ELECTION OF PRESIDENT PRO TEM

If I hadn't been elected, I'm sure he would have been the best qualified man to serve in my position. I pledge, whenever the occasion arises, to carry out the duties of this office to the best of my ability, hopefully, it will not be too often because our existing President is very capable and I would have a little problem in filling his shoes. But, nonetheless, I'll be available when needed.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

SEN. THANE: Mr. President: I rise on a point of personal privilege and request that my remarks be printed in the journal.

President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, it is important on this particular day that we pause for a few minutes to reflect on an event in history. It has been very easy for some of us to forget this day forty-one years ago when we were propelled into the greatest war this world has ever known. The memory of that fateful morning has been engraved into the minds of us who can remember and it has changed our lives and changed the course of history. We must remember that over forty percent of the nation's people were not yet born on that particular day. They too have been changed and influenced by those events. It helps little, forty-one years later, to mourn the deaths of over three thousand brave men who died during that attack. It is, however, fitting that we pause for a moment to honor them and all those who served and died in that war. We all fervently hope that the world has matured and peace will prevail. With the President's permission, I would ask that all of us rise for a moment of silent prayer in memory of that day.

SEN. LEE ANNOUNCED that the committee appointed to notify the Governor and the House that the Senate is organized and ready to transact business has completed its task and requested that the committee be discharged, which request was granted.

The Committee from the House was received and informed the Senate that the House is organized and ready to transact business.

SEN. NETHING ANNOUNCED that there will be a joint session in the House to hear the remarks of the Governor of the State of North Dakota immediately after adjournment.

SEN. NETHING MOVED that the Senate adjourn until 9:00 a.m., Wednesday, December 8, 1982, which motion prevailed.
