A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapter 15.1-09.1 and a new section to chapter 15.1-27 of
the North Dakota Century Code, relating to educational associations governed by joint powers
agreements and the payment of state aid; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-02-08,
15.1-07-23, and 15.1-09-33 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to accounting
procedures and school district business managers; to repeal sections 15.1-07-28, 15.1-07-30,
and 15.1-27-40 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to criteria for and expenditures by
educational associations governed by joint powers agreements; and to provide for a report to

8 the legislative council.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-02-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is
amended and reenacted as follows:

12 **15.1-02-08.** Accounting and reporting system - Uniformity. The superintendent of 13 public instruction shall implement a uniform system for the accounting, budgeting, and reporting 14 of data for all school districts in the state <u>and for all educational associations governed by</u> 15 <u>chapter 15.1-09.1</u>. The superintendent of public instruction shall designate the software 16 standards to be used by <u>the</u> school districts <u>and by the educational associations</u> in their 17 accounting, budgeting, and reporting functions.

18 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is
19 amended and reenacted as follows:

20 15.1-07-23. School district business manager - Bond. A Any person serving as a 21 school district business manager shall furnish to the school board a bond in an amount to be 22 fixed by the school board and equal to at least twenty-five percent of the maximum amount of 23 money subject to the business manager's control at any one time. The bond must be 24 conditioned for the faithful discharge of the business manager's duties, including the Sixtieth Legislative Assembly

1	maintenance of accurate financial records and the safekeeping and deliverance of all school						
2	district property and funds that come into the business manager's control.						
3	SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-09-33 of the North Dakota Century Code is						
4	amended a	nd reenacted as follows:					
5	15.1-09-33. School board - Powers. The board of a school district may:						
6	1.	Establish a system of free public schools for all children of legal school age

13	4.	Acquire real property and construct school buildings and other facilities.					
14	5.	Relocate or discontinue schools and liquidate the assets of the district as required					
15		by law; provided no site may be acquired or building constructed, or no school may					
16		be organized, established, operated, maintained, discontinued, or changed in					
17		location without the approval of the state board of public school education if outside					
18		the boundary of the district.					
19	6.	Purchase, sell, exchange, and improve real property.					
20	7.	Lease real property for a maximum of one year except in the case of a career and					
21		technical education facility constructed in whole or in part with financing acquired					
22		under chapter 40-57, which may be leased for up to twenty years.					
23	8.	Exercise the power of eminent domain to acquire real property for school					
24		purposes.					
25	9.	Purchase, sell, exchange, improve, and lease for up to one year, equipment,					
26		furniture, supplies, and textbooks.					
27	10.	Recruit or contract with others to recruit homes and facilities which provide					
28		boarding care for special education students.					
29	11.	Provide dormitories for the boarding care of special education students.					
30	12.	Insure school district property.					

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1	13.	Independently or jointly with other school districts, purchase telecommunications
2		equipment or lease a telecommunications system or network.

- 3 SECTION 5. A new section to chapter 15.1-27 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 4 created and enacted as follows:
- 5State aid Payable to educational association Obligation of district.61. If a school district is eligible to receive state aid as a result of its participation in an7educational association governed by chapter 15.1-09.1, the superintendent of8public instruction shall forward such aid directly to the educational association on9behalf of the school district. The superintendent of public instruction shall forward10the aid provided for in this subsection at the same time and in the same manner as11that provided for payments under section 15.1-27-01.
- <u>If the superintendent of public instruction determines that a school district failed to</u>
 <u>meet any contractual or statutory obligation imposed as a condition of receiving the</u>
 <u>state aid, the superintendent shall subtract the amount for which the district was</u>
 not eligible from any future distribution of state aid to the district under section
- 16 <u>15.1-27-01.</u>

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SECTION 6. REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL - EDUCATIONAL

18 ASSOCIATIONS GOVERNED BY JOINT POWERS AGREEMENTS. At the conclusion of 19 each school year during the 2007-09 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall 20 compile a report covering the operations of each educational association governed by chapter 21 15.1-09.1. The report must include the administrative functions and student services in which 22 members of each educational association participated and the direct and indirect benefits of 23 that participation. The report must specifically address the impact of educational associations 24 on course offerings, student achievement, professional development opportunities, and the 25 sharing of administrative and instructional personnel. The report also must note other resulting 26 benefits or efficiencies. The superintendent of public instruction shall present the reports to an 27 interim committee designated by the legislative council.

28 SECTION 7. REPEAL. Sections 15.1-07-28, 15.1-07-30, and 15.1-27-40 of the North
29 Dakota Century Code are repealed.
