



REMARKS
 OF

HON. MARK ANDREWS
UNITED STATES SENATOR

“Mr. Speaker: It is a privilege to be here. I appreciate your hospitality. It is always good to be home, particularly when the sun begins to shine and the temperature warms up just a little bit.

Of course it is always good to look out over this House floor and see friends that I have travelled with, friends from both sides of the political aisle. I remember years ago when the Dean of this great House, Brynhild Haugland, and I walked through the Burlington Northern Railroad yards up in Minot looking for votes. You know Brynhild always found a good number and had a few left over for me as well.

And of course on the other side of the political aisle, I travelled through Oscar Solberg's back yard with Oscar and with the late Jim Haley, when he was Chairman of the Indian Affairs Committee in the House of Representatives. Neither one of us were looking for votes, but we were doing our job representing North Dakota. It was a privilege, of course, to be with both of you. As a matter of fact Oscar is on the side where a lot of comments during the campaign were made about committee assignments, you know, and in all the campaigning across North Dakota, the only request I had from any of my constituents about a committee assignment, was a group of Indian leaders, who said 'If you are elected to the Senate, we sure hope you will be on the Select Committee on Indian Affairs.'

And I just want to report that I did get on the Select Committee of Indian Affairs and the Appropriations and the Budget and the Agriculture Committee, which is kind of ad hoc because there weren't any requests for that.

Actually, the Senate, I am finding, as I have talked to some of the alumni from this House who have moved to the Senate across the way, is a totally different body than the House of Representatives. It is a much slower body. The pace seems to go on almost at glacial speed. As a matter of fact in the choosing, and I have gotten reports back from some of the scouts that you have sent over there, that it works that way in the other body too. As a matter of fact, I have heard from Joe Leibhan and he says that 'It is awfully slow over here' and LeRoy Erickson says 'You know they are awfully stodgy.' Bryce Streibel isn't quite ready to comment yet, but when he does, he will probably be running the organization over there.

But in the Senate in Washington, the pace is a little slower. As a matter of fact, in the choosing of offices, we have only gone down to number fifty-seven so far. We will probably reach my number, eighty-three, in another couple of months so I will know where my office is going to be. In the House of Representatives we did our choosing in a twenty-four hour period. The same thing went with committee assignments and the rest.

I am sure the job will be done; and I am sure that the challenges, of course, that face us as a nation and a state will be addressed.

We have some exciting potential here in North Dakota, and I am sure it excites you as much as it does all of us who are privileged to be North Dakotans.

We are concerned about inflation, but we are concerned also about energy and the cost of that energy. Here in North Dakota we are blessed with an abundance of both fuel energy and food energy, and the wise disposition we make of those God given gifts are going to affect the future, not only of our State, but the future of our great nation and

of peace in the free world for us for a time to come.

I think that we have problems; I know you recognize those problems. If you didn't recognize there were problems, you wouldn't be chosen to serve the people of our great state. I certainly agree with you that we are as representatives privileged to vote for some of the finest people in this world. We've got troubles, sure, but our system works better than any other system in this world of ours, and it works better here on the state level, than we are able to put it together on the federal level. The federal Congress could learn a whale of a lot from the way you run your shop right here in our Legislature in North Dakota. You represent, so well, all of our people. I am proud to share with you the honor of representing the people of the great state of North Dakota, and I am proud that you would invite me to come back and say 'Hello' to so many of you that I have enjoyed campaigning with in your home towns and walking up and down the main streets. Some of you are from the other side of the aisle, and you had a little different story to tell and you weren't urging my election, nor was I urging yours, but we work together and we understand each other. The minute the election is over, the partisanship that might be there during the throes of a campaign disappears, and we are all working to build a better state. That is really why it is a privilege to serve as a Representative, and why I say it is such an honor for me to be with the Representatives that are closest to the people of North Dakota.

Thanks for letting me join you today."

SECTION 6. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated the sum of \$486,000 out of the Vietnam veterans adjusted compensation fund to the adjutant general for the purpose of reimbursing appropriate schools for any tuition fees waived in accordance with chapter 37-07.1 of the North Dakota Century Code for the biennium beginning July 1, 1981, and ending on June 30, 1983. This appropriation shall not be subject to the provisions of section 54-27-10.



STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

Salaries and wages of the Adjutant General are increased by \$44,752, of which \$37,407 is from federal and other funds and \$7,345 from the general fund, to allow funding for the continuation of the 10 percent emergency salary increase and for salary increases of nine percent for the first year of the biennium and eight percent for the second year of the biennium. The salaries and wages line item of \$1,954,484 includes \$58,675 for the state to fund a conversion to a noncontributory retirement plan for employees. The new appropriation section appropriates \$486,000 out of Vietnam veterans adjusted compensation fund to the Adjutant General for the tuition waiver program. Included in the amount of \$486,000 is the estimated unexpended balance of \$270,000 from the appropriation for the tuition waiver program included in Chapter 38 of the 1979 Session Laws of North Dakota.

The line item for inauguration fees is increased by \$1,000 from the general fund. The capital improvements line item is increased by \$38,000 from the Vietnam bonus fund to allow the Adjutant General to make payment to the city of Fargo for special assessments.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

The salaries and wages line item of the Parks and Recreation Department is decreased \$39,970. This is a result of adding \$46,004 to continue the 10 percent emergency salary increase and for salary increases of nine percent for the first year of the biennium and eight percent for the second year of the biennium; of adding \$18,144 for temporary salaries for the Devils Lake access project; and of subtracting \$92,718 for three of the four park ranger positions recommended in the executive budget. It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly that the one additional park ranger position be placed at a state park at the discretion of the Parks and Recreation Department. The salaries and wages

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line item amount of \$2,643,448 includes \$55,902 for the state to fund a conversion to a noncontributory retirement plan for employees.

The operating expense line item is increased by \$199,101. The changes are arrived at by subtracting \$22,024 pursuant to legislative guidelines of nine percent per year; by subtracting \$8,400 for the three park ranger positions deleted; by adding \$4,525 for the Devils Lake access project; and by adding \$225,000 for master plans at three state parks. The operating expense line item includes \$300,000 to develop master plans at Fort Stevenson State Park, Lewis and Clark State Park, Turtle River State Park, and Fort Lincoln State Park.

The equipment line item is reduced \$180,129 to provide a total equipment line item of \$400,000. This line item includes \$10,100 for the Devils Lake access project.

A line item totaling \$800,000 of which \$400,000 is from the general fund and \$400,000 is estimated income is added for a marina at Fort Stevenson State Park.

The capital improvements line item in the executive budget is reduced by \$938,500. The total capital improvements line item of \$834,500 is calculated in the following manner:
