REP. OBAN: Mr. Speaker: I rise on a point of personal privilege and request that my remarks be printed in the Journal, which request was granted.

STATEMENT BY REPRESENTATIVE BILL OBAN

Mr. Speaker and members of the Assembly, I rise to challenge the two Republican Majority leaders to synchronize the House and Senate Committee hearings and floor actions schedules. The lack of coordination serves none of us or our constituents well.

During the organizational session in December I told the majority leader that I shared his interest in trying a nontraditional schedule. Completing our work more efficiently and making the legislative process more constituent friendly are worthy goals. Representative Kaldor and I make it clear, however, that we did not believe it would work if the House and Senate were on different schedules. We offered out support with the understanding that if it did not work we could return to the traditional schedule quickly - that was 2 months ago!

Representative Dorso and I have visited about this issue many times since the session started. I know that he has attempted to resolve this issue with the Senate Majority leader with no success. I'm puzzled as to why this can't be settled!

As of today, the members of the Dem-NPL Caucus have missed final votes on 19 bills and missed testifying on 23 bills. I suspect that members of the majority caucus have also missed important votes! None of the members of the House and Senate should be forced to choose between floor action and testifying on Senate or House bills that are important to their constituents. And trying to resolve this issue by reopening the Senate hearings on bills a week after they were originally heard is unacceptable.

Mr. Speaker, there are members of the minority caucus, and I suspect members of the majority caucus, who like the current schedule, but not the conflict with the Senate. It is clearly more convenient for us. Whether it has allowed for greater citizen participation is unclear.

It was pointed out to me last week that the new schedule is not student friendly. Students who come to visit the legislature are unable to see House floor action because of our early morning floor sessions. Although committee work is important I think all of us realize that students are more interested in watching us discuss issues on the floor and cast our vote.

Regardless, it is the responsibility of the two Majority leaders to get together and resolve this conflict, now. There should be no reason for further delay - after all, this the 20th legislative day - 1/3 of the way to adjourning sine die. Thank you!

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. Trauma system established - Duties of health council. The health council, in conjunction with the state department of health and consolidated laboratories, may establish and maintain a comprehensive trauma system for the state. The trauma system may include standards for the following components:

- 1. A system plan.
- 2. Prehospital emergency medical services.
- 3. Hospitals, for which the standards must include:
 - a. Standards for designation, redesignation, and dedesignation of trauma centers.
 - b. Standards for evaluation and quality improvement programs for designated trauma centers. The standards must require each trauma center to collect quality improvement data and to provide specified portions to the department for use in state and regional trauma quality improvement programs.
 - c. Qualifications for trauma center personnel.
- 4. A trauma registry. Data in the trauma registry is not subject to subpoena or discovery or introduction into evidence in any civil action. Designated trauma centers must participate in the trauma registry. A hospital not designated as a trauma center must provide to the registry a minimum set of data elements for all trauma patients as determined by the health council.
- 5. A trauma quality improvement program to monitor the performance of the trauma system. The proceedings and records of the program are not subject to subpoena or discovery or introduction into evidence in any civil action arising out of any matter that is the subject of consideration by the program.

SECTION 2. Health council - Trauma committee. The health council may establish a permanent subcommittee known as the state trauma committee.

SECTION 3. Quick response units, rescue squads, and air medical services - Standards and licensing. The health council may adopt rules establishing standards and licensing requirements for quick response units, rescue squads, and air medical services.

SECTION 4. Physician immunity for voluntary medical direction. A physician is immune from liability while providing voluntary medical direction.

SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys from special funds derived from federal funds and from other income, the sum of \$100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state department of health and consolidated laboratories for the purpose of establishing a comprehensive trauma and emergency medical system, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1997."
