ELECTION OF PRESIDENT PRO-TEM

Senator Wenstrom: Mr. President, members of the Senate, I rise as a special privilege today to place a name in nomination that of an old friend, I say that in terms of the time I have known him, not in regard to his age. I am very happy to place in nomination for the position of President Pro-Tem for the 47th Session of the North Dakota Legislature, Senator Stanley Wright from Stanley, North Dakota, representing the 4th Legislative District.

Senator Goodman: Mr. President, members of the Senate, I would like to second the nomination of Senator Wright. As the former speaker said, his background and experience in the Senate and in his community and his own work experience, make Senator Wright an excellent candidate for the position of President Pro-Tem.
