The Press and Dakotaian's Report of the Proceedings of the Council and House of Representatives.

Fourteenth Session-29th and 30th Days.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Tuesday, Feb. 8-The house was called to order at two p. m.

Mr. Speaker in the chair and all members in their seats.

On motion of Mr. Boyles, the house went into committee of the whole on the special and general order, Mr. French in the chair.

The special order was house file twenty-three, providing for a modification of the exemption law

On motion of Mr. Boyles, the general order was first considered and council bill forty-four, to provide for the collection of costs, in cer-tain criminal proceedings, was first con-sidered. The committee finally agreedto report the bill back with a redation that it pass.

Council bill forty-five, amending section one of chapter twenty-two of the political code, was considered and the ommittee agreed to report it back with

a recommendation that it pass.

Council bill forty-six, to amend section fourteen of chapter twenty-one of the

political code, received the same action.

House file fifty-six, to repeal certain ections of the funding act of Lawrence county so as to permit the issue of warrants in lieu of certificates of indebtedness when there is no money in the treasury with which to pay them, was referred back to the house with a recommenda-

tion that it pass.

Council bill fifty-eight, to repeal section fourteen of chapter thirty-nine of the political code, was reported back with a recommendation that it pass.

House file thirty-six, to amend section eighteen of chapter twenty-one of the revised codes, relating to counties and county officers, received conrevised county officers, and county officers, In its original form it specified that commissioners should not consume more than thirty days in each year in public business, except in case of the prevalence of plagues. It was finally recommended for pass with amendments changing thirty days to thirty-six days, exempting Pembins county from the provisions of the act and granting to the commissioners of Lawrence, Pennington, Custer, Clay and Turner sixty-four days in each year for the transaction of business.

House file seventy-five, regulating the sale, purchase and disposition of live stock in the Black Hills counties, was considered, amended and recommended

The special order, house file twentythree, containing modifications of the exemption law, was discussed at length

in the committee.

Finally Mr. Ellefson moved that the bill be reported back with a recommendation that it be indefinitely postponed, but the motion was lost. Mr. Dickey then moved that the bill be committed to the judiciary committee with instructions to report a substitute and the recommendation was carried. At four

THE COMMITTEE ROSE and reported to the house the foregoing action, and on motion of Mr. La Moure the report was accepted and adopted. SUSPENSION OF THE RULES.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, house file eighty-six, vacating the town plat of Madison, Lake county, was brought up for for its several readings and final passage, and was passed by unanin
