1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 15-40.1 of the North Dakota

2 Century Code, relating to supplemental payments to high school districts; and to amend and

3 reenact sections 15-40.1-06, 15-40.1-07, 15-40.1-08, and 57-15-14 of the North Dakota

4 Century Code, relating to per student payments, the school district equalization factor, and tax

5 levy limitations in school districts.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

7 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-06 of the 1995 Supplement to the North
8 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

9 15-40.1-06. Declaration of legislative intent - Educational support per student -

- 10 School district equalization factor Limitations.
- It is the intent of the legislative assembly, not considering any separate and
 supplemental payments as may be provided by law, to support elementary and
 secondary education in this state from state funds based on the educational cost
 per student. In determining the educational cost per student, the following criteria
 may not be used:
- 16 a. Expenditures for capital outlay for buildings and sites, or debt service.
- b. Expenditures from school activities and school lunch programs.
- 18 c. Expenditures for the cost of transportation, including the cost of schoolbuses.
- 2. a. The educational support per student during the first year of the 1995-97
 20 1997-99 biennium must be one thousand seven nine hundred fifty seven
- 21 <u>forty-six</u> dollars and for the second year of the <u>1997-99</u> biennium the
- 22 educational support per student must be one two thousand eight hundred
- 23 sixty-two forty-seven dollars and is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a
- 24 per student basis as provided in sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08.

1 b. School districts operating high schools not meeting the minimum curriculum 2 as provided in section 15-41-24 or the teacher qualifications in section 3 15-41-25 must be supported in the amount of two hundred twenty dollars, 4 which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as 5 provided in section 15-40.1-07. 6 C. School districts operating high schools that are not accredited pursuant to the 7 accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public instruction on 8 July 1, 1991, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding school year 9 must be supported for the 1991-92 school year or for the first year that they 10 become unaccredited in the amount of the educational support per student 11 established in subdivision a, which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on 12 a per student basis as provided in section 15-40.1-07, but those school 13 districts are not entitled to the amounts resulting from applying the factors in 14 that section. The amount of aid a school district is entitled to under this 15 subsection for each high school that is not accredited must be reduced by two 16 hundred dollars times the number of students in the school for the second 17 school year that the high school is unaccredited, and an additional two 18 hundred dollars per student in the unaccredited school for each additional 19 year the school remains unaccredited. Any high school that becomes 20 accredited is entitled to the per student payments provided for in section 21 15-40.1-07 for the entire school year in which the school becomes accredited. 22 d. School districts operating elementary schools that are not accredited pursuant 23 to the accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public 24 instruction on July 1, 1992, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding 25 school year must be supported for the 1992-93 school year or for the first 26 year that they become unaccredited in the amount of the educational support 27 per student established in subdivision a, which is the basis for calculating 28 grants-in-aid on a per student basis as provided in section 15-40.1-08, except 29 that the amount of aid that a school district is entitled to under this subsection 30 for each elementary school that is unaccredited must be reduced by two 31 hundred dollars times the number of students in the school each year that the

Beginning July 1, 9 1996, the factor is 1.335 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference 10 between 1.335 and the factor representing that which represents the five-year 11 average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 12 superintendent of public instruction.

13 3. For each high school district having one hundred fifty or more, but less than five 14 hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, 15 the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.24 adjusted by fifty 16 eighty percent of the difference between 1.24 and the factor representing the 17 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 18 the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students 19 in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the 20 educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 21 1996 1998, the factor is 1.24 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference 22 between 1.24 and the factor representing that which represents the five-year 23 average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 24 superintendent of public instruction.

4. For each high school district having a total high school enrollment of five hundred
fifty or more students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve,
the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.14 adjusted by fifty
eighty percent of the difference between 1.14 and the factor representing the
five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by
the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students
in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the

1 chapter 15-20.1, and other courses approved by the superintendent of public instruction, 2 earned in another high school district must be included to meet the minimum four required 3 units. In the case of students enrolled in nonpublic schools for graduation or students enrolled 4 in less than four units of standard high school work who are in their fourth year of high school 5 coursework and who are enrolled in approved alternative high school curriculum programs, 6 proportionate payments must be made to the public school district in which the student is 7 enrolled for specific courses. School districts offering high school summer school programs are 8 eligible for proportionate payments provided each course offered satisfies requirements for 9 graduation, comprises at least as many clock hours as courses offered during the regular 10 school term, and complies with rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The 11 superintendent may adopt rules regarding eligibility for school districts to receive proportionate 12 payments for summer education programs. The proportionate payment made under this 13 section during the biennium for high school summer school programs may not exceed one and 14 one-half percent of the total amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for foundation aid 15 and transportation aid during the biennium.

SECTION 3. A new section to chapter 15-40.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
created and enacted as follows:

18 Supplemental payment to high school districts. The superintendent of public 19 instruction shall calculate the average valuation of property per student by dividing the number 20 of students in average daily membership in grades one through twelve in a high school district 21 into the district's latest available net assessed and equalized taxable valuation of property. If 22 the quotient is less than the latest available statewide average taxable valuation per student 23 and if the district's educational expenditure per student is below the most recent available 24 statewide average cost of education per student, the superintendent of public instruction shall: 25 Determine the difference between the latest available statewide average taxable 1. 26 valuation per student and the average valuation per student in the high school 27 district; 28 Multiply the result determined under subsection 1 by the number of students in 2. 29 average daily membership in grades one through twelve in the high school district; 30 3. Multiply the result determined under subsection 2 by the number of general fund

31 mills levied by the district in excess of one hundred fifty, provided that any mills

1	levied by the district which are in excess of two hundred ten may not be used in
2	this calculation; and

<u>4.</u> Multiply the result determined under subsection 3 by thirty percent. The result is
 the supplemental payment to which a high school district is entitled, in addition to
 any other amount provided under chapter 15-40.1.

6 SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-08 of the 1995 Supplement to the North
7 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

8 15-40.1-08. Elementary per student payments - Amount. Payments must be made
9 from state funds to each school district operating an elementary school and to each school
10 district contracting to educate elementary students in a federal school, employing teachers
11 holding valid certificates or permits in accordance with section 15-47-46 and chapter 15-36,
12 adjusted as provided in section 15-40.1-09, as follows:

13 For each one-room rural school, the amount of money resulting from multiplying 1. 14 the factor 1.28 adjusted by fifty eighty percent of the difference between 1.28 and 15 the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this 16 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the 17 number of students in that school in grades one through eight in average daily 18 membership, up to a maximum of sixteen students, times the educational support 19 per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. There must be paid .9 times each 20 additional student in its school in grades one through eight in average daily 21 membership times the educational support per student provided in section 22 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty students in 23 average daily membership. If the one-room rural school is located in a school 24 district with another elementary school, the weighting factor for the students in 25 grades one through six must be based on the average daily membership in the 26 district in grades one through six as provided in subsections 2 through 4. If the 27 one-room rural school is located in a school district with another school that has 28 students in grade seven or eight, the weighting factor for the students in grade 29 seven or eight must be the same as that provided for in subsection 5. Beginning 30 July 1, 1996 1998, the factor is 1.28 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference 31 between 1.28 and that which represents the five-year average cost of education

1 2 per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

3 2. For each elementary school in school districts having under one hundred students 4 in average daily membership in grades one through six, the amount of money 5 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.09 adjusted by fifty eighty percent of the 6 difference between 1.09 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of 7 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 8 public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one 9 through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher, 10 times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except 11 that no payment may be made for more than twenty-five students in average daily 12 membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 1996 1998, 13 the factor is 1.09 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference between 1.09 and 14 that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this 15 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

16 3. For each elementary school in school districts having one hundred or more 17 students in average daily membership in grades one through six, and provided the 18 districts in which such schools are located have an average daily membership of 19 less than one thousand elementary students in grades one through six, the amount 20 of money resulting from multiplying the factor .905 adjusted by fifty eighty percent 21 of the difference between .905 and the factor representing the five-year average 22 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 23 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in 24 grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 25 teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, 26 except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in average 27 daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 1996 28 1998, the factor is .905 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference between 29 .905 and that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student 30 for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

1 4. For each elementary school in school districts having an average daily 2 membership of one thousand or more elementary students in grades one through 3 six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .95 adjusted by fifty 4 eighty percent of the difference between .95 and the factor representing the 5 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 6 the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that 7 school in grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom 8 or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 9 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in 10 average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning 11 July 1, 1996 1998, the factor is .95 adjusted by sixty five percent of the difference 12 between .95 and that which represents the five-year average cost of education per 13 student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. 14 For each of the above classes of elementary schools, except for one-room rural 5. 15 schools that are not located in a district with another school having students in 16 grade seven or eight, there must be paid to each school the amount of money 17 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by fifty eighty percent of the 18 difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of 19 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 20 public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades seven and 21 eight in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the 22 educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no 23 payment may be made for more than thirty students in average daily membership 24 in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 1996 1998, the factor is 25 1.01 adjusted by sixty-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and that which 26 represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as 27 determined by the superintendent of public instruction. 28 For each elementary school having students under the compulsory age for school 6.

attendance, but not less than three years of age, in a special education program
 approved by the director of special education, the amount of money resulting from
 multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by fifty eighty percent of the difference

1 between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education 2 per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public 3 instruction, times the number of special education students in that school under the 4 compulsory age for school attendance in average daily membership in each 5 classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided 6 in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 1996 1998, the factor is 1.01 adjusted by 7 sixty five percent of the difference between 1.01 and that which represents the 8 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 9 the superintendent of public instruction.

10 7. For each elementary school providing a kindergarten that is established according 11 to provisions of section 15-45-01, the amount of money resulting from multiplying 12 the factor .50 adjusted by fifty eighty percent of the difference between .50 and the 13 factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this 14 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the 15 number of students in that school in average daily membership in each classroom 16 or for each teacher times the educational support per student, as provided under 17 section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than 18 twenty-five students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 19 teacher. The full per student payment may be made only to those kindergarten 20 programs providing the equivalent of ninety full days of classroom instruction 21 during any twelve-month period. Programs providing shorter periods of instruction 22 during the same time period must receive a proportionately smaller per student 23 payment. Beginning July 1, 1996 1998, the factor is .50 adjusted by sixty five 24 percent of the difference between .50 and that which represents the five-year 25 average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 26 superintendent of public instruction.

The superintendent of public instruction shall make proportionate payments to each public school district educating students who are also enrolled in nonpublic schools.

Every school district must receive at least as much in total payments for elementary students as it would have received if it had the highest number of students in the next lower category.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 57-15-14 of the 1995 Supplement to the North
 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

57-15-14. Tax levy limitations in school districts. The aggregate amount levied
each year for the purposes listed in section 57-15-14.2 by any school district, except the Fargo
school district, may not exceed the amount in dollars which the school district levied for the
prior school year plus eighteen percent up to a general fund levy of one hundred eighty-five
<u>ninety-two</u> mills on the dollar of the taxable valuation of the district, except that:

- In any school district having a total population in excess of four thousand
 according to the last federal decennial census:
- 10a.There may be levied any specific number of mills that upon resolution of the11school board has been submitted to and approved by a majority of the12qualified electors voting upon the question at any regular or special school13district election.
- b. There is no limitation upon the taxes which may be levied if upon resolution of
 the school board of any such district the removal of the mill levy limitation has
 been submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified electors voting
 at any regular or special election upon such question.
- 18
 2. In any school district having a total population of less than four thousand, there
 19 may be levied any specific number of mills that upon resolution of the school board
 20 has been approved by fifty-five percent of the qualified electors voting upon the
 21 question at any regular or special school election.
- 22 3. In any school district in which the total assessed valuation of property has 23 increased twenty percent or more over the prior year and in which as a result of 24 that increase the school district is entitled to less in state foundation aid payments 25 provided in sections 15-40.1-06 through 15-40.1-08 because of the deduction 26 required in subsection 3 of section 15-40.1-06, there may be levied any specific 27 number of mills more in dollars than was levied in the prior year up to a general 28 fund levy of one hundred eighty five ninety-two mills on the dollar of the taxable 29 valuation of the school district. The additional levy authorized by this subsection 30 may be levied for not more than two years because of any twenty percent or 31 greater annual increase in assessed valuation. The total amount of revenue

1 generated in excess of the eighteen percent increase which is otherwise permitted 2 by this section may not exceed the amount of state aid payments lost as a result of 3 applying the deduction provided in subsection 3 of section 15-40.1-06 to the 4 increased assessed valuation of the school district in a one-year period. 5 The guestion of authorizing or discontinuing such specific number of mills authority or unlimited 6 taxing authority in any school district must be submitted to the gualified electors at the next 7 regular election upon resolution of the school board or upon the filing with the school board of a 8 petition containing the signatures of qualified electors of the district equal in number to twenty 9 percent of the number of persons enumerated in the school census for that district for the most 10 recent year such census was taken, unless such census is greater than four thousand in which 11 case only fifteen percent of the number of persons enumerated in the school census is 12 required. However, not fewer than twenty-five signatures are required unless the district has 13 fewer than twenty-five qualified electors, in which case the petition must be signed by not less 14 than twenty-five percent of the qualified electors of the district. In those districts with fewer than 15 twenty-five qualified electors, the number of qualified electors in the district must be determined 16 by the county superintendent for such county in which such school is located. However, the 17 approval of discontinuing either such authority does not affect the tax levy in the calendar year 18 in which the election is held. The election must be held in the same manner and subject to the 19 same conditions as provided in this section for the first election upon the question of authorizing 20 the mill levy.
