The council assembled at 4 p. m., the president in the chair and all members present, except Mr. Shaw.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE.

A message was received from the house announcing the passage by that body of house files 35, 44, 51, 53, 106 and 123, and requesting the concurrence of the coun-

Mr. Martin resented a petition from citizens of Custer county, representing that many citizens of Custer county are engaged in stock raising and that their cattle are kept in Forsythe county, which is unorganized, whereby the county of Custer is prevented from taxing such property of residents, and asking the legislature to pass a bill consolidating the counties of Custer and Forsythe.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Jolley, from the committee on en rolled and engrossed bills, reported that he had on Saturday presented to the governor council bills 34, 40, 44, 45, 51

Mr. Scobey, from a special committee, reported with amendments, council bill to authorize Kingsbury county to issue bonds for the purpose of building a court house and jail, and recommending its passage as amended. The motion was lost and the resolution went to its regular or-

Mr. Cross presented a concurrent res

lution, calling upon the governor for the return of house file fifty-nine for correc-tion, and under a suspension of the rules the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Ellefson presented a resolution reciting that the wrong copy of house file thirty-one had been sent to the governor and authorizing the sending to him of a corrected copy. The bill provides for the instruction in German and other foreign languages in the public schools. The bill signed by the governor ommitted the clause "other foreign languages."

At this stage of the proceedings a mes-sage was received from the council of the passage of a joint resolution authorizing a correct copy of the bill to be sent to the governor, which resolution was pass ed, under a suspension of the rules.

To overcome the existing difficulty Mr. La Moure, by unanimous consent, introduced house file 135, an amendment to the defective bill, and, under a suspension of the rules, it was passed.

Mr. Warner announced that house file five had been corrected and on motion the number was changed to 136 and the bill was passed.
