"I would like to state for the record that HB 1661 is an effort on my part to return Districts 45 and 44 to their original states. The Korsmo plan for North Fargo (part of HB 1669) shatters District 45 into 3 parts, destroys its historical continuity as a university district, and unnecessarily strings the district out from 12th Avenue North and I-29 to the Edgewood Golf Course. 

SIXTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Kretschmar moved that the amendments to House Bill No. 1669 as recommended by the Majority of the Joint Committee on Reapportionment be adopted, which motion prevailed.

DEBATE ON MAJORITY AND MINORITY REPORT

Rep. Kretschmar: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House: The amendments before the House are on House Bill No. 1669, which is the principal reapportionment bill that was introduced into the House. I will try to briefly explain and try to answer any questions if there are any.

"The first amendment, which occurs on page four, is really just a technical amendment and establishes by statute a timetable or a deadline by which the district political party organizations should be reorganized in order to be ready for the 1982 elections. That date was placed at February 1, 1982, and in the statute the Secretary of State is the officer who will set the schedule; but he will set it so that the work of the reorganization is completed by February 1. That was done because next year the primary election occurs, I believe, on the 8th day of June and filing is required. The last day for filing for the primary election, I believe, is April 14th. At least one of the major political parties has its state convention next year in early March, so that the district organizations should be in place and operational by February 1st.

"The next amendment deals with an adjustment in the boundaries of some of the districts in the Grand Forks area. It takes some of the territory that was within the city districts in Grand Forks and places them in the rural district 19. And then on the northern end of the city, I believe, places some territory that was in the rural area into the city districts 17 and 18. The net change, I believe, is less than 100 people in the populations of those two districts, so it still stays well within the guidelines that the committee established.

"The next amendment deals with the Stark County area, Districts 37 and 38. The bill makes a slight change by adding something like a half section of territory that was in the rural district and places it within the city district. That territory is adjacent to the city, near the city limits, and is an area right now where there are undoubtedly less than

50 people living. I guess there are 13 houses, and it is an area that may grow as the city of Dickinson grows during the next decade. That change also does not affect any of the population variances that we have within the bill. Both of those districts are still well within the variance.

"The last amendment that the committee considered is found on page 2 of the amendments and established the criteria by which Senators who reside in even number districts, and who were elected in 1980, would be up for election in 1982, if their new district exceeded certain limitations. The committee has chosen the figure of 2,000 population. If a Senator has new population in his district that's 2,000 or more, then he would be required to run for election for a two-year term in 1982. The amendment also sets out those districts which fall into that category. There are 7 in number. Two of the 7 are districts which are new and have no incumbent Senator in them at the present time. The other 5 districts have incumbent Senators who were elected at the 1980 election and, I believe, of those, four are in the majority party and one is in the minority. The committee in its early deliberations was using a percentage figure of increase in population and they had numbers ranging from 15 to 25 to all over the line and it is kind of an arbitrary number. Mr. Hickok, the consultant from the University that we were using, suggested it would be just as easy to use a base figure of raw population and that was the thing the committee decided upon earlier today. A 2,000 base - 2,000 figure based upon the ideal district size in North Dakota, which is the 12,315 people, which we get by dividing the state population by 53. This figures out to be a population increase of 16.24%. And we, the committee, determined that that was well within the guidelines that we had been working with and that we believe that this would be well within the Constitutional guidelines and would be upheld by a court if that matter were challenged. Those, basically, Mr. Speaker, are the amendments that the majority of your Joint Committee on Reapportionment placed on the bill; and we would urge that the House adopt the Majority Report and approve those amendments.

REQUEST

Rep. Backes requested a recorded roll call vote, which request was granted.

The report of the Majority was declared adopted.
RULING OF SPEAKER

Speaker Peterson ruled, pursuant to House Rule 602, Subsection 4, that the effect of adoption of the amendments proposed by the Majority Report on the amendments proposed by the Minority Report is as follows:

- 1. That the amendment to pages 23 and 24 is rendered moot because it is irreconcilable with the amendments adopted.
- 2. That the amendment to pages 17 and 18 is reconcilable with the previous amendments and will be voted on at this time.

Rep. B. Larson moved that the amendments to House Bill No. 1669 as recommended by the Minority of the Joint Committee on Reapportionment ruled reconcilable by Speaker Peterson be adopted.

Rep. Irven Jacobson: "Mr. Speaker and members of the Assembly: I rise in support of the Minority Report. The amendment proposed in this report is no doubt the most reasonable amendment that the Joint Committee on Reapportionment considered. What it does - "And this effects only two Districts in Fargo - it returns approximately 5,000 people back to the District in which they now reside - 2482. Citizens from Precincts 23 and 26 would be returned to District 44 and 2468 citizens from Precincts 14 and 16 would be returned to District 45. Why this switch was made in the first place is hard to understand, and when asked, Mr. Korsmo, who presented the plan to the Committee, and which the Committee adopted. When he was asked the logic of this switch in precincts, he answered "An additional District was given Fargo so switches had to be made to compensate for that". Now it is obvious that the switches in the four Precincts in 44 and 45 no bearing on what happened in the rest of Fargo.

"Now, if we mean what we said when we wanted to keep as many District lines intact as possible, this is our chance to put these 5,000 citizens back in their present Districts — it would be fair, and it makes sense.

"I would hope this Body would see the fairness of this amendment and vote "Yes" for fairness sake."

and vote "Yes" for fairness sake."

Rep. Berg: "I was wondering why, when the reapportionment committee, they can take a 10% or less deviation figure, you know, as far as district boundaries, and accept a 10% figure there, and then, as far as Senators running in a district, you got a 2000 person change in a district, which comes up with a percentage figure of over 16%. Would you explain that some? I understood the courts on that part there, they got a ruling at the 10% figure applied there also."

Rep. Kretschmar: "Mr. Speaker and Rep. Berg. The committee, early in its deliberations in June, decided that it wanted to keep the population variance among the districts at a 10% or less figure. There are federal court cases which have upheld legislative plans that have been within that area. There are court cases which have upheld legislative plans which exceeded 10%. The thread of the cases seems to be that if a legislative plan that stays within 10% variation is

challenged in court, the burden of proof to attack the plan is upon those trying to attack it. If the variation gets over 10%, up to in the 15% range, then that burden seems to shift on the proponents of the plan. We as a legislature, have to set forth and prove that the plan falls within the constitutional guidelines. The basic constitutional guideline that we were following was the one-man one-vote rule. We were trying to keep the population variance among the districts at 10% or less. The plan with, these amendments, that is before the assembly right now is within those variations. It comes out, I think, 9.93 or 9.94 on the population variance.

"The increase, that's one question, and the courts have given legislative bodies more leeway in devising plans than they have allowed themselves. The courts, at least the federal court here in North Dakota, was more strict on itself when it did the legislative reapportionment plan than the courts across the country have been in looking at and either approving or disapproving legislatively created plans. So we felt that we would be within constitutional guidelines, and, I believe we are, by staying within that 10%.

"The other matter, the figure on Senators who would be required to run, is, I believe, similar but very much a different question. We could have decided in the committee and we could, I think, decide as a legislature, to require all Senators to run in 1982 and then they could flip coins to see who had four year or two year terms. The committee determined that it was historically the tradition in North Dakota that the Senate was a continuing body and elected about one-half of its membership at each general election every two years. We thought that that tradition should be continued and that the Senate should remain, if at all possible, a continuing body and those Senators, or so many of them as could be determined, would serve out the four year terms to which they were elected in 1980. They would then come up for reelection in 1984. Under our present system, those Senators are presently in the even numbered districts. When the court ordered a plan for reapportionment in 1975 or 1976 - the last one, or the plan we have right now - it did mandate that if a Senator's district population changed up or down by 10%, that that Senator would have to run; and it named the districts in the 1976 election where Senators would have to run. There were five or six at that time, I believe. Here again, the Committee determined that the Legislature would have more leeway in making a determination than the courts would put on themselves, if they had to make the determination and not just review a plan. The figure finally decided upon was a raw number of 2,000 increase. That was very near the 15% that several of the House members on the committee wanted. It was far below the 25% that was originally in the interim committee bill that was approved by the Legislative Council and introduced into the Legislature. I think we are well within the guidelines with our 2,000 people, even though that percent is a higher number than we use on population deviation. I think 15% is certainly a reasonable figure and keeps a measure of continuity in the Senate, which I think also is important, and that basically is why the committee did that.'

Rep. E. Pomeroy: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly: Before voting on this provision, I would like to call the members' attention to an alternative on the population figures when a Senator would have to run. The minority report filed contains a compromise position that the minority party favors, and that is that a Senator

would have to run upon having a population increase of 1500 voters rather than 2,000. I would urge that the majority amendments are rejected because, upon their approval, that will render that portion of the minority report moot and this assembly will not be given the

opportunity to vote on the 1500 figure.

Therefore, in order to approve the 1500 figure, you will have to reject the majority report until the minority report can be adopted in that respect. Having explained where we are procedurally, I would just like to say a word in favor of the 1500 figure. While Rep. Kretschmar has explained that historically only half the Senate runs, the more important consideration is that historically people vote for the Senators that represent them. Here, we're talking about having 1999 people that can conceivably be represented by an individual that they have never had the opportunity to vote for. This is not consistent with the system free elections and I don't think it's a principle that we should endorse this afternoon.

"The District Court in 1975 said 10%. The 1500 vote figure is higher than 10%, but we've struck that to try and be reasonable. I would therefore urge this Assembly, at this time, to reject the majority amendments so that we will have the opportunity to approve the 1500 vote figure that will force an incumbent senator to run for reelection again rather than the 2,000 vote figure which I assert is impermissibly high. Thank you."

Rep. Backes: "Mr. Speaker and House Members: I request that my statement be recorded in the House Journal. As Minority Leader, I would like a recorded vote on the percentage of population change needed for re-election purposes, as defined in the Minority Report.

"Since the rules of the House now prevent our obtaining such a vote, I have chosen to use the House Journal to accomplish the same end.

"The Minority Report to House Bill No. 1669 has virtually the entire support of the Democratic-NPL Minority in this Assembly. Our reason is quite simple. In devising the last reapportionment plan (the one we are now operating under), the Courts ordered that a Senator in a given District must run for election if there was over a ten percent shift in

population.
"To operate in a different way now in order to protect incumbents, we feel, can only lead to a Court challenge. Therefore, as the Minority party, we want to go on record as opposing the larger number of percentage in favor of the smaller number of percentage of change

needed to demand Senators to run again."

Rep. Strinden: "Mr. Speaker: The proposal offered by the Minority, which was defeated, at a 12.2 percent population allowable — that is over 10 percent. If their concern is the court declaration on 10 percent or less, they have undermined their own arguments."

Rep. Backes: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly: I was tempted to rise a little earlier when Rep. Kretschmar made the pitch for the Majority Report and the bill and to say that we are operating under a double standard in these two areas — population deviation and population percentage needed on reelection. Rep. Kretschmar argued the case that we had to stay within a 10 percent deviation because the courts would really go after us if we got more than that; and I have argued it in front of the committee, I argued it on the floor earlier today, that it's been proven in court that we can go as high as 16 percent, a little better than 16 percent. In West Virginia, for the very argument that I have been using, they did recognize county lines, they

did recognize city urban problems. That's why they allowed the 16 percent. The same courts have thrown out plans with a 5 percent deviation, because of denial of rights to minority groups. Now that isn't the problem in this reapportionment plan, and I can say that's probably the only good thing about it is that. At least I don't think it denies any minority, except the Democrats. But, if we're so hung up on the 10 percent deviation that we're going to tear up county lines, that we're going to mix urban and rural populations, and all the other arguments we've heard, then why don't we go to the 16 percent or the 15 percent and take that chance, because I think it is defendable in court. The one thing that isn't defendable in court is the 20 percent deviation we're going to give on this Senator deal, simply because the plan we're under has set 10 percent and Rep. Strinden is dead right. The Minority plan allowed about 12 percent. The reason for that was to try to get enough votes out of the committee to at least get closer to the 10 percent than we are. We still didn't get the votes out of committee in the rush we're in this House. I told my committee members not to try to hold the committee up. I don't want to be an obstructionist — not to go back and look for another amendment, make the committee wait, bring the new amendment in and vote on it again. That's how we ended up with 12 percent? We knew we were going to lose anyway. What's the difference? But we're running a double standard here. In one case we say we can't go over a certain deviation; in the other case we go ahead over it; and the court rulings are just the opposite. This plan's in trouble because we're not consistent; and the conistency on these two points alone are going to bring a court challenge to this plan."

Rep. Strinden: "It is a short session and everyone would be disappointed if we didn't have a little bit of fire, wouldn't they? What we wanted to do, and I only pointed it out, Rep. Backes, that if you were just building the case for the court knowing you were going to lose anyway, why did you pick 12.2? Why didn't you come at 8.6, 4, 5, 3

or something like that and be below 10 percent?"

Rep. Backes: "Rep. Strinden, I'm aware that our remarks are going to be recorded in the Journal and I hope when this gets to the court case the Journal will be used and I think I explained why we weren't below 10 percent."

REQUEST

Rep. Backes requested a recorded roll call vote, which request was granted.

ROLL CALL

The Report of the Minority as ruled reconcilable by the Speaker was declared lost.

MOTIONS

Rep. Strinden moved that the rules be suspended and that House Bill No. 1669 be placed on the eleventh order for second reading and final passage, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Kretschmar moved that the House waive the reading of the title to House Bill No. 1669, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Kretschmar: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly: This is the principal reapportionment bill that was introduced into the House during this reconvened session. I will briefly try to explain the general provisions of the bill. Most of them have been discussed here when we argued the amendments; but Section 1 of the bill contains a provision that would allow county commissioners, who were elected in 1980, to serve out their terms of four years even after county commissioner districts would be reapportioned, if that was done in any particular county. Some counties have their commissioners running at large; in those counties the county commissioners could serve out their four-year terms. Some county commissioners have new districts and elect in districts and there they could serve out their term unless there were two incumbents in the same district or no incumbent in a district, and then there would have to be an election. Basically, that kind of follows on the issue of having Senators hold over for their two-year terms, too, and was placed in the bill because of an earlier Attorney General's opinion requiring all county commissioners who were, even those elected in 1980, to run in 1982.

"The next section of the bill, Section 2, deals with political party reorganization after reapportionment. And that would require the establishment of new precincts where it is necessary and the selection of new precinct committeemen in those precincts and then the reorganization of district organizations where that will be required because of changes in districts. It specifically provides that the state party organizations do not have to reorganize and those organizations will stay in place during the balance of the 1982 campaign and then get back on their regular sequence. Section 3 of the bill makes some changes in the legislative statute that we have, and changes a present statute that we have that where the Senate should be between 48 and 52 members and the House double that. We've changed the figures from 47 to 53 and then changed the requirements of allowing a double district, or a double Senate district in those areas where there is a federal facility that has over two-thirds of the population of a single district, if it were a single district. Those are just minor changes to comply what we — the present statute to get them in compliance with

what we have done in the reapportionmnt bill.

"Section 5 of the bill is the establishment of new legislative districts in North Dakota. The committee approved the establishment of 53, well maybe not 53, 53 Senate seats in fifty-one legislative districts. We continue District 40-50 in the Minot area as a two-Senator district and we have established District 17-18 in the Grand Forks area as a two-Senator district. The committee decided on 53 Senate seats because that would allow the districts to stay within a 10 percent population variance. The committee operated on the first rule that the committee was operating under or the first guideline was that we would not cross the Missouri River with a district. Historically, that's never been done in North Dakota and the LPNA Committee last session gave that to the Interim Committee as a guideline and we followed it. By using that criteria the population variances would come out the best if we had a 47 member Senate or a 53 member Senate. Professor Hickok, the consultant that was from the University that aided us in the reapportionment matter, had provided us information on 46, I think, through 54 Senate districts. And the committee early on chose to go along and ask him to prepare plans that had 53 Senate districts. That increase figures out to be between 36 and 37 thousand people, if your average district is about twelve and one-half thousand; and that 36 and 37 thousand is what North Dakota's population increased between 1970 and 1980. Another factor that led us to choose 53 districts was that the population increase could be - was just confined to three areas of the state, namely Fargo increased by one district, Bismarck area increased by a district, and the West River area increased by a district; so the committee went head and drew the plans along those

"The committee also has a guideline to try to maintain current legislative districts, try to maintain county and political subdivision lines as much as possible. The committee tried to do that. In some areas of the state we perhaps were not as successful as we should have been.

"But overall, I think we have a good legislative district set up under this bill. I think, under the plan that we're operating right now, the plan that was devised by the Federal Court in 1976, divides six North Dakota counties that wouldn't have to be divided because they're too small to be one district. The present plan divides only five of those counties. We have to divide some of them. Of course, we had to divide counties like Burleigh and Cass, which were too large to be one legislative district, and so those counties are divided. Basically, I believe, in my judgment, this plan will maintain and will be upheld by a court for the — on the one man, one vote rule. I think we are well within the population variance, which is, I think, 9.93. And that is what the courts have held up in various cases in other areas of the country that are constitutionally sound. The courts have allowed even higher variations in some states, but we wanted to maintain that 10 percent variation, so that we would be sure that our plan would be constitutionally sound.

"Section 6 of the bill provides for the staggering of Senator's terms and provides for those Senators which must run in 1982, those who were elected in 1980 for four-year terms. I think in some states, and we had this information before the committee, I believe it's the State of Iowa, when they did their reapportionment they just decreed that any Senator who was elected to a four year term would serve out his term

no matter what change in his district, so long as there wasn't another incumbent Senator in his district; and that was one option that the committee did consider. The committee did not finally adopt that, they adopted the 2,000 population increase that we have in the amendments and now have in the bill. Those Senators from even numbered districts who are elected in 1980, and who are up for election in 1982, under the bill will be elected for two-year terms and then they'll get back on the four-year sequence. We also provided for the other double district that we established in Grand Forks. In that district, next year they'll elect two Senators, one for a two-year term and one for a four-year term and then they will elect a Senator each election after that, either their odd numbered or even numbered one in that district.

"The committee also provided a section in the bill on legislative intent, so that there would be some indication of what guidelines the committee followed and what we thought was important in establishing the legislative guidelines. Finally, we repealed some of the legislative guidelines for reapportionment that are in the statutes that were put in, I think, in 1977. That's Section 8 of the bill. There is an emergency clause on the bill, and if it receives the 67 votes from this House and a two-thirds vote in the Senate, it would become law upon the Governor's signature and be in place for the 1982 election.

"That basically, Mr. Speaker, is an overview of the bill. I'd be happy to answer any questions if any come along."

Rep. Gerl: "If there is going to be one additional seat in Fargo, one additional seat in Bismarck, and one additional seat in the West River District, why then on District 17 and 18 are you combining them? What was the justification behind that?"

Rep. Kretschmar: "We combined both of those Districts because that area also includes a Federal facility of almost a district-wide population. I think about 9-10,000 people, which is the Grand Forks Air Force Base. In fact, that part of the state in the Federal Court decision in 1976 was put into two districts, District 17 and 18. The Committee had figures on the district that had the Air Base in it, where the vote totals were relatively small compared to other Legislative Districts around the state. And the Committee felt that even though it had a large population, there was not enough political activity for either party to work out well as a district. The experiment had been tried for two or three elections and the Committee felt that it wasn't working the way it was supposed to.

"We thought that District 40-50 in Minot was a much better system in the Air Base situation, so we voted to place both of the Air Bases under the same basis. They are almost near in population; they are both near major metropolitan areas in the state, and we thought they should both be treated similarly under the bill."

Rep. Metz: "Mr. Speaker and Members of this Assembly: I will support House Bill No. 1669 rather reluctantly. I will support the bill because there seems to be no better alternatives without major district changes. I also realize that one man, one vote, is a Federal mandate. I will have to, however, make the Assembly aware of several problems in my District 28. These problems were probably created in the last reapportionment or even before that.

"First of all, the area is very irregular, and I find that the historic background of the people and geography is very different from east to west and north to south. And, up until yesterday, included parts of four

counties. The district still includes parts of three counties. No other district has that great a variance.

"Logan County, in my district, a closely knit county is being torn apart and divided. The county has, over the last few years, been tossed to-and-fro something like a yo-yo. The people do not like this. Logan County has produced several great statesmen over the years and deserves better treatment. Thank you for listening."
