At 9:00 a.m. December 4, 1990, according to the Constitution and Statutes of North Dakota, the members elect of the House of Representatives of the Fifty-second Legislative Assembly assembled in the House Chamber of the State Capitol at Bismarck, North Dakota, and were called to order by the Speaker of the Fifty-first Legislative Assembly, Rep. William Kretschmar.

The prayer was offered by Rev. Dale McClaflin, Pastor, Church of the Nazarene, Bismarck.

ANNOUNCEMENT

SPEAKER KRETSCHMAR ANNOUNCED that the House would be on the Fourth order of business:

COMMUNICATION FROM SECRETARY OF STATE JIM KUSLER December 4, 1990

North Dakota Century Code section 54-03-03 instructs the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives to "...make a correct roll of the members of their houses respectively to whom certificates of election have been issued by the proper officers." The Office of Secretary of State has issued Certificates of Election to the names appearing on the attached list with the Great Seal affixed.

On November 21, 1990, and again on December 3, 1990, the State Canvassing Board met in the Office of Secretary of State and canvassed the certified abstracts of Returns from North Dakota's fifty-three counties. The attached certified list is a true and correct list of the candidates who received the highest number of votes for the legislative offices voted upon at the November General Election. To: William E. Kretschmar, Speaker of the House of Representatives

- Merton R. Peterson and Lawrence D. Marsden, being first duly sworn on their oath, depose and state they have read the following petition, know the contents thereof and the same is true based on their own knowledge, information or belief.
- 1. A mailing including an absentee ballot application; campagin (sic) literature for Kathi Gilmore, Brian Skar, Byron Dorgan, S.F. "Buckshot" Hoffner and Floyd Stromme; a letter requesting them to vote; and a return envelope addressed to the County Auditor at Bottineau, ND. In addition, the outside envelope had the return address as "Co. Auditor, Botno Co. (sic) Courthouse, Botno, (sic) ND 58318". (Copies of the items are attached including the outside envelope with the post office cancellation stamp thereon.)
- 2. When a letter was returned to the Bottineau County Auditor for insufficient address, the County Auditor turned it over to the Bottineau County States Attorney on or about November 2, 1990. The States Attorney made a request of the Attorney General's office for an investigation into the use of the County Auditor's office as a return address with the above material enclosed.
- 3. The North Dakota Crime Bureau Investigator was in Bottineau on or about November 23, 1990 taking affidavits from several individuals concerning the mailing of the campaign material using the County Auditor's return address on the outside envelope.
- 4. The investigation has been ongoing and on December 3, 1990, the Bottineau County States Attorney made a request of the North Dakota Attorney General to appoint a special prosecutor to persue (sic) the case as the evidence is presented.
- 5. We believe the Crime Bureau report will indicate that Kathi Gilmore had direct association with this mailing and if so, violated North Dakota law.

In view of the above information and the continuing investigation, we ask the House of Representatives to consider provisionly (sic) seating Kathi Gilmore at this time pending the outcome of the Crime Bureau investigation.

RONALD E. GUNSCH, being first duly sworn on his oath, deposes and states that he has read the following Petition, knows the contents thereof and the same is true based on his own knowledge, information or belief.

RONALD E. GUNSCH challenges the qualifications of John J. Mahoney to serve in the House of Representatives, Legislative Assembly, State of North Dakota for the following reasons:

John J. Mahoney is an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of North Dakota and residing in Center, Oliver County, North Dakota. That in the November general election he ran for the office of Oliver County States Attorney, while at the same time running for the House of Representatives, Legislative Assembly, State of North Dakota, District 33, which encompasses the counties of Mercer and Oliver. That this was done in violation of Section 16.1-12-03 NDCC, as amended, and the House of Representatives has exclusive jurisdiction under Article IV, Section 12 of the North Dakota Constitution and Section 54-03-07 of the North Dakota Century Code to judge the qualification of its members. See also State ex rel. Olson v. Bakken (1983), 329 NW 2d 575; and State ex rel. v. Meiers (ND 1987), 403 NW 2d 392; State ex rel. Olson v. Thempson (ND 1976) 248 NW 2d 347; State ex rel. Andrews v. Quam (ND 1942) 7 NW 2d 738; State ex rel. Schmeding v District Court of Sixth Judicial District (ND 1937) 271 NW 137.

That the Legislative Assembly, State of North Dakota, House of Representatives should refuse to seat John J. Mahoney, as he has failed to comply with the North Dakota Century Code and is therefore not qualified to serve in the House of Representatives.

Ronald E. Gunsch further petitions and requests that he be seated as the candidate qualified from District 33 because whereas John J. Mahoney was not qualified, the effect is the same as if he had not been nominated or his

name appearing on the ballot and that therefore Ronald E. Gunsch received the highest number of votes for a qualified candidate and should be seated.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

REP. KLOUBEC: Mr. Speaker: I rise on a point of personal privilege and request that my remarks be printed in the Journal.

I would like to read into the House Journal from Section 560 of Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure. Section 560 deals with the qualifications of members. Paragraph 10 is the significant portion of Section 560, and I will read it to the House.

10. The authority of a house of a legislature to pass upon its membership is a continuing power and the question of the election and qualification of members is never finally decided, in the sense that a decision is conclusive upon the house, until final adjournment. A member at any time may be seated or unseated upon the same facts.

Mr. Speaker, I read that communication into the Journal because of our concerns regarding the qualifications of some of the members to be seated in the House. We hope that any legal processes that may take place will do so speedily.

SPEAKER KRETSCHMAR APPOINTED Reps. Brown and Tollefson to such committee and Speaker R. Anderson was then escorted to the rostrum.

OATH OF OFFICE

SPEAKER KRETSCHMAR ADMINISTERED the Oath of Office to Speaker-Elect R. Anderson.

REMARKS OF SPEAKER RONALD A. ANDERSON

This is a special moment for me. I think it is a dream - probably that everyone here has - to be Speaker of the House of Representatives in the great state of North Dakota. I am in awe and I am humbled and I thank you from the bottom of my heart for this honor. I hope to follow in the footsteps of the speakers of the past, some of them are in the chamber now: Representative Kretschmar, the outgoing Speaker; Representative Kloubec; Representative Roy Hausauer, "Coach"; and Representative Kelly, who is now over in the Senate. I hope, I know that at times, especially to begin with, that I am going to err, but I hope you will bear with me, and I hope when I do err that it is because I am trying to be too fair because, as those of you who have worked with me in the past know, I want to be fair to everybody here. I thank you for this opportunity.

As my first duty as Speaker, I would like to present the gavel that Representative Kretschmar used to hammer us down in the last session. The gavel reads: William E. Kretschmar, Speaker of the House, North Dakota House

of Representatives, Fifty-first Assembly 1989-90. To a very special guy, I think a great Speaker, and to a good friend, Representative Kretschmar.

PRESENTATION OF THE GAVEL

SPEAKER R. ANDERSON PRESENTED former Speaker Kretschmar with the gavel that he used during the Fifty-first Legislative Assembly.

REMARKS OF REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAM E. KRETSCHMAR

Mr. Speaker, members of the Fifty-first Legislative Assembly, and members of the Fifty-second Legislative Assembly: It was a very high honor for me to serve you as your speaker during the Fifty-first Legislative Session. I enjoyed doing it very much. It was fun work and I know we have a good successor.

There is much work to be done by the Fifty-second Legislative Assembly. I believe that our principal task will be to present a balanced budget to the people of the state of North Dakota for the ensuing two years. I also believe that we have to take action to reduce the size of this assembly. Our population has decreased in the last 10 years. In my judgment, we should vote to decrease the size of the legislative assembly. We will also have to wrestle with the always difficult problem of reapportioning the legislative districts. With shifts in our population, with reduction in our economy, and our overall population, that task will not be easy.

In other states, they do it in different ways. Sometimes there are nonlegislative commissions doing it. I firmly believe that that job is a task of the legislative assembly. We are the so-called "board of directors of the state government," and we have that responsibility, and we should meet it. If we do not meet it, we have failed in our duty, and we may well have the courts of the United States doing it for us.

Another matter that is going to come up this session, that I think should be looked at very seriously, is a resolution that would enable a study during the next interim to go to an annual session system. We can do that under our Constitution. We are allowed to meet for 80 legislative days during a biennium, and I believe it is time to seriously look at dividing those days up between both years of the biennium. Things happen so fast in this latter part of the twentieth century that the "board of directors," to meet only once every twenty-four months, I believe, is not often enough. I firmly think that if annual sessions were enacted and used, they would be half as long as our present session. I know that you veterans know, and you new members will find out after this session, that being here three and one-half to four months is simply too long.

One other thing I think of importance, that this legislative assembly should pass, is enabling legislation to allow members of the legislative assembly to become members of the Public Employees Retirement System, on a voluntary basis.

I think that there will be many, many other tasks that will be before us. I am sure that there will be nearly as many bills as in previous sessions, and clearly as much, if not more, work. I commend the House of Representatives for electing Representative Anderson to succeed me as Speaker. There is no question in my own mind that he will do a very, very fine job for us and, Mr. Speaker, I will kind of be watching you, too.

You know, this election of Representative Anderson is putting Keene, North Dakota, on the map. Just as maybe two years ago, my election put Venturia, North Dakota, on the map. But, I would say to you that I think Venturia is going to stay on the map because this would be the first legislative assembly in North Dakota, to my knowledge, were there will be two people from Venturia, North Dakota. Representative Ritter, from the Forty-seventh District, is a native son from Venturia and is a good friend of mine. I grew up with him, played baseball with him, went to school with him, and I certainly welcome him to the House of Representatives.

With that, Mr. Speaker, I again thank the members of the assembly very much for allowing me to serve as your speaker for two years. I enjoyed it very much to start, and I think I will enjoy it very much to complete my term. Thank you very much.

HOUSE SEATING SENIORITY TABLE AS SPECIFIED IN HOUSE RULE 350 (1991 Session not included)
