## DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

The Press and Dakotalan's Report of the Proceedings of the Council and House of Representatives.

Fourteenth Session\_21st Day

Council.

Monday, Jan. 31-Council not in ses-

Monday, Jan. 31—The house convened at ten o'clock a. m., and was opened with prayer by the chaplain.

Mr. Speaker in the chair and all the members present excepting Inman, Moore, Rohr and Thompson.

The journal of the two preceding ses sions was read and approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Ellefson, from the committee on agricuture and manufactures, reported hack house file 42, with a recommendation that it pass.

Mr. Kennedy, from the com on engrossment, ported house files five, forty-one and twenty-seven as correctly engrossed.

Mr. Warner, from the committee on education, reported back house file 48 with amendments and a recommendation that it pass as amended.

Mr. Miller, from the committee on finance and revenue, reported back council bill 17 with amendments and a recommendation that it pass as amended.

Mr. Thielman, from the select commit tee consisting of the delegation from 13th district, to whom was referred house file 30, to incorporate the village of Parker, reported the same back with the re port that the committee was unanimous ly in favor of its passage.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Mr. La Moure presented a resolution calling for the appointment of a special committee of two members from judicial district who shall draft a bill for the apportionment of representation in the next legislature, and that the speaker be a men.ber of such committee. Also that the speaker be given time to report such committee. The resolution

By Mr. French-House file fifty-three to provide for the payment of costs in criminal actions in unorganized counties.

By Mr. French-House file fifty-four. to amend section 501 of the civil code and authorizing insurance corporations to invest in real estate in Dakota.

By Mr. Thorne-house file fifty-five, authorizing the county commissioners of Minnehaha county to issue bonds to

complete a jail, and for other purposes
By Mr. Warner—house file fifty-six to repeal certain sections of the funding

act of Lawrence county.

By Mr. Warner—house file fifty-seven to incorporate the city of Deadwood.

By Mr. Warner—House bill fifty-eight -joint resolution providing that the legislative session adjourn on the 19th day of February. The preamble recites in effect that, it is rumored that the session has been extended by congress to sixty days, but that it is the sense of the legislature that the business can be finished in forty days.

ENROLLED BILLS.

Mr. Kennedy, from the committee on enrollment, reported house files three and twenty-two as correctly enrolled.

COUNCIL BILLS.

Council bill five, to amend section one of chapter nineteen, had its second reading and was referred to the committee on insurance, banks and banking.

Council bill eleven, to amend section ninety-six of the justice's code, had its second reading and was referred to the committee on judiciary.

Council bill fifteen, substitute, to locate establish and endow a territorial normal school, came up for second reading, but further action was suspended until the substitute be printed.

Council bill twenty-one, to authorize county commissioners to levy a tax of not more than eight mills for ordinary county expenses, including the support of the poor, had its second reading and was referred to the committee on finance and revenue.

Council bill twenty-two, repealing or amending sections 660, 661 and 666 of the civil code, had its second reading and was referred to the committee on judi-

Council bill twenty-three, to amend section 1,748 of the civil code, had its second reading and was referred to the committee on insurance, banks and banking.

HOUSE BILLS.

House file forty-nine, to amend the act

relative to the employment of short-hand reporters in district courts, had its second reading and was referred to the com-

mittee on insurance, banks and banking. House-file fifty, defining the bounda-ries of the third judicial district and fixing the time for holding court therein, was, on motion of Mr. L. Moure, refer-red to a special committee, consisting of the members from the third district.

House file thirty-one, to establish a public school law for Dakota, reported from the comation that it pass, came up for its third

reading.

Mr. Dickey moved that the order of third reading of bills be passed over un-til the return of the absent members. Adopted.

RECESS

At 11:10 the house took a recess of ten minutes.

NON-CONCURRED IN.

Mr. La Moure moved that the vote by which the house concurred in the amend. ments of the council to house file three reconsidered and, it was dered. The house then refused to so ordered. conour in the council amendments. The bill orders the printing of the reports of territorial officers and the council amendments cut down the number of copies of each report from 500 to 300, the saving in expense thereby being seven dollars COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

On motion of Mr. Wells, the house 11:40 a. m., went into committee of the whole, Mr. Boyles in the chair, the subjects of consideration being house files five, thirty, forty-two and forty-eight.

THE COMMITTEE ROS at 11:55 a. m. and reported back the bills under consideration with a recommendation that they pass as reported from the

standing committees. The report of the committee was adopted, on motion of Mr. Cross.

House file five provides for the erection of a court house and jail in Lawrence

House file thirty provides for the incorporation of the village of Parker.

House file forty-two relates to brands and marks on live stock.

House file forty-eight authorizes school district number one of Pembina county to issue bonds for the construction of a

AN ATTEMPT AT ADJOURNMENT. Mr. Baynes moved that the house ad-

Mr. Dickey said he would like to have the house consider the subject of the engrossing clerk.

The roll was called and the resolution to adjourn was lost-ten to ten.

THE ENGROSSING CLERK.

Mr. Dickey moved that the committee on engrossment and enrollment be given full authority to act as they see fit in regard to the engrossing clerk. He said that the committee had informed him that the work was all up in good shape and that the clerk desired to be given time to demonstrate that he could comply with the requirements.

On motion of Mr. French, the motion

of Mr. Dickey was laid on the table.

MORE ADJOURNMENT.

A motion was here made to adjourn and on a call of the roll it was lost-eight to-twelve.

FURTHER EXPLANATIONS.

Mr. Donaldson said he had conferred with the engrossing clerk and was satisfied that now that he fully understood the nature of his duties, he would prove satisfactory to the members of the house.

Mr. Warner stated that the engrossing clerk of the house had procured the assistance of the engrossing clerk of the council, which he did not think was proper. If he would procure outside assistance it would be satisfactory.

Mr. Nomland urged that the clerk should be given further trial and that and present action would be an injustice. Mr. French thought the matter should

be definitely settled this morning.

A MOTION.

Mr. Thorne moved that further action upon the subject be postponed until twelve o'clock to-morrow morning, when the house will be prepared to act upon the resignation of the engrossing clerk.

Mr. Ellefson moved as an amendment that further action be postponed until it was found that the clerk did not perform his duties satisfactorily.

The amendment was defeated-eleven

Mr. Dickey moved as an amendment that the last clause of Mr. Thorne's motion, relative to final action on the case. be stricken out.

The amendment was adopted-twelve to eight-and the motion as amended was passed-fourteen to six.

ADJOURNMENT.

The house at 12:45 p. m. adjourned till 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.
