- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 23-12 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to a prohibition on the use of public and health insurance funds for
- 3 assisting in the commission of a suicide; and to provide an effective date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 5 **SECTION 1.** A new section to chapter 23-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is 6 created and enacted as follows:
- 7 Suicide and euthanasia Use of public and health insurance funds prohibited. No
- 8 funds of this state or any agency or political subdivision of the state and no federal funds
- 9 passing through the state treasury or a state agency may be used to provide, procure, furnish,
- 10 fund, or support, or to compel any person to provide, procure, furnish, fund, or support, any
- 11 item, good, benefit, program, or service, the purpose of which is to cause, or to assist in
- 12 causing, the suicide, euthanasia, or mercy killing of any individual. No health insurance
- 13 provider that issues policies or contracts, collects premiums, or makes payments in the state
- 14 may offer, provide coverage, or pay for any services that are intended to or result in the
- 15 unnatural termination of human life.
- 16 **SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE.** If the United States supreme court declares the law
- 17 of another state which is substantially similar to sections 12.1-16-04, 12.1-16-05, and
- 18 12.1-16-06 unconstitutional, the attorney general shall certify that fact to the governor and the
- 19 legislative council. Section 1 of this Act is effective upon certification by the attorney general to
- the governor and the legislative council that sections 12.1-16-04, 12.1-16-05, and 12.1-16-06
- 21 are substantially similar to a law of another state which has been declared to be
- 22 unconstitutional by the United States supreme court.
