REMARKS By Honorable Byron Dorgan United States Congressman

Lt. Governor Meiers, senators, ladies and gentlemen: I'm pleased to be here today. As many of you probably know, Congress is not in session this week. It is President's Day on Monday, which means that we take the whole week off. Then we'll go back and work a day or so, and then we'll run into Flag Day and take a little rest for Flag Day, and then Arbor Day and National Pinochle Week. We'll sort of work our way through the year.

Congress is a lot like the state legislature: where a lot of people, Democrats and Republicans, liberals and conservatives try to do the best job we can on some very important public questions.

I was privileged to have worked with many of you in this chamber throughout the 1970's in my role as tax commissioner, and I won some and lost a lot with you. But I always have respected what you do. I am always struck, when I come back to the state legislature to look at your bill books and understand the amount of work that you do in a very short span of time. It's really quite incredible--the amount of your task and the amount of time allotted to it, and I think very few people understand that.

I was talking the other day to someone in Washington about the state legislature because they were talking about something that was being passed back in their state. As we talked about state legislatures, I told them that ours was one that has a lot of Republicans and a lot of Democrats, and sometimes they do things I like, and sometimes they do things I don't think are so good. Still, almost all of us in North Dakota understand that we have made some very significant investments in the right thing: the future of our state. The other fellow and I had been talking about education. I said to him, "You know, if you take a look at what North Dakota commits to education in its per capita spending

on education on all levels, it's enormous." We've always made that commitment--Democrats and Republicans, and I'm proud of that commitment.

A congressman from Oklahoma, Congressman Mike Synar, was telling us the other day that he had been back home and he had been talking to a group of Cub Scouts. He served in the state legislature before he went to the United States Congress. He said, "I asked those Cub Scouts, what do you think is the difference between a legislative body like the state legislature or the United States Congress and the Cub Scouts? And one little fellow raised his hand, and he said, "Adult supervision."

Well, we kid ourselves a lot, and people kid us a lot - those of us who serve in the legislative bodies here and in Washington, D.C., but the task is pretty sobering. The task is to do the public's business, and that's not very easy.

Last Wednesday night the president gave the State of the Union address and the chamber was packed with the House and the Senate, the Supreme Court, the cabinet, and diplomats from around the world. The president gave the State of the Union address at a time when things are pretty good in this country in a lot of areas. Times have improved over the last few years in many areas. People do feel pretty good about this country. The president made that clear in his State of the Union address. He described once again, as he does very well, that this country is a country of hope, compassion, and courage and a country where dreams can come true for people all over the country if they work hard enough and strive hard enough.

So the president told us some good news about the State of the Union. He said the economy is growing and the people feel better about themselves and about America. But we're a big country, and things aren't good everywhere. Those of us who spend our time trying to fix what's wrong need to understand that we've got some problems.

We've got farmers that work hard, but their dreams no longer come true because prices are too low and interest rates are too high and farm failures are at a record high. And that's the State of the Union that we need to fix.

We have magazines and newspapers that are filled with ads for the latest diet fads asking the average American if they won't chip in and help take off some of that extra weight while two-thirds of the world is hungry and the sub-Saharan region of Africa starves. At the very same time that condition exists, we, as Americans, through our farm program are asking if we can't make our most productive assets less productive: our family farms. And that's a State of the Union that we have to fix.

Yet, the wealthiest and most robust nation in the history of civilization is deep in debt and sinking deeper in debt. Five

years ago we had a federal debt of \$900 billion, today it's \$1.7 trillion. We have annual budget deficits of \$200 billion a year and the most recent trade year ended with a \$125 billion trade deficit and that is a State of the Union that we have to fix.

Now I guess if you were to look back one hundred years from today to what we're doing now, you could probably try and describe who we are and what we think, and what our aspirations and our values are by what we spend our money on in the public domain: you, in the state legislature, and we, in the United States Congress.

The President a week ago today sent us the budget that he proposes for this year. And now we're going to get involved in a wrestling match, all of us, trying to wrestle with this question of "what do we do about that?", "what do we really spend our money on?" The President said, "For this coming fiscal year, I propose a federal deficit of \$180 billion." He said, "I propose a thirteen percent increase in budget authority for defense. I propose nearly a fifty percent cut in spending for farm programs. I propose eliminating revenue-sharing, cutting Medicaid, cutting student aid, a five percent general across-the-board cut for programs for the poor, eliminating UDAG and EDA, and many other budgets."

The question is then: what will happen? Well, what will happen, I think, is that we'll now, from that submission by the President to the Congress, get involved in that sport called the good, old-fashioned, American budget debate.

You see, I think, while everyone kids government a lot, and they often speak ill of government or make jokes of government, everyone also understands that government is a necessary evil: necessary, certainly, but not benign; in many ways, evil. It imposes strangleholds of red tape and regulation and so on, and so people understand that government is necessary, but we have these different views of what government should be doing, and at what rate.

I personally would like to see an across-the-board freeze on all federal spending-all of it--defense and nondefense. I don't think that's likely to happen this year. In fact, I think all three members of the North Dakota delegation have indicated they would support that and would vote for it. Probably all three of us have sponsored or cosponsored bills to do that, but the debate is do we spend more for defense at the expense of other programs? Well, I don't know how that's going to resolve itself. A senator on the other side of the Capitol the other day, Senator Cohen from Maine, was talking about the defense budget, and many of us, myself included, think we're spending a little too much in that area. He said that when the news came out last week, following the news that said that we were paying \$7,600 for coffeemakers-ten-cuppers, to be sure--\$426 for hammers, and now we're spending \$680 for toilet seats on the submarine-chasing airplane, it gives

new meaning to the word "throne". Those senators have a great sense of humor.

Well, the fact is, in my judgment, we're throwing a lot of money at some of these budget items and we have to exercise some restraint in defense and nondefense issues. What can you expect? It's my judgment that those of us in Congress, particularly from rural states, will wage a very strong fight against dramatic cuts in agriculture at this point. You would not cut defense spending if you were in the middle of a war. You would not cut health care spending in America if you were in the middle of an epidemic, and it seems to me unwise to suggest a dramatic and deep cut for spending for agricultural programs in the middle of a farm crisis. Those of us who come from this part of the country, Republicans and Democrats alike, will wage a very strong and very aggressive fight against the kinds of proposals that are existing today in the President's budget on agriculture.

I'm not saying we need another nickel above today's spending. I'm willing to freeze agricultural spending. But I am not, and neither are, I'm sure many Republicans and Democrats from states like North Dakota, willing to see a fifty percent cut with the kind of times that farmers are facing in the 1980's in the appropriations for agriculture. It seems to me that you especially, I, and others, understand that defense is not just appropriations for the Department of Defense. Defense in this country is also the kind of investments you've made and the kind of investments we've made in a strong education system. That's defense. Defense is an investment in a strong health care system. Defense is the maintenance of a network of family farms. This is one of the few countries in the world, the only country in the world, that is both a major industrial giant, one of the superpowers militarily, and also can produce enough food for itself and help feed the rest of the world. That is a major part of this country's defense.

I'd like to try and tell you what I think will happen to these spending issues. I would think that you should expect to see some spending cuts in revenues that North Dakota now receives in some of these types of areas as recommended by the President, and as I think will be negotiated and accepted by Congress. I expect you will see cuts in funds in the UDAG grants. I expect you're going to see cuts in the EDA program. I expect that you're going to see cuts in revenue-sharing, and North Dakota receives about \$13.6 million in revenue-sharing. I expect that you may see some cuts in rural water and sewage grants. Those are some of the kinds of areas that have been either targeted for cuts or outright elimination by the President on which I think you will see action by Congress to proceed ahead with some basic cuts in revenue. If I were in the state legislature, I would predict that some funds in those areas will probably be diminished as a result of Congressional acquiescence to some of the President's requests.

With respect to agriculture itself, I know that you and Governor Sinner are discussing a number of initiatives at the state level to try and respond to what you see and what we see as a farm crisis. I think that's good, I think that probably all of us understand that this is not a state problem that the state can solve--it's too big for that--but the kinds of things that you are doing and the kinds of things you are discussing, I think probably give a lot of hope to a lot of farm families out there that otherwise have no hope. I'd like to describe to you very briefly what I think might happen in Congress shortly.

We introduced a bill last Thursday that I think has a chance of being passed by the House and by the Senate in a short-term. The bill provides for two things on the credit side. It provides, first, for a fifty percent advance payment of the loan rate on the expected crop for this year. What that would do is use the money that is already targeted in this year's budget for loan rates, but move fifty percent of that money out immediately to help family farmers who otherwise can't find the liquidity to purchase the feed and the seed, the fertilizer, the other things necessary for spring planting. We talked with Speaker O'Neill about that, he's assured us he would help us to move that to the floor of the House quickly; Senator Dole says it's the best plan that he's seen at this point. A group of us introduced it last Thursday, the first part is advanced loan rate payments, the second is a debt restructuring similar to, but improving upon, that which was announced by the Secretary of Agriculture and the President.

I think that all of us in this room understand that even if we provide for some short-term, and some intermediate or some long-term, credit needs of family farmers, that won't solve the problem. Ultimately they have to get a better price for their product or they will fail.

The 1985 Congress is required to produce a new four-year farm plan and we are now in the beginning stages of working on that. I can't predict what direction that will go, but I can tell you that I don't think that anyone, Republican or Democrat, is of a mind to accept the administration's suggestions of cutting in half the support prices for the next four-year farm program.

I would expect within the next three to four weeks you should know whether the United States Congress is going to do anything above that which was announced by the Secretary of Agriculture on farm credit and that will help you prior to the time that you are going to have to make final decisions on what you might be doing here. Also, in the time frame beyond that leading up to the end of this year, we will be working on and trying to construct that new four-year farm plan.

I know that there has been some discussion in South Dakota, in Nebraska, and in other state legislatures, and I've heard some at least in North Dakota, saying that legislators from here ought to

join legislators from other states and come to Washington, or at least communicate with decisionmakers in Washington, and I think that's fine. I think that there are Democrats and Republicans from urban districts who need your advice, who need your counsel; we need your help--those of us who come from states like North Dakota--we need your help as well. You certainly need to talk to President Reagan, Secretary Block, Mr. Stockman, and others on Capitol Hill, both sides of the aisle, and in this administration especially, decisionmakers who can impact a farm program and short-term credit needs in a way that would be beneficial, not detrimental, to the future of our farms, and to the future of North Dakota.

Now I'd like to, in closing, say that this whole process that we're involved in here is one of making choices. Most of what we do in this country is done privately, by ourselves, with private choices of consumption. And then another major part of what we do is done publicly, understanding that we need law and order, that we need a defense, we need research on health, we need farm price supports, we need an education system, we need roads to drive back and forth to town, back and forth to school. A major part of what we do, we do publicly. And we are the ones who serve in legislative bodies, who make the choices of what kind of expenditures that we make in that public domain. No matter how severe the criticism in the short-run, it seems to me that it's incumbent upon the United States Congress and the state legislature to do what's necessary in both the short-term and the long-term, in what I think is one of the most severe agricultural crises that we've seen in many, many years. The bedrock of this state's economy is still farming. We have never, if you go back and look at economic history, seen farm prices go down and stay down, and at the same time seen interest rates go up and stay up for a long period of time. And those two conditions are conditions that family farmers cannot hurdle.

If family farmers are the strength of our economy, and they are, and if they're confronted with those two problems that they cannot control, then we have to intervene, somehow, to see if we can help--you, here in the state legislature, and those of us in the United States Congress.

I told the House a while ago about a fellow who was at a meeting I attended near LaMoure, and he, like a lot of people you run into when you're walking up and down the street, got up and said "I'm not real crazy about government, to be real honest with you," but he said, "I finally ran into a government I can identify with," he said, "I was over in Montana, going over to visit my daughter. My wife and I were driving along. I was going a little bit fast. I got picked up by the highway patrol over there. They gave me a ticket, and the highway patrolman said I was going 74 miles per hour. He took out this receipt and wrote it out, and he said, 'That's going to be five dollars. The way we do it here in Montana is, when you get picked up, you pay me five dollars, and I give you the receipt.' I thought

that was really something," he said. "I was just folding that receipt to put it in my pocket, and the highway patrolman said, 'By the way, you hang onto that receipt. If you get picked up again today, that's good for all day.' Now, there's a government I can understand and respect," he said.

Well, good government is a matter of choice. Good government is we in the state legislature and we in the United States Congress making the right choices.

I would like to close today with a quote from Adlai Stevenson, who talked about that. We really are the product of those who elect us, all of us, and when we cast votes, we reflect the expressions of those who elect us. We reflect the trust of their evaluation of our judgment. And Adlai Stevenson said, "Trust the people, trust their faith, their fortitude. Trust their good sense, and trust them with the important decisions." I think that is what you do here in the state legislature, and I'm pleased to be invited to be back to spend a few minutes with you.

As always, I'm proud of, not every piece of work you do, but I'm proud of the product that comes out of the North Dakota Legislature which is a good legislature with a good history working on behalf of the people living in the best state of this country. Thank you very much.

- "Farm" means a tract or tracts of land as provided in paragraph 1 of subdivision b of subsection 15 of section 57-02-08.
- "Farmer" means a person involved in the production of an agricultural commodity, as provided in paragraph 2 of subdivision b of subsection 15 of section 57-02-08.
- 4. "Fund" means the home-quarter purchase fund.
- 5. "Home-quarter" means a single contiguous tract of not more than one hundred sixty acres [64.75 hectares] which serves as the base unit of a farm and upon which the farm residence and buildings are located.

SECTION 2. If Senate Bill No. 2502, as approved by the forty-ninth legislative assembly, becomes effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Definitions. As used in this Act, unless the context requires otherwise:

- "Board" means the credit review board for the region where the farm or a majority of the farm is located, or its authorized agent where applicable.
- "Farm" means a tract or tracts of land as provided in paragraph 1 of subdivision b of subsection 15 of section 57-02-08.
- 3. "Farmer" means a person involved in the production of an agricultural commodity, as provided in paragraph 2 of subdivision b of subsection 15 of section 57-02-08.
- 4. "Fund" means the home-quarter purchase fund.
- 5. "Home-quarter" means a single contiguous tract of not more than one hundred sixty acres [64.75 hectares] which serves as the base unit of a farm and upon which the farm residence and buildings are located.

SECTION 3. If Senate Bill No. 2502 of the forty-ninth legislative assembly does not become effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Farm foreclosure negotiation board. The governor shall appoint seven members to the farm foreclosure negotiation board. Three members of the board must have experience serving as directors or officers of financial institutions. Four members of the board must have experience in the operation of a farm. No member of the board may hold state office or serve in state office or serve in state government in any capacity at the time of appointment or during service on the board. The governor shall appoint members to terms of four years. The governor shall appoint one member to serve as chairman of the board.

SECTION 4. If Senate Bill No. 2502 of the forty-ninth legislative assembly does not become effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Powers - Compensation and expenses. The board shall meet at the call of the chairman, as is necessary to fulfill its duties under this Act. The board shall serve as a negotiator between a farmer who is in danger of immediate foreclosure or who has received a notice of foreclosure on a farm and has petitioned the board, and any lender who holds a valid mortgage upon the property. The board may hire staff, subject to appropriations, to serve as negotiators for the board. Board members are entitled to receive fifty dollars for each day of official service, as directed by the board. The board members are entitled to expenses as provided in sections 44-08-04 and 54-06-09.

SECTION 5. If Senate Bill No. 2502 of the forty-ninth legislative assembly does not become effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Petition - Negotiation.

- Any farmer may petition the board for aid after receipt of a notice of foreclosure, or if the farmer is in danger of immediate foreclosure. Upon receipt of the petition, the board or its authorized agent shall enter into negotiations with the lender, on behalf of the farmer.
- 2. The board or its authorized agent shall negotiate with the lender in an attempt to extend the term of the loan, reduce the dollar amount of payments under the loan, or otherwise negotiate a settlement that will allow the farmer to reside

in the farm residence and allow the farmer to continue to produce agricultural commodities. Any change in the terms of the mortgage must be approved by the lender and the farmer.

SECTION 6. Interest rate buydowns by the board.

- 1. If the board, or its authorized agent, is unable to mediate a settlement in the negotiation of a farmer's debt, the board may approve the purchase, refinancing, or redemption of the farmer's home-quarter. If the board approves the purchase, refinancing, or redemption of the home-quarter, it shall subsidize the interest rate paid by the farmer after credit has been obtained by the farmer from any governmental or private financial institution or agency.
- The board may only approve an interest subsidy if the farmer has the financial ability to meet all payments and financial responsibilities, including the payment of principal and interest on loans subsidized under this Act.

SECTION 7. Fund - Appropriation.

- A revolving fund must be maintained at the Bank of North Dakota for the subsidy of interest rates on home-quarter purchases, as provided in this Act. All moneys transferred into the fund, interest upon moneys in the fund, and payments to the fund are hereby appropriated for the purpose of providing subsidies in accordance with this Act.
- 2. The board may petition the emergency commission for a transfer from the state contingency fund whenever it appears to the board that the moneys remaining in the fund are not sufficient to meet demands on the fund. The emergency commission shall grant the transfer request, or so much thereof as may be necessary, if it finds that an emergency situation exists in the industry of farming, due to increasing numbers of farm foreclosures.
- 3. The fund must be administered and supervised by the Bank of North Dakota. The Bank may deduct a service fee for administering the fund from payments received on the fund.

SECTION 8. Interest rates - Repayment - Loan qualification. An interest subsidy may only be approved on the first fifty thousand dollars of principal loaned to the farmer for the

purchase or refinancing of the home-quarter. For the first year after approval of any loan, the board shall subsidize ten percentage points per annum of the interest payments due from the farmer, not to exceed the amount of interest actually charged on the first fifty thousand dollars of principal. For the second and third years of the loan, the board shall subsidize six percentage points per annum of the interest payments due from the farmer, not to exceed the amount of interest actually charged on the first fifty thousand dollars of principal. The amount of any interest payments subsidized by the board must be added to the principal amount of the loan, and the lender shall repay this amount into the fund as it is repaid by the borrower. Loans approved by the board must be amortized and may have terms of up to forty years.

SECTION 9. Home-quarter - Appraised value. The board shall determine the appraised value of home-quarters for the purposes of this Act. In determining appraised value, the board shall receive testimony, from either party, on the value of the home-quarter as a single tract of land.

SECTION 10. If Senate Bill No. 2502 of the forty-ninth legislative assembly does not become effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Rulemaking authority. The board may adopt rules under chapter 28-32 as are necessary to implement this Act.

SECTION 11. If Senate Bill No. 2502, as approved by the forty-ninth legislative assembly, becomes effective, the following section is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

Rulemaking authority. The industrial commission may adopt rules as are necessary to implement this Act and determine the qualifications of applicants as required by this Act.

SECTION 12. EMERGENCY. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and is in effect from and after its passage and approval."
