## FIRST DAY.

TERRITORY OF DAKOTA, COUNCIL CHAMBER, YANKTON, Monday, December 2, 1872.

On the 2nd day of December, A. D. 1872, it being the day provided by law for the convening of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Dakota,

The Members of the Council of said Assembly met in the Council Chamber at Yankton, the Capital, at 12 o'clock M. and proceeded to an organization in the following order, towit:

The Council was called to order by Geo. T. Rea, former Secretary, who called the roll of Members.

The following named gentlemen responded to their names: First Legislative District.—Alex. Hughes, O. F. Stevens and Henry Smith.

Second District.—E. B. Crew, Nelson Miner and Joseph Mason.

Third District.—C. H. McIntyre, John Lawrence and D. T. Bramble.

Fourth District.—H. P. Cooley.

Fifth District.—W. T. McKay.

Sixth District.-G. W. Harlan.

Seventh District.—Enos Stutsman.

The prescribed oath of office was then administered to the above named Members by Chief Justice G. W. French, whereupon,

On motion of Mr. Lawrence,

Mr. Crew was elected temporary President.

On motion of Mr. Stutsman.

Mr. Geo. I. Foster was elected temporary Secretary.

On motion of Mr. Lawrence,

The Council then proceeded to the election of permanent officers.

On motion of Mr. Lawrence.

Mr. Hughes was placed in nomination for President.

On motion of Mr. Bramble,

Mr. Miner was placed in nomination for President.

There being no further nominations,

And a vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Hughes, were

Messrs. Crew, Harlan, Hughes, Lawrence, McKay, Mason, McIntyre and Stutsman.

Those voting for Mr. Miner, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Smith and Stevens.

Mr. Miner voted for Mr. Mason.

It appearing that Mr. Hughes had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected President of the Council.

On motion of Mr. Stutsman,

A committee of two was appointed by the Chair, to wait upon the President elect to the chair.

Messrs. McIntyre and Stevens were appointed as such committee.

The committee having discharged their duty.

The President took the Chair.

Chief Justice G. W. French then administered the oath of office to the President.

The election of a Secretary being then in order.

On motion of Mr. McIntyre.

Mr. Geo. I. Foster was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Bramble,

Mr. T. F. Singiser was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations,

And a vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Foster, were

Messrs. Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, McKay, Mason, McIntyre. Stutsman and Mr. President.

Those voting for Mr. Singiser, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Miner, Smith and Stevens.

It appearing that Mr. Foster had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Secretary of the Council.

The election of an Assistant Secretary being then in order. On motion of Mr. Harlan,

Mr. Wm. Ball was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations made for Assistant Secretary,

The vote was taken viva voce, and

Mr. Ball was declared duly elected Assistant Secretary of the Council.

The election of an Enrolling Clerk being then in order,

On motion of Mr. Stevens,

Mr. J. P. Walters was placed in nomination,

On motion of Mr. Mason,

Mr. Randolph Mostow was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations,

And the vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Walters, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Smith and Stevens.

Those voting for Mr. Mostow, were

Messrs. Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, McKay, Mason, McIntyre, Miner, Stutsman and Mr. President.

It appearing that Mr. Mostow had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Enrolling Clerk of the Council.

The election of Sergeant-at-Arms being then in order.

On motion of Mr. Lawrence,

Mr. Thomas Reed was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Bramble,

Mr. Barney Cole was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations,

And the vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Reed, were

Messrs. Crew, Lawrence, McIntyre, Mason, McKay, Miner, Stutsman and Mr. President.

Those voting for Mr. Cole, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Smith and Stevens.

It appearing that Mr. Reed had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Sergeant-at-Arms of the Council.

The election of Messenger being then in order.

On motion of Mr. Crew,

Mr. Knud Simonson was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Stevens,

Mr. C. J. Brouillette was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Miner,

Mr. L. Anderson was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations,

And the vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Simonson, were

Messrs. Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, McKay, Mason, McIntyre, Stutsman and Mr. President.

Those voting for Mr. Brouillette, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Smith and Stevens.

Mr. Miner voted for Mr. Anderson.

It appearing that Mr. Simonson had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Messenger of the Council.

The election of Fireman being then in order.

On motion of Mr. Lawrence,

Mr. C. Bensen was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Miner,

Mr. L. Anderson was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations,

And the vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Benson, were

Messrs. Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, Mason, McIntyre, McKay, Smith, Stutsman and Mr. President.

Those voting for Mr. Anderson, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Miner and Stevens.

It appearing that Mr. Benson had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Fireman of the Council.

The election of Chaplain being then in order.

On motion of Mr. Lawrence,

The Rev. J. T. Walker was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Stevens,

Rev. W. McK. Cain was placed in nomination.

On motion of Mr. Miner,

The Rev. Mr. D. P. Brown was placed in nomination.

There being no further nominations made,

And the vote being ordered, it resulted as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Walker, were

Messrs. Bramble, Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, McKay, McIntyre, Stutsman and Mr. President.

Those voting for Mr. Cain, were Messrs. Cooley, Smith and Stevens.

Those voting for Mr. Brown, were

Messrs. Mason and Miner.

It appearing that Mr. Walker had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Chaplain of the Council.

The officers elect, present, then came forward and the oath of their respective offices was administered by Chief Justice G. W. French.

## RESOLUTION.

Mr. Stutsman submitted the following resolution which was read, considered and agreed to:

Resolved. That a committee of three be appointed by the Chair, to draft rules for the government of the Council, and to act with a like committee on the part of the House as a joint committee to draft rules for the government of the two Houses, and that until such time as new rules shall be adopted, the Rules of the last Session of the Council, shall govern this Council, and the Joint Rules of the last Session of the Legislature, shall be temporarily adopted.

The Chair appointed as such committee,

Messrs. Stutsman, Lawrence and Stevens.

Ordered, That the Secretary acquaint the House therewith.

Mr. Crew submitted the following resolution which was read, considered and agreed to:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to inform the House that the Council is permanently organized.

The Chair appointed as such committee,

Messrs. Crew, Bramble and McIntyre.

Whereupon, the committee retired and after a brief absence returned and reported as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT.—Your Special committee appointed to inform the House that the Council is permanently organized, beg leave to report that the duty assigned them has been discharged.

The Council adjourned until Tuesday, Dec. 3rd, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Read a first and second times.

Thereupon, Mr. McIntyre moved to lay the bill on the table.

The ayes and noes being desired by two members and ordered, and it being put,

It was decided in the negative.

Ayes 3; noes 10, as follows:

Those voting in the affirmative, were

Messrs. McIntyre, Miner and Stutsman.

Those voting in the negative, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, Mason. McKay, Smith, Stevens and Mr. President.

So the motion to lay on the table was disagreed to.

Mr. Stutsman moved to indefinitely postpone the further consideration of the bill.

The ayes and noes being desired by two members and ordered, and it being put,

It was decided in the negative.

Ayes 3; noes 10, as follows:

Those voting in the negative, were

Messrs. Bramble, Cooley, Crew, Harlan, Lawrence, Mason. McKay, Smith, Stevens and Mr. President.

So the motion to indefinitely postpone was disagreed to.

Mr. McIntyre then moved to refer the bill to a special committee of two, and that the bill be ordered printed.

The ayes and noes being desired by two members and ordered, and it being put,

It was decided in the negative.

Whereupon, Mr. Lawrence moved to suspend the rules, and that the bill be read a third time and put upon its final passage,

And the question being put,

Read a third time.

The question then being on its passage, and it being put, "shall the bill pass?"

It was decided in the affirmative.

The question then being on agreeing to its title, and it being put,

The title was agreed to.

Ordered, That the Secretary acquaint the House therewith, and request concurrence therein.

Mr. Bramble submitted the following resolution, which was read, considered and agreed to.

*Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Territory be requested to furnish the members of the Council such copies of the laws and journals of previous sessions, as he may have on hand.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. Stutsman, from the special joint committee, on the part of the Council, submitted the following report:

PRESIDENT:—The joint committee on the part of the Council, have to report that the joint committee waited upon his excellency, the Governor, and communicated to him the message of the two Houses, and in reply were informed by him that he will be pleased to communicate with the two Houses in joint convention, in the hall of the House of Representatives, this day, at 3 o'clock P. M.

### NOTICE OF BILL.

Mr. Bramble, by unanimous consent, gave notice that he will at some future day of the session introduce a bill for a charter for the city of Yankton.

A committee of the House being announced, through their chairman, communicated as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT:—We have been appointed a committee to inform the Council that the House is now prepared to meet your honorable body in joint convention, and the committee will escort the Council to the Representative Hall: thereupon

On motion of Mr. Stutsman,

The Council proceeded to the hall of the House of Representatives, to meet the House in joint convention.

### IN JOINT CONVENTION.

The Speaker of the House presiding, called the joint convention to order.

On motion of Mr. Turner.

The clerks of the House were instructed to act as clerks of the joint convention.

The roll being called, the following gentlemen answered to their names:

Absent -- Mr. Hamilton.

A quorum of each house being present, the chair proclaimed the joint convention fully organized, and ready for the business for which it was convened; whereupon

Mr. Turner moved that a committee of two, to consist of one member of the Council and one from the House, be appointed to wait upon his excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the two houses have assembled in joint convention, and await his pleasure.

Which motion was agreed to: whereupon

Messrs. Turner and Bramble were appointed as such committee.

After a brief absence, the committee returned, accompanied by his excellency, the Governor, the Chief Justice and other Federal officers, and reported as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN:—Your committee appointed to wait upon his excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the joint convention of the Legislative Assembly is in session, and await his pleasure, have discharged that duty, and have the honor to present his excellency, the Governor.

His excellency was then invited to the Speaker's stand, when he delivered his second biennial message.

His excellency having retired.
On motion of Mr. McIntyre,
The joint convention was dissolved.
The members returning to the Council Chamber.
The Council was called to order by the
President in the chair.

## MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Mr. Mason was permitted to have his vote reconsidered in favor of Council Bill No. 1, entitled "A bill for a Joint Resolution providing for the election of a Public Printer for the hegislative Assembly and the Territory of Dakota," which bill passed the Council on the 4th inst.

Mr. Lawrence submitted the following resolution, which was read and considered:

Resolved. That Council Rule No. 22, be amended to read as follows:

22. All bills and joint resolutions after the first reading shall be printed, unless otherwise ordered by the Council, and for that purpose they shall immediately upon such reading be delivered by the Secretary or Assistant Secretary, to the Chairman of the committee on Public Printing, who shall deliver the same to the Public Printer elected by this Legislative Assembly, and whenever any printing of whatever description, shall be ordered by this Council, the same shall be done by such Public Printer.

Whereupon Mr. Stutsman raised to a point of order, to-wit: That the Council cannot amend the temporary rules adopted for the government of the Council.

The President decided that the point was not well taken.

Mr. Bramble in the chair.

Mr. Stevens moved that the resolution now before the Council be laid on the table, and that the committee on rules be requested to report to-morrow.

Thereupon Mr. Hughes submitted the following amendment:

That the committee on rules be instructed to report a rule to-morrow, in conformity with the resolution now under consideration.

Mr. Stutsman then moved that the Council do now adjourn. Which motion was disagreed to.

The question then being on the motion of Mr. Hughes to amend, and it being put,

It was agreed to.

The question then recurring on the motion of Mr. Stevens as amended, and being put,

It was agreed to.

## NOTICE OF BILLS.

Mr. Miner gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to revise the Criminal Code, approved January 9th, 1863, and to revise the Justices Code, approved January 7th, 1863, and to repeal all laws in conflict with the same.

Also that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to amend Section one of Chapter twenty-three of the Session Laws of 1870-71.

Mr. President gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to amend an act entitled an act to incorporate the Dakota & Northwestern railroad company, approved January 11th, 1867:

Also that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to amend the Exemption laws of Dakota Territory;

Also that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to repeal an act to amend an act entitled an act to simplify and abridge the practice, pleadings and proceedings of the courts of this Territory, approved January 13th, 1871;

Also that on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, he will ask leave to introduce a bill to amend chapter seven of the session laws laws of 1868-9, relating to preliminary examinations.

### OPINION OF CHIEF JUSTICE G. W. FRENCH.

To the Hon. Alexander Hughes, President; and Gentlemen of the Council:

In accordance with the desire of your honorable body, as made known to us through the Hon. C. H. McIntyre, chairman of the committee, whose duty it was to wait upon the judges for the purpose of learning their opinion of the law touching the rights and powers of the Secretary of this Territory, as also the right and powers of your Legislative body in the expenditure of the public moneys which are being appropriated by Congress from session to session, for the printing of the laws and other incidental expenses attending the sitting of our Territorial Legislature, we have to say; that after carefully examining the law upon that subject, we are clearly of the opinion that the Secretary of our Territory and none other is the disbursing agent of the Government; and as such, has the entire control of said appropriations, and

therefore has the sole right to appoint whoever he chooses as public printer, as he is held responsible by the general government for an honest, faithful and judicious expenditure of said appropriations.

OPINION OF ASSOCIATE JUSTICE W. W. BROOKINGS.

To the Honorable Council:

I concur in the opinion of the Chief Justice relative to the public printing. My reasons for such concurrence are that the same question came up in the first Legislature of Dakota, and was then fully discussed and unanimously conceded that the Legislature had no control over the printing. A stronger reason in evidence of such decision is that the universal customs of Territories has been to leave the matter entirely in the hands of the Secretary of the Territory; custom thus making such course a law even were it not expressly placed under the control of the Secretary by statute.

Can it be that for the last thirty years, the several Secretary's of the several Territories have usurped the rights and privileges of the Legislatures in the matter of public printing? The Secretary in this matter only executes the instructions he receives from the First Comptroller of the Treasury.

I am therefore of the firm opinion that the manner in which the printing has been disposed of heretofore, is the correct one, and that the Legislature has no control whatever over such disposition, to the extent of the appropriation made by Congress for such printing.

7 volumes of Congressional Globe, 2d session of 42d Congress;

9 copies of Congressional Directory, 3d session of 42d Congress;

200 copies of Agricultural Report for 1871-2;

150 packages of assorted Seeds for farm and garden; 30 packages of imported Tree Seeds for western prairies.

My reason for thus sending these seeds and documents to you in bulk, is, that they may the more safely reach the Territory in this way, and be distributed among members of the Legislature, and by them sent into the several counties which they respectively represent; inasmuch as fully one half of the seeds, documents and plants sent out by me last session, in single packages to individual addresses throughout the Territory, were never received by the parties to whom they were mailed.

A supply of bulbs, cuttings, sprouts and floral plants will be sent before the opening of early spring in Dakota.

No civil case which is in the jurisdiction of the courts of justice of the peace shall be commenced originally in the district courts of this Territory.

With said amendments, the committee recommend that the bill do pass.
