DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

The Press and Dakotalan's Report of the Proceedings of the Council and House of Repremeentatives.

Fourteenth Session-37th and 38th Da:

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AFTERNOON SESSION.

The council re-convened at 2:30 p. m. with the president in the chair.

Roll call showed that Messrs. Fisher Scobey, Wiggin and Wilson were absent REFORT ON ENROLLING COMMITTEE.

Mr. Jolleys from the enrolling and en mmittee, reported that had deposited with the secretary of the tions, and had called at the executive office with a number of bills for the action of the governor, but found the office locked. He also informed the council that the committee had employed C. C. Valentine as an assistant enrolling and

On motion of Mr. Shaw, the action of the committee was endorsed.

CALL OF THE HOUSE.

On motion of Mr. Shaw a call of the house was ordered, and the sergeant arms directed to bring in the absent members. The absentees were soon found and brought in, and further proceedings under the call were dispensed with.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR. A message was received from the gov ernor announcing his approval of the following council bills;

No. 32, an act to amend section eleven of chapter 39 of the political code.

No. 29, an act to legalize the acts of Geo. H. Walsh as notary public of the territory of Dakota.

An act to repeal section 14. of chapter 39, of the political code.

No. 59, an act in relation to attorney's less in justices' courts.

No. 68 an act to amend section seven of chapter 39, of the political code.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE. The council then went into committee of the whole, Mr. Fisher in the chair, and

proceeded to the consideration of council bill 103, to authorize any school district in the territory to issue bonds to build a school house, and council bill thirty, cre ating the office of commissioner of finance and banking and defining the duies thereof.

After some time spent in the consideration of these measures, it was moved and carried that when the committee rise it recommend that council bill 103 be re ported back without recommendation, and that council bill 30 be reported back with a recommendation that pass.

House file 52 providing for the government of the hospital for the insane, was hen taken up.

Amendments were made increasing the number of trustees from three to five, making three of them residents of Ynol-ton county; reducing the salary of assis-tant physician from \$1,000 to \$750 per

annum; making a majority of the board a quorum for the transaction of all busi-ness except the appointment of officers; providing that the trustees shall receive no other compensation than mileage at the rate of ten cents per mile for each mile of travel in the discharge of their official duties:

The committee then arose and through its chairman reported the bill back, and recommended its passage as amended.
On motion the recommendations of the committee of the whole were adopted.

During the afternoon two messages were received from the governor, through his private secretary. One was a report of all the reprieves, commutations of sentence and pardons made during the past two years and the other was a veto of house bill 63, which reads as follows:

lwo years and the other was a veto of house bill 63, which reads as follows:

Executive office, Territory of Dakota, Yankton, February 16, 1881.—To the House of Representatives of the Territory of Dakota: I return herewith to the house of representatives, in which body it originated, bill No. 63, entitled; "An act to create the county of Griggs and define the boundaries thereof," without my approval and signature, and with my objections thereto.

I. This bill dismembers three counties, two of which are organized and well settled, cutting twenty townships from Traill, two from Barnes and what would be equal to eight townships from Trail, two from Barnes and what would be equal to eight townships from Foster country, without attempting to provide for any financial adjustment of the outstanding indebtedness of the counties from which the proposed county of Griggs is to be carved.

II. The bill utterly fails to provide for submitting the question of division and dismemberment, to the voters of the organized counties of Trail and Barnes from which a large portion of the proposed county of Griggs is to be taken, and is therefore in direct conflict with the principles of the bill which I am advised, passed your body on yesterday providing that organized counties shall not be divided without the consent of a majority of the voters therein.

III. I am not advised that the people in the counties proposed to be dismense.

III. I am not advised that the people in the counties proposed to be dismemented bered have petitioned for the creation of this new county and on the contrary from a failure to submit the question for their sanction by the terms of the bill, I am led to doubt that this action is desired by any considerable number of the people to be effected by the proposed division and creation of a new county, and believing it to be a great wrong to disnuember organized counties and force unjust burdens upon the people inhabiting them without their consent, I cannot approve this bill.

COMPENSATION FOR CLERKS.

Mr. Speaker, (Mr. French in the chair) introduced, by unanimous consent, house file 177, to provide compensation for the chief clerks of the council and house for completing the business of the session. It appropriates six dollars per day, not to exceed twenty-five days, to the clerks for necessary work after the adjournment of the legislature.

The bill had its several readings and was passed, Messrs. Hale, Inman, Moore, Thielman and Van Osdel voting in the negative.

THE SPECIAL ORDER.

The special order being the veto messages of the governor, given in yesterday, was taken up.

House file 35, creating the county of Walsh and defining the boundaries thereof was passed over the veto, Mr. Thompson alone voting in the negative.

House file 63, creating the county of Griggs and defining the boundaries thereof came up for passage over the veto and was passed, Messrs. Baynes, Landman, Moore, Thompson and VanOsdel voting in the negative.

Council bill 22, expunging the act requiring married women to be examined apart from their husbands before signing documents transfering property, came up for passage over the veto of the governor, and was passed; Messrs. Dickey and Landman voting in the negative.
