Rep. Brokaw requested that his remarks be printed in the Journal, which request was granted.

Rep. Brokaw: "In looking over this resolution, I see alot of very good reasons why we should have a resolution. But then, when I get down to

where the guts of the resolution is, it's about the most gutless piece of gutless legislation that I've seen. It doesn't get at the problem. It doesn't get to the holding company that Burlington has formed, and indicated that they are going to form in May. It doesn't get to the forfeiture of the land, the minerals they got when they first built these roads, and I think we've got to get at that, and I think we've got to put some pressure on them.

"And as I look at all the reason, the whereas's and that, I see many reasons for the bills that I had asked to be introduced for this session. I really didn't care whether they had my name on them or not, but I think you missed a wonderful opportunity to piggyback them in on Rep. Kingsbury's bill and Senator Erickson's bill. I think they could have been put in there. And I'd just like to mention what they did: Number 1, it would strengthen the regional authority. It would give the state a little more time to pick and choose, and it would give us up to

ten years to make up our minds which railroads we wanted.

"Then, another bill patterned somewhat after the Iowa Bill would put a 4 cents surtax charge on all fuels used by the railroads in North Dakota. It would have kicked in at 1 percent anytime they identified 1 percent of their branchlines for abandonment. It would have become permanent if they abandoned 5 percent or more. And it is interesting to note that Iowa did this during a special session for just apportionment. And they put on a 3 percent tax now that will go in the very near future to 8 cents, and that would be used for their rehabilitation of the railroads. In this bill that would have gone to fund the Railroad Authority Bill. In North Dakota it would have raised something like two million dollars at a very conservative figure.

"In Iowa, their bill, which is just a flat bill on everything doesn't make any difference either whether they're abandoning or not, it will

bring in between three and eight million dollars.

"The bill that I think we really needed was the one that would have opened up the records of the railroad to the state on any abandonment and would have required the state to look at the records on any abandonment.

"Two other bills would have been for the reversion of any land that was granted by the state or political subdivision. And the other would have simply allowed the coop to own or operate railroads. I'm disturbed that Governor Olson said that this was not a state issue and I would have liked to see him come down here and ask for this kind of legislation. We took care of a couple of other taxation problems that affected a few — not a great deal of people — but we still took care of them. We had the taxation problem on some of our high production crops, and we took care of the platted land. So I think we should have taken care of something here that would have affected a lot of the people in North Dakota.

"And I guess, finally, I would have to congratulate Rep. Strinden for keeping my bills from coming out of the Delayed Bills Committee. And I guess I would also have to congratulate you, Rep. Strinden. I think that you have earned the stripes and you can be a full fledged water have for the polloged company page."
