HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3025

A concurrent resolution urging Congress to take steps to devolve the unemployment 1 2 compensation program back to the states. 3 WHEREAS, the unemployment compensation system was created with the dual goals 4 of helping to reduce economic hardship for unemployed workers and stabilizing the economy 5 during recessions; and 6 WHEREAS, to accomplish these goals, the unemployment compensation system 7 consists of unemployment insurance and a system of Job Service offices; and 8 WHEREAS, the unemployment compensation system is funded by a two-tiered system 9 of taxation with a state payroll tax averaging about .9 percent of total wages and a federal 10 payroll tax known as the Federal Unemployment Tax Act tax that is .6 percent of the first \$7,000 11 of wages, with a surtax of .2 percent; and 12 WHEREAS, the surtax was first implemented in 1977 to restore solvency and integrity 13 to the unemployment compensation system; and 14 WHEREAS, Congress has extended the surtax four times since 1987 despite the fact 15 the unemployment compensation system has generated large surpluses each year; and 16 WHEREAS, the surtax alone generated approximately \$1,400,000,000 in 1995 and is 17 due to expire in 1998; and 18 WHEREAS, Congress and the administration have shown signs of making the 19 temporary surtax indefinite; and 20 WHEREAS, the administration has budgeted to extend the surtax at least through the 21 year 2006; and 22 WHEREAS, the Congressional Budget Office has estimated if the .2 percent surtax is 23 eliminated, the savings to business would stimulate added job growth, resulting in increased tax 24 revenues of almost \$900,000,000 between 1996 and 2000; and

1	WHEREAS, of the payroll tax revenue collected through the unemployment
2	compensation system and maintained by the federal government, the federal government
3	maintains 53 separate accounts for state payroll taxes and three separate accounts for Federal
4	Unemployment Tax Act taxes; and
5	WHEREAS, 80 percent of the tax is supposed to be returned to the states to administer
6	the unemployment compensation program and 20 percent is dedicated to the extended benefits
7	account designed to provide long-term benefits in case of severe economic hardships, and
8	once these accounts reach their statutory ceiling the money is placed into the loan account for
9	loans to state unemployment compensation systems in financial trouble; and
10	WHEREAS, the accounts maintained by the federal government have accumulated
11	large surpluses that are being used to offset the federal deficit rather than return unemployed
12	workers to work; and
13	WHEREAS, at the end of fiscal year 1995, state accounts had balances totaling
14	\$35,900,000,000 and the three federal accounts had balances totaling \$11,900,000,000; and
15	WHEREAS, states only receive an average of 60 percent of the money from the federal
16	government that is supposed to be dedicated to funding the administration of the
17	unemployment compensation system and the other 40 percent is consumed by federal activities
18	including demonstration programs and federal bureaucracy; and
19	WHEREAS, filing reports complying with the unemployment compensation system's
20	dual taxation system costs employers almost \$500,000,000 a year; and
21	WHEREAS, if states were allowed to fully administer their own unemployment
22	compensation systems, duration of unemployment could be decreased, payroll taxes could be
23	decreased, and employment could be significantly increased;
24	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
25	OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:
26	That the Fifty-fifth Legislative Assembly urges the Congress of the United States to take
27	steps to devolve the unemployment compensation program back to the states in order to
28	maintain integrity in the system and accomplish the goals the unemployment compensation
29	system was designed to achieve; and
30	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of State send a copy of this resolution
31	to each member of Congress.
