The salaries and wages line item is increased \$2,219,841. This adjustment provides funds for the continuation of the 10 percent emergency salary increase and for salary increases of nine percent for the first year of the biennium and eight percent for the second year of the biennium. Also, this adjustment deletes funding for Travel Division personnel since these funds have been included in the appropriation for the Business and Industrial Development Department. The salaries and wages line item amount of \$60,518,845 includes \$1,501,227 for the state to fund a conversion to a noncontributory retirement plan for employees.

The operating expense line item is reduced \$1,724,514 by deleting \$920,565 for the Travel Division and by subtracting \$803,949 in accordance with legislative inflation guidelines. The operating expense line item includes \$115,000 for mapping work previously conducted by the Travel Division. The equipment line item is increased \$981,631 to allow for the purchase of new aircraft.

The capital inprovements line item is reduced \$50,000 since the building to be constructed pursuant to this appropriation has already been purchased.

The \$6.9 million line item for a road and bridge impact fund to be funded from a portion of the five percent oil production tax is deleted.

The estimated income line item is reduced \$5,473,042 in accordance with the above changes.

RECOGNITION

Senator Nething moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort U.S. Senator Mark Andrews to the rostrum, which motion prevailed.

The Honorable Mark Andrews was escorted to the rostrum and addressed the Assembly.

Senator Nething moved that the following remarks of Senator Andrews be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

U. S. Senator Mark Andrews:

Thank you Mr. President, it's good to be with you and it's a privilege to visit with the North Dakota State Senate, to be with friends I've traveled with in your own neighborhood and across the state during the campaigns where we inject some partisanship for a short period of time before we settle down and work together for the best interests of this great state of ours. Of course it brings back a lot of memories too. I remember that late night, Jiggs, that you and I were traveling across southwestern North Dakota and the ideas that we worked out together in the car, just as I remember the conversations I've had with Ralph Christensen in his hardware store and with a whole host of other people—brother Tweten and farming, he kind of competes with us from time to time on some of the crops that he can put together and he has the benefit of being a potato farmer. Rollie Redlin and I, of course, had the privilege to serve together in the United States Congress. He was a great colleague and has done a fantastic job down there for the Garrison Diversion Project. It seems years since you and I were there at the picture where they signed into law that bill that passed when we were there so it's like coming home.

Your problems in the North Dakota Senate are a lot like ours in the United States Senate except you've got a better handle on them. Our problems with the budget, your talking about the budget, you seem to know better what to do about the budget. The pace of the session-I was just in the House across the hall and having served some 18 years in the House down in Washington, I found out that the Senate is indeed a slower paced body, I don't know whether it is more graceful but it is certainly a more dignified body. I was talking with some of your colleagues the night before last when I was in Bismarck and I had a number of comments from Joe Leibhan who says it really is kind of slow over there, we've got to do something about it. Leroy Erickson said "gee whiz" it just doesn't move like the House does. Bryce Streibel is holding back any comments but give him a couple of years he'll probably be running the place. But these are actually ways that develop over the years of facilitating the conduct of the state's business and facilitating the conduct of the nation's business.

The Senate in Washington is of course no different. It is a slower

body than the House of Representatives because of condition. Some of the things are rather interesting. I've been there now for a month and a half and the Senate picks its offices starting with the election in November so we in the United States Senate have been picking our offices for three and a half to four months. It's not like it used to be Rollie, in the House, where they give you a 24 hour period, "bang" and that's it. In the Senate they've gotten down, when I left last Friday, to No. 57. They've got 43 Senators yet to go before they start moving in to permanent offices. They think we'll make the move sometime in May or June. In the meantime I haven't got too bad quarters. I'm in Milt's old office in the Dirksen Building and our daughters came down for the swearing in ceremony, went over to the Russell Building and decided they would really rather have me over there with the high ceilings, the old fashioned thing. So, being a father with two daughters what do you do, you say "yup" we'll go to the Russell Building. So when we get our choice we may well do that.

Last week we got to pick our desks. I don't know how much problems you have in picking your desks here, but that was a five week process. and there's a lot of history behind that desk as a matter of fact. You know, they have different desks in the Senate. One of them is known as the old Jeff Davis desk. It's now occupied by the senior Senator from the State of Mississippi, a great friend of our Senator Milt Young John Stennis and it still has the bayonet hole in it that a union soldier inflicted on it when he was on the floor of the Senate and was told that that was indeed the desk of Senator Jeff Davis, who of course became the president of the Confederacy. So in the very wood of our chamber is the history of our republic. The Webster desk doesn't have a top writing box on it because Webster, back in those days, decided his predecessors had gotten along fine without that writing desk, so he could get along fine without it so to make it uniform in the photography of the Senate they've put it on extra long legs so it looks like it's about the same size of the other desks that haven't been altered. The luck of the draw was that when I picked, I picked in the rear row so I could have some room for my long legs and low and behold Senators are a lot like school children. Senators, through the ages I found out, have carved their names in the bottom drawer of these desks that have been there for a hundred and fifty years and you'll find Webster's name carved in one, you'll find all kinds of different names. There was a Senator Cass whose name is carved into one desk. I picked my desk on the basis of location. Went back one evening, Mary and I were down because it was going to be a late night session and I had to get her approval before I settled on the desk I was going to pick. She looked down from the gallery and she said that looks okay and it was my time to choose so I went down and chose. The next day I was at the desk and I opened it up and in the drawer below, guess what was carved into the wood—Langer. So, by a pure stroke of luck, a North Dakota Senator inherited a desk a North Dakota Senator had been at way before. We've got challenges facing us, of course, that transcend the traditions of the bodies were privileged to serve in. Changes, but we're going to address them, we're going to address them properly.

I was privileged to listen to your discussion of energy a minute ago. That certainly is one of our big challenges. How we're going to make the most efficient use of our energy, how we're going to harness our coal so we can be independent from the OPEC countries. I think one of the things we are going to find is that our coal will be made into methanol or liquid fuel in the future and this is probably the great

sleeper in energy independence here in the United States and as we moved toward that goal we'll gain freedom from these fantastic prices we have to pay for the imports of energy. But the exports of grain we hope can continue to increase. They're the best possible way of solving the imbalance of payments that bothers our nation so much.

I think I've got an interesting piece of news today for the North Dakota State Senate. We are all concerned as members representing a farm state about the quality of our grain exports. We've got a new team in Washington. We've got a new Secretary of Agriculture. Grain quality standards have been a big challenge over the years and I can tell you today the head of the grain inspection division, a subcabinet rank in the Department of Agriculture, will be a North Dakotan, so for the first time we'll have a person from the greatest grain producing area running the entire grain inspection operation of the federal government and I would hope that this infusion of North Dakota talent will make sure that our farmers' grain reaches its ultimate destination in the shape it left the farm and the local country elevator. And, I think this is a place that North Dakota is uniquely qualified to make this type of an impact on our grain sales overseas. Ken Gilles, the present vice president for agriculture at NDSU, will be the new head of the federal grain inspection service showing again the type of talent that we have in North Dakota. Sure we've got troubles in America today and we've got troubles in North Dakota, not too many really, when you look at the troubles that face other areas in this world, they get smaller and smaller. The thing to remember is that our system works and I think the thing to remind our constituents, who we're so privileged to serve and vote for, is that this system works if we participate and work together in it. You represent, so well, our people as legislators representing North Dakota. I'm proud to share with you the honor of representing our great state. It's a privilege to be with you today and thanks so much for letting me visit with you for these few minutes. Good luck to you and God speed in your work.

We have dealt with the crop for thirty years now, have seen it come from zero to one of, I think, a major economic importance and I'm not so sure anyone really thanks you people for your part in it. We have been to the legislature for several grants, research and promotion and you have been very agreeable with us on that behalf. We have through your grants in research, increased yields now fifty percent. We think we can do better than that. We can grow one hundred to one hundred fifty percent in the future and we want to thank you for that, but we must also make you aware that our production research is going at about an even pace. If we excel too much in it we are going to make mistakes. We think now that we will be back asking for more research in utilization. Obviously it doesn't help me to grow lots of sunflowers without a market for them. We see so many exciting things in the utilization of sunflowers, and we think that that probably is where the effort should be at present. With utilization and trade groups we think you are not only making an investment in sunflowers but also an investment in North Dakota generally. We feel that by your giving us a profit on our sunflowers you get your tax money appropriated back. We would like to thank you from the bottom of our hearts for the honor of this day and would also like to thank my family for the patience they have shown me. Thank you very much.

House Bill No. 1025. — A Bill for an Act making an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the civil air patrol of the state of North Dakota.
