POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

REP. OBAN: Mr. Speaker: I rise on a point of personal privilege and request that my remarks be printed in the Journal, which request was granted.

Twenty-five years ago as a college freshman at the University of North Dakota it was inconceivable to me as I watched the nightly news reports on Vietnam that in less than five years I would be serving in Vietnam. I also could not have imagined twenty-five years ago that today I would be sharing my concerns about another possible war thousands of miles away, not only as a North Dakota citizen and as a North Dakota State Representative, but, more importantly, as a father. I have a son who will turn 18 this month.

We do not celebrate Saddam Hussein's invasion of Kuwait. On the contrary, we all condemn his barbarous act! All of us have friends, neighbors, relatives, and coworkers in the Persian Gulf. They have their duty to perform! We understand that, and we support them during this difficult time!

But, we at home also have our duty. Now is not the time to be silent! We must speak out, we must ask questions now before American blood is shed, not after! We must not allow our soldiers to be committed to war without the full support of the American government and the American people behind them. The American people must understand fully our goal, the potential cost, and then decide for themselves if the goal is worth the price! This public discussion, I do not believe, has occurred to the extent it should on an issue as momentous as this one.

It seems we are on the verge of war. I am frightened by that prospect. I see stories about body bags, germ warfare, biological warfare, and nuclear war. What will Israel do? Will the entire Middle Fast erunt?

However, despite my fears, I insist on being optimistic. I do not believe that peace is lost. At this moment on the floor of our national Congress, our national leaders are going through a wrenching debate. They have at least two resolutions to consider. One would authorize the use of swift and immmediate force in support of the United Nations resolution after January 15, in effect giving the President nearly unlimited power to take this country to war. Members of the Assembly, this is similar to another resolution passed in 1964 – the Gulf of Tonkin resolution requested by a President of my party. Fortunately, there is another alternative – one urging support for the sanctions – for patience – something President Bush said would be required when he announced the sanctions last August.

Also, the Secretary-General of the United Nations is making another effort to find a peaceful solution and France is committed to using their good offices to achieve peace.

All of us have the opportunity to assist our nationally elected officials on this issue of war and peace. We must flood them with calls and letters giving them our opinions, guidance, and encouragement before American blood - North Dakotan's blood - is shed in the desert.

My message for our President and our Congress is to be patient, to allow the sanctions to work and to allow others pursuing peace more time. Please do not rush to war! War means pain and tears!

This Assembly has important business to conduct. The gravity of this situation is so overwhelming it is difficult for me and I suspect for many of you to fully appreciate the task before us in light of the possible conflagration that faces the world.

I know that as we continue our work we will pause and pray for the safety and swift return of our men and women in the $\mbox{Armed Forces}$.

Mr. Speaker and members of the Assembly, today I urge you with all the sincerity I can to contact our Congressional delegation and other Congressmen and women to urge them to support sanctions. The debate is not over allowing Iraq to stay in Kuwait, it is over how best to remove him and at what price. This is not a Republican issue or a Democratic issue – it is an American issue

I urge all of you who will be in Bismarck to attend a "Vigil for Peace", tomorrow, Saturday, January 12, from 11:40 to 12:20 at the Post Office, 3rd and Rosser. Also, Sunday at $6:00~\rm p.m.$ at the Evangel Temple, 3225 State Street, there will be a "Community Call to Prayer" in support for members of our community who are in the Gulf.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me this opportunity to express my thoughts before the Assembly. This issue has been heavy on my mind and in my heart. Despite my fears, I feel better today!
