Rep. Backes moved that the remarks of the Honorable Byron Dorgan, United States Congressman of North Dakota, be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

REMARKS OF THE HONORABLE BYRON DORGAN UNITED STATES CONGRESSMAN

"Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen:

"Thank you for inviting me to address the Assembly. I understand that my colleague, Senator Andrews, was here earlier during the session and most of you who serve in the North Dakota Legislature know that I have participated in your proceedings for five preceding legislative sessions. I enjoy and respect what you're doing in the North Dakota Legislature. It's not easy. It's hard work. And I'm just honored to have been invited to participate with you in my new role as Congressman, representing this state in the U.S. Congress.

"I have to confess that I miss the somewhat combative, but always

mutually respectful, relationship I've had with the Majority Leader. Well, I sort of miss it. I used to miss it. But I was interested in learning that someone, when I left the Capitol after serving eleven years here, predicted paralysis here in this Capitol if I was to leave. And I came back last Friday evening to Bismarck, turned on the television set, and here were legislators in wheelchairs at the Class A Basketball Tournament. From political hardball to wheelchair basketball. It occurred to me, however, it was not the younger and more active people of the House of Representatives that were in the wheelchairs. I understand it was the older folks across the hall.

"I now am serving in Congress and have to vote as you have to vote, pushing those buttons to one side or the other. Now I know what you all mean when you told me over the years that there isn't a 'maybe' in between. You vote 'yes' or you vote 'no'. And having had to cast those votes I know that you wish, and I certainly wish, that there was a button that says 'I think so' or 'Perhaps' or 'I'm not so sure.' But it's not that easy and you vote yes or no, and I have a healthier respect for that.

"We've had some strong disagreements in the past when I served in the Executive branch. But we've also worked together on a lot of issues. And the North Dakota Legislature and the North Dakota Executive branch of government I think is a source of pride to all of us. No hint of scandal. There's no question about diligence. The North Dakota Legislature and the Executive branch represent good government. It works. It works the right way for the people it's supposed to serve.

"One worries that when one leaves North Dakota you lose contact. We don't always have to worry about that because the press calls from time to time. Last Monday morning I received a call from one of our newspapers in the state that was carrying Jack Anderson's column on Monday. And in Monday's Jack Anderson's column he was reporting a secret sex club in Washington involving members of Congress and diplomats. Well, they asked for my comment on that. And as any freshman would know in the U.S. Congress you simply refer them to the seniors in your delegation. So I suggested that they call Senator Andrews and Senator Burdick. The fact is there are stories about Congress and politicians, and it represents the worst of public life. But the best of public life, I think, is personified by much of what we've done in North Dakota, much of what you do here in the Legislature.

"Having been invited to address you, I'd like to spend just a couple of minutes talking about what are sometimes confusing, and certainly always dramatic, times in the Federal Government. Confusing, I say, because one of the main topics of concern these days in Washington is whether or not the grain embargo is going be lifted. And it's interesting, to someone who goes to Washington for the first time and takes a look at the national political system, it's interesting that President Carter campaigned all across this country on the promise that he would never impose an embargo. And he did. And then President Reagan campaigned across the same country and said that he was going to lift the embargo. And he didn't. And those of us who care about the grain embargo and what it does to this country are supporting in a bipartisan way an attempt to persuade the administration to lift that embargo. That embargo is not injuring the Soviet Union. The Soviets are still getting their product. It's injuring the American farmer. And my feeling has been that if we're going to embargo in an attempt to restrict the inflow of goods to the Soviet

Union, then we ought to embargo everything. We ought to embargo the sale of Caterpillar tractors to the Soviet Union. We ought to embargo all the trade and commerce that we involve ourselves in with the Soviet Union.

"I say that these are dramatic times because we have a significant amount of inflation; we have unemployment; we have high interest rates. Part of this condition, I think, results from a government almost intoxicated by its own budget. I'd like to just give you some of my thoughts about the economic recovery program and what's being discussed in Washington in that regard.

"The President has proposed about \$49 billion in budget cuts for fiscal year 1981 and fiscal year 1982. I support the President and I support that level of budget cuts. I think that we ought to cut budgets, I think it's necessary. I played on a tennis court recently and saw the sign on the edge of the court that said 'The Jennings Randolph-Robert Berg Memorial Tennis Court built with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Conservation Funds'. You know, what is U.S. Fish and Wildlife doing building tennis courts? What is the Farm Home Administration, for that matter, doing building golf courses and motels? And we can spend days, you and I, talking about the excesses, where the budgets have been stretched and stretched and distorted well beyond their intended result. And so it's time for us to cut the budget. And I think that the President's program is bold and it's courageous in many areas. He's doing what no Democrat or Republican in Washington has dared do for a long time. It doesn't mean I agree with him on every issue. But I do think that we all need to say that cutting the budget is right; it's important; and what he's doing in some areas is very bold and courageous. Reasonable people will disagree on some specific details. I disagree, for example, on cutting solar energy. I think cutting alcohol fuels loan programs is not wise. I think cutting WIC and Medicaid is unwise. But there are other areas where I think there ought to be deeper cuts. In general I support the level of budget cuts that we're talking about in Washington.

"The Farm Home Administration, particularly, is an area where there ought to be some cuts. But we ought to make sure we cut what wastes and not that which works. The cuts in the proposed budget for the loans for farm ownership, particularly for the beginning farmer, are too deep, I think. For example, the money left in that budget for all the beginning farmers all across America, after the budget cuts, if they're approved, would represent only half of the amount of money this government put its name on to support a loan to one corporation, Chrysler. And that's just fundamentally wrong. But, again, budgets cuts are important and I intend to support them.

"It's important, however, I think, for all of us, especially those of us in North Dakota, to understand that budgets cuts go part of the way to solving this economic problem, but just part. We also need to deal with the subject of energy, and we have to deal with the subject of monetary policy. According to economists, about one-half of the inflation in this country is caused by the burgeoning bubble of increased energy prices flowing and coursing through our economy. That means that we must produce more energy and use less. And we must produce more of the right kind. And it means a strong national commitment to conservation programs.

"In the area of interest rates I felt for a long while that the classic economic definitions that say, 'If you increase interest rates you dampen demand, and therefore you abate inflation,' I've felt for a long

while that's fundamentally false. It used to be what we taught in economics. But is doesn't work. We do not have demand-pull inflation these days. We have a different kind of inflation. We have inflation caused by substantial energy cost increases. We have inflation caused by lack of productivity increase. We have inflation caused by federal spending. We have inflation caused by lack of competition in the market place. But we do not have the classic demand-pull inflation. And high interest rates cause more inflation; they do not cure inflation. And so we need consistent, predictable, long-range monetary policy that makes sense. The Wall Street Journal reported in a recent article that the larger corporations in America are continuing to borrow money at about the same rate they used to. They pay more for it and just send it along in increased prices. But it's the kind of people we represent, the small businesses, the family-size farms, who either can't get it or, if they can get it, can't afford the funds at today's interest rates. And so I intend to not only work on budget cuts but to go farther than that and deal with energy issues and monetary policy issues.

"It seems to me it's important for us while we talk about this to maintain a perspective about what this country is. This country is still the strongest country in the world. We still, of all the major industrial nations in the world, have the highest standard of living. We still, despite all the talk about productivity, have the highest productivity of any worker in the major industrial nations. The others are catching up, to be sure. But we still have the highest rate of productivity, as measured with other industrial nations. We lead from strength when we try to solve these economic problems. It's that simple. We have troubles. But we ought to understand that this is still the strongest country in the world economically. And we lead from strength in trying to solve those problems.

"You and I, many of us have different backgrounds. We have different philosophies. We come from different parts of the state. But we have one common interest. And that common interest is to work for the common good of North Dakota and of this country. And inviting me to speak to you today is manifestation of your interest in working with me and other members of the Congressional delegation. And my coming is my signal to you that I intend to cooperate in every way possible in working with the North Dakota Legislature to share that common interest and achieve those common goals.

"Right after the election last fall I received a letter from a young girl in Dickinson who was in fifth grade. And her teacher had suggested that she write to people in political office. And at the fifth grade level, here's what she said in the letter to me: 'Dear Byron Dorgan, I've been a Republican all my life. But good luck anyway.' Her friend who also included a letter was in fifth grade and she said, 'Dear Byron Dorgan, We voted twice in our school in Dickinson during the election. I voted for you the second time.'

"Well, it's in that spirit with which I offer you my cooperation. I want to work with you, stay in touch with you as I work in Congress on issues that you're related to. And I hope that you'll feel free to call me

on issues and interests that you're concerned about.

"It's a test of government, I think, to keep the private sector private. It's a test of government to help maintain a healthy economy. It's a test of government to make sure we have the necessary social programs to help those in this country who are in need. And it's a moral test of government, and we need to remind ourselves during these times, it's a moral test of government, as one of our most

influential political leaders said, to determine how it treats those who are in the dawn of life, the children; those who are in the twilight of life, the aged; and those who are in the shadows of life, the handicapped, the sick and the needy. And I think all of us share a desire to measure up to that test. And I think we will. Thank you very much."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. Subsections 12, 13 and 14 to section 43-15-10 of the 1979 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code are hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

- 12. To regulate and control the practice of pharmacy in North Dakota.
- 13. To adopt, amend, and repeal rules for the regulation of pharmacies and pharmacists providing radio-pharmaceutical services, including special training, education, and experience for pharmacists and physical design of space, safeguards and equipment for pharmacies.
- for pharmacies.

 14. To make, adopt, amend, and repeal rules as may be deemed necessary by the board from time to time for the proper administration and enforcement of this chapter.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Subsection 1 of section 43-15-10 of the 1979 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

- To-cancel, revoke, or suspend-the-certificate and registration of any registered pharmacist who To refuse to issue or renew, or may suspend, revoke or restrict the certificate, registration or permit of any pharmacist or registered pharmacist, upon one or more of the following grounds:
 - Is addicted to any drug habit.
 - b. Uses any advertising statements of a character tending to deceive or mislead the public.
 - . Is a chronic or persistent inebriate.
 - d. Permits or engages in the unauthorized sale of narcotic drugs or controlled substances.
 - Permits or engages an unauthorized person to practice pharmacy.
 - f. Is mentally or physically incompetent to handle his pharmaceutical duties.
 - g. Is guilty of fraud, deception, or misrepresentation in passing his pharmacist examination.
 - h. Willfully-and-repeatedly-violates Is found by the board in violation of any of the provisions of the laws regulating pharmacists or the rules and regulations established by the board.
 - and regulations established by the board.

 1. Unprofessional conduct as that term is defined by the rules and regulations of the board.
 - the rules and regulations of the board.

 j. Incapacity of a nature that prevents a pharmacist from engaging in the practice of pharmacy with reasonable skill, competence, and safety to the public.
 - k. Is found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of one or more of the following:

 (1) A felony, as defined by the statutes of North Dakota.
 - (2) Any act involving moral turpitude or gross immorality.
 - (3) Violations of the pharmacy or the drug laws of North Dakota or rules and regulations pertaining thereto, or of Statutes, rules or regulations of any other state, or of the federal government.
- 1. Fraud or intentional misrepresentation by a

pharmacist in securing the issuance or renewal of a certificate of registration or pharmacy permit.

SECTION 3. A new section to chapter 43-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

PENALTIES, REINSTATEMENT, CRIMINAL PROSECUTIONS, AND JUDICIAL REVIEW.

- Upon the finding of the existence of grounds for discipline of any person holding, seeking, or renewing a certificate of registration, permit, or license under this chapter, the board may impose one or more of the following penalties:
 - a. Suspension of the offender's certificate of registration, permit, or license for a term to be determined by the board.
 - b. Revocation of the offender's certificate of
 - registration, permit, or license.

 Restriction of the offender's certificate of registration, permit, or license to prohibit the offender from performing certain acts or from engaging in the practice of pharmacy in a particular manner for a term to be determined by the board.
 - by the board.
 Refusal to renew offender's certificate of registration, permit, or license.
 - e. Placement of the offender on probation and supervision by the board for a period to be determined by the board.
- 2. Any person whose certificate of registration, permit, or license to practice pharmacy in North Dakota has been suspended, revoked, or restricted pursuant to this chapter, whether voluntarily or by action of the board, shall have the right, at reasonable intervals, to petition the board for reinstatement of such certificate of registration, permit, or license. A petition shall be made in writing and in the form prescribed by the board. Upon investigation and hearing, the board may in its discretion grant or deny such petition, or it may modify its original finding to reflect any circumstances which have changed sufficiently to warrant such modifications.
- 3. Nothing herein shall be construed as barring criminal prosecutions for violations of this chapter where such violations are deemed as criminal offenses in other statutes of North Dakota or of the United States.
- 4. All final decisions by the board shall be subject to judicial review pursuant to chapter 28-32."

SECOND READING OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

House Concurrent Resolution No. 3005. — A concurrent resolution to create and enact a new section to the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, relating to special sessions of the legislative assembly; and to amend and reenact sections 23 and 41 of article IV and section 5 of article V of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, relating to the maximum duration of legislative sessions, effective dates of legislative acts, and the powers of the governor.

STATEMENT OF INTENT

This amendment would allow the governor to limit the purpose and length of any special session of the legislature called by the governor. The legislative assembly would also be allowed to call itself into special session if requested in writing by two-thirds of the members of each house. Finally, the amendment specifies when a measure passed by the legislative assembly becomes law.
