Rep. Nicolson moved that the acting Chief Clerk appoint a committee of two to escort the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the acting Chief Clerk appointed as such committee Reps. Nicolson and Belquist.

I have known Stanley Saugstad for many, many years and I can personally verify that by nature he is friendly, and gets along well with people. By education and experience he has the background to carry out his duties as they should be carried out. Through his own training and self discipline, he will give to his planning that which is so necessary for us to have a successful session. He will not shirk his responsibilities.

In presenting his name to you as a candidate for the Speakership, I wish to commend him to you and urge your support for him."

Rep. Tweten: "I wish to second the nomination of Rep. Saugstad for the office of Speaker. I have had the privilege of working with Stanley for the past two Sessions and I am sure he will serve this office with honor. I wish to second what Mr. Miller has already said. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to second his nomination."

Rep. Haugen: "I would like to place before this assembly the name of a man I have known practically all my life. He is a hard worker in this legislature and always supports all good legislation. This man back in his home county of Richland is thought of very highly and I would like to nominate Thomas Stallman."

Rep. Anderson of McHenry: "I would like to second the nomination of Mr. Stallman. He is a man who is a veteran of World War 2; was on Saipan, Iwa Jima and the Marianas. I feel he is well qualified and by getting only 17 more votes from the majority he can be elected."

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE TO THE 38th LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Ladies and Gentlemen of this 38th Legislative Assembly, officers of the administrative and judicial branches of our state government, we share the honor and responsibility of being chosen to serve all of the people of North Dakota under our constitutional form of government.

To be a part of this impressive ceremony in these stately chambers of the North Dakota House of Representatives is an experience both humbling and exhilarating for all of us. In the days ahead, there will be proposals and legislation presented representing political philosophy. This is as it should be. However, the vast majority of legislation upon which you will act will not represent political philosophy but will be offered in the never-ending process of adapting our governmental services to the evolution of our times. Political overtones should be minimized where partisanship serves no useful purpose, and political viewpoint should be emphasized where the best traditions of our system of government so require. Because of the division in political control between the majority in this legislative assembly and myself as governor, it is obvious that maximum accomplishment for our citizens can take place only if you and I pursue sincerely

a course of co-operation and respect of viewpoint. I pledge you this co-operation and respect. I invite the leaders of the Republican and Democratic-NPL parties to consult with me often so that we may reach timely understanding on proposed legislation. Your advice and inquiry as individual legislators is valued by me, and I welcome it at any time.

Section 75 of our North Dakota Constitution directs me as governor to "communicate to the legislative assembly by message, information of the condition of the State, and recommend such measures as (I) shall deem expedient." In carrying out this responsibility, I respectfully present this message to you, high-lighting those areas of state government which have requirements of major importance.

DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT — IS IT MEASURING UP?

Several months ago in Washington, D. C., while awaiting an appointment, I visited a small museum in the basement of the Department of the Interior Building. Here was a display explaining the original land survey system which established the basic political subdivision, the township, over 175 years ago. Surveyors tramped the wilderness to block off these townships from base lines and master meridians. Other displays around the museum room showed how a river, with its early-day transportation facilities, would often be the only reason for the location of a boundary of a new state. Rivers also determined the location of cities, some of which would later become state capitals or county seats.

The little country school house was located in another political subdivision — the school district; the school district was designed small enough so that youngsters from any part of the district could walk to and from school if they had to. The counties were formed so that any citizen had a good chance of driving his horses to the county seat in one day, from even the remote edges of the county. The states were carved from territories to create a governmental unit responsible for a full spectrum of governmental services. Transportation, whether by water or by land, played a dominant role in establishing units of government and the location of governmental headquarters. The political subdivisions thus formed were sound and practical for our system of government at those moments in our history.

But today, one has only to walk from that museum in Washington, D. C., to the traffic-clogged street in front of the Department of the Interior Building to receive the full impact of our vastly different world and its modern-day requirements of government. The fantastic rising productivity of our nation's economy, the instantaneous communication, our swift modes of travel, the exploding population, mounting demands for governmental services, the expanding role of the Federal government, and the test of democracy and Capitalism against competing ideologies — all cry out for changes in our governmental structure and services which are consistent with the needs of this second half of the twentieth century.

Political analyst Walter Lippman recently expressed the concern of many citizens when he pointed to democratic

government's apparent inability to make necessary changes in its own structure. We may become victims of our own pride in the past and a false dedication to a democratic process dying from obsolescence.

Shouldn't we North Dakotans be asking ourselves these questions: How does our North Dakota state and local government measure up to present-day requirements? Should school districts now be even larger to increase the education return to our tax dollar? Should the township governments be consolidated within, but consistent to, the high school district boundaries to equalize tax assessment and encourage optimum planning of such things as construction and maintenance of school bus routes? Should counties be enlarged to eliminate costly duplication and dilution of governmental services within adjacent counties, and provide for planning over a larger geographical area? Should councils of local government be established to encourage the installation of a working mechanism for municipal, county, school district and other political subdivisions in mutual action to solve mutual problems? Should such entities as municipalities and river basin development agencies be allowed to plan and develop across state lines? Should the states be stepping up their activities in bi-lateral compacts and regional co-operation? Should the citizens of North Dakota be modernizing our State Constitution through a Constitutional Commission charged to extend its activities over the next four or five bienniums, bringing to the voters at each general election a modernized section of our Constitution for their approval? Should we reconsider the 1942 North Dakota study on governmental reorganization? This reorganization plan, cut short by World War II, is still pertinent and if adopted would bring our state government closer to current requirements. Should we ask a neutral study agency such as the UND Bureau of Government Research to prepare recommendations for state government reorganization by sections, to be presented to the Legislature over several bienniums?

I believe all of these actions should be taken in order that the increasing demands upon local government be absorbed without a corresponding rise in governmental cost. Each year, our taxpayers call for leadership to stem the inefficiencies of government at all levels. The increased role of the federal government looms as an alternative. We can point to many instances of federal government intervention caused by the inability or unwillingness of the states to come to grips with their state-level problems. The ability of our local democratic form of government to react to changing economic and social conditions at all levels depends upon you and me. We should approach the proposals of change in this session with courage and determination.

You will note that the changes which I have suggested are in governmental structure and administration. I have not included the political framework of government such as the precincts, legislative districts, legislative apportionment and election law. For even though some changes are desirable in the political framework of government, such changes are not necessarily essential to modernizing governmental structure and administration.

There is, however, one matter involving our political framework of government which must be resolved in this session, and that is legislative reapportionment. The Constitutional amendment which directs reapportionment seriously limits our ability to give all of our citizens equality of representation in our House of Representatives.

There will be those of us who feel that the Senate should also be reapportioned at the same time, either to provide a strict population representation or to provide area representation. Nevertheless, it is necessary to carry out the directive of the Constitution to the greatest extent possible in this session and make the necessary adjustments in the membership of our House of Representatives.

May I suggest that reapportionment be an early objective of this legislative assembly to forestall any need for a special session.

FISCAL POLICY AND TAXATION

Seldom does a legislative assembly find itself with such a challenging and clear-cut opportunity as now faces you. You will have the pressure of but sixty days to make significant contributions to strengthen democratic process in government, to institute new and desirable state services, and to elevate this state's pride and esprit de corps. But dulling the keen awareness of what could be possible will be the constant deadening refrain of "deficit financing." If we become so engrossed in the political expediences which surround the subjects of taxes and government cost, we could well miss the opportunities of statesmanship which are so beckoning at this session.

For several bienniums, we have known that rising costs of government were outstripping our annual government revenues. Several factors in the past decade have made it possible to delay a firm recognition of our fiscal problems. The development of the crude oil industry and the heavy federal public works programs in North Dakota along with substantial state government reserves these past ten years have only postponed until now this day of reckoning.

Appropriations have exceeded state income in the present biennium by the following estimates:

You will note that in the above figures of income, I have included items normally regarded as revenue, such as transfers of profits from the Bank of North Dakota and the State Mill and Elevator. However, I have not included as either revenue or appropriations transfers between these funds.

The deficits of the present biennium were projected in the last legislative session. We can also project the conditions of the various funds at the end of the next biennium should no remedial action be taken in this session to match state government cost and state government revenue.

Yes, compounding the task of rationalizing the needs for governmental change facing us will be the gnawing anxiety over state government revenues.

But failure to place state expenditures in their proper perspective is the greatest hazard we face in this session. For example, investments in education, mental treatment, tourism, etc., could pay substantial dividends, yet by their very nature are some of the easiest appropriations to limit severely.

The past two sessions have avoided the problems of tax revenue and tax structure. We will not have the luxury of reserve funds in this session to cushion inactivity. North Dakota's tax structure is archaic and badly needs a complete equalizing and modernizing.

At the time of statehood, the holding of personal property and real estate fairly well reflected the ability of a taxpayer to pay taxes, and such property holders also received the substantial share of government services. This was true because years ago nearly all North Dakotans were engaged in agriculture or served agriculture as small town merchants. Today, more than half our North Dakotans do not live on farms. Our small town merchants are under heavy economic pressure caused, in part, by our tax structure. The trades and professions are steadily increasing in number and earning capacity. This is natural in a maturing society. We should recognize this in our tax structure. The holding of personal property or real estate today is neither a reasonable indicator of personal income, nor does it reflect accurately the amount of governmental services received by an individual taxpayer. As a step in the direction of tax reform, I suggest that the state property tax levy, now allowable to 4 mills, be eliminated on non-corporate personal property and real estate. This would recognize the importance of small business risk capital investment in personal property and real estate to provide jobs and economic growth for our state and its citizens.

Finance of our state government should and, I believe, could be done without increasing the tax load of those who now pay their taxes and support governmental services equitably. Increased efforts must be made to encourage all citizens to support government with their just share of the tax burden. There is tax evasion in income tax collection, sales tax collection — in fact, there is substantial evasion in nearly all types of taxes collected. There are still some special interests which, as a class of economic activity, enjoy a privileged status in reduced taxes. There should be no special treatment given to any select group.

If we were to make a frank expression of tax policy, we would probably agree that such policy included the following:

- 1.) Tax levies should reflect the individual's ability to pay taxes. The state income tax most nearly satisfies this

requirement. A simplified state income tax return set up on IBM cards, similar to the Alaska type of plan where the taxpayer pays to the state a percentage of the federal income tax, is very desirable in that it is simple for the taxpayer, easily audited, and reduces evasion. It would, in effect, have the advantages of being consistent with the requirements in making out the federal income tax return. I recommend it. A withholding tax for non-residents working here is desirable. A more aggressive inventory for income tax purposes of all out-of-state residents who gain substantial income from North Dakota property should be pursued.

2.) The governmental service provided should be charged against the user where practical. The gasoline tax for highway construction is a good example. There are other examples which should come under our scrutiny.

3.) Taxes should not penalize economic growth, should not be regressive, and should not distort channels of trade. If this is a true statement, then the personal property and real estate taxes are not desirable forms of state taxation in this day and age. And, in the case of the sales tax, only an extension to greater coverage with no increase in rate would be justified.

4.) Our Tax Department should be given such appropriation as is necessary to establish an electronic data processing program and for the employment of additional field auditors.

The big problem facing us, budget-wise, is financing the education foundation program for the young people of our state. It will be tempting to liquidate and transfer the School Construction Fund to the Equalization Fund, to help reduce the education foundation program deficit. Such action, even if accompanied by legislation to permit the Bank of North Dakota to absorb the school construction lending would be a failure to come to final grips with the problem of a permanent state revenue program to support primary and secondary education.

Who carries the major burden of supporting education now? The major burden is carried by personal property and real estate owners even though their net income from such property may not justify it. Those who make adequate incomes without owning personal property or real estate are not now able to contribute equitably to education; yet, their interest in education, I am sure, is just as high as property owners. This situation should be considered in tax legislation in this session.

So necessary is it that we modernize and continually improve our tax collection apparatus, that I recommend that the Tax Department be given ample funds to employ professional assistance in renovating its procedures, and that they be directed to seek such assistance.

Government revenues in the final analysis can come from only one source — the productive capacity of our citizens. What about the total productive capacity of North Dakota? What might we do to improve it?

ECONOMIC GROWTH

The Greater North Dakota Association's 38th economic review, published on December 27, said that in 1962 agriculture led in our greatest total wealth-producing year in

North Dakota history. Tribute must be paid to Mother Nature at this point, for the 1961 drought and 1962 bonanza clearly indicated who was boss.

But, in the flush of success of our farm economy in 1962, there is a chance that we might overlook some governmental activities for which we should be very grateful. A soil bank haying program in 1961 made it possible for our cow herds to drop their calves on the lush pastures of 1962. An emergency credit program of the Farmers Home Administration loaned over \$11 million in non-secured loans so that desperate farmers were able to have seed in the ground when the bountiful rains of 1962 began to fall. Yes, we need to pay tribute to the timely action of the United States Department of Agriculture, a tribute that is easily forgotten in this after-glow of economic success in 1962.

North Dakota's economic growth potential for the years ahead is excellent. The completion of the new interstate crude oil pipe line, which has already raised wellhead prices of crude oil, places our oil in a better competitive position and has already spurred exploration. Its engineered capacity of nearly five times our present production in the area served is an indication of the professional optimism of its builders in our crude oil future.

The planned 200 megawatt electric generating plant on our Missouri River could be the most significant economic advance in decades for North Dakota. It may someday be viewed as the pioneer in low cost thermo-generation which made our lignite coal the center of a complex of private and co-operative generation forming the electric power producing hub of the Upper Midwest.

The freehold bus body assembly plant at Pembina, the expansion of potato products processing, the proposed sugar beet refinery at Drayton, the phenomenal growth of North Dakota cheese plants, a new start in federally-inspected meat packing — these are but a few of the intriguing straws in the wind of future economic activity. These are important because they mean jobs and income to our people.

There are, however, pieces of legislation which deserve your consideration in the interest of economic growth and state promotion:

1.) The Economic Development Commission has worked out well as a bipartisan agency with majority responsibility resting in the Governor's Office. I recommend that the law so stipulate. Government is strengthened when the administration charged with major responsibility can, under the law, exercise that responsibility.

2.) It would be helpful to have the full force of this legislature in support of the following:

- (a) The petitioning of the Minnesota legislature to abolish their costly duplicate grain grading law, which forces North Dakota-inspected grain to be re-inspected before it can be placed in a Minnesota public warehouse. This out-dated Minnesota law, once justifiable, now retards food and feed processing development in North Dakota.
- (b) The petitioning of the Interstate Commerce Commission to establish a hold point on the railroads

at Fargo to allow grain sampling of our own crop. Oklahoma has thirty such hold points. The railroads serving North Dakota will give our state but three. This situation is to Minnesota's advantage and to our disadvantage.

- (c) The joining with our North Dakota Wheat Commission, our Public Service Commission and our Economic Development Commission in forcefully petitioning the Interstate Commerce Commission and our railroads to grant North Dakota competitive rail rates in marketing our wheat at coastal ports.

3.) The Bank of North Dakota could serve our state's economic needs better by:

- (a) Establishing a centralized investment agency for state trust funds to satisfy North Dakota's need for capital before such funds are invested out of state.
- (b) Pioneering a program of adjustment credit for young farmers in their efforts to shift from cash grain farming to high gross production farming. Capital investment in more intensive types of farming will continue for many years to offer our greatest potential for increased total state productivity and for supporting the economy of every North Dakota community. Our small towns, as centers of trade, churches and education, are worth saving.

4.) Significant strides are being taken in the establishment of large-scale thermo-electric generation from North Dakota lignite coal. If our state is to achieve a destiny as an electric power generation hub, it appears wise for us to provide the mechanism for financing large-scale electric generation and transmission without our being entirely dependent upon the federal government or private financing. However, since state-guaranteed financing of electric power generation or transmission can be justified only on the basis of a broad public service to the people of North Dakota, the following safeguards are recommended:

- (a) That first priority for electric power generated or transmitted be given to public agency electric consumers.
- (b) That power rates be non-discriminatory within any given consumer category.
- (c) That loans be confined to enterprises organized and headquartered in North Dakota.
- (d) That the rates of any facility financed by this method be placed under the jurisdiction of the North Dakota Public Service Commission.

HIGHWAYS AND TOURISM

This state is a part of the Old West with our frontier forts, our Indian tribes, the nation's top rodeo cowboys, the buffalo and longhorn cattle ranges, Teddy Roosevelt country, and our historical dramas. We are also a part of the exciting future with our hydro dam, the coal fields, oil wells, hunting, and large-scale agriculture. The pressure to visit us is building up faster than our plans to accommodate our tourist guests.

North Dakota has embarked upon a mutual effort with Nebraska, South Dakota, Montana and Wyoming to route

tourists through our states. North Dakota is not adequately prepared to offer the enticing attractions we have as our share of this tourist loop. A new hard-surfaced highway along the south edge of Garrison Reservoir, up through Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, and on to the North Unit of the Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park, and then south through the Badlands to the South Unit of the Park on Interstate Highway 94 would provide an exciting and intriguing portion of this multi-state tourist loop. North Dakota is one of the last of the states in the nation to concentrate on tourism development. The returns from tourism are so fantastic that seemingly insurmountable costs of highway construction and tourist attractions would be quickly paid off by the increased business brought into our state. I recommend your close study of this proposed highway construction possibility. It is not a totally new recommendation, for the 1957 Legislature unanimously endorsed a study of such a Badlands highway.

MENTAL HEALTH

The last session of our Legislature wisely created the Mental Health Authority in the State Department of Health to coordinate the many activities in this field between various state departments; and transferred the State Psychiatric Clinic to that department. Since those significant steps were taken, it now appears desirable to phase in the next very important steps — those of placing the State Hospital at Jamestown and the State School at Grafton under the Mental Health Authority in the State Department of Health.

Enabling legislation which would foster the development of community mental health centers under a state matching program would pay dividends. Follow-through treatment of hospital discharged mental patients and preventive treatment is still woefully lacking in our state.

North Dakota should join in the reciprocal program for mental treatment now being followed by twenty-four states through interstate compacts.

We will have substantial new information to guide us in mental health legislation. The Joint Commission Report can be used as a yardstick in measuring our mental health program. The expert and timely report of Dr. Carroll Lund's Citizen Committee and the report of the team from the National Institute of Mental Health studying our State Hospital will provide provocative suggestions for improvement of our mental health and treatment services.

I would agree that mental health legislation will be among the most important presented in this session. Custodial patient care of the past must give way to an aggressive program of capturing the tremendous social and economic advantages to our people now available through modern treatment and prevention of mental illness.

We need to re-evaluate our laws on state charges for the institutional care given our children at the Grafton State School. We cannot share the lingering sorrow of the families who must be separated from their children when they were placed in an institution, but all of us should be willing to share financial burden of such care.

LABOR

Recognition of each of our citizens' individual contributions to the economic system under which we enjoy ever-increasing prosperity should be the motivating force in our preparation of legislation dealing directly with laboring people and management.

The growing work force in North Dakota has earned, and has been granted the right by our voters, to have a state Department of Labor to be specifically concerned with their interests. I recommend the establishment of such a department with jurisdiction over related agencies.

Our minimum wage law should be up-dated to be consistent with the dignity and concern due our wage earners.

Both Workmen's Compensation benefits and Unemployment Compensation benefits should be revised upward to be consistent with the original intent of these worker protection programs. Revisions in our labor-management laws should recognize that no substantial industry has ever located in North Dakota, nor will any locate in our state, for reasons of low wages or inadequate labor legislation. A substantial segment of our migrating young people go as laboring people seeking the security and recognition available elsewhere. Working people are the broad base of any state's consumers.

Our state, as an employer, also has some obligations to its wage earners and salary earners which should be reviewed in this session. If we are to attract competent personnel and if we are to prevent costly and wasteful personnel turn-over, we must be competitive in the labor market.

It is essential that state government offer some of the fringe benefits, such as retirement and hospitalization, that are factors in drawing experienced state personnel into private industries or competing out-of-state institutions.

I also recommend an expansion of the state merit system to additional departments.

EDUCATION

Land, labor, capital and management are the four factors of production. As each year passes, the depth of education associated with labor, capital formation, and management increases in importance. We must recognize the tremendous competition for teachers nationwide. Insufficient financial backing of our educational system on any level would be a serious blow, not only to each individual North Dakota student, but also to our ability to maintain economic, social and cultural leadership in not only this state, but in the nation in the generations ahead.

Education is an investment and not an unrecoverable cost. Because of the great number of institutions of higher education in our state, we must exercise discipline in controlling overlapping and duplication in the expansion of these institutions. This is a problem coming about under the constant pressure of increasing total knowledge to be taught and demands for more specialized fields. The Legislative Research Committee has recognized the desirability of bi-lateral and regional cooperation in higher education. This session should lend its support by providing all the necessary flexibility for our Board of Higher Education to attain these objectives.

Our student loan program has functioned well, but its expansion is warranted.

WELFARE

The prevention of waste in human resources should be a prime objective in our welfare program. The fact that heavy welfare payments are now being made in depressed areas of the state should excite our imaginations. For, in significant instances, the need of the state in development of historical sites, tourist attractions, state parks, game enhancement areas and water resource projects lies in the very areas where substantial welfare payments with no returns are now being made.

Rehabilitation of habitual welfare recipients should be a prime objective. Perhaps, the time is here for a North Dakota public works program in our depressed areas so that some additional appropriation over present relief payments could show constructive results.

Our Welfare Department's pioneer work in youth delinquency correction should be continued. I commend our Welfare Department for a high degree of excellence in the performance of their work.

It is fitting that tribute be paid to Carlyle Onsrud and Glen Jahnke. Their passing on was a significant loss of two men of great accomplishment in the field of welfare in North Dakota. Their great stature nationally placed them among the most knowledgeable in planning public responsibility.

AGING

A successful step was taken in the 1959 session, when a \$2 million revolving loan fund was set aside to finance housing for our aged. Present projection of need indicates that this revolving loan fund should be increased to \$5 million. Assignment of responsibility for the administration of this loan fund is vague. This is characteristic of all aspects of services for the aged. There is need to center responsibility for the direction of the programs for the aged in one department. State level work in planning for the aged has involved voluntary work and voluntary committees. To benefit from such activity, it is necessary to direct a state department to assume follow-through responsibility.

WATER RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

A constant pressure is being exerted by downstream interests to obtain for their use waters that originate in and pass through North Dakota. While North Dakota does have the advantage of a sound water resource development program, it must be constantly strengthened to oppose any encroachments on our rights to these waters.

We should, through concurrent resolution, request Congress to act favorably on the following:

1.) The re-authorization of the Garrison Diversion Unit, with a construction appropriation.

2.) The construction of the Bowman-Haley dam, which, I am glad to report, has been authorized.

3.) The prompt mobilization of Corps of Engineers' forces to provide spot bank stabilization of the Missouri River banks which are being threatened by erosion from the upper reaches of the Oahe to the Garrison Dam.

4.) The prompt construction of flood protective works in the Velva area, to eliminate recurring flooding in and near that city.

5.) The removal of an apparent cloud that exists on all North Dakota water rights issued since September 1934 because of a Declaration of Intent filed by the Department of Agriculture to use all the unappropriated waters in the state of North Dakota.

I concur in a recent resolution by a state-wide group of North Dakota citizens that the Legislature enunciate a definite policy to protect and develop all water resources for future beneficial use. The necessary safeguard of this precious natural resource will not only need the co-operation of the Legislature but also will require financial participation by the State. Now is not too early to plan for and to make provision for such assistance.

The Legislative Research Committee and the State Water Conservation Commission have been co-operating in the revision of our State Water Code. Many noteworthy laws and amendments will be submitted for your consideration as a result of this endeavor. However, due to the complexity of water law, I recommend that these two agencies continue this co-operative endeavor for at least another two years to better enable us to obligate our water for use in North Dakota.

ESPRIT DE CORPS

What does it mean to you and me to be a North Dakotan? It has been suggested that Theodore Roosevelt's immortal words, "If it had not been for my life in North Dakota, I would not have been President," could well be this state's theme. Eighty-eight prominent North Dakotans were nominated for recognition as this state's representative in Statuary Hall in Washington, D. C. Can you name ten of them?

Where in North Dakota can our school children and our visitors of this generation and the next find a focal point to learn of great North Dakotans, the origin and development of our cattle industry, the histories of our Indian people, of our immigrants, of our oil and coal industries, of our agriculture, and of our art? Where is North Dakota's Hall of Fame?

I strongly recommend that a study group be formed to plan the preservation, display and full exploitation of our rich North Dakota heritage, which should not be permitted to slip unrecognized into the past. Perhaps a large heritage center to display the past and present of all which gives us pride in North Dakota is in order.

Two important developments have come from our Dakota Territory Centennial. One of these was the realization that the displays in our west wing hall of the State Capitol during this celebration did something good for the pride of North Dakota. That west wing hall could become North Dakota's Hall of Fame.

The second important development from our Centennial celebration was the creation of the Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider award designed to be this state's supreme recognition of North Dakotans who have been influenced by this state in achieving national recognition in their field of endeavor. Lawrence Welk, Dorothy Stickney, and Ivan

Dmitri have received this award. It would be well to receive legislative recognition of the establishment of this award.

CONCLUSION

I have presented to you in this message my appraisal of major concerns for our North Dakota state government in the coming biennium. You will note that, where practical, recommendations have been general to allow the greatest flexibility in your efforts to cope with specific problems. Ahead of you are hours of testimony and wearying detail. Most of the testimony will be well documented and capably given. Yet, there will be major requirements for legislation which will suffer by its presentation or lack of organized support. Your skill in assimilating facts, together with your depth of compassion in considering testimony, will stand you in good stead in legislating for the good of all people in North Dakota.

Good politics, good citizenship and good government are one and the same. We should exercise them freely. May God grant us wisdom and courage in these days ahead.

REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

Rep. Halcrow moved that the remarks of Reps. Vinje, Leahy and Burk, on the Committee on Contested Elections, be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Vinje: "Mr. Speaker: First I wish to thank the members of the Committee on Contested Elections for their faithful, diligent attention to the duties and also my thanks to the four young ladies that were furnished us by the Employment Committee.

A brief explanation of how we arrived at the results might be in order. The committee had several meetings with the Atty. General's office as to present rules and laws before starting the recount. The committee met and agreed on method of procedure and in that we agreed to abide by the statutes as they pertained to stamping and initialing ballots. Those that did not meet this qualification were thrown out. Other ballots in which there was any doubt as to the voter's intention were carefully checked by the entire committee and decision made by the committee as to the validity of those particular ballots.

We were fortunate in having 2 attorneys on this committee, Mr. Leahy and Mr. Burk and I would recommend to the Chair that he call on these gentlemen and other members of the committee for their observations."

Rep. Leahy: "Mr. Speaker: Our committee first agreed to examine the ballots to determine whether or not they were properly stamped and initialed in accordance with the state law. The ballots were opened and laid face down on the table and examined. Those which did not contain both the official stamp and initial of the election official were taken out and laid aside and not counted. We found 31 ballots which were neither stamped nor initialed. Eight additional ballots were found stamped but not initialed and were therefore not counted.

During the counting of the ballots, we found 7 ballots upon which the voter had voted for more than 3 candidates; there being only three to be elected. These ballots also were not counted.

On those ballots where the voter's intention was not clear, the Committee as a whole examined such ballot and made a decision as to whether or not to count them.

In several instances the tally of the election board did not agree with the tally of the committee. In those cases the Committee recounted the ballots to determine who was in error. It was found that several of the tally books were incorrect.

It was with regret that the Committee had to eliminate some ballots because of these errors. We would urge all

election boards to exercise utmost care in complying with the election laws so that no voter would be disenfranchised.

It was very interesting to me to serve on this committee and to see first hand the operation of our election laws."

Rep. Burk: "The representative from Fargo has pretty well stolen my thunder and covered the entire subject. Our Supreme Court has held on two occasions that if the ballot is not stamped and initialed, that ballot will not be counted. In this case, as Mr. Leahy has told you, it was necessary to throw out 31 that were not stamped nor initialed. Eight more that we had to throw out was because they were stamped but not initialed. With one or two exceptions, those ballots were from one precinct in Cavalier County. The Boards as a whole did an accurate job.

There are interesting things to observe — being on an election board. I have never been on an election board before. Practically every election in my county in the last thirty years, I have been on the ballot in one form or another.

There were three Republicans and three Democrats on the ballot and some voters were very courteous and voted for all six on the ballot; some voted for four and some for five.

We didn't count these, but I estimate there were over one hundred that voted for no candidate for the legislature. Apparently they didn't think any of the six were entitled to their vote. In some instances they only voted for Senator Young; some voted only for Governor Guy; some only for Mark Andrews, on the entire ballot. It was very interesting and I believe that even though had we counted all the ballots that were thrown out, the result would probably have been the same, although it was mighty close.

It was an interesting experience."

THE RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF A FREE PRESS AND OF GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS (An Address to the Senate and House of Representatives of the North Dakota State Legislature, Friday, January 25, 1963.)

"Gentlemen: This is an honor that rarely comes to a North Dakota boy born on the wrong side of the tracks. I should know, because I was born in a railroad section house at Berwick, North Dakota and lived, until I was 16, in a small four-room house about three hundred feet from the railroad tracks and the stockyards in Towner.

I am honored. I am most grateful for this opportunity. And I am glad to be back home again.

REMINISCENCES

Adversity, it is said, is given to man to make him strong in resisting it. When I was a child, we didn't exactly figure life this way, particularly when meals were sometimes far between and food always scarce. Nor when we children cried with the paralyzing cold that turned the wash pan in our little house into a solid cake of ice each night, froze the pump out in the yard, made your socks stand alone, your shoes turn to stone, and gave you an incredible agility at hugging the trap door of your long underwear.

Nothing, however, developed character among the children of my youth so much as the dreaded journey to the "little house out back." We never had inside plumbing until we children were able to earn enough money to rent a three-room place with one of those wonderful little rooms where you could actually enjoy reading the Sears Roebuck catalog, even in the winter. There is no thrill, gentlemen, in the whole world like a boy's first experience with an inside toilet in a North Dakota winter.

I must not bore you with too many references to my boyhood in this great state. It gave me an opportunity for a good education in a free public school, taught by fine men and women who were dedicated to educating youth and building character. I have never found this basic education obtained in the Towner public schools deficient in any respect. It equipped me well for college, for sev-

eral advanced degrees, for the various aspects of my career as educator, journalist, researcher, and management consultant. Once, but only for a brief moment, when I became the Director of the School of Journalism at Rutgers University in New Jersey and Executive Secretary of the New Jersey Press Association, I had a fearful moment that a North Dakota kid might be beyond his depth in telling newspaper men in the shadow of New York City, how to run their businesses. It was but a fleeting doubt and I soon found that newspapermen's problems are much the same the country over.

As printer's devil and later news writer, printer, ad sales, foreman and finally editor of the Mouse River Farmer's Press I also learned publishing and printing remarkably well. Although I have since worked on some fine big city newspapers, edited two magazines, had some experience in radio-television journalism, have written a number of books, and have been a teacher and an administrator in four splendid universities, nowhere did I learn more in a short time than in my early years on North Dakota weeklies. I enjoyed my experiences and profited from the time I spent on weekly newspapers at Towner, Granville, Maxbass, Upham, and Bantry. I still recommend this kind of experience as a basic education for newspaper work.

Government, as a North Dakota boy first learns to know it, is represented by the local constable and the county sheriff. Somehow I managed to duck the constable but the sheriff got me at the tender age of 14. It happened like this. We were freshmen in high school and the good ladies of our village had made certain that the local pool hall proprietor knew we were only 13 or 14 years of age. We were forbidden to play pool at Towner, and we resorted to many kinds of ruses to get at a pool table. One night, a local lad quietly pushed his father's model "T" Ford out of the garage and down the street two or three blocks. Several of us crawled in and he drove us to Berwick where somehow we persuaded the pool hall man to let us play. As we started home about 9:30 p.m. we were confronted by a pair of headlights blocking the middle of the road and before we knew it the sheriff and his deputy were taking us in tow. It seems that the boy's father had suspected something, missed the car, and sent the sheriff after us. No great trouble resulted from that first and last brush with the McHenry county sheriff, but it taught me something. Today, and ever since that episode, I have had a healthy respect and some trepidation about law and government.

II

The history of the relationship between government and the press goes back several centuries. I do not know where it began, but at least as long ago as 1586 an enterprising printer and newsman decided to publish a news magazine, which he called *Mercurio Gallo-Belgicus*. It was an odd sort of thing to be called a news-magazine because he was able to get permission from the government to publish it only every two years and we know of only three extant issues.

Government assumed from the invention of printing the authority to permit or to suppress printing and publica-

tions. As early as 1552 there was established in England a set of rules and regulations for printing and publishing and as the Stationers Company became more powerful they were designated by the Crown to regulate the press.

Printing as we know it today was not invented until about 1450 in Germany and it did not come to England until 1487 when William Caxton brought a crude press and some types made in Holland with which he printed several early English classics. Actually, it was not until 1621 that any kind of news publication appeared in England. These first news sheets were about 6 x 9 inches, printed on two sides of one piece of paper and their contents were largely a recital of what was happening in foreign wars. The publishers soon felt the heavy hand of government and none of these early corantos were published with any regularity.

Newsbooks which succeeded corantos began perhaps as early as 1635 but with the beheading of King Charles I and later assumption of power by Cromwell and the commonwealth, these books were strictly regulated. Throughout the commonwealth, in fact, only two, *Mercurius Politicus* and *The Intelligencer* were allowed to be published and even then John Milton, the great poet, was appointed to censor all copy that went into them. Actually, it was not until 1688 that the press had any degree of freedom in England and not until 1695 were newspapers allowed to be published without specific authority from the government, always issued in advance of publication. All publications up to that time could be suspended without notice or without stated reason by the Crown.

III

It is not my purpose today to trace in detail the fight for freedom of the press through all of its perilous vicissitudes to the present time. The wise founders of this great land of ours knew from terrible experiences that the right of the press, and the people, freely to learn, to know and to utter the truth was the only guarantee they could write into our constitution — that the people would always be adequately informed. This was the only way to keep our people well enough informed to govern themselves with wisdom.

Today I'd like to submit for your earnest, fair-minded consideration a new concept in the relationship of the press and the government.

Jefferson, Madison, Adams, Hamilton, Franklin and all of our founding fathers, were lawmakers, gentlemen, just as you are. A very few of them were newspaper men. They were not interested in giving any unwarranted or unusual privileges to a man who had a printing press. When they wrote, "Congress shall make no law abridging the freedom of the press" they were simply establishing a guarantee that the people of this infant democracy would forever have the right, and the means to be currently informed about all matters affecting their lives, their property and the activities of their duly elected representatives.

Today, gentlemen, I'd like to submit the proposition that the press and the government are in the most realistic sense the shield and the armor of the people. Both the

press and government are actually creatures of the people and their fundamental responsibilities are not to each other but to the sovereign people of the state and the nation. There has been much strife between governments and the press. Henceforth, let there be no more. The very existence of both the press and the government are interdependent. We are the right and left hands of the people. When the press dies it is but a few moments until lawmakers are shot at the wall. And soon all legal government dies. One cannot exist without the other.

In the Bible Our Savior commanded us to do certain things because: "This is the law and the prophets." And He also said: "I come not to destroy the law and the prophets but to fulfill them". In like manner the Free Press must be dedicated only to full and free information for the people, and not at any time to the destruction or the vitiation of our laws. The free press is the only means modern man has ever found for making the laws of our land understood and through understanding, making them effective.

How could a democracy possibly exist in America without a free press? To be sure the government of a few, or the government of a tyrant, can exist only when the press is dead. But we should waste no time today assuming that anyone in this room believes in any kind of government except government of the people, by the people, and for the people. This being our understanding of government, our determination to keep the people thoroughly informed must never falter.

Many years ago, I wrote that the honest public official will jealously cherish and diligently guard his right to speak and publish freely. The free press is his only weapon against ignorance, vicious rumor, malicious attack and false insinuations that he is dishonest or inept.

The crook — wherever you find him in private or public affairs — shuns publicity. It is the fierce searchlight of publication that exposes the public thief. When the people are thoroughly informed they will embrace the honest official and destroy him who would 'destroy our democracy.

All of you at some time have had experience with persons bent upon destroying the government of the United States of America. Back in 1919 — only about two years after the Bolshevik Revolution in Russia — I had my first glimpse of Communists at work. Where they came from and how they got there we never knew, but three visitors, two men and a woman who spoke only Russian, were introduced unexpectedly at a specially called meeting of newspaper people held in Minot. Their message was translated to us by a man known as Rosie Moore, who had been prominent in the socialist party in America and had recently returned from three months in Russia. To be sure, they did not say that it was time for a revolution in the United States, and they expressed profound and everlasting friendship for our state government in North Dakota which was then known as a farmer-labor government. It all sounded pretty good and I heard no extremely adverse comments. Later, however, in a room in a Minot hotel where I somehow happened to hear discussions between certain of our

leaders and these three Russians, I heard a great deal about the way Bolsheviks had been able to kill the Tsar and thousands of others in their take-over of the Russian government. All this, they said, had to be done before the "people" could govern Russia.

I haven't the least idea how many communists there were in the United States so soon after the Russian revolution, but every development since that time leads us to think that they were actively engaged in promoting revolutions in all lands from that day to the present.

Most vividly, I do recall their statement that all the newspapers permitted to be published in Russia would be owned by the Communist party. This, gentlemen, is what must happen in a dictatorship. We, who are dedicated to a government of the people's representatives must forever keep in mind the opinion of the United States supreme court which on February 10, 1936 in the case of *Grosjean vs. the American Press Company et al.* said in part as follows: "The free press stands as one of the great interpreters between the government and the people. To allow it to be fettered is to fetter ourselves". Long, before, Thomas Jefferson had said: "The only security of all is in a free press . . . no government ought to be without censors; and where the press is free, no one ever will." And Madison said: "Nothing could be more irrational than to give the people power, and to withhold from them information without which power is abused. **A people who mean to be their own governors must arm themselves with power which knowledge gives. A popular government without popular information or the means of acquiring it is but a prologue to a farce or a tragedy or perhaps both.**"

In the light of these expressions by eminent persons in the history of our land, I would like to repeat the proposition that the government and the press are both teachers of the sovereign power of the people. They must both be dedicated to the best interests of the people, and they depend upon each other and upon the people for their existence and their continued prosperity.

IV

Nowhere in the political literature of this democracy or any other will you find enunciated the peculiar concept embraced by some persons both in government and journalism that the rights of the press are sovereign rights without equal and reciprocal responsibilities. It is a well established fact in political science that every right enjoyed by one person means that a similar right exists for another.

It is almost axiomatic, therefore, that the rights and privileges of the press are balanced equally by the duties and responsibilities of the press. No one can logically entertain the thought that an irresponsible journalist has the right to malign anyone in public office. Responsibilities of the press are enduring and inexorable. He who speaks and publishes information and opinion is responsible at law for every syllable he utters.

In the time we have left today, I should like to delineate in some small detail the rights and responsibilities of the press and the comparable rights and privileges of government officials in dealing with the press. Only if we understand this reciprocal and equally great responsibility

of the press and government will we gain anything in our attempt to make these two instruments of democracy more determinative in the lives of our people.

Gentlemen, these I believe to be fundamental and inalienable rights of a free press.

First, the Right of Access to full information about all matters of deep concern to the public.

2. The Right of Access to information about the activities of the people's elected representatives.

3. The Right to Request the opinion of any legislator in any matter of importance with which he is involved.

4. The Right to Interview responsible persons about pending legislation, particularly in those aspects upon which the people have not yet been informed.

5. The Right, after doing sufficient significant research and study, to Review the present situation and to compare it with situations in the past with regard to legislation pending or past.

6. The Right to Predict the probable effect of a pending bill if it becomes a law.

7. The Right to Express freely the considered and responsible opinion of the editors, but only on the editorial page or in columns plainly labeled as editorial opinion. No newspaper has the right to load or color a news story in favor or against anything.

8. The Right to Publish on the editorial page or in other suitable space, letters pro and con on any subject, and to select those letters which he will publish on the basis of their substance, propriety, and good taste, but not to reject them solely because he holds a different opinion.

9. The Right, in the interest of the good of the people to Challenge the necessity for any proposed law.

10. The Right, when convinced, to Fight a bad bill or a bad law with every legitimate means that can be commanded.

11. The Right to Question and to Challenge, without malice, the conduct and the motives of any official, assuming certainly, full responsibility for the correctness of all statements.

V

We must be equally mindful, those of us who are journalists, of the rights and privileges of government officials in their relationships with the press. I believe that law makers and all government officials have these unquestioned rights:

1. The Right to be Quoted Truthfully, verbatim if necessary.

2. The Right to be Interviewed when a legislator opposes as well as when he favors a given piece of legislation, and with equal opportunity to express his views.

3. The Right to be Quoted in context. That is to say, the journalist has no right to pull a word or a phrase from a complete statement and to publish it as if it were a full, fair, and correct representation of a legislator's opinion. The devil can always quote scripture for his own purposes.

4. The Right to be Treated Without Maliciousness and With exacting Fairness at all times.

5. The Right to be Free from vicious attacks on his own person, on his family, on his friends, on his natural misfortunes, on his natural deficiencies, and on his physical handicaps.

6. The Right to Remain Silent unless the obligation of his office requires him to talk in the interest of the people. I cannot believe that there is any responsibility on the part of an elected or appointed official to, as we say in the newspaper business, "make copy".

7. The Right to Reply in the same newspapers, and in similar space, to Attacks on him regardless of where they originate.

8. The Right to Inform the Press, and through the press to inform the people, of any developments which he feels are of great importance.

9. The Right to Challenge, by means of a letter or other suitable methods, anything that appears in the public press which he believes is false, fraudulent, or without adequate basis in fact.

10. The Right to Bring the people, by any means at his command, the truth, as he understands it, about anything affecting the people for which he has any responsibility.

11. The Right to Request the press to regard in **confidence** any statement which he believes should not be made public at this particular moment for the good of the people.

The total count of the rights and privileges of a free press and the rights and privileges of legislators and other government officials will probably never be completed. We could go on without limit, but it is unnecessary.

Again, let me say I think that the legislator's and the government official's only affective means of keeping his constituents informed is a Free Press. This is so, because only the press is always ready, is available without cost, is manned by able people, can carry your message by word and picture, can carry the complete story and not a little of this and a little of that, can take your message into virtually every home in the land, is a wanted service and is so much wanted that it is paid for, is an instrument that actually seeks your opinion, is thoroughly responsible at law, and has earned the reader's respect for reliability. What else can help you keep your people so intelligently informed?

Gentlemen, the freedom of the press is your freedom. Guard it as jealously as you guard any other privilege which is your right to enjoy. The freedom of the press is the freedom of the people to information that affects them significantly. It is not the right of one man, or a few people, to pry into other people's businesses, and it is not a right without a corresponding duty and responsibility.

The history of governmental institutions goes in cycles. If this great democracy of the United States is not sometime subjugated to the despotism of a dictator, it will be the first democracy in the world that did not suffer such a death.

It is our common task to keep America so strong, so vigilant, so fair in its dealings with its own people and those in foreign lands, so solicitous of the welfare of others, so concerned with helping the weak, the oppressed, the

down-trodden, so vigorous, so articulate in denouncing the vicious doctrines of communism and other forms of tyranny, so terrible in inflicting its military might upon those who would plunder and ravish the people of the world that never, in his most maniacal moment will a Hitler or a Khrushchev attempt the subjugation of our sovereign people.

Gentlemen, in this terrible and totally destructive battle which wages hot and cold but seemingly continues for ever, never can we lose sight of the fact that a strong, fair government, and an equally strong and fair minded press are the shield and buckler of the people. We shall together oppose all forms of tyranny or we shall in truth both be totally destroyed."

be covered into the general fund of each county in which the district lies in the share or proportion that the district's taxable valuation in such county bears to the aggregate taxable valuation of the property in the district.)) If the district comprises an entire county, any balance remaining in the treasury of the district shall be paid into the general fund of the county; and if the district includes more than one county, any balance in the district's treasury shall be paid into the general fund of each county in the ratio or proportion that the assessed valuation of property therein bears to the assessed valuation of property in the district. If the district comprises one or more counties, and one or more townships, cities or villages not situated in any such county or counties, any balance remaining in the treasury of the district shall be paid into the general fund of each such county and into the treasury of each township, city or village in the ratio or proportion that the assessed valuation in each county, township, city or village bears to the assessed valuation in the district. If the district includes one or more townships, cities or villages in a county, but does not include the entire county, any balance remaining in the district's treasury shall be paid to each township, city and/or village in the proportion that the assessed valuation thereof bears to the assessed valuation of the district. And if a part only of a township is embraced within the district, any balance in the district treasury shall be paid to the township in which a part of the district lies in the ratio or proportion that the assessed valuation of property in such part of the district bears to the assessed valuation of the district. We, the Committee to arrange for Chaplains, to invoke the blessings of God, at the start of each legislative day, were amazed and shocked at the observation by the new and obviously uninformed writer of one of the state's oldest and respected newspapers of our state. Quote:

"I discovered that prayer costs the state \$12 a day out here . . . I mentioned the cost of prayer; by that I meant that sessions of the House and Senate are opened with a prayer by a chaplain from Bismarck or Mandan.

A committee from each body arranges with the local ministerial association for a chaplain, the clergymen ap-

pearing in rotation according to a schedule prepared by the association.

They are paid \$6 per time. From what I've seen of the senators and representatives here, I think a moment of silent prayer by all 162 of them would be at least as effective, and certainly cheaper."

First, for his information, the Chaplains are not restricted to Bismarck and Mandan. As has been announced in this Chamber, any member of this body has the privilege of having his pastor, who is trained as a spiritual leader, to open our daily proceedings with a Divine message and to ask spiritual guidance in our deliberations; providing they notify the committee one week in advance of the day of his visit. The Bismarck Ministerial Association, as a matter of courtesy and convenience volunteers the responsibility of scheduling a leader from all religious sects.

As to the \$6.00 for their service, this is a mere pittance, considering the imposition on their busy schedules.

The solemnity of each minister's message certainly reminds each legislator of his complete dependency upon the providence of a Divine Power and no doubt invokes many moments of silent meditation by each of us during our deliberations.

Certainly, this young man, by the same token, would not imply that each of us could write his column for him.

Our Nation and State was founded on the premise that in God we trust — may it never change.

May this reporter devote more of his time to discovering the more serious misuse of our state's funds, than the picayunish stipend given to our spiritual leaders."

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Revision and Correction of the Journal have carefully examined the Journal of the twenty-first day after recess and twenty-second day and recommend that the same be corrected as follows:

TENTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Halcrow moved that House Bill No. 653 be placed at the head of the calendar, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Halcrow:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House of Representatives, a proper discussion of reapportionment can only proceed on the question of which plan yields the fairest result based on population.

House Bill 653 is based on the premise that all districts in the state of North Dakota should be treated equally on a population basis. The constitution, Section 35, lays down certain guide lines which must be followed allotting one representative to each senatorial district, but also providing that in multi-county districts, they shall be allotted the equivalent of one representative for each county in that district. There are nine multi-county districts which include 21 counties. The total population of these 9 districts is

100,396. In dividing this figure by the 21 representatives, we find a population factor of 4,781 for each representative.

The real premise of this plan is based on the conclusion that if it is fair for these 21 counties to get a representative for 4,781 people each, then it is fair for the balance of 40 districts to get the first representative for 4,781 also. Obviously, this factor cannot be used further than the first representative or we would wind up with much too large a House.

The population outside of the 9 multi-county districts is 532,050. We tried several different starting figures for the proper size of the House of Representatives and finally concluded that a 99 member House was the best starting point. We then subtracted the 21 representatives previously mentioned from the 99 and found that there were 78 additional representatives to be distributed among the population of 532,050. This produced a second factor (532,050 divided by 78 equals 6,821). Then, using the major fraction formula applied to 6,821, we worked out for the 40 districts, the number of representatives they should be allotted. In practice, it works out like this:

The first 4,781 yields one representative. 6,821, or a major fraction thereof, which is 3,411, which, when added to the 4,781, equals 8,192 and yields a second representative. In the three representative category, you start with 4,781 for number one; 6,821 for number two and the major fraction 3,411 for the third. The same procedure applies all the way up to the top, which in this plan, is six representatives.

If we were not bound by the constitution, we could start with the lowest population county and make a real fair apportionment, but we would wind up with over 400 representatives.

Proponents of House Bill 552 have said that the plan which yields the least difference between the High and Low result factors would be the fairest plan. An examination of these factors shows the following result:

The low factor under House Bill 552 is District No. 3 — 4,211 population per representative, and the high factor is District No. 37 — 8,303 population per representative, or a difference of 4,092. The low factor under House Bill 653 is District No. 37 — 4,151 population per representative and the high factor is District No. 25 — 8,147 population per representative or a difference of 3,996. House Bill 653 yields the lower differential.

Under House Bill 552, District No. 9 gets 7 representatives or one for each 5,499 population. District No. 10 gets 4 representatives or one for each 5,264.

The average result factor under House Bill 552 (Low 4,211 + High 8,303 = 12,514 divided by 2 = 6,257).

The result then shows District No. 9 and District No. 10 getting representatives at a much lower population factor than the state average of 6,257. When the difference is multiplied by 12, it produces a more accentuated disproportion in favor of the high population area. A similar conclusion is derived by examining District No. 6 and District No. 7.

The constitutional question will likely be resolved on the question of which plan produces the fairest result to all

population areas, whether low, in between, or high, and if the results most closely approximate statewide averages.

It is unfortunate that reapportionment has been suggested as an issue between rural and urban areas. House Bill 653 does not recognize such an argument. House Bill 653 recognizes only the argument of fairness through population reapportionment within the guide lines of the constitution of the State of North Dakota."

Rep. Stockman asked that a record be kept of the proceedings on House Bill No. 653.

Rep. Stockman moved that the House resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the consideration of House Bill No. 653, for the purpose of considering an amendment to the conclusion that we have a 115 member House based on the equal proportion theory, which motion lost.

Rep. Stockman asked for a roll call vote on his motion to place House Bill No. 653 in General Orders, which motion lost. There were ayes, 29; nays, 82; absent and not voting, 2.

So the motion was declared lost.

Rep. Burk: "I think Mr. Stockman assumed in his motion that we can only apportion under equal proportion. I don't think that is correct. We don't want the Court to assume that the House agreed with one or the other. We want the Court to decide who is right."

Rep. Fitch moved that further action on House Bill No. 653 be deferred one day, which motion lost.

Rep. Vendsel: "I wanted to support the motion of Rep. Fitch. Actually I have wondered how many members actually have gone thru both bills. That is 552 and 653. There is a delegation that is consistently voting against 552 and for 653. Under 552 they would have four members and under the other they would only have three. I wonder if you are cognizant of this. We believe that this is the proper type of reapportionment. I recognize that the others have control. We are going to have your kind of reapportionment."

Rep. Goebel: "If we pass this bill it is an appeasement to get more non affected district votes for passage. Next session with the city gain of representation they will amend this section to the equal proportions formula and you non affected districts now will be affected. You will lose representatives two years from now. They will have the votes against you.

As in U. S. Congress, I maintain the equal proportions formula is right for this House and should be passed now if the equal area formula is used in the Senate as in U. S. Congress.

To have representation in both N. D. House and Senate on population basis is wrong and I'm opposed to this because it will give the urban areas an unfair advantage in future legislation.

The tax problem is serious in urban areas, and just as serious in rural areas. I can foresee in the future with population on both sides having the vote advantage may possibly tax homesteads including all farm buildings, shelter belts, fences, and all other farm property exempt now.

I maintain this bill should be defeated now and House Concurrent Resolution J should be passed and sent to the Senate for action. If the Senate passes Resolution J we can amend House Bill No. 579 still in committee to the equal proportions formula as in defeated House Bill No. 552, and it will pass, and I will vote for it then, but will vote against House Bill No. 653 now.

I'm opposed to this bill and the people of McIntosh and Logan County resent this legislation, and I want their feelings expressed on this prepared statement as part of the record.

The threat of Court action isn't any different now than it was in prior sessions, and this shouldn't force you into a decision.

On this bill only eighteen districts are affected with reductions, and quite a number affected with increases. The balance of power lies in districts not affected, and you decide the issue.

The bill two years ago affected decreases in more districts and could not pass."

Rep. Vendsel: "I wish to compliment the majority floor leader. In my book he has become a master politician. Anyone who can obtain the support of the minority floor leader has accomplished the very nearly impossible on a problem as important as reapportionment.

However I am not happy with House Bill No. 653 as it has been drawn and I cannot abide by the idea that the people of North Dakota should be subjected to two theories of representation. We have the 9th district reapportioned on the basis of a population of 4781. We have other districts apportioned on the basis of 6821 per representative.

Now, I say to you in all sincerity this is not equal representation so I cannot support House Bill 653."

Rep. Link: "During these days and the work that has gone into the culmination of this bill, there has been a great deal of interest focused on this subject. I think it bears out well what was told to us in the early days of this session when we had not placed the first reapportionment bill in, that this was of very great importance to every member. I believe this body has given all these measures that have been given to it much study and I don't think further deliberation would accomplish any more. However, all measures labor under a defect of our constitution and because I have been close to it in the past attempt to effect the reapportionment measure for this House, I believe it is imperative that I make a statement to merely indicate my position and it is not intended to influence either the majority nor the minority, but to state my position.

To clear up the constitutional defect under which we are laboring, I submit that the entire legislature, both the House and Senate, has a responsibility to correct this constitutional defect.

The constitutional amendment proposed in the House Concurrent Resolution "J" would give the people an opportunity to do so. If I were certain that this resolution would pass the House and Senate, giving the people the opportunity to correct the constitution, I could vote for it. However, I cannot vote for a House reapportionment which reduces the representation for my county by half, with no adjustment of the senatorial representation to help maintain a sound balance of House representation."

Rep. Brown: "Once again I would like to bring to the attention of this House that we all took an oath to uphold the constitution of the State of North Dakota. There is no defect in the constitution as has been implied by the minority floor leader. In Section 35, it says that "the House of Representatives shall proceed to apportion the balance of the members of the House of Representatives to be elected from the several senatorial districts, within the limits prescribed in this Constitution, according to the population of the several senatorial districts" and certainly House Bill No. 653 does not do that.

According to this formula, it is a gerrymander deal where it sets off a certain number, and places the balance where they feel they can get representation for those districts."

Rep. Halcrow: "Mr. Speaker, speaking only for myself today, or any other time on reapportionment, I want it

clearly understood that it was quite difficult for me to promote a plan for reapportionment which decreases the representation of my own county. I felt, and still do, that the job for the House of Representatives here at this time was to reapportion. The federal court is holding a hammer over our heads and if we don't, then somebody else will do it.

I resent very much the implication that there is any "gerrymandering". If I were going to gerrymander I would gerrymander in favor of Pembina county, — you can be sure of that. I further back up the statement made in the original presentation to this House — this will give fairer representation than any other plan."

Rep. Link. "Mr. Speaker, I intended to offer in connection with my other remarks that Rep. Halcrow has sincerely and honestly attempted to give the fairest plan to this House and on that basis I do not question his plan. It is the fairest offer to this body."

Rep. Fitch: "But wait until tomorrow and we will give you a fairer plan."

Rep. Aamoth: "Mr. Speaker, it is fine to get thru with this. We know we are going to have 28 votes and Cass County is greatly disappointed that the vote was not stronger. We do not believe that this is the proper type of reapportionment. I recognize that the others have control and that you have the votes. You have the votes and we are going to have to accept the reapportionment that you give. I know Mr. Halcrow has had a hard job. I know he has worked hard. I believe he has been as fair as it is possible to be on this problem. We have other problems to take up and I want to commend Don for his work on this difficult program, and I hope his bill prevails and I am sure it will on the identical figure shown on the board this past few days."

Rep. Burk: "It is mighty nice for once to know that you are not in the minority."

Rep. Halcrow moved that the House be at ease for 30 minutes, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Saugstad: "This is to be Ken Fitch Day and I will call Rep. Loder to the Chair."

Rep. Loder asked Reps. Halcrow and Link to escort Rep. Fitch to the rostrum.

Rep. Loder introduced the American Legion Band, who had entered the House chamber and announced their first selection "Salute the Sultan or 157".

Rep. Loder introduced Rudy Hoefs of Hankinson who gave a history of the band and Rep. Fitch's managership.

Rep. Loder called on Jack Williams, State Adjutant of the American Legion who presented Rep. Fitch with a plaque from the band.

Rep. Loder called on Mr. Green, director of the band, who told of the awards given to the band and the help given to them by Mr. Fitch.

Rep. Brown was then called on to give Rep. Fitch a plaque from the House of Representatives.

Rep. Brown: "Ken, my distinguished colleague, Mr. Speaker, members of the House and our guests, the most outstanding band in the United States. It is indeed a privilege for me to have been called upon to represent the members of this House. This is probably one of the best kept secrets ever in the legislative halls. I wish sometimes our bills could be kept as secret.

This is the second time I have had the privilege to make a presentation to our honored colleague. First of all for the benefit of the new members of the legislature (I do not have to bring it to the attention of the old members) — Mr. Ken Fitch is not the hard-crusted politician that he appears at times. When you get to know Ken Fitch you will find he is one of the most charitable and humble individuals that I have had the privilege of associating with. When any of you new members find yourselves in trouble regarding parliamentary procedure processes, you can go to Ken and he will help you as he has helped me, and many more, in this legislative hall.

Ken was elected for the 16th term to serve in this House of Representatives. He first came to the legislature in the 1931 session. He sat out the 1933 session; was reelected in 1935 and has been here continuously since.

I can think of no better words to express the feeling of myself and the members of this body than to repeat that poem I did on the occasion of presenting him with a watch when he was Speaker of this House in 1955.

"Give me a guy, with a straight forward eye,
With a grip that will hurt your hand,
With a tongue he uses, but never abuses,
And a mind that can understand,
A guy that brags of his mother,
And thinks all women the same,
A lad you can't rile, who toils with a smile,
And puts his whole heart in the game."

We also have a plaque ordered but we could not get it here in time. However, the manufacturer kindly prepared a sketch and before I let you see it, I will read it to you.

Ken, it has been a privilege to serve with you.”

Rep. Fitch: “It isn’t very often that I can’t say something.

I was never so completely surprised in my life! I had been working with Mr. Green for the 14th and I will say one thing for this band—they are never late for formation and now they are 16 days ahead of time. I don’t think I will ever get over this. Members of the band, I can’t tell you how greatly I appreciate your coming here for this. I am not going to be able to say much more.

Over the years it has been a pleasure to be with them, and we have traveled all over the United States and Mexico; we have seen everything and done everything, and now I might as well die.

Members of the House, I can’t tell you how much I appreciate this plaque which I shall cherish all my life. I have made many friends here over the years.

Anyway, you can see how much I do appreciate it. Thank you all.”

Rep. Loder called Harry Vadnie to the rostrum who told of the different occupations represented in the band and how Rep. Fitch had provided for the band on all their trips.

Rep. Fitch announced the last number, at the request of Mr. Vadnie, “The Stars and Stripes Forever”, and introduced the drum majorette, Miss Judy Saunders of Minot.

Speaker Saugstad returned to the Chair and the House resumed on the eighth order of business.

"As of this moment I would like to sit up here and listen to your deliberations. It has been a great pleasure to have been here with you."

THIRTY-SIXTH DAY AFTER RECESS AND
THIRTY-SEVENTH DAY

Bismarck, February 13, 1963

The House reconvened at 1:30 p.m., pursuant to recess taken, with Speaker Saugstad presiding.

The Speaker announced that the House would be on the 17th order of business, for introduction of visitors.

Rep. Miller moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Congressman Don Short to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Miller and Bowman.

Rep. Aamoth moved that the remarks of Congressman Short be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Congressman Short: "Mr. Speaker and members. This 'Mr. Speaker' comes quite naturally. I have had four years of practice besides the two—no, one term here. I am always making mistakes when I come up here. I hope you don't remember when I was here 2 years ago. It is really nice, as I am sure everyone says when they come back to North Dakota, but it really is nice to get back and those who know me, will know that I really mean it. North Dakota will always sort of be—my wife isn't here, so I guess I can say that North Dakota is my second love.

"I hate to take any time, and I won't take any time. We, in Congress, are always being criticized for delaying and not getting down to business. I think this is legitimate as far as Congress is concerned. The House of Representatives is always subject to some criticism, some of it is unjust. It always takes a certain amount of time to go through the legislative processes and get to the root of the problems that we are all trying to solve.

"Congress, according to the paper I read yesterday, has as yet, done virtually nothing and this is unfortunately somewhat true. The Senate is in the process of adopting rules and about the first thing they do is adopt rules, and until they finish this part of the business they can't officially appoint members of their committees. The Senate, some 30 days after we have convened, has not got around to appointing their committees. We have done better on the House side, but we have not done a great deal. There is a great deal of organizational work going on. In the present consideration of bills there are some rather startling proposals that are sent to us, and perhaps the most startling one this year is the rather unique proposal of tax cuts and

increasing in federal expenditures. This is something by which maybe you people can profit a little bit by the experiences that I think most of us in Congress are having. This is really unique for the American people. I think I have had, as every member has, literally hundreds of letters on this subject. This is probably the most publicized part of the President's program. The tax cut interests everybody—nobody likes to pay taxes and everybody agrees that we need to stimulate economy. Probably no greater device could be used than simply to reduce federal taxes, in particular. It has been real interesting as you get letters from the people all over the country. It was very gratifying to get the number that I got from here. People say 'We are for tax cuts. This is basic and something that we should have. This is the real way to stimulate the economy, constructively, of this country. For Heaven's sake, let's take the further step of reducing federal expenditures in every practical way that we can.' I don't think anybody quarrels with that, simply because our federal budget is approaching a hundred billion dollars—not thousands, not millions, but billions. Now, surely something could be chiseled off some way along the line without actually deterring our national government in carrying out services for the people of the United States and the services and facilities that they have a right to expect from their government.

"You people are somewhat faced with the same problem in the state legislature. You have services that are expanding in the state government, and you have to seek and find ways to finance these. There is a very simple premise, a simple yardstick that must be applied for your convictions. Are these services that the people have a right to expect and that they want? They should be told that they must expect to have to pay for them, unfortunately. In North Dakota you don't seem to have the latitude, and I hope we will never see the time come when you will take that latitude—of deficit financing in North Dakota. We have done that at the national level and people are not buying it. They are more concerned about the prospect of an eleven or twelve billion deficit accruing from reduced taxes. You are faced with the proposition of having to raise some more money somehow, after you have exhausted every possible way of reducing state services to the people of the state. Then you will have to proceed, I hope, to balance the budget and apply the necessary taxes in the best and most appropriate way you can to carry out what the people expect.

"I am real glad to have had this pleasure to see my old colleagues and say a few words in the presence of so many people in the balcony. When I was here we didn't have crowds like this. Maybe what you are doing now is more interesting and spectacular. Certainly it is not my presence that has drawn this crowd because it was a surprise to me as I did not know until about ten minutes ago that I would be up here. Thank you."

After approval of the initial resolution by the number of electors required by section 21-03-07, the proceeds of the bond issue shall be used only for the purpose and in the manner designated by the school plan except as herein provided.

3. After approval of the bond issue, no change shall be made in the purpose of expenditure of the bond proceeds except that, upon a favorable vote of sixty percent of the electors residing in any specific area intended to be served as provided in subsection 1 of this section, material changes may be made in such plan as it affects said area to the extent such changes do not conflict with contractual obligations incurred."

Delete lines 94 through 109 inclusive and in lieu thereof insert the following:

"its discretion submit a specific plan for which such fund shall be used. The plan shall designate the general area intended to be served by use of such fund. The area intended to be served shall be described in the plan but need not be described in the building fund ballot. After ap-

Rep. Hertz moved a substitute motion that the report of the minority on House Bill No. 785 be substituted for the report of the majority, which motion lost on a roll call vote.

Rep. Hertz: "Mr. Speaker, when I first submitted my House Bill No. 785 for a separate labor department, I did it in all honesty and sincerity. I waited until the majority had theirs submitted.

The first bill they submitted was for the Labor Commissioner to be elected. After Senator Hernet made such a hull-a-ba-loo about the Tax Commissioner, that was torn up. Then they asked that the Labor Commissioner be appointed by the Agricultural Commissioner; which was not workable.

In House Bill No. 785, which is identical to Senator Holand's bill in the Senate which says the Governor shall appoint the Labor Commissioner, subject to the approval of the Senate.

Now in committee the majority amended my bill in line 30, which was for four years, and amended it to say "two years," and further amended it in line 42, following the language, after the period - this following amendment was made by the majority: 'The present deputy Commissioner of Labor, or successor, shall serve as Commissioner of Labor until the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January 1965.'

Now, that was agreeable to me. I figured maybe Governor Guy would make that appointment in July. I don't care who is Commissioner as long as we get a separate department.

At the end of the bill, Section 15, was added: "An appropriation". The appropriation called for \$100,000 from the treasury. Now - my bill had no appropriation in the original bill.

I realize that there is another bill comparable to House Bill No. 785 that has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Holand. This bill is now under consideration in the Senate. I think that House Bill No. 785 should be placed on the calendar for action and sent over to the Senate so that

Senator Holand will have both bills in the Senate for final consideration.

House Bill No. 785 was drawn to take only existing functions out of the Department of Agriculture and Labor. There are no new functions added in this bill.

In addition, House Bill No. 785 will not cost the State of North Dakota any more money than the operation of the existing division of labor in the Department of Agriculture and Labor. There is only one exception to this statement, and that is a recommendation of \$16,000 per biennium for the labor commissioner's salary as compared to \$12,000 that he presently receives.

In setting up a proposed budget for House Bill No. 785, I deducted a proportionate amount of expenses from the existing budget of the Department of Agriculture and Labor for the new labor department. In other words, I am proposing that we spend money in a separate department of labor that is now being spent on labor functions in North Dakota.

North Dakota has gone through substantial change since the Department of Agriculture and Labor was first organized. At the present time, we have as many employees in North Dakota as we have farmers. In addition, our society has become more industrialized and the problems of labor have become much more complex and complicated. In addition to the changes in North Dakota labor legislation, we have seen numerous changes in labor policies at the national level that have a direct effect on labor in North Dakota. A separate labor department could do a much more effective job of representing the employees of North Dakota than is presently being done.

People of North Dakota voted in June of 1960 to establish a separate labor department. I think that the state legislature has a responsibility to follow this mandate from the people to establish a separate department of labor. This was not done in the 1961 session, and I think it is imperative that something be done in the 1963 session.

Just about every walk of life in North Dakota has a voice in the official family of state government.

Agriculture has its Department of Labor;

Every profession has its examining and supervisory committee;

The dairy farmers have the Dairy Products Promotion Commission;

The wheat farmers have their Wheat Commission;

Even cattle and chickens are represented in the Livestock Sanitary Board and the Poultry Improvement Board.

I believe that the 157,120 non-agricultural employees in North Dakota deserve an agency that can give them information and assistance in the formulation of peaceful labor-management relations in this state.

In conclusion, I would like to summarize by repeating these points:

- 1.) House Bill No. 785 would greatly clarify labor policy in North Dakota.
- 2.) House Bill No. 785 will require no more expenditure than is now being spent on labor functions.

- 3.) The people have voted to establish a separate department of labor.
- 4.) The 157,120 people in the ranks of employment are in need of adequate representation in state government.

I hope that you will vote to place House Bill No. 785 on the calendar so that the Senate will be able to consider both bills, thereby establishing a department of labor in this session.

Listed below is the contemplated budget of the new Labor Department. These funds would be removed from the budget of the Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor as it is now drawn. The only exception to this is that under this proposal, the Commissioner of Labor would receive \$16,000 a biennium rather than the present \$12,000 a biennium. Aside from this, all transfers would come from the present budget of the Department of Agriculture and Labor.

The return shall be signed by the person required to make it and shall contain a written declaration that it is made and subscribed under penalties of perjury;
2. If a husband or wife living together have an aggregate net income of fifteen hundred dollars or over, each shall make such a return, unless the income of each is included in a single joint return;
3. If the taxpayer is unable to make his own return, the return shall be made by a duly authorized agent or by a guardian or other person charged with the care of the person or property of the taxpayer;
4. Every fiduciary subject to taxation under the provisions of this chapter shall make a return for the individual, estate or trust for which he acts, if the net income thereof amounts to six hundred dollars or over; the return shall be signed by the person required to make it and shall contain a written declaration that it is made and subscribed under penalties of perjury. Subsections 4 and 5 of this section shall apply to every income year beginning after December 31, 1952;
5. The return made by a fiduciary shall state specifically the items of gross income and the deductions and exemptions allowed by this chapter, and such other facts as the tax commissioner may prescribe. Under such regulations as the tax commissioner may prescribe a return may be made by one or more joint fiduciaries;
6. A fiduciary required to make a return under this chapter shall be subject to all of the provisions of the chapter which apply to an individual;
7. The return shall be accompanied by a true copy of the federal income tax return of the tax-payer or by equivalent information on forms furnished and under regulations promulgated by the state tax commissioner.))

57-38-31. DUTY OF INDIVIDUALS AND FIDUCIARIES TO MAKE RETURNS.) 1. Returns with respect to taxes imposed by this chapter shall be made by the following persons:

- a. Every individual who is required to file a federal income tax return under the provisions of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended shall be required to make and file a return with the tax commissioner, except that any individual who has attained the age of sixty-five before the close of his taxable year shall be required to make a return if he has for the taxable year a gross income as defined for federal income tax purposes of six hundred dollars or more; provided that no individual shall be required to make and file a return with the tax commissioner unless he has a gross income as defined for federal income tax purposes of six hundred dollars or more; provided further that if a husband and wife make a joint return of income for federal income tax purposes they shall make a joint return of income for the purpose of complying with this chapter;
- b. Every estate the gross income of which for the taxable year is six hundred dollars or more;
- c. Every trust having for the taxable year any taxable income, or having gross income of six hundred dollars or over, regardless of the amount of taxable income.

2. If an individual is deceased, the return of such individual required under subdivision a of subsection 1 of this section shall be made by his executor, administrator, or other person charged with property of such decedent.

3. If an individual is unable to make a return required under subdivision a of subsection 1 of this section, the return of such individual shall be made by a duly authorized agent, his committee, guardian, fiduciary or other person charged with the care of the person or property of such individual, except that this subsection shall not apply in the case of a receiver appointed by authority of law in possession of only a part of the property of an individual.

4. Returns of an estate or a trust shall be made by the fiduciary thereof.

5. If a return is made by one of two or more joint fiduciaries for federal income tax purposes, a similar return shall be made for the purposes of complying with this chapter.

6. Each return shall be signed by the person required to make it and shall contain a written declaration that it is made and signed under penalties of perjury; in the case of a joint return, both the husband and wife if both are living shall sign it.

7. Each return shall include thereon the indentifying account number required for federal income tax purposes."

Dear Representative Burk:

You have brought to our attention House Concurrent Resolution L-1 and ask for an opinion thereon. As we understand it, you are essentially asking for the technical difference between tuition and fees, and to what extent may fees be charged before they actually become tuition which would be in violation of our constitution.

Our present constitutional provision states that the state must provide a system of free public schools including collegiate courses. This would seem to place a prohibition upon the charging of tuition. However, in most states that have such a prohibition a "fee charge" for matriculation or a registration fee does not offend the prohibition against charging tuition.

"Where there is a prohibition against charges to certain students for 'tuition', such prohibition will not preclude the exaction of fees or charges for other items not falling within the meaning of the term tuition."

(14 C. J. S. P. 27, page 1364.)

A look at "Words and Phrases" discloses the following definitions of the word "tuition".

"Tuition is the charge made for instruction, rather than a rent for use of buildings in which instruction is imparted." Linton v. Lucy Cobb Institute, 45 S. E. 53.

"State board of education held to have authority without consent of student body to charge student union fee to state university students for purpose of discharging bonded indebtedness on students' union building, notwithstanding legislative provision requiring free 'tuition' for resident students."

Rheam v. Board of Regents of University of Oklahoma, 18 P. 2d 535.

"A 'tutor' is one who teaches, usually a private instructor; while 'tuition' is the act or business of teaching the various branches of learning." Ibid.

It would appear that the strict interpretation of the word tuition would mean the cost of actual instruction, i. e., teachers' salaries. The term would not seem to include costs of the physical plant nor salaries of administrative employees. However, where the statute states that "admission" to the state's schools shall be free, the charging of incidental fees has been denied.

"Prohibition on tuition fees in units of university system was not to prevent board of regents from charging reasonable 'matriculation,' laboratory, hospital, and athletic fees to students in such institutions." *State v. Regents of Univ. System of Georgia*, 175 S. E. 567.

Turning to House Concurrent Resolution L-1, we note that there is no specific bar to charging "tuition". The resolution merely states that education shall be "free" and goes on to authorize a charge (tuition or fee) that is reasonably related to the costs of operation. Therefore, this resolution is unlike other statutes or constitutional provisions relating to "tuition" in that it specifically authorizes the charging of a "tuition or fee". Whether the charge made by our institutions is reasonably related to the cost of operation is a question of fact that we could not answer. It would seem that this resolution would not result, to any great degree, in a change from the law as we know it today.

I trust that this information will assist you.

Dear Mr. Fitch:

Re: New Sources of Appropriations

As requested by you, I have looked into the legality of appropriation by the Legislature from various special funds. You wish to know if any of these special funds have any monies available which could be appropriated by the Legislature for general or special purposes. Some of the funds involved would be the Workmen's Compensation Fund, Highway Department Fund, Fire and Tornado Fund, State Bonding Fund, State Hail Insurance Fund, Teachers' Retirement Fund and Board of University and School Lands Fund.

Two constitutional provisions which would have to be considered in this regard are Section 186 and Section 185 of the Constitution. The first paragraph of Section 186 provides as follows:

"(1) All public moneys, from whatever source derived, shall be paid over monthly by the public official, employee, agent, director, manager, board, bureau, or institution of the State receiving the same, to the State Treasurer, and deposited by him to the credit of the State, and shall be paid out and disbursed only pursuant to appropriation first made by the Legislature; provided, however, that there is hereby appropriated the necessary funds required in the financial transactions of the Bank of North Dakota, and required for the payment of losses, duly approved, payable from the State Hail Insurance Fund, State Bonding Fund, and State Fire and Tornado Fund, and required for the payment of compensation to injured employees or death claims, duly approved, payable from the Workmen's Compensation Fund, and required for authorized investments made by the Board of University and School Lands, and required for the financial operations of the State Mill and Elevator Association, and required for the payment of interest and principal of bonds and other fixed obligations of the State, and required for payments required by law to be paid to beneficiaries of the Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund, and required for refunds made under the provisions of the Retail Sales Tax Act, and the State Income Tax Law, and the State Gasoline Tax Law, and the Estate and Succession Tax Law, and the income of any State institu-

tion derived from permanent trust funds, and the funds allocated under the law to the State Highway Department and the various counties for the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of public roads.***"

While this section (186) restricts the use of certain moneys to designated purposes, it is possible a distinction might be made between some of the funds in view of the wording used in this section. For instance, you will notice that as regards the Bank of North Dakota, the State Hail Insurance Fund, the State Fire and Tornado Fund, the State Bonding Fund, and the Workmen's Compensation Fund, only the moneys "necessary" to conduct their operations are appropriated. As regards the State Highway Department, this section allocates all the funds set aside under law to the Highway Department. Hence, it would be possible to contend that if those departments which were appropriated "necessary" funds had as income more funds than necessary to operate their activities, that these excess funds are not set aside by the Constitution and would be subject to appropriation by the Legislature for general purposes.

I note in Sections 154 and 159 of the Constitution it expressly provides how the principal and interest income of the Board of University School Land Funds are to be used. These provisions are such that the Legislature could not appropriate any moneys from this fund. The Constitution makes no mention as to the use of the interest income from these funds. I understand that the interest income from these funds would run into millions of dollars. It would appear to be possible to distinguish between principal and interest income in these funds. It would be the consensus of opinion of our staff that this interest income would be subject to appropriation for general purposes.

The case of *Langer v. State*, 284 N.W. 283, indicates that the appropriations made by Section 186 of the Constitution do not cover appropriations for administrative purposes. The appropriation measures for departments that handle special funds usually state that there is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Treasury in the specific fund, not otherwise appropriated, an amount of so many dollars. Consequently, I believe it might be contended should the proper occasion arise that the funds used for administrative purposes of certain departments derive from the interest income on the fund they are handling. If such were the case, the amount of interest income now available for appropriations would have to be reduced by the amounts expended for administrative purposes. However, I do not believe anyone will raise such arguments in regard to the amount of interest income available for appropriations.

Section 175 of the Constitution states, "No tax shall be levied except in pursuance of law, and every law imposing a tax shall state distinctly the object of the same, to which only it shall be applied." (Emphasis supplied.) In 1935 the Legislature transferred over one million dollars from the State Hail Insurance Fund to the Equalization Fund. The transfer of that "surplus" was challenged on the grounds that the hail tax was not being applied to the purpose for which it was levied. The Supreme Court stated

that the hail indemnity tax was not a tax at all — it was, in effect, an insurance premium. The court went on to say that the Legislature need not impose additional tax burdens upon the taxpayers to meet necessary governmental expenses when such burdens can be obviated by an appropriation of the surplus or excess in such a fund.

One justice dissented to the case of *State v. Hopton*, 265 N. W. 395, on the basis that there was, in fact, and in law, no surplus. The majority of the court felt differently. They stated that the Legislature had all of the facts at their disposal and that the court could not substitute its judgment of the correctness of the facts for that of the Legislature.

I hope this information will be of assistance to you.

Rep. Brown asked that his remarks on House Bill No. 648 be printed in the House Journal.

"I am for freedom — and I define freedom as the right of any person to do as he pleases so long as he does not interfere with the equal right of any other person to do as he pleases.

To me, freedom means absolute equality under the law for all persons.

I believe the law should never mention a race or a color, or a particular religion, or a business organization, or a labor organization, or any group or person.

Many years ago a great philosopher asked: "If men use their liberty in such a way to surrender their liberty, are they thereafter any the less slaves?"

It is quite appropriate on this the birthday anniversary of the Father of Our Country and our first President, that we recall these precious words spoken by him in the critical period of Valley Forge: "Shall a few designing men, to gratify their own avarice, upset the goodly fabric we have been rearing at the expense of so much time, blood and treasure?"

The strength of America is in the character of its individual citizen — and character strengthens in the face of adversity and problems.

Character does not shrink back from difficult, unpleasant duty.

Robert Payne had this to say about liberty: "Those who expect to reap the benefits of Liberty — must undergo the fatigue of keeping it."

In this great land of Liberty under our Republic form of Government — men of all walks of life — have been able to organize to better enjoy the privileges of our heritage.

May God forbid that it should ever be any other way.

In order to preserve those rights — in an organized society, we must have government — a government that treats all equally — so it is by necessity, to support that government, that we must tax ourselves to support that government — on an equitable basis.

Never should we ever allow government to force any individual, or organization to do that which is repugnant to the freedom of man.

That is why I vigorously opposed the passage of House Bill No. 879.

The 37th legislative assembly, by two resolutions, directed the Legislative Research Committee to study our taxing structure and present legislation that would correct inequities.

House Bill No. 648 is a sincere, honest reconstruction of our corporate and financial taxing structure.

Human nature being what it is, selfishness takes over when it hits home.

I sincerely believe every citizen, in his heart and mind, wants to share in the responsibility of preserving and supporting our government, so that the freedom to continue our free enterprise system, shall be preserved for everyone covered in this bill."

Rep. Goebel requested a call of the House, which was granted.

Rep. Link: "Mr. Speaker, I wish to rise on a point of personal privilege and have my remarks recorded in the House Journal.

"On January 31, the 24th day of this Legislative session, after several joint conferences of the Governor and the majority and minority leaders of the Senate and House, agreement was reached that \$17 million was the minimum figure needed above presently estimated income for the 1963-65 biennium.

"Yesterday, February 26, the 50th day of the session, we hear over the news of a Republican-proposed compromise tax increase plan to meet the state's expected \$17-½ million deficit two years hence. We are told the compromise is between two Republican factions.

"I am glad that though the time remaining to adequately survey and hear the various proposals is short, the majority position is now before us. It is to be expected that differences of opinion must be resolved, but compromise must never take precedence over that which is just, constitutional or financially and economically sound.

"The proposal to charge the \$1.6 million Highway Patrol budget to the Highway Department to relieve the general fund of this amount raises a serious constitutional question. Article 56 clearly states that '1. Revenue from gasoline and other motor fuel excise and license taxation, motor vehicle registration and license taxes . . . etc. . . shall be appropriated and used solely for construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways, and the payment of obligations incurred in the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways.'

"The financial wisdom of this proposal must likewise be questioned. The chairman of the North Dakota Highway Users Conference is quoted as saying 'taking \$1 million away from matching funds for federal interstate highway construction projects would actually mean a loss of \$10 million to the state for highway construction.' On this basis, we would lose \$16 million for federal interstate highway construction should the operation of the Highway Patrol be charged to the Highway Department funds.

"While the plan calls for non-resident withholding, it would seem an across-the-board withholding plan should be considered. Inconvenience to local employers is recognized, but evasion should be held to a minimum in this manner.

"The proposal to take another \$1 million from the Bank of North Dakota should only be considered if it does not jeopardize reserves or seriously affect future earning capacity of the institution.

"The proposal to raise the sales tax to 2½% for two years, or 3% for one year, is unacceptable. This is economically unsound and unjust.

"Here I quote from the Governor's message: 'Taxes should not penalize economic growth, should not be regressive, and should not distort channels of trade . . . and in the case of the sales tax, only an extension of greater coverage with no increase in rate would be justified.'

"I submit that an increase in the rate of our present 2% sales tax will distort channels of trade and cause even greater economic problems for those areas bordering Min-

nesota and Montana which have no sales tax, and South Dakota with a 2% sales tax.

"Consideration of any increase in rate cannot be justified as long as items and services which are capable of carrying this tax are exempt. Low income people who spend all their income for necessities of life should not be asked to pay an additional 1% sales tax while others are able to spend a portion of their income for services and pleasures which are exempt from the sales tax.

"In line with this, we should not overlook the fact that in 1960 in the \$3,000 to \$7,500 net income group, Montana's state income tax was about double and Minnesota's was more than four times that which is levied in North Dakota.

"The proposal likewise anticipates \$800,000 from the franchise tax in House Bill 648, which passed the House by the narrow margin of three votes and is now in the Senate.

"Here I quote from the Fargo Forum of Friday, February 22: "The Legislative Research Committee staff estimated the bill, (H. B. 648), as amended in the House Thursday, would add about \$1.5 million per biennium to the state's suffering treasury beyond what the current corporation taxes yield. It was estimated that about \$1.1 million of this would come from co-ops."

"In North Dakota, farmers constitute the vast majority of patrons and members of cooperative enterprises. It is disappointing that the first major tax increase proposal to pass this House is one that asks the farmers to pay about \$1 million in additional taxes.

"Necessary tax increases should be built around the following:

- A. Graduated income tax
- B. Income withholding tax
- C. Broadening sales tax base

"Other proposals in the plan can and should receive consideration. In the interests of completing the responsibilities of this body without undue delay or expense, areas of differing opinions should be resolved by continued conferences.

"With all the seriousness at my command, may I respectfully urge continued bi-partisan consideration of these important measures to reduce to a minimum any possibility of non-acceptance on the part of the Governor.

"To this end and for the good of this state, the Democratic-Non Partisan League Party pledges its support."

"SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

49-19-08. OPERATION OF PIPELINES.) The operation of the pipelines to which this chapter applies, for the transportation of crude petroleum, coal, or gas in connection with the purchase or purchase and sale of such crude petroleum, coal, or gas, is a business in the conduct of which the public is interested, and as such is subject to regulation by law. The business of purchasing, or of purchasing and selling, crude petroleum, coal, or gas, which uses in connection with such business a pipeline of the class subject to this chapter to transport the crude petroleum, coal, or gas so bought or sold, shall not be conducted unless such pipeline so used in connection with such

business is a common carrier within the purview of this chapter and subject to the jurisdiction herein conferred upon the commission. The attorney general shall enforce these provisions by injunction or other adequate remedy.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-11. PIPELINE CARRIER MUST AGREE TO CARRY WITHOUT DISCRIMINATION.) A common pipeline carrier, in the acceptance of the provisions of this chapter, shall agree expressly that it, without discrimination, will accept, carry, or purchase, the oil, coal, or gas of the state or of any person not the owner of any pipeline, operating a lease or purchasing oil, coal, or gas, at prices and under regulations to be prescribed by the commission.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-13. HEARINGS ON RATES OF PIPELINE CARRIER — POWER OF COMMISSION.) The commission shall establish and enforce rates or charges and regulations for gathering, transporting, loading, and delivering crude petroleum, coal, or gas by common pipeline carriers in this state, and for the use of storage facilities necessarily incident to such transportation, and shall prescribe and enforce rules and regulations for the government and control of such common pipeline carriers in respect to their pipelines and receiving, transferring, and loading facilities. It shall exercise such power upon petition by any person showing substantial interest in the subject matter. No order establishing or prescribing rates, rules, and regulations shall be made except after hearing and notice to the common pipeline carrier affected.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-15. EXCHANGE OF TONNAGE BY COMMON CARRIER — FACILITIES TO BE MAINTAINED FOR RECEIPT AND DELIVERY.) Every common pipeline carrier shall exchange crude petroleum tonnage, coal, or gas with each like common pipeline carrier. The commission shall have the power to require connections and facilities for the interchange of such tonnage, coal, or gas to be made at every locality reached by both pipelines whenever the necessity therefor exists and subject to such rates and regulations as may be made by the commission. Any such common pipeline carrier under like rules and regulations shall be required to install and maintain facilities for the receipt and delivery of crude petroleum, coal, or gas of patrons at all points on such pipeline. No carrier shall be required to receive or transport any crude petroleum, coal, or gas except such as may be marketable under rules and regulations to be prescribed by the commission.

SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-18 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-18. JOINT ACTION BY COMMISSIONS TO REGULATE INTERSTATE COMMERCE.) Where pipe-

lines within the scope of this chapter are engaged in interstate transportation of oil, coal, or gas, the commission shall act jointly and in conjunction with the supervisory body which exercises jurisdiction over and control of such pipelines within any other state for the purpose of control, supervision, making joint rates for interstate transportation of oil, coal, or gas, or any other matters within the scope of this chapter.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-19. DISCRIMINATION BETWEEN SHIPPERS IN FACILITIES FURNISHED, SERVICE RENDERED, AND RATES PROHIBITED.) No common pipeline carrier shall discriminate between or against shippers in regard to facilities furnished, services rendered, or rates charged under the same or similar circumstances in the transportation of crude petroleum, coal, or gas, nor shall there be any discrimination in the transportation of crude petroleum, coal, or gas produced or purchased by itself directly or indirectly. In this connection the pipeline shall be considered as a shipper of the crude petroleum, coal, or gas produced or purchased by itself directly or indirectly and handled through its facilities. No such carrier in such operation, directly or indirectly, shall charge, demand, collect, or receive from anyone a greater or less compensation for any service rendered than from another for a like contemporaneous service. This shall not limit the right of the commission to prescribe rates and regulations from or to some places different from other rates or regulations for transportation from or to other places as it may determine, nor shall any carrier be guilty of discrimination when obeying any order of the commission. Where there shall be offered for transportation more crude petroleum or coal than can be transported immediately, the same shall be apportioned equitably. Gas shall be taken pro rata on the basis of open flow production of the wells connected to the pipeline or lines and the delivery of each well shall be regulated accordingly. The commission may make and enforce general or specific regulations in this regard.

SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.) Section 49-19-20 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

49-19-20. DUTIES OF PIPELINE CARRIERS.) Subject to the provisions of this chapter and the rules and regulations which may be prescribed by the commission, every common pipeline carrier shall receive and transport crude petroleum, coal, or gas delivered to it for transportation and shall receive and transport the same and perform its other duties with respect thereto without discrimination."

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.) Section 54-21-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

54-21-02. BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION — MEMBERS — APPOINTMENT — TERM OF OFFICE — REMOVAL.) The board of administration shall consist of (((five))) seven members. The attorney general, state health officer, superintendent of public instruction and the commissioner of agriculture and labor shall be exofficio members and the other three members shall be appointed by the governor for a term of six years each with the terms of office so arranged that one term only shall expire on the first day of July of each odd numbered year. Each appointed member of the board shall hold his office until his successor is appointed and qualified. The governor may remove any appointed member of the board for cause.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.) Section 54-23-01 of the North Dakota Century Code Supplement is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

54-23-01. INSTITUTIONS UNDER CONTROL OF BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION.) The board of administration shall have full power to manage, control, and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in this chapter and in title 25, the state hospital, the penitentiary, the school for the deaf, the Grafton state school, the North Dakota Industrial school, the state tuberculosis sanatorium, and such other charitable, reformatory, and penal institutions as have been or may be created or established according to law. In managing these institutions, where matters of medical service are involved, the board shall rely upon the advice and recommendations of a council of medical consultants consisting of the director of the mental health division of the state health department as chairman and two other physicians to be appointed by the governor from a list of 5 nominees submitted by the North Dakota Medical Association, and the recommendations of such council on policy matters involving medical service shall be implemented by the board unless 5 members of the board disapprove. The two appointed physicians shall serve for terms of six years each, except one of the first appointees, whose term shall be for three years. Each council appointee shall hold his office until his successor is appointed and qualified and shall serve without compensation. The Governor may remove any appointed member for cause. The council shall meet with the board at least quarterly and at such other times as called by the chairman of the board. The Council may also meet upon the call of its chairman. The board shall not have the power to manage, control, and govern the soldiers' home. The term 'board' as used in this chapter shall mean the board of administration.

SECTION 3. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Bratcher: "Mr. Speaker and members: Today we have before us Senate Bill No. 45, just another one of those pruning operations to divorce the rural people from handling or knowing just what is taking place in our schools and in the education of their own children — taking away our American rights as given to us in the Constitution of the United States. This centralization of education and control. Just why all this centralized power? Do the rural people of America no longer have a devoted place in this great America of ours? Have the rural people of North Dakota and America lost that fascination of endearing the hearts of all those so unfortunate not to have been born of rural parents? Our centralized government now has the unlimited power to tax and to destroy through the sixteenth amendment with unlimited power to regulate anything it chooses to subsidize through the Supreme Court decisions. Education does not escape this danger. Webster's dictionary gives this definition of 'ism; a distinctive doctrine, system or ideal. Social and economic factors affecting our ability to finance our schools from a state and local stand point are hereby affected. We should have a flat state-wide mill levy for all school purposes covering each and every acre of land in the state. Not leaving out portions here and there, thereby making class taxation. Centralization of power and centralization of education in Senate Bill 45 would deprive the rural people of just one more right and privilege that they deservedly should have — just another step down that road with no return. What is the purpose of school reorganization, annexation, centralization, etc.? The are one and all the same, just change of name to make it more acceptable. What forces are behind centralization? Columbia University, Harvard and National Educational Association, with many other top go-betweeners. Dedicated to one and one purpose only — one world government if you please, under one governmental educational supervision, with dictatorial power to replace teachers of their choice, and text books with whatever subject they wish the children to read or learn as written by left wing authors? Members of this assembly and friends — the whole concept of collectivism is the destruction of christianity and church and

our belief in God. For this reason alone I am seriously opposed to Senate Bill No. 45. It destroys and takes away that right for a local people to live and govern themselves as God and our Constitution intended that they should. I do not want to be a part of doing away with rural schools. This reorganization and centralization will not stop at this first phase, but will continue on and on to larger districts. Just as the collectivist plan calls for the eventual creation of ten or fifteen national districts to replace the present fifty states. You may say, this cannot happen here in America. Children being taken from homes and parents. Parents shipped off to some work factory and not in America, but to some foreign land. Don't say this could not happen here in America. What has happened in the last thirty years and this only the beginning as to what will happen, if we don't change our way of thinking, or more properly, I should say, if we do not think for ourselves. We in North Dakota are entitled to do, think and live as we wish — so long as we do not infringe upon the rights and privileges of others. Then why force this reorganization plan upon those that do not want it, or are the people past that stage of knowing what they want, and must accept whatever is dished out to them by this all-powerful centralized educational board? Do we want socialism, Communism, one world government? Of course not. Then my friends let us band together and make a start back up that rugged road that we have so foolishly gone down for the past several years.

"Thirty years: if there is any doubt in the mind of anyone that we, the people have allowed our America to slide down a creeping socialistic road, repeating European history, let us read an article by Dr. Mario A Pei, who came to this country from Italy. His article entitled, 'The America we lost' which was in the Saturday Evening Post, May 31st, 1952. Ovid A. Martin, Associated Press writer for the St. Louis Globe Democrat of May 7th, 1960. Ask a farmer this question: Where are the farmers today? His answer: 'In a hell of a fix.' So is every other segment of our society — and we the people allowed this to happen! We are in financial trouble here in North Dakota because we allowed others to write the amount on the price tag. This is Thomas Jefferson's warning: 'It is incumbent to every generation to pay its own debts as it goes. To preserve our independence we must not let our leaders load us with perpetual debt.' That is one of the instruments the planners of this centralization of education seek to do, destroy us financially. If we survive then they seek to choke us another way — this organizational scheme.

"I oppose Senate Bill No. 45 for the reasons stated. I ask for your support to defeat this bill, members of this assembly and friends of our schools. I am not opposed to education or progress. I am much concerned in our drift away from our liberties! From our freedom! From our constitutional rights and obligations. The people, you and I, if you please are being lead to the communistic slaughter block. In the shadow of this false pretense of better education and in the name of progress, when and if knowingly education or progress blocks my road, to keep freedom and happiness from me — then I say, give me liberty or give me death!"

Rep. Link asked that his remarks be printed in the House Journal.

Rep. Link: "This legislative body has been deeply concerned over state financing for the coming 1963-1965 biennium. We have recognized the need for new revenues to close the gap between what the State takes in and what

we appropriate in all funds. There is, however, one dedicated fund which has received very little attention in this session, and that is the Highway Department Construction Fund.

"In the 1961-1963 biennium, the Highway Department started with an operating balance of \$5,610,200. Revenues other than federal funds to the Highway Department this biennium are estimated at \$31,773,400. Expenditure of state revenues from the highway fund are estimated this biennium at \$31,894,600. This leaves an estimated operating balance of \$5,489,000 at the end of this biennium.

"It should be noted that the Highway Department is balancing its income and out-go this biennium, and will not jeopardize its operating balance. It should be further noted that some federal matching funds in the present biennium were not made available to the State in the amounts projected at the beginning of the 1961-1963 biennium because of a reduction in the income to the federal highway trust fund and adverse weather conditions.

"The Highway Commissioner, Walter Hjelle, and Chief Highway Engineer Robert Bradley stated on March 2, 1963, at a North Dakota Senate hearing, that a \$4,000,000 operating balance is necessary to keep the highway financing program solvent. It must be recognized that a substantial operating balance is necessary because the Highway Department pays construction contractors for work done on state, county and municipal projects, and is later reimbursed by federal payments.

"Projections of the 1963-1965 biennium Highway Department revenue is \$32,565,000. Projected construction and operating costs, if all estimated federal aid is matched, will be \$37,181,000 for the 1963-1965 biennium. Federal matching funds available to our Highway Department for the 1963-65 biennium are \$43,092,136.

"If we meet all of the federal matching program in the 1963-1965 biennium, we will draw down our operating balance to an impossible figure of \$873,000. If we maintain a safe operating balance of \$4,000,000, then we will be short approximately \$3,000,000 in matching federal funds. This could mean a decrease of \$30,000,000 in the interstate highway construction program, or a decrease of \$6,000,000 in the primary and secondary program, or a proportionate reduction in all state road construction programs.

"Highway construction finance is a serious matter, and a failure to provide adequate funds for matching purposes in this session could cause a reduction in the federally-matched highway construction program in North Dakota. I am requesting that my remarks be made a part of the record in the House Journal."

FIFTY-NINTH DAY AFTER RECESS

Bismarck, March 8, 1963

The House reconvened at the conclusion of the recess with Speaker Saugstad presiding.

Speaker Saugstad announced that the House would be on the 17th order of business.

Speaker Saugstad announced that Rep. Hofstrand would substitute for Rep. Johnston, who is ill, on Senate Bill No. 229, and Rep. Goebel would be the new Chairman.

Rep. Brown moved that the remarks of Rep. Miller on House Bill No. 648 be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Miller: "At this time I have reasons to regret that I have been such a good teacher. Rep. Burk has now repeated some of the arguments I used to urge your support of this bill a short time ago. But that was before the bill was completely changed by the Senate amendments.

House Bill No. 648 was introduced in this Assembly in good faith. It was not for the purpose of getting revenue. It was for the purpose of trying to get some degree of equity in our tax system, a responsibility with which we were charged by the previous session of the legislature.

The unfairness that exists has led to the existence of bad conditions in too many of the communities of our state. We had hoped the enactment of this bill would help to correct this.

Now I find House Bill No. 648 returned to us in such a condition that "a father would not recognize his own son".

I came to North Dakota in 1916 as a young lad. My father had been a farmer and grain buyer for quite a few years. After four complete crop failures in South Dakota he came to North Dakota to farm. I shall always remember when he came home after hauling grain to the elevator in the little town of Coleharbor. He was thoroughly disgusted. As a grain buyer he knew what his grain was worth and the grade and price he had to take from the old line elevator was shameful. He was amazed and could hardly believe that such a condition could exist. He went to his neighbors and talked with them about the possibility of pooling their grain for shipping. They agreed because they too, knew what was happening. Later it was discovered that the milling companies were buying only 38.9% No. 1 wheat in North Dakota, but they were selling as No. 1 wheat 90% of all the wheat they were buying in North Dakota.

My father went to town to order a grain car, but learned to his surprise that he could not get a grain car. He and others soon learned that the big business combinations had a strangle-hold on the economy of North Dakota. Therefore, it was natural that a bad feeling should develop toward outside business concerns and especially "big business". That feeling has carried down for many years. It was natural that during this period farmers should form their cooperatives to market their own grain and protect their livelihood.

Today, the attitude of people toward business has changed. Today we are trying to get more business to come to North Dakota. We are trying to create a more favorable atmosphere for business. Also we have come to recognize that business is people. Banks are people! Corporations are people! Cooperatives are people! Any time that anything is done by our State that gives a special tax concession to certain people, to give certain privileges to a group of people, we hurt some other people. We create a bad economic atmosphere in our state and those who are responsible have no reason to be proud of what they have done.

Yes, today I too, was on the conference committee for House Bill No. 648. The Senate has amended this bill as was pointed out. Now it is supposed to bring in nearly a million dollars.

I asked these questions of the Senators even though I knew the answers. To what extent is the tax on banks and savings and loan associations being raised? About 50%! What is the increase in the tax rate on the corporations that are already bearing the brunt of the business tax load? It varies from 16 $\frac{2}{3}$ % to 33% with an average increase of 23 $\frac{1}{2}$ %! Then I asked an innocent question. Will the cooperatives be paying any additional tax money? The answer: "Well, there should be some additional tax money". I smiled at that answer and suggested that the tax rate on the cooperatives must have been increased. But that was not the case. However, now I was assured that the tax commissioner would have a record of those receiving dividends so more taxes would probably result. That would leave the insinuation that the farmers had not been honest in paying their taxes on dividends before.

I know that we need money. We need money badly, but do we need it so badly that we are willing to violate every principle of fairness and put all the load on those who are now carrying it? We can pay too big a price for some revenue and here is one case where that may be true.

I have a great deal of respect for people. I have faith in people and know that eventually we are going to have tax equity. I made this statement to the conference committee that whenever a business felt the need to advertise on the radio or in the papers that it was paying taxes, it was an admission that they were not paying the same tax load that their competitors were paying.

The condition that exists today is wrong. It should be changed! It is going to be changed sometime. I have a motto here on my desk that has given me a lot of help and encouragement: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, Courage to change the things I can, and Wisdom to know the difference."

Members of this Assembly, it does not require much wisdom to realize that we cannot change the tax situation at this time. But those of us who live here and are responsible for the present situation must see that eventually a change to bring about tax equity must be made. I am going home with a clear conscience. I have tried. And you who are casting your vote on this measure at this time should make up your minds as to whether or not you are right or wrong in trying to achieve some degree of tax equity.

Mr. Speaker, I move that House Bill No. 648 be laid upon the table."

Arne, on behalf of your colleagues, it is my pleasure to present to you this luggage and with it our thanks and best wishes.

I want you to know too, Arne, that this is not a hint that you pack up and leave but rather that you use this on your return to Bismarck for future sessions."

Rep. Johnson: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House:

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to make this presentation to one of the outstanding legislators of this body.

I have been privileged to serve on two committees with Rep. Walter Christensen for the past two sessions and have found him to be one of the very best.

I have learned to respect his good judgment and ability, as I know you all have.

As assistant minority floor leader, Rep. Christensen has displayed not only great ability but also has revealed a quality of respect, consideration and love for each and every one of his fellow legislators.

He has always carried the cause of his party with dignity and honor.

I appreciate the honor that has been mine as assistant minority floor leader. Inasmuch as this is only my second term, I feel very inadequate at times fulfilling the duties of this assignment.

It has been an interesting experience and I do sincerely thank all of you for your fine spirit of cooperation.

I have especially enjoyed working with Rep. Art Link.

Thank you so much for this gift."

Rep. Anderson of McHenry: "Mr. Chairman, and members of this house, both minority and majority.

I am happy to have the honor to present a gift to Rep. Aamoth on behalf of all of us, for leadership that you have performed in this session, even though at times, we have had our different opinions, which makes good Government."

Rep. Aamoth: "Mr. Chairman and friends — and I sincerely count each and everyone of you as good and dear friends.

During the last sixty days, we've had our differences of opinion and beliefs — but the truly impressive thing about this wonderful body is that these differences were honest convictions and rightfully respected as such by each of you. It has been an honor that I shall always remember to have served as your assistant majority floor leader. I regret that illness curtailed my effectiveness, and I am most

grateful to Don and Stanley for allowing me to stay on in a limited capacity. I hope that the results of our work of this session will be appreciated by the people of our great State in the spirit in which it has been effected. I thank you again for every consideration and this wonderful gift."

Rep. Lowe: "Mr. Speaker and members of the Assembly:

"The friendships we make and the fine people we learn to know are among the lasting rewards that come with serving in the state legislature. In traveling about the state we find these folks in practically every community and regardless of party affiliation, this bond of having served together, makes each reunion a real pleasure. This is as it should be.

"There are people with whom we are associated here whom we admire greatly and with whom we have more contact than others. The man we honor on this occasion is one of these. He has been fair in his dealings with all of us and has rendered splendid service to the state as a citizen and as a member of this assembly. In his position as minority floor leader, he has had some difficult problems to handle and has conducted himself in a fine, upstanding, gentlemanly manner. We of the majority and the entire body have appreciated his efforts and his diligent work. It is with great pleasure that I have the honor to pay tribute to Rep. Arthur Link, minority floor leader of the House of Representatives, and to present this gift to him on behalf of his colleagues.

"I thank you."

Rep. Link: "Rep. Lowe, members of the Assembly, employees, newsmen, friends: Perhaps to the uninitiated it might at times seem that some of us by nature are not what we sometimes appear. By fate or otherwise some of use have been asked to assume certain positions, and to do certain things for certain groups. I suppose if it were not so, we could not have any semblance of orderly process in resolving the differences that do exist between men of all races, of all creeds, of all political philosophy.

"I do want to assure you, however, that those of you who have not had this experience in the past will realize that as the days and weeks melt into months and we look back upon the deliberations (that were sometimes controversies), that they will melt into one great process of democracy and that all of us will begin to realize that it has been indeed a privilege (a privilege that few in the state are accorded) to make the acquaintance and have had the opportunity to serve in what I believe is the greatest fraternity in the state—that of the state legislature. And as I again, on this occasion, look down upon this fine desk force with our beloved desk reporter, Ruth Smith—and the news reporters—I want to assure you all that I am deeply grateful for the cooperation and the respect that all of you have accorded me.

"Thank you so very kindly."

Rep. Giffey: "On behalf of the members of the House, it is my pleasure to present this gift to the Majority Floor Leader. We recognize the tremendous responsibilities that go with your position of leadership, Rep. Halcrow, and we wish to express our appreciation for the courteous

manner you have accepted each of us when we stopped at your desk or met you in the halls."

Rep. Halcrow: "Thank you Rep. Giffey and members of the 38th session of the House of Representatives. You have said some very fine things about me, but I want you to know that we do not have the time for me to give you the other side of the story. Our mutual association in this body cannot be purchased in silver or gold, and I shall hold it high above any materialistic value. With that connotation I shall cherish this gift so long as I live. I hope all of us can meet here again. Thank you."

Rep. Vendsel: "Mr. Chairman and members: I considered it a distinct honor and privilege when I was asked to make this presentation, particularly because I am a freshman member of this House, having graduated from the lower House to the upper House.

"It seems logical that after twelve years of service that Stan Saugstad should have been accorded the highest honor that can be given to any member of this body. He has been completely impartial and with his quiet attitude, he has been a credit not only to himself but to the state legislature and the State of North Dakota. He has dedicated himself to high ideals and principles and, Stan, we wish you well and we say 'Thank you for a job well done' and personally I would like to add thanks from the loyal opposition from the 29th district and I am glad you didn't lower the boom during the campaign last fall as you did last night!"

Speaker Saugstad: "Mr. Chairman: All of you have been most gracious. I thank each and everyone of you for this gift.

All that I can say is that I am most grateful for having had this opportunity to serve with you.

After having had this experience, I now fully appreciate the need for an excellent and smoothly functioning desk force.

If time permitted, I would like to say something about each individual. However, Jerry Stair, Ruth Smith, and Monte Burke, in particular are to be commended for performing a difficult and intricate job. Both have had long experience and both are willing to put in the extra effort that is so necessary for handling the routine work of the Legislative Assembly.

By the same token, all of the desk force have done an excellent job. Further, I should like to pay my respects

to all of the House Employees and the Committee Clerks in particular.

Last, but not least, I should like to pay tribute to the fine work of Florence Nemer, the Speaker's Secretary, who, because of her long experience, was able to do a professional job.

Rep. Brown: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to a point of personal privilege and ask to have my remarks printed in the House Journal.

I read the Fargo Forum today and Mr. Wally Lindell's interview with the Governor. Mr. Lindell states he (the Governor) had his feet on his desk. Yes, that is typical of him — he is always up in the air — never has he had his feet on the ground. He has never learned that he is the executive officer of the state — but has always assumed the role of a dictator.

We who served with him as a freshman legislator and the only term he ever served, will recall his hot headed attitude, he never did learn the rules of this body, and when he couldn't get his way, he attempted to appeal the decision of the chair.

Ascending to the Governor's chair, he became lost in the aurora of his position, and assumed that he could pull the strings and have everybody jump like puppets.

Early in February, when I sat in on meetings in his office, I presented two tax measures that would have treated all of our citizens on an equitable basis, but in as much as they did not satisfy his favored groups and special interests, he informed the group that he would fight them to the last ditch.

I was elected to represent the citizens of the 27th district and all of the people of North Dakota.

It has been their interest that I have been battling for. Certainly I do not favor the Governor's socialist programs, nor his confiscatory tax proposals.

The people of North Dakota are willing and ready to support government on an equitable base — but positively they will rebel at a confiscatory, dictatorial mandate from one who assumes the role of a dictator. The governor by his

public pronouncements has truly exemplified the role of a spoiled boy, who if he can't have his own way, is not willing to serve the best interests of all of the people of North Dakota.

His has been the role of one who puts the interests of special groups ahead of that of the welfare and good of all of the people. By his sanctimonious utterances, he has completely beclouded the basic issue and completely ignored the best interests of the citizenry of our state. It is most unfortunate that an egotistical personality, of little actual governmental experience, usurps the prerogative of his high and honorable office, to make public utterance of half truths for strictly political propaganda."

Rep. Link: "Mr. Speaker, in the recognized and accepted method of party political organizations, I cannot evade the responsibility that is mine today.

I stand here as the party's choice to speak for our party and our Governor.

I must, however, on this day — refrain from answering this kind of an attack."

Rep. Fitch: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the remarks of Rep. Link will appear to have been uttered on March 8th to correct the date and strike the word "Sabbath". The motion prevailed.

Rep. Halcrow: "Mr. Speaker: Senate Bill No. 185 provides for distinctive marking of all state-owned vehicles. Strictly construed this bill, and the existing law, would require such marking on the governor's car.

Certainly, it is not the intent of the legislature that the law should apply in this instance, however, it would be mechanically difficult to secure reconsideration of the bill at this time to correct this over-sight. We have therefore concluded that this statement in the Journals of both Houses would clearly show the legislative intent not to include the governor's car within the provisions of this law, and I move at this time that these remarks be printed in the Journal."

COMMENTS ON AMENDMENTS AND PURPOSE OF SENATE BILL No. 39

The purpose of this bill is to establish a withholding system for nonresident employees for the period beginning August 1, 1963, and ending September 30, 1965, and to establish provisions for the filing of declarations of estimates of tax due and the payment of taxes thereon by nonresident employees during the period beginning August 1, 1963, and ending September 30, 1965.

From and after October 1, 1965, it is the intent of the Legislative Assembly to establish a general income tax withholding system for all employees whether resident or nonresident who come within the provisions of the Act, and after such date it is the intent of the Legislative Assembly to establish requirements for the filing of declaration of estimates of tax by all taxpayers coming within the provisions of the Act and the payment of taxes due thereon.

In addition, provision is made during the period beginning August 1, 1963, and ending September 30, 1965, for any employer to elect to treat his employees as nonresidents and place them and their wages under the withholding tax system regardless of their place of residence or regardless of their filing of income tax returns during the previous year.
