# ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2049

Introduced by

(North Dakota/South Dakota Commission)

### 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact section 37-17.1-14.5 of the North Dakota Century Code,

- 2 relating to the interstate mutual aid agreement or compact; to amend and reenact sections
- 3 37-17.1-04, 37-17.1-14.2, and 37-17.1-14.3 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to
- 4 interstate mutual aid agreements; to repeal section 37-17.1-14.4 of the North Dakota Century
- 5 Code, relating to the mutual aid agreement or compact; and to declare an emergency.

### 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 37-17.1-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is
amended and reenacted as follows:

9 **37-17.1-04. Definitions.** As used in this chapter:

- 10 "Disaster" means the occurrence of widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss 1. 11 of life or property resulting from any natural or manmade cause including: fire, 12 flood, earthquake, severe high and low temperatures, tornado storm, wave action, 13 oil spill, or other water or air contamination, epidemic, blight, drought, infestation, 14 explosion, riot, or hostile military or paramilitary action, which is determined by the 15 governor to require state or state and federal assistance or actions to supplement 16 the recovery efforts of local governments in alleviating the damage, loss, hardship, 17 or suffering caused thereby.
- "Disaster or emergency worker" means any person performing disaster or
   emergency responsibilities or duties at any place in this state subject to the order
   or control of, or pursuant to a request of, the state government or any political
   subdivision thereof.
- "Emergency" means any situation which that is determined by the governor to
   require state or state and federal response or mitigation actions to immediately

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1		supplement local governments to protect lives and property, to provide for public
2		health and safety, or to avert or lessen the threat of a disaster.
3	4.	"Emergency management" means a comprehensive integrated system at all levels
4		of government and in the private sector which provides for the development and
5		maintenance of an effective capability to mitigate, prepare for, respond to and
6		recover from, known and unforeseen hazards or situations, caused by an act of
7		nature or man, which may threaten, injure, damage, or destroy lives, property, or
8		our environment.
9	<u>5.</u>	"Mass care" means food, clothing, shelter, and other necessary and essential
10		assistance provided to a large number of affected people in response to, or
11		recovery from, a disaster or emergency.
12	SE	CTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 37-17.1-14.2 of the 1995 Supplement to the
13	North Dakc	ta Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
14	37-	17.1-14.2. Interstate mutual aid agreements.
15	1.	This state may enter into an interstate mutual aid agreement or compact with any
16		state that has enacted or shall enact the compact substantially in the form
17		contained in section <del>37-17.1-14.4</del> <u>37-17.1-14.5</u> .
18	2.	The governor may enter into an interstate agreement with any state if the governor
19		finds that joint action with that state is desirable in meeting common
20		intergovernmental problems of emergency or disaster preparedness, mitigation,
21		response, and recovery.
22	3.	The governor may deny the request of a requesting state as the governor
23		determines necessary.
24	4.	All interstate mutual aid compacts and other interstate agreements to which this
25		state is a party dealing with disaster or emergency preparedness, response,
26		recovery, or mitigation must be reviewed and made current every four years.
27	5.	If a person holds a license, certificate, or other permit issued by any state or
28		political subdivision evidencing the meeting of qualifications for professional,
29		mechanical, or other skills, the person may render aid involving that skill in this
30		state to meet an emergency or disaster, and this state shall give due recognition to
31		the license, certificate, or other permit.

1	6.	When considered of mutual benefit, the governor may, subject to the limitations of		
2		law, enter into intergovernmental arrangements with neighboring provinces of		
3		Canada for the purpose of exchanging disaster or emergency resources.		
4	SEC	CTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 37-17.1-14.3 of the 1995 Supplement to the		
5	North Dako	ta Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:		
6	<b>37-</b> 1	17.1-14.3. Authority to join interstate mutual aid agreements - Interstate		
7	compacts.			
8	1.	The governor, in the name of the state, may join with other states in the interstate		
9		mutual aid agreement or compact.		
10	2.	The governor may negotiate and execute such supplemental agreements as may		
11		be necessary and proper to fully carry out the terms and provisions of the		
12		interstate mutual aid agreement or compact as set forth in section 37-17.1-14.4		
13		<u>37-17.1-14.5</u> .		
14	SEC	CTION 4. Section 37-17.1-14.5 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and		
15	enacted as	follows:		
16	<u>37-</u> 1	17.1-14.5. Text of the mutual aid agreement or compact. The interstate mutual		
17	aid agreement or compact referred to in sections 37-17.1-14.2 and 37-17.1-14.3 reads as			
18	follows:			
19		INTERSTATE MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT OR COMPACT		
20		Article I - Purpose and Authorities		
21	<u>This</u>	s compact is made and entered into by and between the participating member states		
22	which enac	t this compact, hereinafter called party states. For the purposes of this agreement,		
23	the term "states" is taken to mean the several states, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the			
24	District of C	columbia, and all United States territorial possessions.		
25	The	purpose of this compact is to provide for mutual assistance between the states		
26	entering inte	o this compact in managing any emergency or disaster that is duly declared by the		
27	governor of	the affected state, whether arising from natural disaster, technological hazard,		
28	manmade o	lisaster, civil emergency aspects of resources shortages, community disorders,		
29	insurgency,	or enemy attack.		
30	This	s compact shall also provide for mutual cooperation in emergency-related exercises,		
31	testing, or c	other training activities using equipment and personnel simulating performance of		

1	any aspect of the giving and receiving of aid by party states or subdivisions of party states		
2	during emergencies, such actions occurring outside actual declared emergency periods.		
3	Mutual assistance in this compact may include the use of the states' national guard forces,		
4	either in accordance with the National Guard Mutual Assistance Compact or by mutual		
5	agreement between states.		
6	Article II - General Implementation		
7	Each party state entering into this compact recognizes many emergencies transcend		
8	political jurisdictional boundaries and that intergovernmental coordination is essential in		
9	managing these and other emergencies under this compact. Each state further recognizes that		
10	there will be emergencies which require immediate access and present procedures to apply		
11	outside resources to make a prompt and effective response to such an emergency. This is		
12	because few, if any, individual states have all the resources they may need in all types of		
13	emergencies or the capability of delivering resources to areas where emergencies exist.		
14	The prompt, full, and effective utilization of resources of the participating states,		
15	including any resources on hand or available from the federal government or any other source	ı	
16	that are essential to the safety, care, and welfare of the people in the event of any emergency		
17	or disaster declared by a party state, shall be the underlying principle on which all articles of		
18	this compact shall be understood.		
19	On behalf of the governor of each state participating in the compact, the legally		
20	designated state official who is assigned responsibility for emergency management will be		
21	responsible for formulation of the appropriate interstate mutual aid plans and procedures		
22	necessary to implement this compact.		
23	Article III - Party State Responsibilities		
24	1. It shall be the responsibility of each party state to formulate procedural plans and		
25	programs for interstate cooperation in the performance of the responsibilities lister	<u>d</u>	
26	in this article. In formulating such plans, and in carrying them out, the party states	3,	
27	insofar as practical, shall:		
28	a. Review individual state hazards analyses and, to the extent reasonably		
29	possible, determine all those potential emergencies the party states might		
30	jointly suffer, whether due to natural disaster, technological hazard, manmad	e	

1			disaster, emergency aspects of resource shortages, civil disorders,
2			insurgency, or enemy attack.
3		<u>b.</u>	Review party states' individual emergency plans and develop a plan which will
4			determine the mechanism for the interstate management and provision of
5			assistance concerning any potential emergency.
6		<u>c.</u>	Develop interstate procedures to fill any identified gaps and to resolve any
7			identified inconsistencies or overlaps in existing or developed plans.
8		<u>d.</u>	Assist in warning communities adjacent to or crossing the state boundaries.
9		<u>e.</u>	Protect and assure uninterrupted delivery of services, medicines, water, food,
10			energy and fuel, search and rescue, and critical lifeline equipment, services,
11			and resources, both human and material.
12		<u>f.</u>	Inventory and set procedures for the interstate loan and delivery of human
13			and material resources, together with procedures for reimbursement or
14			forgiveness.
15		<u>g.</u>	Provide, to the extent authorized by law, for temporary suspension of any
16			statutes or ordinances that restrict the implementation of the above
17			responsibilities.
18	<u>2.</u>	The	e authorized representative of a party state may request assistance of another
19		par	ty state by contacting the authorized representative of that state. The
20		pro	visions of this agreement shall only apply to requests for assistance made by
21		anc	to authorized representatives. Requests may be verbal or in writing. If verbal,
22		<u>the</u>	request shall be confirmed in writing within thirty days of the verbal request.
23		Red	quests shall provide the following information:
24		<u>a.</u>	A description of the emergency service function for which assistance is
25			needed, such as, but not limited to, fire services, law enforcement,
26			emergency medical, transportation, communications, public works and
27			engineering, building inspection, planning and information assistance, mass
28			care, resource support, health and medical services, and search and rescue.
29		<u>b.</u>	The amount and type of personnel, equipment, materials and supplies
30			needed, and a reasonable estimate of the length of time they will be needed.

1		<u>C.</u>	The specific place and time for staging of the assisting party's response and a	
2			point of contact at that location.	
3	<u>3.</u>	<u>The</u>	re shall be frequent consultation between state officials who have assigned	
4		eme	ergency management responsibilities and other appropriate representatives of	
5		<u>the</u>	party states with affected jurisdictions and the United States government, with	
6		free	exchange of information, plans, and resource records relating to emergency	
7		<u>cap</u>	abilities.	
8			Article IV - Limitations	
9	Any	part	y state requested to render mutual aid or conduct exercises and training for	
10	mutual aid	shall	take such action as is necessary to provide and make available the resources	
11	covered by	this o	compact in accordance with the terms hereof; provided that it is understood that	
12	the state rendering aid may withhold resources to the extent necessary to provide reasonable			
13	protection f	or su	ch state.	
14	Each party state shall afford to the emergency forces of any party state, while operating			
15	within its state limits under the terms and conditions of this compact, the same powers (except			
16	that of arrest unless specifically authorized by the receiving state), duties, rights, and privileges			
17	as are afforded forces of the state in which they are performing emergency services.			
18	Emergency forces will continue under the command and control of their regular leaders, but the			
19	organizatio	nal u	nits will come under the operational control of the emergency services	
20	authorities of the state receiving assistance. These conditions may be activated, as needed,			
21	only subsequent to a declaration of a state of emergency or disaster by the governor of the			
22	party state that is to receive assistance or commencement of exercises or training for mutual			
23	aid and shall continue so long as the exercises or training for mutual aid are in progress, the			
24	state of emergency or disaster remains in effect, or loaned resources remain in the receiving			
25	state, which	never	<u>is longer.</u>	
26			Article V - Licenses and Permits	
27	Whe	eneve	er any person holds a license, certificate, or other permit issued by any state	
28	party to the	com	pact evidencing the meeting of qualifications for professional, mechanical, or	
29	other skills,	and	when such assistance is requested by the receiving party state, such person	
30	shall be dee	emed	l licensed, certified, or permitted by the state requesting assistance to render	
31	aid involvin	g suc	ch skill to meet a declared emergency or disaster, subject to such limitations	

1	and conditions as the governor of the requesting state may prescribe by executive order or
2	otherwise.
3	Article VI - Liability
4	Officers or employees of a party state rendering aid in another state pursuant to this
5	compact shall be considered agents of the requesting state for tort liability and immunity
6	purposes; and no party state or its officers or employees rendering aid in another state
7	pursuant to this compact shall be liable on account of any act or omission in good faith on the
8	part of such forces while so engaged or on account of the maintenance or use of any
9	equipment or supplies in connection therewith. Good faith in this article shall not include willful
10	misconduct, gross negligence, or recklessness.
11	Article VII - Supplementary Agreements
12	Inasmuch as it is probable that the pattern and detail of the machinery for mutual aid
13	among two or more states may differ from that among the states that are party hereto, this
14	instrument contains elements of a broad base common to all states, and nothing herein
15	contained shall preclude any state from entering into supplementary agreements with another
16	state or affect any other agreements already in force between states. Supplementary
17	agreements may comprehend, but shall not be limited to, provisions for evacuation and
18	reception of injured and other persons and the exchange of medical, fire, police, public utility,
19	reconnaissance, welfare, transportation and communications personnel, and equipment and
20	supplies.
21	Article VIII - Compensation
22	Each party state shall provide for the payment of compensation and death benefits to
23	injured members of the emergency forces of that state and representatives of deceased
24	members of such forces in case such members sustain injuries or are killed while rendering aid
25	pursuant to this compact, in the same manner and on the same terms as if the injury or death
26	were sustained within their own state.
27	Article IX - Reimbursement
28	Any party state rendering aid in another state pursuant to this compact shall be
29	reimbursed by the party state receiving such aid for any loss or damage to or expenses
30	incurred in the operation of any equipment and the provision of any service in answering a
31	request for aid and for the costs incurred in connection with such requests; provided that any

1	aiding party	state may assume in whole or in part such loss, damage, expense, or other cost, or		
2	may loan such equipment or donate such services to the receiving party state without charge or			
3	cost; and p	rovided further that any two or more party states may enter into supplementary		
4	agreements	s establishing a different allocation of costs among those states. Article VIII		
5	<u>expenses s</u>	hall not be reimbursable under this provision.		
6		Article X - Evacuation		
7	Plar	ns for the orderly evacuation and interstate reception of portions of the civilian		
8	population a	as the result of any emergency or disaster of sufficient proportions to so warrant,		
9	<u>shall be wo</u>	rked out and maintained between the party states and the emergency		
10	management/services directors of the various jurisdictions where any type of incident requiring			
11	evacuations might occur. Such plans shall be put into effect by request of the state from which			
12	evacuees come and shall include the manner of transporting such evacuees, the number of			
13	evacuees to be received in different areas, the manner in which food, clothing, housing, and			
14	medical care will be provided, the registration of the evacuees, the providing of facilities for the			
15	notification	of relatives or friends, and the forwarding of such evacuees to other areas or the		
16	bringing in of additional materials, supplies, and all other relevant factors. Such plans shall			
17	provide that the party state receiving evacuees and the party state from which the evacuees			
18	come shall mutually agree as to reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses incurred in receiving			
19	and caring for such evacuees, for expenditures for transportation, food, clothing, medicines and			
20	medical care, and like items. Such expenditures shall be reimbursed as agreed by the party			
21	state from which the evacuees come. After the termination of the emergency or disaster, the			
22	party state	from which the evacuees come shall assume the responsibility for the ultimate		
23	support of r	epatriation of such evacuees.		
24		Article XI - Implementation		
25	<u>1.</u>	This compact shall become operative immediately upon its enactment into law by		
26		any two states; thereafter, this compact shall become effective as to any other		
27		state upon its enactment by such state.		
28	<u>2.</u>	Any party state may withdraw from this compact by enacting a statute repealing		
29		the same, but no such withdrawal shall take effect until thirty days after the		
30		governor of the withdrawing state has given notice in writing of such withdrawal to		
31		the governors of all other party states. Such action shall not relieve the		

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1		withdrawing state from obligations assumed hereunder prior to the effective date of	
2		withdrawal.	
3	<u>3.</u>	Duly authenticated copies of this compact and of such supplementary agreements	
4		as may be entered into shall, at the time of their approval, be deposited with each	
5		of the party states and with the federal emergency management agency and other	
6		appropriate agencies of the United States government.	
7		Article XII - Validity	
8	This Act shall be construed to effectuate the purposes stated in Article I hereof. If any		
9	provision of this compact is declared unconstitutional, or the applicability thereof to any person		
10	or circumstances is held invalid, the constitutionality of the remainder of this Act and the		
11	applicability thereof to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.		
12	Article XIII - Additional Provisions		
13	Nothing in this compact shall authorize or permit the use of military force by the national		
14	guard of a state at any place outside that state in any emergency for which the president is		
15	authorized by law to call into federal service the militia, or for any purpose for which the use of		
16	the army or the air force would in the absence of express statutory authorization be prohibited		
17	under section 1385 of title 18, United States Code.		
18	SEC	CTION 5. REPEAL. Section 37-17.1-14.4 of the 1995 Supplement to the North	
19	Dakota Cer	ntury Code is repealed.	
20	SEC	CTION 6. EMERGENCY. This Act is declared to be an emergency measure.
