MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE.

The following message was received from the Senate:

SENATE CHAMBER, June 1, 1892.

MR. SPEAKER:

I have the honor to herewith transmit to your honorable body the following Joint Resolution:

JOINT RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, This assembly of the Legislature has been called by the Governor to provide a method for the canvassing of the vote to be polled at the general election next to be held in this State; to provide for the election of presidential electors at such election and to consider the advisability of increasing the appropriation for the display from this State at the World's. Resolved, By the Senate of the State of North Dakota, the House of Representatives concurring, that this Legislature shall discuss or consider no bill the subject of which is not recommended in the message addressed by the governor to it unless by unanimous consent.

JOINT SESSION.

The joint session of the two houses was called to order by the Speaker of the House, who introduced the Lieutenant Governor, the President of the Senate.

The President designated the chief clerk of the House as the clerk of the joint session.

The roll of the House and Senate was then called,

All the members being present except Messrs. Burton, Daily, McKendry, Thompson and Triplett of the House, and Messrs. Arnold and Lowry of the Senate.

Mr. Little moved

That the President appoint a joint committee of three from the House and three from the Senate to inform the Governor that the two Houses are in joint session and ready to receive his message,

Which motion prevailed, and

Mr. President appointed as such committee

Messrs. Little, Ink and Patch, of the Senate, and Messrs. Gill, Fay and Burke, of the House.

The joint committee to wait upon the Governor returned escorting the Governor.

The president introduced the Hon. Andrew H. Burke, governor, who delivered the following message:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

An extraordinary occasion having arisen by reason of the lack of provision in the laws of the State for the canvass of the vote whereby the representatives to the Electoral College which shall elect the next President of the United States are chosen, and for canvassing the general election returns of the State, I have, as provided by the Constitution, called you together in special session.

The dignity of the State is not only involved in this omission of proper laws, but our duty to the National Government is thus rendered impossible of performance. The duty of your Executive is fulfilled in calling the assembly of the people's representatives together, and it remains with you to take such action as may seem proper to you in the premises.

The sentiment of the people, as expressed to me from almost every county of the State, also warrants me in calling your attention to the matter of an additional appropriation to the World's Fair fund. At your regular session you saw fit to make a certain appropriation, which was then thought sufficient; but a very large number of the citizens of North Dakota express themselves as dissatisfied with the amount set aside by you for that purpose, in view of the improved condition of affairs in the State generally since your adjournment. And the number who agree in this matter is so large that, in deference to their wishes, expressed in private to me, in public through the press and in mass meeting throughout the State, I bring this subject to the notice of your honorable body.

It is also my duty as Executive to inform you that it is the wish of the people of the State, so far as I am advised—and I should not venture to convey the message to you if I was not convinced from the multitude of expressions which have come to me that the sentiment of a majority of the people accords with this wish—that your session be short, and that you consider only the questions named above.

It is proper for me to say, however, that I have assumed the responsibility of taking you from your respective avocations and of incurring expense to you and to the State, with great reluctance. And especially have I felt the extreme delicacy of signifying to you the feeling with reference to the World's Fair fund, and with reference to the consideration of only two subjects at this special session; but believing, as we all do, in that fundamental principle of American liberty, that the people are the rulers, and that your honorable body, as well as myself, are but the servants of the people, and having been made acquainted with their desires, I felt that I should fail in my duty should I neglect the communication of them to you.

Since the close of the last session death has taken from us two of our associates. Representatives Daily, of Walsh, and Thompson, of Traill, have been summoned to meet with the great majority. I take this opportunity to pay my tribute of respect to their memory.

In welcoming you to your Capital I take pleasure in renewing the acquaintances of your former session, and trust that this one will be harmonious and that the duty before you will be cheerfully and expeditiously performed.

Having thus fulfilled my constitutional duty, I leave these matters in your hands, satisfied that you will deal with them wisely and as, in your judgment, the honor and dignity of the State and duty to yourselves and your constituency demand.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

In relation to the speedy passage by the Congress of the United States of the so-called Dolph Land bill for relief of certain settlers in the Red River valley, State of North Dakota.

WHEREAS, The St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway company, a whereas, The St. Faul, Minheapons & Mankoba Kanway company, a corporation organized under the laws of Minnesota, acquired title to certain lands in the valley of the Red River of the North in the then territory of Minnesota, now State of North Dakota, by the timely construction of certain lines of railway, in accordance with the provisions of certain acts of congress, approved March 3, 1857 (11 U.S. Statutes at Large, 195) and March 3, 1865 (13 U. S. Statutes at Large, 526), which title was confirmed by decision of the Su-preme Court of the United States, filed December 22, 1890; and, WHEREAS, Subsequent to the accupition of such title and prior to its

WHEREAS, Subsequent to the acquisition of such title and prior to its confirmation, a large and meritorious class of citizens, now residents of this State, settled upon, improved and paid for said lands the government price charged for lands under the pre-emption and homestead laws of the United States, in good faith, supposing said lands to be unappropriated public domains, subject to acquisition under said laws, and received patents therefor from the government, and,

WHEREAS, The bill now pending before congress (Senate Bill No. 3134) will, if passed and carried into effect, allow said St. Paul, Minneapolis &

Manitoba Railway company to relinquish all its claim and title to said lands. and to select in lieu thereof other lands, vacant and unappropriated, and situated in states or territories along the lines of said railway, and will render such settlers secure in the enjoyment of their homes and their property, and prevent the institution of legal proceedings for their ejectment from lands upon which they have erected homestead improvements costing many hun-

upon which they have erected homesteau improvements costing many hun-dreds of thousands of dollars; now, therefore, *Resolved*, By the Senate, the House concurring, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be earnestly requested to use their utmost en-deavors to effect the speedy passage and approval of said bill. *Resolved*. That the Governor be and is requested to forward copies of these resolutions to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

To the Honorable Speaker and House of Representatives: GENTLEMEN: You desire my opinion as to whether or not House Bill No. 4 is in conflict with Section 61, Article 2 of our State Constitution which provides that no bill shall embrace more than one subject, which must be expressed in its title.

This section must receive a reasonable construction, and whenever a matter contained in the statute may fairly be considered germane to the subject expressed in the title it is sufficient.

The subject matter of this bill is to provide for the filling of the respective public offices referred to and keeping the same filled at all times.

The bill referred to provides for the election of officers, also the method of filling any vacancies which may occur in any of said offices, all of which is necessary to carry out the main object of the bill before referred to.

I am therefore of the opinion that said bill is not in conflict with the section of the constitution referred to, hence is constitutional.
