SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 10-06-13 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

10-06-13. Enforcement.

- 1. The attorney general shall commence an action in the district court of the county in which the substantial portion of farm farmland or ranchland used in violation of this chapter is situated, if the attorney general has reason to believe that any person is violating this chapter. attorney general shall file for record with the register of deeds of each county in which any portion of the land is located a notice of the pendency of the action. If the court finds that the land in question is being held in violation this chapter, or that a corporation is conducting the business of farming or ranching in violation of this chapter, the court shall enter an order so declaring. The attorney general shall file any such order for record with the register of deeds of each county in which any portion of the land is located. Thereafter, the corporation shall, within the time set by the court not to exceed one year from the date of the court's final order, divest itself of any farming or ranching land owned or leased by it in violation of this chapter, and cease all farming and ranching operations. Any corporation that fails to comply with the court's order shall be dissolved by the secretary of state.
- The divestment period is deemed to be a covenant running with the title to the land against any corporate grantee, corporate successor, or corporation assignee of the corporation not authorized to do business under this chapter.
- 3. Any land not divested within the divestment period prescribed shall be sold at public sale in the manner prescribed by law for the foreclosure of real estate mortgage by action. In addition, any prospective or threatened violation may be enjoined by an action brought by the attorney general in the manner provided by law, including enjoining the corporation from completing performance on the remainder of any leasehold which is in violation of this chapter. Any
- 4. Subject to the divestiture requirements of subsections 5, 6, and 7, a domestic or foreign corporation may acquire farm farmland or ranchland as security for indebtedness, by process of law in the collection of debts, or by any procedure for the enforcement of a lien or claim thereon, whether created by mortgage or otherwise. All farm

- 5. Unless retention of the farmland or ranchland is permitted under subsection 6 or 7, all farmland or ranchland acquired as security for indebtedness, in the collection of debts, or by the enforcement of a lien or claim shall be disposed of within three years after acquiring ownership, if the acquisition would otherwise violate this chapter. In the interim such
- 6. The disposition requirement does not apply to a corporation that has acquired title to the land through the process of foreclosure of a mortgage, or a deed from a mortgagor instead of a foreclosure, if, by the expiration of one month after what is or what would have been if the mortgage had been foreclosed the redemption period of the mortgage, that corporation leases to the prior mortgagor from whom it was acquired, with an option to purchase, and if documents evidencing the lease agreement have been filed with the register of deeds of each county in which the land is located. A copy of a notice of lease is sufficient evidence. The exemption in this subsection applies for only five years and then only if the property has been appraised in accordance with subsection 8. The annual lease payments required of the tenant cannot exceed seven percent of the appraised value.
- 7. The disposition requirement does not apply to a corporation that has acquired title to the land through the process of foreclosure of a mortgage, or a deed from the mortgagor instead of foreclosure, if, by the expiration of one month after what is or what would have been if the mortgage had been foreclosed the redemption period of the mortgage, that corporation contracts for the sale of the land to the prior mortgagor from whom it was acquired, and if documents evidencing the purchase agreement have been filed with the register of deeds of each county in which the land is located. A copy of a notice of the contract for deed is sufficient evidence. An exemption under this subsection is valid only if an appraisal has been made in accordance with subsection 8, and if it is valid, the exemption is unlimited in duration. The sale price cannot exceed the price determined by the appraisers.
- 8. If an appraisal is required, the appraisal must be made by three independent appraisers, one selected by the corporation, one selected by the

prior mortgagor, and the third selected by the first two appraisers.

It's my extreme honor and pleasure to present this gift to you, Oscar, with best wishes from all your fellow legislators. You are fine legislator, a true gentleman, and a real friend to all.

- REP. SOLBERG: I thank you all for this gift, whatever it is. I want you to know that I've enjoyed this session, and I've enjoyed my association with every one of you. Thanks a lot.
- REP. OPEDAHL: Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly. First I think I would like to correct Representative Nalewaja that we really aren't bald. We just have high foreheads.

It is indeed an honor and a privilege to have the opportunity to present a small token of our appreciation to the Dean of the North Dakota House of Representatives--Representative Haugland. This fine lady has not only earned the esteem of the citizens of North Dakota, whom she has served so well, but is recognized nationwide for her service and contribution to the human values that have always been dear to her.

Her 24 terms in the House of Representatives is unequaled by a lady legislator in the United States. We congratulate you, Representative Haugland, and thank you for serving as an example of the excellence that you have portrayed in the many years you have served your state so well. Representative Haugland, will you please come forward?

REP. HAUGLAND: Thank you, Representative Hamerlik, presiding Speaker at this time, and fellow Members. It has been a

joy to work and to know each one of you. I am deeply appreciative. Thank you very much.

- REP. ULMER: Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly. I have the honor of presenting Representative Goetz with a present. I would like you to know that I have worked many years with Bill's brothers, and I always considered them to be very good Democrats, and I asked them one day, what the hell happened to Bill. They said he was the black sheep in the family, so would you come forward and get your "black sheep" award?
- REP. GOETZ: Thank you all very much. I appreciated it.
- REP. GATES: Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly. "Hearts and flowers" or "livers and thorns"--which is the correct title of this particular presentation? I guess you'll be the judge. My presentation is to an individual who chose the same career path as I did--teaching. An excellent choice! However, he wandered astray in his choice of political parties.

This individual is completing his fourth term in the House and decided it is time to start his climb to leadership. It is kind of like the rise through the exalted leader of the Elks--you start as the outer door guard, or some such title, and after seven years, you get there. Well, this individual has started his climb to leadership this session as the caucus chairman of the Democrats in the House. He has been renowned this session for three things--resident game warden, his lobbying effort over the last two months to get HB1465 reconsidered (if you remember that, it is the manufactured homes bill), and his long and eloquent speeches. - REP. HANSON expressed his appreciation to the Assembly.
- REP. WENTZ: It's my pleasure to present a gift to Representative Art Melby. And, in recognition of the terseness of Representative Melby's debating style, I've decided to make this presentation brief. Here!

I'm sure I was chosen to make this presentation because I'm a woman, and Art has such high regard for women. He looks up to women. He has to. He's rather old-fashioned and quaint in that way. He puts women on a pedestal. Representative Nalewaja and I were talking about that the other day, and we really don't mind being put on a pedestal, but, Representative Melby--we have a question-how do you clean a toilet from a pedestal?

Representative Melby might seem very "no nonsense" and all business to those of us who know him only as a legislator,

but that's not so. He's a Lutheran, you know, and Lutherans are much like Baptists. They raise hell, but you can't catch them at it.

Art doesn't smoke. I've noticed that, and I've asked his constituents back in Harvey, and they told me that Art kissed his first woman and smoked his first cigarette on the same day, and he hasn't had time for tobacco since.

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly: To Admiral Melby, my favorite dance partner, with our love.

- REP. MELBY: This was really a surprise. I never expected anything like this. But thank you all, and now I think it's time to light all boilers and get underway.
- REP. C. WILLIAMS: I'm very pleased that I've been granted the privilege and the pleasure of presenting the gift to an outstanding person--our Assistant Majority Leader, Bill Kretschmar.

I am at a disadvantage. This morning, consequently, I went around talking to some Republicans to get some background on this outstanding person. I got plenty of it. He comes from Venturia, Bill Kretschmar does. Wilbur Vander Vorst helped me find that on the map. It's a suburb of Ashley. He represents the 30th district, and according to Mr. Vander Vorst, Bill is a bird watcher and woman chaser. It has never cost him any votes; however, the women do not take him seriously.

During the legislative assembly, Bill gets his kicks out of amending almost every portion that the constitutional convention came up with. According to Tim, it's the hope of the Assembly that he completes his work before death. He's been in the House since 1973. I made a concerted effort to get to know Bill one day. I sat down with him at lunch and proceeded to try to talk and visit with him, and he fell asleep. I thought perhaps he was a mute or something.

In talking to some of the Republicans, they told me that he had served under the Earl of the House since 1977, as Assistant Majority Leader. I think you'll agree, ladies and gentlemen, that that's enough to make anybody mute. One day I saw Bill approach Earl. They were talking very, very close. It seemed to be something of great importance. Bill was asking the question. Finally, Earl nodded; Bill got up, ran out of the Assembly, went into the office. I thought that man is playing an important role. He quickly took a left turn and went into the bathroom.

It is indeed a privilege for anyone to get in front of this body and present a gift to our outstanding leaders. Anyone

who serves as a leader in a leadership position in this circus that we have is certainly very deserving of our attention and any praise that we can throw on them.

Bill, you are held in high esteem by both parties. You are a man who has given great service and devotion, and, too often, we extend too little praise to these people. At this time, Eill, would you come forward for your gift, please?

- REP. KRETSCHMAR: Mr. Speaker, Representative Williams, really just serving in this House is more than enough for any one of us. I do appreciate the courtesies and kindness shown to me by all of the Members. Over these seven sessions that I have served in this House, I've certainly come to love it and to love its Members. I even like most of them. I think, Mr. Speaker, if I'd have had my druthers, I would have asked that you just center on one of those large brown envelopes and put on there a two dollar 21 wager, but I do thank you very much.
- REP. WOLD: Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly. It is my pleasure to make this presentation to Representative Serenus Hoffner, Assistant Minority Leader. Representative Hoffner has several distinguishing features: the first is a remarkable change that those of us who have been here for a while have recognized in his change of attire. He now dresses in his banker's pinstripes and his businessman's blues, although we know that he seldom votes that interest. He wasn't always that way. Some of us can remember when the wits and the outrageous color of his ties were only exceeded by those worn by Art Melby and Roy Gilbreath. Some of you might be interested in his old ties, and you can purchase some of them if and when Ben Meier ever has a garage sale.

Another one of Representative Hoffner's distinguishing features is his manner of speech. We witnessed it again today in a debate. He's very thoughtful. He's very deliberate. He's very methodical in his oral presentation. Representative Murphy has codified one of his philosophical concepts that he has labeled "Hoffner's First Law on Thinking: How do I know what I think until I hear what I say?"

We all know how difficult it is for the Democrats to control their caucus, and of course it is one of his duties to serve as the whip. Murphy has another law--it's called "Hoffner's Third Law of Leadership: How can I soar like an eagle when I'm dealing with all these turkeys?"

Another distinguishing feature of Representative Hoffner is that he has to be doing something productive all the time. Even when he is jogging, he is dictating into his little

portable dictaphone to his constituents. The girls in the steno pool have taken a vote. They have decided that they prefer Hoffner's heavy breathing to Stofferahn's good looks.

One last quality that he possesses, and I think that it's quite apparent to all of us, is his gentleness. Representative Hoffner, you are a gentle man. - REP. HOFFNER: Mr. Speaker, thank you, Tom; Members of the Assembly. I really enjoyed myself six times this session: sustaining the six Governor's vetoes. Going from the majority to minority has been a difficult thing, but serving in this Assembly either in the majority or the minority is always a pleasure, and it's been a pleasure again this session. Thank you very much.
- REP. KELLY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly. For the fifth year in a row, Representative Conmy has won the best-dressed male legislator award. His exquisite taste and attire are the envy of all his colleagues. Soon this natty dresser will be donning the drab black robe of a federal judge. Your friends, and even your enemies, thought they would like to be the first to purchase your judicial raiment. Representative Conmy, would you please step forward. "Here come da judge."
- REP. CONMY: I thank you. I only hope that you are accurate prophets. Instant nausea.
- REP. UNHJEM: Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly. The Minority Leader has had a long career of legislative service and most, if not all of that time, until this session, he served on, as the press calls it, the powerful House Appropriations Committee. Last session, he was Chairman of that committee, rising to the highest position of power in which he has served. Charlie has served this session without being on any committee without having the opportunity to have input by his vote at that crucial level of committee amendments. As Minority Leader he doesn't have the votes to carry any partisan issue on the floor except maybe for those veto overrides. I'm not really saying that Charlie's position has approximated that of a Maytag repairman, but I think there may have been times this session that he may have wondered why he sought it.

Seriously, Charles Mertens is a dedicated, conscientious, concerned, and distinguished Member of this Assembly. I, personally, and the majority caucus hold him in great respect. We're all pleased to present him with this token of our appreciation for a job well done in that important

position of spokesman for the loyal opposition and the voice of conscience in his role as Minority Leader for the Forty-ninth Legislative Assembly.

REP. MERTENS: Thank you. I'm really appreciative of this. To me, there's nothing quite like being a member of the North Dakota House of Representatives. It has indeed been a privilege to serve as the Minority Leader of the House. The friendships that you make endure forever.

Earl was just telling me the other day that he had a little gift that he was planning to give me when he finished his light reading of the Constitution in the evening. He said, "as long as you just take it in an advisory capacity." I was touched by that; I thought perhaps I should return the favor. I thought the other morning that I had found the plan that he was looking for during the whole session. So I called him and he told me what I could do with that plan.

Seriously, it's a great pleasure to serve here and, for the freshman legislators, it is something that you will never forget, the friendships that are made here. Thank you very much.

REP. SCHNEIDER: Thank you. First of all I want to mention that I don't resent Representative Donna Nalewaja's comment on the way some of us do our hair. You see, I figured it worked for Byron Dorgan.

You know, I came down here last session and sat just over from then-Republican floor leader Earl Strinden. I sat there in awe of his majesty, of his charisma, of his command performance, of his stentorian voice, of his gifts that he has for leadership and tactical ability and I turned to my seatmate, Tish Kelly, and I said, "Gee, do you think I could ever be that good?"; and she said, "Well, no, I can't imagine that." But she did say, "If you ever are, I'll be sure to write letters to the editor saying that you're not as coarse and mean as you really are."

I thought I would try to emulate this man, so I searched into his background to find if we had any common traits and it came up in a story that came up in the last session: when Earl was giving a speech commemorating Tish Kelly on being the only woman Speaker of the House in the country, he was telling that he was a young Marine officer in Washington, D.C., at the same time she was working there for a congressman and mused that, perhaps, if chances might have been different, she might have been Mrs. Earl Strinden today. Of course, Tish retched with the thought. She said if that unlikely event had ever happened, it would not be that way; he would have had the opportunity to be floor leader and Mr. Speaker. I did get a clue from that that Earl Strinden was once a Marine corps officer. I thought,

so was I. Maybe I have some of the same traits, but, no, they didn't teach me marching orders or close order drill or anything like that. When I wanted somebody to do something, I had to tell them. Somehow he gets people to do all kinds of things without ever even asking them. I was taught as a Marine to defend the garrison, but I never went to those extremes.

There was at least one thing that I thought we had in common and that was we both supported the triggered sales tax bill. There were those in my caucus who felt perhaps he would not support that bill when I never had any question in my mind: I know a trigger-happy Marine when I see one.

Representative Strinden, it's been indeed a great pleasure having served with you. Please come forward and get your bauble.

REP. STRINDEN: Thank you very much Representative Schneider; Representative Hamerlik; Mr. Speaker; Dean of the House, Representative Haugland; former Speaker and Dean of the Minority Caucus, Representative Solberg; former Speaker, Representative Kelly; former Speaker, Representative Peterson. I want to correct something lest I'm in the doghouse again. When I suggested that, maybe if I would have an opportunity to visit with the beautiful young lady Tish Kelly, when she was in Washington, D.C., and I was stationed at Quantico, I suggested, who knows, she may have been then a Republican. My wife, when she read what someone thought I said, reminded me that that would have been a most unfortunate happening for me because I think we would have had a legal suit or something going: I was married shortly thereafter so my wife is here and I want that to stand corrected.

Thank you so very much, all of you. It's a privilege to serve in what we can call the people's house in the legislative branch of government. Representative Hamerlik, what do you want? Do you want the speech on "we're the board of directors or the policymaking branch?"

We have a unique opportunity. There are just a handful of people in this great nation of ours who serve in the legislative branch in all of the states in the Union. Here is where we see the tugs-and-pulls of a free society surface. I'm proud of our record. It's been an honor and a privilege to serve with each and every one of you. There's a camaraderie that's unique. It is a great experience. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve with you in this 49th legislative session.

Winston Churchill once said, "Nothing is more dangerous than to live in the temperamental atmosphere of a gallup

poll, always taking one's temperature." Said Winston Churchill, "There is only one duty, only one safe course, and that is to be right and not to fear to do or say what you believe to be right." Let that be our goal, let that be our motto, let that be our badge of honor as Members of this legislature.

We have employees here who are not recognized and I wonder if all of the employees can come down along the side, the bill clerks and the pages and all of them, so that we can give them our standing ovation for serving us so very well. They're down here when we swear them in and we know that we could not function as a legislature without the help of all these wonderfully dedicated people who come here and spend a few weeks and become highly proficient at doing what they're assigned to do. Let's give them a standing ovation, ladies and gentlemen. Thank you again and God be with you until we make another roll call.

REP. CONMY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I'm sure all of you thought that one of the most wonderous polysyllabic words was supercalifragilisticexpialidocious, but that has faded from memory once you have been exposed to "You've heard the motion, is there a second, all in favor, ayes have it, next" and we move on with our business. Roy Hausauer has been our Speaker, he has been patient with us, tolerant, long-suffering with the urge to keep the process going, he's up there now watching the clock wondering, "will this never quit?"

We want you to know that we have a few tips we've worked out for the next Speaker. The first thing you do when someone moves a call of the House is you turn the button off before you say "Jesus Christ". The desk force has a special motion ready. It is all typed and ready to be handed out. The next person who, in our waning hours, makes a motion to divide a minority report on the Sixth order into 43 subsections is going to be subject to a motion that the House reconsider our action when we seated him in December. It will pass unanimously.

Roy, with our thanks for your patience and because you're such a nice person, this, Roy, is for you.

But, before we give that to Roy, Representative Schneider, there's a special presentation. We have for you the tooth fairy award from the children's caucus in honor of the tax on candy and soft drinks and I'll deliver it.

REP. R. HAUSAUER: Well, thank you, Pat. It's certainly a great honor to be elected and serve as a Speaker of this 49th legislative session. It's like our former Speaker, Oscar Solberg, said, "It's a great honor that comes to so few people." I'm very proud to have been able to serve. Many

people have asked me about the job because, over the years, since 1971, I've served with the Appropriations Committee: it's a big committee, a lot of people and a lot of action. They asked about this job and all I can tell them is, it's damn lonely, and it is.

I just have to thank the desk force, they do an excellent job, and the other workers in this great hall and the leadership on both sides of the aisle. They've certainly been a great help to me and I can't thank them enough. Over the years I just can't believe the people I've served, great people, fine people. It's always been enjoyable and I want to thank you for everything.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

MR. SPEAKER: Your Conference Committee to which was referred Engrossed HB 1404 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the SENATE RECEDE from its amendments as found on pages 2520-2527 of the House Journal and that Engrossed HB 1404 be amended as follows:

That the Senate recede from its amendments as found on pages 1939-1946 of the Senate Journal and pages 2520-2527 of the House Journal and that engrossed House Bill No. 1404 be amended as follows:

On page 1 of the engrossed bill, line 1, after the words "A BILL" delete the remainder of the bill and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act to adopt the Family Farm Survival Act of 1985 and to provide participation in short-term loans to farmers and agribusinesses; to create and enact a new section to chapter 4-36 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a bond reserve fund; to amend and reenact section 4-36-03, subsection 6 of section 4-36-04, sections 4-36-06, 4-36-07, 4-36-08, 4-36-12, 4-36-24, and 4-36-25, relating to the Agricultural Development Act; to provide appropriations; and to declare an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. Short title. This Act may be known as the Family Farm Survival Act of 1985.

SECTION 2. Definitions. In sections 1 through 7 of this Act, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

- 1. "Agribusiness" means a locally owned business operation, located within this state, which is primarily engaged in providing services, materials, or equipment for the production, processing or transportation of agriculture products.
- 2. "Farmer" means a resident of this state who owns or operates an existing farm or ranch operation, and has a debt-to-asset ratio of fifty percent or greater or has suffered some form of unavoidable natural or financial hardship in at least one of the past four years.
- 3. "Operating loan" means a loan or extension of credit with a term of one year or less made by a nongovernmental financial institution to a farmer or agribusiness for the operation of an existing farm or ranch operation or agribusiness. An operating loan includes a farmer's home

administration or small business administration subordinated operating loan and guaranteed operating loan, and may be further defined by rule of the industrial commission.

SECTION 3. Operating loans - Participation by the Bank of North Dakota.

- 1. The Bank of North Dakota shall make available an appropriate amount of funds to purchase participation interests in operating loans to farmers and agribusinesses. Interest charged on a participation interest purchased by the Bank under this section may not exceed eight percent per annum, plus necessary and reasonable fees as determined by the industrial commission.
- 2. The amount of a participation interest purchased by the Eank under this section may not be greater than sixty-five percent of the loan amount or two hundred thousand dollars, whichever is less. The term of any participation interest purchased under this section may not exceed one year.
- 3. The Bank may not purchase a participation interest in a loan under this section until verification is received establishing that the farmer has obtained adequate crop or hail insurance which has been assigned to the primary lender, or that adequate insurance, as determined by the Bank, has been obtained by the agribusiness.

- 1. The portion of the operating loan retained by a nongovernmental financial institution may not bear interest at an effective rate more than one and one-half percentage points per annum less than the interest rate computed and published monthly by the state commissioner of banking and financial institutions pursuant to section 47-14-09. The initial interest rate must be set on the date of the loan commitment and must be adjusted quarterly, based upon the last published interest rate computed by the commissioner.
- All participation interests purchased are subject to the review and approval of the Bank.
- 3. The full amount of a loan qualifying for participation must be evidenced by one master note drawn by the financial institution to

reflect both interest rates and to provide a schedule of payments to the financial institution and the Bank of North Dakota based upon pro rata shares of the loan participation.

SECTION 5. Interest buydown.

- 1. There is hereby established an interest rate buydown fund to be maintained by the industrial commission at the Bank of North Dakota.
- 2. The industrial commission may buydown or reduce the interest paid by a farmer or agribusiness on the Bank's portion of the participation operating loans by up to an additional five percentage points a year below the amount provided in section 3 of this Act.
- 3. Any interest buydown provided under this section must be repaid by the farmer or agribusiness not later than July 1, 1991, under terms approved by the Bank of North Dakota and pursuant to rules adopted by the industrial commission. Money collected under this subsection must be deposited in the fire and tornado fund in the state treasury.
- SECTION 6. Agribusinesses. Not more than twenty percent of all participation interests purchased by the Bank of North Dakota under sections 1 through 7 of this Act may be in loans for agribusinesses.
- SECTION 7. Rules. The industrial commission may adopt such rules and guidelines as are necessary to implement sections 1 through 6 of this Act.
- SECTION 8. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-03 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-03. Terms defined. As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
 - "Agriculture or agricultural enterprise" means and includes, but is not limited to, the real and personal property constituting farms, ranches, and other agricultural commodity producers; agriculturally related sewage, liquid and solid waste collection, disposal, treatment, and drainage services, and facilities; and agriculturally related antipollution and air, water, ground, and subsurface pollution abatement and control facilities and services.

- "Bonds" means any bonds, notes, debentures, interim certificates, bond, grant and revenue anticipation notes, or any other evidences of indebtedness.
- "Commission" means the industrial commission of North Dakota created pursuant to section 54-17-01.
- "Contracting party" means any party to a lease, sales contract, or loan agreement except the commission.
- 5. "Lender" means any federal or state chartered bank, federal land bank, production credit association, bank for cooperatives, savings and loan association, building and loan association, small business investment company, or any other institution qualified within the state to originate and service loans, including, but not limited to, insurance companies, credit unions, and mortgage loan companies.
- 6. "Loan insurer" and "loan guarantor" mean an agency, department, administration, or instrumentality, corporate or otherwise, of or in the department of housing and urban development, the farmers home administration of the department of agriculture or the veterans administration of the United States of America, any private mortgage insurance company, or any other public or private agency which insures or guarantees loans.
- 7. "Operating loan" means an operating loan as defined under section 2 of this Act.
- 8. "State" means the state of North Dakota.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT. Subsection 6 of section 4-36-04 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

6. Enter into agreements with any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States of America or this state and with lenders and enter into loan agreements with contracting parties for the purpose of planning, regulating, and providing for the financing and refinancing of any agricultural enterprise or an operating loan.

- SECTION 10. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-06 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-06. Commission Loans to lenders Conditions. The commission may make, and undertake commitments to make, loans to lenders under terms and conditions requiring the proceeds thereof to be used by such lenders to make operating loans and loans for agricultural enterprises. Loan commitments or actual loans shall be originated through and serviced by any bank, trust company, savings and loan association, mortgage banker or other financial institution authorized to transact business in this state.
- SECTION 11. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-07 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-07. Commission Invest in, purchase, or assign loans Conditions. The commission may invest in, purchase, or make commitments to take assignments of, operating loans and loans made by lenders for the construction, rehabilitation or purchase of agricultural enterprises. No loan shall be eligible for investment in, purchase, or assignment by the commission if the loan was made more than six months prior to the date of investment, purchase, or assignment by the commission.
- SECTION 12. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-08 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- $4\mbox{-}36\mbox{-}08.$ Commission Lender's requirements. Prior to exercising any of the powers authorized in sections $4\mbox{-}36\mbox{-}06$ and $4\mbox{-}36\mbox{-}07$, the commission shall require the lender to certify and agree that:
 - The loan is, or if the same has not been made will, at the time of making, be in all respects a prudent investment; and
 - 2. Such lender will use the proceeds of such loan, investment, sale, or assignment within a reasonable period of time to make loans or purchase operating loans or loans to provide agricultural enterprises, or, if such lender has made a commitment to make operating loans or loans to provide agricultural enterprises on the basis of a commitment from the commission to purchase such loans, such lender will make such loans and sell the same to the commission within a reasonable period of time.

- SECTION 13. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-12 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-12. Commission Bond issuance Special obligations How paid and secured. Bonds issued under this chapter shall not be payable from nor charged upon any funds other than the revenue pledged to the payment thereof, nor shall the commission be subject to any liability thereon. Such bonds shall not constitute a charge, lien, or encumbrance, legal or equitable, upon any property of the commission, except those agricultural enterprises, or portions thereof, mortgaged or otherwise encumbered under the provisions and for the purposes of this chapter. The bonds may be additionally secured by a pledge of any grant, contribution, or guarantee from the federal government, the state, or any corporation, association, institution, or person.
- SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-24 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-24. Bank of North Dakota Authorization to exercise administrative powers - Payment of commission expenses - Reimbursement - Liability of state or political subdivision. The commission may delegate to the Bank of North Dakota, and and the Bank of North Dakota is hereby authorized to exercise, all administrative powers granted to the commission under this chapter. The Bank of North Dakota is further authorized to advance from its funds the amount necessary to permit the commission to issue its first series of bonds under this chapter which shall be refunded to the Bank of North Dakota by the commission upon issuance of said bonds. Thereafter, all expenses incurred by the commission in carrying out the provisions of this chapter shall be payable solely from funds provided under this chapter, and nothing in this chapter shall be construed to authorize the commission to incur indebtedness or liability on behalf of or payable by this state or any political subdivision of it.
- SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 4-36-25 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 4-36-25. Commission Bonds exempt from taxation Exception. All bonds issued under this chapter, interest payable thereon and income derived therefrom except inheritance, estate, and transfer taxes, shall at all times be exempt from all taxes imposed by this state, any county, any city, or any other political subdivision of this state. Bonds may be issued under this chapter whereby the interest on the bonds is subject to federal income taxation.

SECTION 16. A new section to chapter 4-36 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Reserve fund.

- The commission may establish and maintain a reserve fund and may deposit moneys appropriated by the state for the purpose of the fund, all proceeds of bonds required to be deposited in the fund by terms of any contracts between the commission and its bondholders or any resolution of the commission pertaining to proceeds of bonds, moneys or funds of the commission which it determines to deposit, and moneys made available to the commission for the purposes of the fund from any other source, and may transfer funds from the interest rate buydown fund established in section 5 of this Act. Moneys in the reserve fund must be held and applied solely to the payment of the interest on and the principal of bonds and sinking fund payments as the payments become due and payable and for the retirement of bonds, including the payment of any redemption premium required to be paid when any bonds are redeemed or retired prior to maturity.
- 2. The commission may certify to the legislative assembly such amounts as are necessary to maintain the fund at a level necessary to secure the payment of the principal, premium, if any, and interest on its bonds.
- SECTION 17. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the fire and tornado fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$4,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the interest rate buydown fund for the period beginning upon the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 1987. Upon expiration of this appropriation, the funds which remain in the interest rate buydown fund must be returned to the fire and tornado fund. Any interest generated from the interest rate buydown fund must be transferred to the fire and tornado fund upon expiration of this appropriation. The industrial commission shall by rule establish the priority of applications for interest rate buydowns under this Act, if appropriations are not sufficient to make loans to all applicants.
- SECTION 18. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the fire and tornado fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$4,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the extent that the fire and tornado fund balance does not

drop below \$13,000,000, to the interest rate buydown fund for the period beginning July 1, 1986, and ending June 30, 1987. Upon expiration of this appropriation, the funds which remain in the interest rate buydown fund must be returned to the fire and tornado fund. Any interest generated from the interest rate buydown fund must be transferred to the fire and tornado fund upon expiration of this appropriation. The industrial commission shall by rule establish the priority of applications for interest rate buydowns under this Act, if appropriations are not sufficient to make loans to all applicants.

SECTION 19. EMERGENCY. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and is in effect from and after its passage and approval."

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

State Board of Higher Education

The salaries and wages line item is increased by \$25,000 from the general fund to allow funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

The salaries and wages line item is increased by \$4,300 from the general fund for providing board employees' disability insurance similar to that received by institution employees.

The salaries and wages line item is reduced by \$134,773 from the general fund to delete funding for a vacant associate commissioner position.

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$15,465 from the general fund to provide funds to restore postage, printing, supplies, and travel to the current service level.

The private college tuition assistance line item is increased by \$100,000 from the general fund and the student financial assistance grants line item is decreased by \$600,000 from the general fund.

The community colleges line item is reduced by \$77,564 from the general fund with a corresponding increase to the amount of community colleges estimated income. Of the total, \$15,322 is a reduction to income for deleting proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition and foreign student tuition. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

University of North Dakota

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$641,500 from the general fund to reflect funding the institution at 87 percent of the facilities maintenance formula.

The equipment line item is reduced by \$164,839 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle. The reduction reflects an exclusion of the computer valuation which was initially included in the equipment calculation amount.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$815,603 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2 million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$1,395,160 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$944,160 and foreign student tuition of \$451,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

North Dakota State University

The salaries and wages line item is increased by \$472,153 from the general fund to provide funds for a total increase of eight FTE faculty positions: four FTE faculty positions the first year of the biennium and an additional four FTE faculty positions the second year of the biennium.

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$164,100 from the general fund to reflect funding the institutions at 87 percent of the facilities maintenance formula.

The equipment line item is increased by \$51,971 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$731,899 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2 million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$1,225,460 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$992,460 and foreign student tuition of \$233,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

North Dakota State School of Science

The salaries and wages line item is reduced by \$344,262 from the general fund to delete a total of 6.9 FTE faculty positions: 3.25 faculty positions in the first year of the biennium and an additional reduction of 3.65 positions in the second year of the biennium.

The equipment line item is increased by \$36,228 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$200,141 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2\$ million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$140,068 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$115,068 and foreign student tuition of \$25,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide

average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Dickinson State College

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$105,100 from the general fund to reflect funding the institution at 87 percent of the facilities maintenance formula.

The equipment line item is increased by \$9,414 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$44,781\$ with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2\$ million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$7,032 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$1,000 and foreign student tuition of \$6,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Mayville State College

The equipment line item is increased by \$4,607 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$43,239 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2 million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$43,122 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$28,122 and foreign student tuition of \$15,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for

other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Minot State College

The salaries and wages line item is increased by \$212,951 from the general fund to provide funds for a total increase of four FTE faculty positions: two FTE faculty positions the first year of the biennium and an additional two FTE faculty positions the second year of the biennium.

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$125,000 from the general fund to reflect funding the institution at 87 percent of the facilities maintenance formula.

The equipment line item is increased by \$12,584 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$104,555 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2 million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$106,644 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$4,644\$ and foreign student tuition of \$102,000\$.

The capital improvements line item is increased by \$117,000 from the general fund to provide funds for payment of water improvement special assessments.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Valley City State College

The salaries and wages line item is increased by \$44,000 from the general fund to provide funds for one FTE computer programmer analyst position.

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$79,200 from the general fund to reflect funding the institutions at 87 percent of the facilities maintenance formula.

The equipment line item is increased by \$7,062 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$36,306 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2\$ million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$13,352 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$11,352 and foreign student tuition of \$2,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

NDSU-Bottineau

The equipment line item is reduced by \$3,998 from the general fund to reflect the establishment of a 19-year rather than 20-year equipment replacement cycle.

The estimated income line item is increased by \$23,476 with a corresponding decrease to the general fund to reflect a proportionate share of the estimated effect of additional tuition increases that are expected to provide a total of \$2\$ million of additional income to the various institutions in Senate Bill No. 2003.

The estimated income line item is reduced by \$31,064 with a corresponding increase to the general fund to eliminate the additional income from the proposed increases in Minnesota student tuition of \$2,064 and foreign student tuition of \$29,000.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

UND-Medical Center

The operating expenses line item is increased by \$300,000 from the general fund.

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

NDSU State Toxicologist

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Forest Service

The salaries and wages line item allows funds to continue average salary increases of 9.5 percent for faculty and senior administrative staff and 5.5 percent (\$50 per month minimum) for other employees the first year of the biennium and to provide average salary increases of four percent (\$50 per month minimum) the second year of the biennium.

Purpose of Other Changes

A new section is added which authorizes line item transfers by each institution or agency upon approval from the Board of Higher Education.

Another new section is added which appropriates \$1,000,000 to the Board of Higher Education to be used for critical needs of the institutions of higher education provided for in the constitution and included in Senate Bill No. 2003 for faculty or other positions, operating expenses, and equipment.

A new section of legislative intent is added which authorizes the Board of Higher Education to increase tuition at the institutions of higher education to provide an estimated additional \$2 million of income during the 1985-87 biennium. It is intended that nonresident students shall be equitably included in any tuition increases.

 - Preparation of yearly reports to the legislative council on the status of all reclamation research projects, conclusions reached, and future goals and objectives.
- SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 38-14.1-04.3 of the 1983 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
- 38-14.1-04.3. Reclamation research objectives. The reclamation research advisory committee shall make all recommendations on the specific reclamation research projects that are to be funded from moneys administered by the commission. Prior to awarding reclamation research funds, the commission must receive consider the recommendations of the committee relating to the proposed reclamation research project to be approved for funding by the commission, each proposed project must meet the following criteria:
 - Development of data and conclusions that will assist in returning the land to its original or better productivity.

- 2. Development of data and conclusions that will assist in returning the land to an approved postmining land use as soon as possible.
- Development of data and conclusions that will reduce unnecessary regulatory costs and assist in effectively reclaiming the land to its original or better productivity.

SECTION 7. STORAGE FACILITIES. Structures for storage of agricultural products may be authorized for construction by the state board of higher education when such structures do not exceed \$50,000 in cost.

SECTION 8. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated \$300,000 to the main experiment station, out of any funds available from the sale of animals by the experiment stations due to adverse climate conditions, for the purpose of purchasing replacement animals at the respective experiment stations during the biennium beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1987.

SECTION 9. RESEARCH/EXTENSION CONSTRUCTION - APPROPRIATION. Provision is hereby made in this section for the main agricultural experiment station or any of its branch stations to accept a gift dedicated to the construction of a facility to house research and extension service staff. The facility is to be constructed at nor near the station headquarters site. The total construction cost shall not exceed \$1,000,000.
