# DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

The Press and Dakotaian's Report of the Proceedings of the Council and House of Representatives.

Fourteenth Session-31st and 32nd Days.

The reporter rises to a question of privilege: What has become of the watch-man of the council? Has he "passed

Councilman Day made a brave fight to secure the passage of his bill to exempt breaking on government land from taxation, but a majority of the council was against him and the proposition failed. In the older settled counties the relief contemplated in this measure would not extend to a great many settlers and would make little difference in the pub-lic revenue, but in the newly settled portions of the terrifory where a large majority of the land taken is under the homestead and tree culture acts, and where the title to the soil is still in government, it would very materially lessen the burden of taxation. In the view that the pioneer settlers upon the public lands are entitled to every encouragement that liberal laws can bestow, and should be exempt from all unnecessary burdens of taxataon, the proposed measure was highly commendable.—In the council this forenoon the vote by which the bill was lost yesterday was reconsidered, and it was then passed by ayes, 7; noes, 5. It will now go to the house for the consideration of that body.

Mr. Scobey's bill for the establishment of an agricultural college at Brookings should receive a cordial support from every member of the legislature who is in favor of the establishment of such institutions. The town of Brookings is in the center of one of the finest sections of agricultural land in the ter-ritory, and, when the system of railroads now projected in the Sioux valley is completed, will be easily accessible from all parts of southern Dakota. bill is carefully drawn, requires a liberal donation of land from the citizens of Brookings, and if passed will doubtless form the nucleus of what will in a few years be an honor and great benefit to the educational interests of the terri-

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Scobey, from committee on educa tion, reported and recommended to passage of council bill 92, for an agricultural college at Brookings.

Mr. Shaw, from the committee on charitable and penal institutions, reported a substitute for council bill 89, to provide for the instruction and education of deaf and dumb persons, and recommended its passage.

The same gentleman from the committee on finance and expenditures, reported with amendments council bill 83, making an approprianion for the deaf and dumb school at Sioux falls, recommending its passage.

On motion the reports were adopted. Mr. Jolley from the committee on expenditures, reported with amendments house file 120, providing for the employment of assistant enrolling and engross ing clerks. The amendments cut down appropriation for the payment of such assistants from one hundred to fifty dollars.

Mr. Day, from the committee on counties reported favorably house file 55, to authorize the county commissioners of Minnehaha county to issue bonds of said county to complete a county jail and for other purposes.

RECONSIDERED.

On motion of Mr. Day the vote was reconsidered by which council bill 78, exempting breaking on government land from taxation, was lost yesterday.

Number 121, to amend section nine of chapter thirty-nine, of the political code, to apply to the county of Lawrence, to the committee on judiciary.

Number 122, supplementary to house tile thirteen, relative to voting bonds in Pembina county.

APPORTIONMENT.

Mr. La Moure moved that the rules be suspended, and house file 119, relating to apportionment, be put upon its final passage.

An amendment, offered by Mr. Kennedy, which was adopted, made Lake county the senior county of the sixth district nstead of Brookings.

Mr. Inman moved to amend the bill by making the counties of Union and Clay the first district, instead of Union and Lincoln and supported his motion in a lengthy argument.

The proposition was discussed by Messrs. Dickey, Wells, Thielman, Donaldson, La Monre.

Amondments of Mr. Inman objected to and ruled out.

The bill was then passed, Messrs. Hale and Inman, McBratney, Dickey, Landman and Mr. Speaker voting in the negative and the rest in the affirmative, except Messrs. Nomland and Ellefson, wlo were absent.
