REMARKS OF THE HONORABLE BYRON DORGAN. UNITED STATES SENATOR

Governor and Senators: It is nice to see all of you here today and thank you for the invitation to come and say a few words during your legislative session. I noted when I came in the back of the room that it has been so many years since I served in this building as Tax Commissioner and would come down and watch the activities from beyond the railing and see what was going to be done to me, and when and by whom. I noted when I came in the back of the room that some of the same people are here. Senator Lips is back there and I noted he is still resisting the use of a computer. So, there are still some things in life that remain unchanged. It is nice to see all of you here.

The jobs that we have in the Senate of the U.S. Congress or the Senate of the State Legislature are remarkably similar and we are confronted with pretty much the same issues. In fact, I am guessing that people frequently confuse what we do. You undoubtedly get letters complaining about things that we do, and I certainly get letters complaining about things that you do from time to time. A fourth grade class from Abercrombie, North Dakota, wrote to me some while ago at the request of their teacher for a class project, and one of the young fourth graders said "My teacher tells me that you represent us in the U.S. Senate." And then he said, "Boy, is that a scary thought!" I thought, there are some state senators that may feel that way as well.

It is kind of a scary thought to try to grapple with these issues that you grapple with here in the state senate and we grapple with, because the issues are not simple and they are not issues that we are going to solve in a minute, or a month, or even a year. This country is now facing some of the most difficult, complex, and wrenching issues, in a whole range of areas, that we have ever faced. We were just talking about Aids - that is one. Trade, the economy, and the bombing of the World Trade Center, which translates into terrorism. Someone shows up in Texas claiming to be Jesus and holding people hostage, which translates into a whole range of cult activities. There is no end of challenges that we have facing us. It is not a set of things for which public policy is always going to be an answer. We are told that things are just fine if we just let them be. But then we wake up the next morning and think that the Soviet Union is gone and that there is Russia and Yeltsin, and then on Monday morning we wake up and understand that Yeltsin is now under investigation for impeachment and the world may change again in a dramatic way. And south of Linton or west of Regent the lives of people who farm, who work on Main Street, and who go to school will be affected by what happens to Boris Yeltsin in Russia.

It is a small world and the connection is pretty direct. We are told by those who are statistical gatekeepers that the economic indicators say that things are actually moving now - 4.8 percent real economic growth in the fourth quarter of last year. They did not say that one-half percent of that was a hurricane. One-half percent of economic growth was a hurricane because the way economists measure economic growth, they measure the repair from the hurricane, but not the damage created by it. So, if we have a couple more hurricanes, we will get this place revved up. But economic indicators do not indicate anything, really. If there is a car accident on the "U" in front of this capitol in a few minutes, it will be economic growth by some economist in a bunker that is putting the numbers together because it will translate into a fender repair, a doctor bill and a doctor service, and certainly into a lawyer who is going to sue. And so, that is all part of the economic indicators. But, you know what it indicates. You go back home and you listen to what people say and the indicators are that people think that

things are off base and they want it changed from health care to the economy and more.

Out of four million kids born in this country this year, a million kids will be born without a father, 800,000 of whom will never learn the identity of their father during their lifetime. Think of that. 2.7 million kids were actual reported cases of child abuse just reported last year - 2.7 million kids. We have 10 million people out of work, 25 million people on food stamps, and 35 million people with no health insurance. Those are the indicators that you know about, you hear about on your Main Streets. I hear about them every day and it indicates that the country is not doing very well. It does not mean we cannot do well. There is not anyone better poised in the world to compete with us or to do better than we are if we simply have our policies straight.

President Clinton has proposed a plan that has three parts. Spending cuts? Everbody says let us cut spending except this little area that affects me. The fact is, you and I know in the legislative activity spending cuts hurt. But we are going to have spending cuts. Tax increases? Everybody says "No tax increases." Heck, I do not like taxes at all." They say "Let us have zero taxes." Tax increases, including a tax on millionaire income, is going to get Senator Jerome Kelsh with that. A millionaire surtax they say. Tax the upper income people. Well, we are going to have a tax increase this year. It is going to pass. It also includes a BTU tax which is pretty tough for us. Some of us are concerned about that and would like to modify or adjust it. But we are going to have spending cuts and we are going to have some tax increases, and I think it is going to pass.

Third, there are some incentives. Some incentive spending. Some of you would scoff and say "Spending is spending, it is bologna incentives." It is not bologna. There is a difference. If you smoke two packs a day and spend \$2,000 a year on cigarettes, is that not different spending \$2,000 a year on cigarettes then taking the \$2,000 and giving it to your kid to get some Tech training. Of course it is different. One was an investment and one was simply consumption, and not very good consumption at that. There is a difference between just plain old flat spending in your family and your government, and also investment in a family, business, or government. So what the President has said is let us do three things. Let us cut spending, let us increase taxes, and let us make some investments for the future. Those are hard choices, but I think when all is said and done and the smoke clears and the dust settles, I think that plan is going to pass. I think and hope and pray it is going to work.

One of the three major battles that we are involved with, and I think essentially three battles that you are probably involved with in similar ways, is the economy. How do we put this plan together constructively so that it does work, so that we have not just a recovery but also jobs. The Wall Street Journal says in its column "We have robust economic recovery, that is what the indicators say. Of course, we are not producing the number of new jobs we would like." Well, you tell me Mr. and Mrs. Wall Street Journal what is an "economic recovery" if not accompanied by new jobs. A meal without food? That is not an economic recovery. We need an economic recovery that is accompanied by real jobs that are decent and good jobs, and it is not going to come from government - it is going to come from the private sector. The combination of public policies that allow the private sector to create those jobs represent the key to future economic opportunity. We must deal with this in a comprehensive way and we cannot avoid it any longer. We can avoid duplication in government and cut real spending. We do not need four Air Forces, we do not need five agencies to collect intelligence, and the list of duplication goes on. You are fighting the same battle here, trying to cut out waste and it is tough to do, but we do not have any choice and the American people are telling us we must.

The second big battle is trade, and it is going to affect everyone of us and everyone of our constituents. When durum floods down here from Canada and is

unfairly subsidized, our durum growers cannot compete with it. That is just the tip of the iceberg. If it is not fair trade, we ought not be involved. We ought to shut our borders to things that are dumped in here in an unfair way. We ought to open our borders and say to anybody in the world "You send anything you want to this country because we force the American producers to have to compete as long as the competition is fair. If it is unfair, stay out. If it is fair, you are welcome to come and compete, provided that you open your markets to our country's goods made by American producers, just as we open our markets to you." Whether it is NAFTA, which is an enormously complicated and very controversial set of negotiations with Mexico which I will not support, I will vote against, work against, and fight against the current NAFTA trade proposal, whether it is the Canadian agreement which is fundamentally flawed and sold out agricultural economic interests for the interests of some investment bankers and others, or whether it is GATT, which must be done in a way that is sensitive to rural America's needs. Not favoritism just sensitive to rural America's needs, but insisting on fair trade. That is essential if we are going to lay a groundwork for good jobs in the future. Should we connect Canada, the United States, and Mexico in an economic block with which to compete against Europe and the Pacific rim? Of course we should. Absolutely! Should we go with a negotiated treaty with Mexico that sets up competition between us and Mexico for jobs? Of course not. That is dumb. We should not, cannot, and will not have to compete against dollar an hour labor with no tariffs. It makes no sense at all.

The third area is health, and you are all involved in the enormous amount of work on health care. I understand the sensitivity of it. We are going to have to deal with health care costs, and if we fail to deal with costs we will not solve the federal deficit problem and we will not actually reform health care either. Skyrocketing health care costs are at the root of our problem. You and I know talking about provider taxes, and Lord knows it is not my province to come and give you advice on anything, you are kind enough to not give us your two cents worth everytime we make a mistake, and I am not intending to preach to you today about provider taxes, but I do want to tell you this - last year I was very critical, and I am going to continue to be critical of some thirty states who tried to extract federal dollars without doing anything to solve their health care problems simply by a shell game. I think the risk exists that those states who end up with provider taxes - that is a higher state contribution - and then lead into health care reform where we have a health care reform system in which there are standardized benefits under Medicaid rolled into a new health care program, the risk exists that the current level of contribution by a state will be the level at which you enter that system. Those who develop very high provider taxes may well find they outfoxed themselves with respect to future health care reform options, paying permanently higher taxes without compensating additional benefits. do not envy the choices you have in front of you because I know people want benefits and I know you have trouble finding the resources to meet them. We have exactly the same problem at the federal level. But with respect to health care, none of us will ever solve this problem unless we first deal with cost and then deal with coverage. If we do not deal with costs and coverage in an effective way we will still have people tomorrow, next year, and the year after wondering if they can afford to get health care for a five year old kid because they do not have money in the bank. That should not happen in this country.

I know that there is plenty of reason, given all of these challenges and all of these difficulties, for people to wring their hands and wonder if we will ever solve these things. But, I think all of you who run for office understand that if you did not believe and I did not believe tomorrow is going to be better than today, and the future is going to be better than the past, and that we have hope to tackle these and not just hold them off but actually fix them and move into a better and brighter future filled with opportunity - if you did not believe that, you would not be doing this. As Thomas Wolfe says, "I believe there is an almost boundless optimism, an indestructible belief, and a quenchless hope that we can fix things in this country and put America back on track." Thank you very much.

A newly formed district is eligible entitled to receive the a supplemental pupil payment provided for in section 15-27.6-05 of two hundred five dollars for an additional period of two years the first year following the effective date of the reorganization and one hundred five dollars for the second year following the effective date of the reorganization based on the number of full-time equivalent students in average daily membership during the year prior to before the effective date of the reorganization if the newly formed district:
 - a. Encompasses at least seven hundred square miles [181299.168 hectares], enrolls at least six hundred students, and, prior to before the reorganization, consisted of three contiguous school districts, each of which operated grades kindergarten through twelve programs or grades one through twelve programs;
 - b. Prior to <u>Before</u> the reorganization, consisted of at least six contiguous school districts, four of which operated grades kindergarten through twelve programs or grades one through twelve programs; or
 - c. Either enrolls a minimum of six hundred students or encompasses at least seven hundred square miles [181299.168 hectares], and, prior to before the reorganization, consisted of four or five school districts, each of which operated grades kindergarten through twelve programs or grades one through twelve programs.
- Sections 15-27.3-12 through 15-27.3-15 and 15-27.3-17 through 15-27.3-21 apply to school district reorganizations under this chapter.
- A newly formed school district that was approved to receive a planning grant prior to July 17, 1991, is eligible to receive the additional supplemental pupil payments."
