ENGROSSED SENATE CONCURRENT  
RESOLUTION NO. 4030

1 A concurrent resolution directing the Legislative Council to study the issues of welfare reform  
2 as they relate to the relationship between the state and the federally recognized Indian tribes  
3 within the state.

4 **WHEREAS**, Congress has enacted Public Law 104-193, which substantially reforms  
5 the welfare system and which includes block grants to the states and to federally recognized  
6 Indian tribes, if the tribes so choose, along with strict work requirements for recipients of public  
7 assistance and time limits for recipients of public assistance; and

8 **WHEREAS**, members of federally recognized Indian tribes represent less than six  
9 percent of the population of the state; however, approximately 25 percent of the welfare  
10 caseload of the state is tribal members who live on reservations; and

11 **WHEREAS**, tribal economies have not been as strong as the economy of the remainder  
12 of the state which will make compliance with the work participation rate requirements of the  
13 welfare reform legislation more difficult to achieve on the reservations; and

14 **WHEREAS**, the federally recognized tribes in the state are undecided as to whether to  
15 apply for state and federal block grants that would allow the tribes to design and administer  
16 their own welfare system; and

17 **WHEREAS**, the federally recognized tribes in the state are unsure as to the role the  
18 state should play, if any, in the development, funding, and administration of a tribally  
19 administered welfare program; and

20 **WHEREAS**, the federally recognized tribes in the state desire to engage in constructive  
21 dialogue with the state regarding welfare reform issues of mutual concern;

22 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF NORTH DAKOTA,**  
23 **THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:**

24 That the Legislative Council study the issues of welfare reform as they relate to the  
25 relationship between the state and the federally recognized Indian tribes within the state; and

- 1           **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Legislative Council, in conducting its study, shall  
2   solicit input from tribal members, tribal leaders, and tribal government officials interested in  
3   state and tribal welfare reform issues; and  
4           **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Legislative Council report its findings and  
5   recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to  
6   the Fifty-sixth Legislative Assembly.
