The term of office of the appointed members is three years, ~~except that of the original appointees, three shall serve one year, three shall serve two years, and two shall serve three years, which appointees to be determined by lot.~~ At all times either the school board member or the school administrator must be from a school with an enrollment of less than five hundred students.

The ~~two citizen members, the school board member, the school administrator, and the schoolteacher~~ appointed by the governor must be reimbursed for actual necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as members of the council at the same rates as provided by law for other state officers and employees. The costs incurred in reimbursing the ~~two citizen~~ members of the council for their actual necessary expenses must be paid by the ~~superintendent of public instruction~~ legislative council. The other members of the council are not entitled to any compensation or reimbursement for expenses incurred in performing their duties. ~~The superintendent of public instruction shall call the initial meeting of the council at which time the council shall elect its chairman and other officers and take such other action as it deems appropriate.~~

It is the intent of the fifty-fifth legislative assembly that the funds appropriated in section 19 of this Act for grants to the Center for Innovation in Instruction and the SENDIT network be distributed by the educational telecommunications council to support teacher and school staff training in educational technology through the Center for Innovation in Instruction and to support the electronic connectivity and networking of schools through the SENDIT network.

SECTION 16. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - MYRDAL FUND FOR TECHNOLOGY IN CURRICULUM AND STAFF DEVELOPMENT. It is the intent of the fifty-fifth legislative assembly that the funds appropriated in section 19 of this Act for the Myrdal fund for technology in curriculum and staff development be used for grants to school districts to encourage the integration of technology into school curriculum and to support staff development programs relating to the use of technology. The Myrdal fund for technology in curriculum and staff development board of directors, as provided in House Bill No. 1476 as approved by the fifty-fifth legislative assembly, shall distribute any moneys in the Myrdal fund for technology in curriculum and staff development in cooperation with the educational telecommunications council, to avoid duplication in the distribution of grant funds for educational technology projects.

SECTION 17. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - PRAIRIE PUBLIC BROADCASTING - MATCHING GRANTS. It is the intent of the fifty-fifth legislative assembly that prairie public broadcasting receive grants from the educational telecommunications council. The grants are to be distributed four times each year, in July, October, January, and April. The grants must be fifty cents for each dollar raised by prairie public broadcasting during the three-month period ending in the month immediately preceding the month in which the grants must be distributed. In determining the amount of the grant, revenue from the following sources must be considered: membership contributions for prairie public television and prairie public radio from North Dakota residents, program underwriting contributions raised from organizations doing business in North Dakota, and fees received for the prairie on-line program. Grants may not exceed \$475,000 during any state fiscal year. If, as of June thirtieth of any year, the amount of grants distributed during the preceding twelve months is less than \$475,000, the undistributed amount available for that fiscal year must be deposited in the state general fund.

SECTION 18. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - TECHNOLOGY REIMBURSEMENT PAYMENTS. It is the intent of the fifty-fifth legislative assembly that the funds appropriated in section 19 of this Act for technology reimbursement payments be used for reimbursing school districts for technology-related expenditures. The educational telecommunications council shall determine the maximum amount to which each school district is entitled by dividing the number of elementary and secondary students in average daily membership in this state into the funds appropriated in section 19 of this Act for technology reimbursement payments and then multiplying the result by the number of students in average daily membership in each district. Upon receiving substantiating documentation from a school district indicating the expenditure of funds on or after July 1, 1996, for the acquisition of computer technology for student uses or instructional purposes, interactive television, or teacher inservice programs related to the use of computer technology in classroom instruction, the educational telecommunications council shall provide reimbursement to the school district in an amount equal to that expended but not exceeding that to which the school district is entitled.

SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from other income, to the educational telecommunications council for grants for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999, as follows:

DEPARTMENT 160 - LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

HOUSE - This amendment changes the membership of the Educational Telecommunications Council to include the director of the Legislative Council's Information Technology Management Division and requires that the Educational Telecommunications Council perform its duties in cooperation with the Information Technology Management Division. This amendment requires that reimbursement for members of the Educational Telecommunications Council be paid by the Legislative Council. This amendment changes the powers and duties of the Educational Telecommunications Council to reflect an emphasis on developing statewide educational technology systems.

This amendment provides legislative intent regarding grants for the Center for Innovation in Instruction, the SENDIT network, the Myrdal fund for technology in curriculum and staff development, Prairie Public Broadcasting, and technology reimbursement payments.

This amendment also appropriates \$8,223,250 (\$8,027,250 general fund, \$196,000 other funds) to the Educational Telecommunications Council for grants. Of this amount \$1 million is for grants to be distributed as determined by the Educational Telecommunications Council.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a portion of sales, use, and motor vehicle excise tax collections equal to ~~sixty~~ forty percent of an amount determined by multiplying the quotient of one percent divided by the general sales tax rate, that was in effect when the taxes were collected, times the net sales, use, and motor vehicle excise tax collections under chapters 57-39.2, 57-40.2, and 57-40.3 must be deposited by the state treasurer in the state aid distribution fund. The state tax commissioner shall certify to the state treasurer the portion of sales, use, and motor vehicle excise tax net revenues that must be deposited in the state aid distribution fund as determined under this section. The Revenues deposited in the state aid distribution fund are provided as a standing and continuing appropriation and must be allocated, subject to legislative appropriation, as follows:

1. Fifty percent of the revenues must be allocated in the first month subsequent to each quarterly period for state revenue sharing as provided in sections 54-27-20.2 and 54-27-20.3. Fifty-three and seven-tenths percent of the revenues must be allocated to counties in the first month after each quarterly period as provided in this subsection.

- a. Ten and four-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of one hundred thousand or more, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- b. Eighteen percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of forty thousand or more but fewer than one hundred thousand, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- c. Twelve percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of twenty thousand or more but fewer than forty thousand, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- d. Fourteen percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of ten thousand or more but fewer than twenty thousand, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- e. Twenty-three and two-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of five thousand or more but fewer than ten thousand, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- f. Eighteen and three-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of two thousand five hundred or more but fewer than five thousand, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.
- g. Four and one-tenth percent of the amount must be allocated among counties with a population of fewer than two thousand five hundred, based upon the proportion each such county's population bears to the total population of all such counties.

A county shall deposit all revenues received under this subsection in the county general fund. Each county shall reserve a portion of its allocation under this subsection for further distribution to, or expenditure on behalf of, townships, rural fire protection districts, rural ambulance districts, soil conservation districts, county recreation service districts, county hospital districts, the Garrison diversion conservancy district, the southwest water authority, and other taxing districts within the county, excluding school districts, cities, and taxing districts within cities. The share of the county allocation under this subsection to be distributed to a township must be equal to the percentage of the county share of state aid distribution fund allocations that township received during calendar year 1996. The governing boards of the county and township may agree to a different distribution.

- 2. Fifty percent of the revenues must be allocated for personal property tax replacement as provided in section 57-58-01. Forty-six and three-tenths percent of the revenues must be allocated to cities in the first month after each quarterly period as provided in this subsection.
 - a. Fifty-three and nine-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of twenty thousand or more, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.
 - b. Sixteen percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of ten thousand or more but fewer than twenty thousand, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.
 - c. Four and nine-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of five thousand or more but fewer than ten thousand, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.

- d. Thirteen and one-tenth percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of one thousand or more but fewer than five thousand, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.
- e. Six and four-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of five hundred or more but fewer than one thousand, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.
- f. Three and five-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of two hundred or more but fewer than five hundred, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.
- g. Two and two-tenths percent of the amount must be allocated among cities with a population of fewer than two hundred, based upon the proportion each such city's population bears to the total population of all such cities.

A city shall deposit all revenues received under this subsection in the city general fund. Each city shall reserve a portion of its allocation under this subsection for further distribution to, or expenditure on behalf of, park districts and other taxing districts within the city, excluding school districts. The share of the city allocation under this subsection to be distributed to a park district must be equal to the percentage of the city share of state aid distribution fund allocations that park district received during calendar year 1996, up to a maximum of thirty percent. The governing boards of the city and park district may agree to a different distribution.

SECTION 3. REPEAL. Sections 54-27-20.2 and 54-27-20.3 and chapter 57-58 of the North Dakota Century Code are repealed.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. Sections 2 and 3 of this Act are effective on January 1, 1999."

DEPARTMENT 85 - PAYMENTS TO POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS

HOUSE - This amendment reduces the amount of funding deposited in the state aid distribution fund from an amount equal to 60 percent of one percent of the net sales, use, and motor vehicle excise tax collections to an amount equal to 40 percent of one percent of the net sales, use, and motor vehicle excise tax collections. In addition the amendment provides that revenues deposited in the state aid distribution fund are appropriated as a continuing appropriation. This change becomes effective January 1, 1999.

As required by section 18 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 2015, the fifty-fifth legislative assembly specifically provides state radio communications with the authority to expand its 911 services beyond the twenty-county limit set by the fifty-fourth legislative assembly. The authority to add Golden Valley county to its 911 service begins with the effective date of this Act and ends on June 30, 1999. State radio communications is then limited to providing 911 services to the counties being served as of June 30, 1999.

SECTION 12. FEDERAL PROGRAM TERMINATIONS - BLOCK GRANT - FUNDING REDUCTIONS - RELATED PROGRAM REDUCTIONS - REPORTS TO THE BUDGET SECTION. If the federal government during the 1997-99 biennium terminates funding for any program administered by an agency, department, or institution of the state of North Dakota, the agency, department, or institution, subject to budget section approval, may terminate the program and not replace the reduction in federal funds with state funds, notwithstanding any other provision of law. If the federal government combines funding for separate programs in a block grant resulting in a reduction of total federal funds available for those programs, the administering agency, department, or institution may, subject to budget section approval, prioritize or reprioritize programs as necessary in making programmatic reductions. The agency, department, or institution may administer funds available under a new federal block grant or similar measure, consistent with the terms of that measure, notwithstanding any other provisions of law intended to conform to or implement the provisions of the repealed federal Act, and shall report any program terminations, reductions, or changes resulting from this section to the budget section of the legislative council for its approval.

SECTION 13. RISK MANAGEMENT. The North Dakota insurance reserve fund shall transfer \$5,000,000 of excess equity investment in the North Dakota insurance reserve fund to the office of management and budget on July 1, 1997. This transfer represents final settlement with the North Dakota insurance reserve fund for any claim by the state to any funds held in reserve by the North Dakota insurance reserve fund for claims pending before July 1, 1997.

The recovery of the \$5,000,000, together with current reserves in the risk management fund, are considered sufficient reserves for claims anticipated in the 1997-99 biennium. Therefore, the following amounts shall be deducted from the budgets for risk management premiums as indicated:

SECTION 14. TRANSFER. The director of the office of management and budget shall transfer \$550,000, or an amount equal to the 1997-99 biennium costs relating to the information technology management division of the legislative council, whichever is less, from the information services operating fund to the general fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The transfer is to reimburse the general fund for costs relating to information technology research, planning, monitoring, reviewing, and auditing and for assistance provided to agencies by the information technology management division of the legislative council.

SECTION 15. INTENT - LEGISLATIVE RENOVATIONS. It is the intent of the fifty-fifth legislative assembly that the facility management division of the office of management and budget convert, during the 1997-99 biennium, the house of

representatives lounge into a house committee room. The house conference room is then to be renovated and used to provide space and three telephone lines for the doctor of the day.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT. Section 32-12.2-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

32-12.2-06. (~~Contingent expiration date — see Note~~) Liability insurance - Reinsurance. Upon approval of the director of the office of management and budget, an entity of the state may participate in a government self-insurance pool or may purchase insurance against liability of the entity and its employees for damages resulting from claims under this chapter. The director shall limit participation in government self-insurance pools and, except as provided in this section, the purchase of insurance to exposures determined to cause an excessive financial risk to the state risk management fund including exposures reasonably expected to deplete the fund and have a significant detrimental impact on the state's budget. The director shall develop a state self-insurance program that provides as much coverage as possible of potential liability recognized by this chapter, but that includes supplemental insurance purchases in a manner that is determined appropriate by the director in consultation with the state risk manager. The insurance may be provided by an insurance company authorized to do business in this state which the commissioner of insurance has determined to be responsible and financially sound, considering the extent of the coverage required, or coverage may be provided by a government self-insurance pool. If a premium savings will result and the director of the office of management and budget approves, the insurance policy or memorandum of coverage may be in force from one through three years from the date of issue. The director may procure an excess loss reinsurance contract for the state."

The \$200,000 is to be used to establish a balance in the preliminary planning revolving loan fund, as recommended by the Budget Section. Pursuant to North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) Section 54-44.1-07, the Budget Section requested that the Office of Management and Budget include in the executive Budget presented to the 1997 Legislative Assembly money to be used for the preliminary planning revolving loan fund which is established by NDCC Section 54-27-22. The fund was originally established by the 1975 Legislative Assembly to be used for the prepayment of consultant and planning fees for capital improvement projects. The purpose of the fund is to assist agencies in preparing more accurate cost estimates for proposed capital projects.

This amendment also adds new Sections 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 as follows:

Section 12 provides that if federal funding for a program is terminated during the 1997-99 biennium, the administering state agency, department, or institution shall terminate the program. It also provides that if the federal government reduces federal funding by combining the funding for separate programs into a block grant, the agency, department, or institution shall prioritize or reprioritize programs as necessary.

Section 13 provides for a transfer from the North Dakota insurance reserve fund of \$5,000,000 of excess equity investment in the North Dakota insurance reserve fund to the Office of Management and Budget.

Section 14 provides for a transfer equal to the costs associated with the Legislative Council's Information Technology Management Division up to \$550,000 from the Information Services Division's operating fund to the general fund during the 1997-99 biennium. The amount is a portion of the estimated revenue that will be generated as a result of increasing the Information Services Division's overhead rate by two percent from 2.9 percent to 4.9 percent for the 1997-99 biennium. Funding for the increase has been included in agency budget requests and the increase is based on the recommendations of Wolfe and Associates, Inc., to provide funding for planning, reviewing, and for research and development costs. These functions were originally included in the Information Services Division but are now being transferred to the Legislative Council and provided a general fund appropriation.

Section 15 provides legislative intent regarding legislative renovations.

Section 16 amends Section 32-12.2-06 relating to the state risk management fund. The change directs the director of the Office of Management and Budget to develop a state self-insurance program.

Any amount remaining in the line item must be distributed on a per student basis as required by section 15-40.1-07.6, except that during each of the school years of the biennium a school district or special education unit may not receive less than ninety percent of the amount received during the 1993-94 school year from state special education funds, excluding reimbursements for student contracts, boarding care, and gifted and talented programs. State special education payments distributed as required by section 15-40.1-07.6 must be reduced by the amount of matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for students participating in the medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the amount of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special education unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the department of human services on behalf of the district or unit.

SECTION 5. GOALS 2000 - PARTICIPATION VOLUNTARY. The school board of any school district may, on behalf of the district it represents, choose to participate or not to participate in Goals 2000 Educate America Act, Public Law No. 103-227 [108 Stat. 125; 20 U.S.C. 5801 et seq.]. Any school board that chooses to participate and directly or indirectly receives federal funds for its participation shall expend such funds in the manner it determines best meets the goal of educational enhancement in the school district. The superintendent of public instruction may not impose any financial penalty or other sanction on a school or school district if the school board chooses, at any time, to terminate participation in goals 2000."

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

DEPARTMENT 201 - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

HOUSE - This amendment reduces salaries and wages for three FTE positions, adds operating expenses for additional federal funds anticipated to be available, adds a special line item for Goals 2000, and increases other grants for additional federal funds anticipated to be available.

This amendment removes funding for the Educational Telecommunications Council, the Center for Innovation in Instruction, the SENDIT computer network, Prairie Public Broadcasting, and the Myrdal fund for excellence. Funding for these programs was included in House Bill No. 1034.

This amendment eliminates the \$20 million line item for equity payments and increases the grants - foundation aid and transportation line item by \$18.9 million. This amendment also increases the grants - revenue supplement payments line item by \$875,000. House Bill No. 1393, as amended by House Appropriations, provides per student payments of \$1,959 and \$2,061, mill deducts of 33 mills and 34 mills, and a formula for distribution of \$3.1 million of

revenue supplement payments. These payments correspond to the funding level provided in this bill.

This amendment adds legislative intent relating to the distribution of special education funds and provides that school district participation in the Goals 2000 program is voluntary.

The funds appropriated in the supplemental fund for the mental health services line item in section 1 of this Act may be allocated by the department of human services, subject

to budget section approval, to the human services centers and state hospital to address costs associated with deinstitutionalization, caseload increases, patient stays, or other unanticipated costs associated with serving persons with a mental illness, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The department of human services shall inform the budget section of requests for funding that the department does not recommend to the budget section for approval.

SECTION 7. SUPPLEMENTAL FUND FOR DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES SERVICES. The funds appropriated in the supplemental fund for developmental disabilities services line item in section 1 of this Act may be allocated by the department of human services, subject to budget section approval, to the human service centers and developmental center to address costs associated with deinstitutionalization, caseload increases, patient stays, or other unanticipated costs associated with serving persons with a developmental disability, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The department of human services shall inform the budget section of requests for funding that the department does not recommend to the budget section for approval.

SECTION 8. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - HUMAN SERVICE CENTER SERVICES. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that while the legislative assembly is allowing the human service centers more funding flexibility during the 1997-99 biennium, the human service centers are expected to:

1. Continue to utilize standards, guidelines, and practices in effect on March 1, 1997, for providing human services pursuant to provisions of subsection 2 of section 50-06-05.3.
2. Continue to strive toward improving the quality of services and monitor and strive to achieve successful client outcomes.
3. Maximize available federal or other funds to provide essential services and for service enhancements.
4. Provide appropriate community services to continue the trend of fewer state hospital and developmental center admissions in order to serve clients, to the extent possible, in a least restrictive environment.
5. Utilize innovative and effective methods of service delivery in order to achieve cost savings to reallocate for performance incentives and to enhance the level of services provided to clients.

SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT EMPLOYEES - EMERGENCY COMMISSION APPROVAL. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the emergency commission approve requests submitted by a human service center, the state hospital, or the developmental center for authorization to hire additional full-time equivalent positions that are associated with an approved request for funding from the supplemental fund for mental health services or the supplemental fund for developmental disabilities services during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999.

SECTION 10. HUMAN SERVICE CENTER SERVICE COSTS - REIMBURSEMENT SYSTEM. Each regional human service center shall report its services provided during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999, on a cost per service basis in a form designated by the executive director of the department of human services. The department shall analyze the data collected and develop, for the 1999-2001 biennium, a standardized reimbursement system for the human service centers based on service costs and any supplemental payment costs to be incorporated into the department's 1999-2001 biennium budget request.

SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - EMPLOYEE BONUSES. Notwithstanding section 54-14-03.1, the regional human service centers, state hospital, and developmental center may provide bonus payments to their employees during August 1999, of up to three percent of an employee's base salary from any realized savings resulting from program efficiencies accumulated during the 1997-99 biennium, excluding any supplemental funds for mental health or developmental disabilities services received. A bonus payment may not increase an employee's salary level for which funding request calculations for the 1999-2001 biennium will be based.

SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL AND REPORT. The general fund appropriations contained in subdivision 4 of section 1 and the welfare

reform contingency line item in subdivision 2 of this Act are not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. The welfare reform contingency may only be spent with prior budget section approval. Any unexpended funds from these appropriations are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001. The department of human services shall report to the budget section of the legislative council on the status of these appropriations at its fall 1999 meeting.

SECTION 13. A new subsection to section 50-06-05.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

To set the salary of the center director and approve the employee compensation plan. The department of human services shall develop procedures that provide for a transition to regional center governing boards to be established on July 1, 1998.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-05.5 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

50-06-05.5. Director of regional center - Medical director. Each regional human service center must be headed by a regional director appointed by the executive director of the department in consultation with the regional human service council. The regional director ~~must be accountable to~~ position is not a classified position and the director must serve at the pleasure of the executive director. Each regional director shall have the authority to employ the staff necessary to discharge the center's responsibilities. The regional director shall also have authority, subject to the approval of the executive director of the department and within the limit of legislative appropriations, to make contractual arrangements with public or private agencies or with individuals and organizations to discharge the regional human service center's service delivery responsibilities. The staff of each regional human service center shall include a qualified medical professional who must be designated as the medical director of the center. The medical director must be primarily responsible for coordinating mental health and medically related services. The medical director's position may be part time or full time as determined appropriate by the regional director, with the concurrence of the executive director. At the discretion of the executive director, the regional director of a center, if qualified therefor, could also be appointed medical director of that center. As used in this section, "qualified medical professional" means an individual possessing a degree of doctor of psychiatry, when such an individual can be employed, and when this is not possible, an individual possessing at least a medical degree."

Page 4, after line 29, insert:

"SECTION 16. Section 50-06-14.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

50-06-14.4. Alzheimer's and related dementia projects. The department of human services shall establish projects containing up to ten beds designed to meet the service needs of the alzheimer's and related dementia population. The projects established under this section must explore the financial and service viability of converting existing nursing facility or basic care capacity to a specific service environment that targets the alzheimer's and related dementia population. The state department of health shall cooperate with the department to ensure the success of the projects. The projects may be established notwithstanding subsections 2, 5, 10, and 11 and subdivision c of subsection 9 of section 50-24.5-01, relating to definitions for aid to aged, blind, and disabled persons, and subsection 1 of section 23-09.3-01, relating to the definition of a basic care facility.

SECTION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 50-24.1-02.2 of the 1995 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

50-24.1-02.2. Community spouse resource allowance. In determining eligibility for medical assistance applicants and recipients, the department of human services shall establish a community spouse resource allowance equal to the maximum community spouse resource allowance as provided by 42 U.S.C. 1396r-5(f)(2). This section applies to a community spouse of an institutionalized spouse. For purposes of this section, "institutionalized spouse" includes an individual who is described in 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(10)(A)(ii)(VI).

SECTION 18. AMENDMENT. The new section to chapter 23-16 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by section 3 of chapter 254 of the 1995 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

Moratorium on expansion of long-term care bed capacity. Notwithstanding sections 23-16-06 and 23-16-10, ~~during the period after July 31, 1995, and before August 1, 1997 except when existing beds are converted for use by the alzheimer's and related dementia population under the projects provided for in section 50-06-14.4, the state department of health and consolidated laboratories may not issue a license for any additional bed capacity unless the expanded bed capacity was approved by the health council under chapter 23-17.2 before August 1, 1995 above the state's gross capacity of seven thousand one hundred twenty-four beds during the period between August 1, 1997, and July 31, 1999.~~

SECTION 19. TRANSFER OF LAND AUTHORIZED.

1. The department of human services may sell to the department of corrections and rehabilitation the forensic unit building, the ET building and adjacent gymnasium, and surrounding real property.
2. The authorized sale is exempt from sections 54-01-05.2 and 54-01-05.5.

SECTION 20. EXEMPTION FROM BIDDING REQUIREMENTS. Notwithstanding any other provision of law relating to public contracts or bidding requirements, the department of human services may contract and expend funds for the renovation of the state hospital to accommodate patients as a result of any sale of the property described in section 16 of this Act.

SECTION 21. COMPUTER OPERATING AND DEVELOPMENT COSTS - BUDGET SECTION REPORTING. The department of human services shall allocate to the various divisions the appropriation contained in subdivision 5 of section 1 of this Act for computer operating and development costs subject to budget section approval. The department, as it develops the reforming and enhancing services for the people of North Dakota (RESPOND) computer system, shall periodically report to the budget section of the legislative council during the 1997-99 biennium on the status of the development of the system, system costs and benefits, and the receipt of the matching federal funds. The department may not spend general fund appropriations made by the fifty-fifth legislative assembly for the RESPOND computer system unless approval for the matching federal funds in the amounts estimated during the fifty-fifth legislative assembly has been received from the appropriate federal agency.

Except as may be waived by approval of the budget section of the legislative council, the department of human services shall meet the requirements provided by the administration for children and families of the United States department of health and human services in its communication dated February 12, 1997, related to the state's development of the reforming and enhancing services for the people of North Dakota (RESPOND) and training, education, employment, and management (TEEM) project. The requirements include information regarding client eligibility and expert system rules, cost benefit analysis for the TEEM and RESPOND projects, and a revised budget for the TEEM and RESPOND projects.

SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - COMPUTER DEVELOPMENT. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services not enter into contracts for computer development that require the expenditure of funds in future bienniums without the prior approval of the legislative assembly. It is also the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services not make interest payments on computer development contracts in the amount of \$632,450 during the 1997-99 biennium that were not authorized by the legislative assembly.

SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - CASE MANAGEMENT - PILOT PROJECTS. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services establish pilot projects for expanded long-term care case management to assist functionally impaired adults in accessing necessary services to maintain the appropriate level of independence in the least restrictive setting at the lowest possible cost and that these pilot projects be financed within available department resources.

SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - TRANSITIONAL SERVICES - DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED STUDENTS. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the disability services division of the department of human services, the office of special education of the department of public instruction, and local special

education units explore opportunities for collaboration and shared funding in the provision of transition services to developmentally disabled students between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one.

SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - WAGE INCREASES FOR LOW-INCOME DIRECT CONTACT STAFF OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES PROVIDER AGENCIES. In addition to any wage increases for direct contact staff financed out of the annual inflationary adjustments contained in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act, it is the intent of the legislative assembly that community developmental disabilities provider agencies attempt to mitigate staff turnover during the 1997-99 biennium by augmenting the wages of low-income direct contact staff with \$4,300,000 appropriated within subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act and allocated by the department of human services for such purpose. Each provider agency shall inform the department of human services of the hourly wages it pays to each direct contact staff before and after applying the augmenting funds. The department shall compile and report that information to the budget section. "Low-income direct contact staff" means, for purposes of the department's ratesetting process, positions with departmentally approved hourly wage funding, in effect on July 1, 1996, for residential services, in each residence, of \$8.71 for the first full-time equivalent, \$7.66 for the second full-time equivalent, and \$6.26 for any remaining full-time equivalents except standby staff; and for day service staff, individualized supported living arrangement staff, and family support services staff, \$6.73 for each full-time equivalent.

SECTION 26. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - WAGE INCREASES FOR CERTIFIED NURSE AIDE STAFF - NURSING HOME. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that annual inflationary adjustments contained in subdivision 2 of this Act for nursing home reimbursement be used by nursing homes to emphasize reducing certified nurse aide staff turnover by adjusting staff wages.

SECTION 27. REPEAL. Section 25-04-20 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 28. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 13 is effective on July 1, 1998.

SECTION 29. EMERGENCY. The appropriation contained in subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act for the state hospital includes \$1,295,000 of other funds for remodeling of state hospital buildings to accommodate the relocation of patients from buildings to be sold to the department of corrections and rehabilitation, which is declared to be an emergency measure and those funds are available immediately upon filing of this Act with the secretary of state. Sections 16, 19, and 20 are declared to be emergency measures and effective upon filing of this Act with the secretary of state."

Estimated income is increased by \$200,241, and general fund support is reduced by \$138,390. Adds \$1,295,000 of estimated income generated from the sale of land to the Department of Corrections for the medium security prison. The funding will be used to remodel facilities to relocate the patients which were housed in the facilities that now will be used to house inmates of the Department of Corrections.

7 Adds other funds to allow the Badlands Human Service Center to continue a contract with St. Joseph's Hospital in Dickinson for outpatient behavioral health care.

The amendment provides a single line item appropriation, except for capital improvements which are appropriated separately, for each of the human service centers, the State Hospital, and the Developmental Center rather than the object code line items recommended in the executive budget for the State Hospital, the Developmental Center, and in total for all human service centers. This amendment removes 15.5 FTE vacant positions at the human service centers and eight FTE at the State Hospital.

The amendment includes sections that:

- Provide legislative intent regarding the expectations of services the human service centers are to provide during the 1997-99 biennium.
- Provide legislative intent that the Emergency Commission authorize additional FTE positions for the human service centers, State Hospital, or Developmental Center relating to approved mental health or developmental disabilities supplemental funding.
- Require the department to develop a reimbursement system for the 1998-2001 biennium based on service costs at the human service centers.
- Allow the human service centers, the State Hospital, and the Developmental Center to provide employee bonuses in June 1998 of up to three percent of an employee's salary from program efficiencies accumulated during the 1997-99 biennium.
- Exempt the human service centers, State Hospital, and Developmental Center general fund appropriations from the provision that cancels appropriations at the end of each biennium.
- Regional human service center director positions are unclassified positions and that they serve at the pleasure of the executive director of the Department of Human Services.
- Provide that the \$1,295,000 received by the State Hospital for the sale of land and buildings to the Department of Corrections and appropriated to the State Hospital is an emergency measure.

A new subdivision 5 is added appropriating \$32,263,866 for computer technology, of which \$13,000,000 is from the general fund. Total reductions of \$35,936,533, \$16,672,667 from the general fund, were removed from the individual subdivisions 1 through 4.

New sections are added to House Bill No. 1012 regarding:

- Receipt by the State Hospital of \$1,295,000 for the sale of land and buildings to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, authorizing the sale of the property and appropriating the proceeds as an emergency measure.
- The Department of Human Services meeting the requirements of correspondence dated February 12, 1997, except as waived by the Budget Section, and providing the department may not spend the related general fund appropriations until the requirements are met.
- The Department of Human Services reporting to the Budget Section regarding the status of the RESPOND computer system including system costs and benefits and the receipt of federal funds.
- Providing for a moratorium on nursing home beds above 7,124 and allowing for 10 Alzheimer's beds as a pilot project.
- Authorizing the Department of Human Services to have pilot projects for long-term care case management within available resources.
- Legislative intent regarding collaboration and shared funding in the provision of services to developmentally disabled students transitioning from school to other programs.
- Legislative intent relating to increasing wages for developmentally disabled direct contact staff.
- Allowing the community spouse resource allowance to apply to persons on home and community-based services (North Dakota Century Code Section 54-24.1-02.2).

The funds appropriated in the supplemental fund for the mental health services line item in section 1 of this Act may be allocated by the department of human services, subject to budget section approval, to the human services centers and state hospital to address costs associated with deinstitutionalization, caseload increases, patient stays, or other

unanticipated costs associated with serving persons with a mental illness, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The department of human services shall inform the budget section of requests for funding that the department does not recommend to the budget section for approval.

SECTION 7. SUPPLEMENTAL FUND FOR DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES SERVICES. The funds appropriated in the supplemental fund for developmental disabilities services line item in section 1 of this Act may be allocated by the department of human services, subject to budget section approval, to the human service centers and developmental center to address costs associated with deinstitutionalization, caseload increases, patient stays, or other unanticipated costs associated with serving persons with a developmental disability, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The department of human services shall inform the budget section of requests for funding that the department does not recommend to the budget section for approval.

SECTION 8. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - HUMAN SERVICE CENTER SERVICES. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that while the legislative assembly is allowing the human service centers more funding flexibility during the 1997-99 biennium, the human service centers are expected to:

1. Continue to utilize standards, guidelines, and practices in effect on March 1, 1997, for providing human services pursuant to subsection 2 of section 50-06-05.3.
2. Continue to strive toward improving the quality of services and monitor and strive to achieve successful client outcomes.
3. Maximize available federal or other funds to provide essential services and for service enhancements.
4. Provide appropriate community services to continue the trend of fewer state hospital and developmental center admissions in order to serve clients, to the extent possible, in a least restrictive environment.
5. Utilize innovative and effective methods of service delivery in order to achieve cost savings to reallocate for performance incentives and to enhance the level of services provided to clients.

SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT EMPLOYEES - EMERGENCY COMMISSION APPROVAL. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the emergency commission approve requests submitted by a human service center, the state hospital, or the developmental center for authorization to hire additional full-time equivalent positions that are associated with an approved request for funding from the supplemental fund for mental health services or the supplemental fund for developmental disabilities services during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999.

SECTION 10. HUMAN SERVICE CENTER SERVICE COSTS - REIMBURSEMENT SYSTEM. Each regional human service center shall report its services provided during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999, on a cost per service basis in a form designated by the executive director of the department of human services. The department shall analyze the data collected and develop, for the 1999-2001 biennium, a standardized reimbursement system for the human service centers based on service costs and any supplemental payment costs to be incorporated into the department's 1999-2001 biennium budget request.

SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - EMPLOYEE BONUSES. Notwithstanding section 54-14-03.1, the regional human service centers, state hospital, and developmental center may provide bonus payments to their employees during August 1999, of up to three percent of an employee's base salary from any realized savings resulting from program efficiencies accumulated during the 1997-99 biennium, excluding any supplemental funds for mental health or developmental disabilities services received. A bonus payment may not increase an employee's salary level for which funding request calculations for the 1999-2001 biennium will be based.

SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL AND REPORT. The general fund appropriations contained in subdivision 4 of section 1 and the welfare reform contingency line item in subdivision 2 of this Act are not subject to section 54-44.1-11. The welfare reform contingency may only be spent with prior budget

section approval. Any unexpended funds from these appropriations are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001. The department of human services shall report to the budget section of the legislative council on the status of these appropriations at its fall 1999 meeting.

SECTION 13. A new subsection to section 50-06-05.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

To set the salary of the center director and approve the employee compensation plan. The department of human services shall develop procedures that provide for a transition to regional center governing boards to be established on July 1, 1998.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-05.5 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

50-06-05.5. Director of regional center - Medical director. Each regional human service center must be headed by a regional director appointed by the executive director of the department in consultation with the regional human service council. The regional director ~~must be accountable to~~ position is not a classified position and the director must serve at the pleasure of the executive director. Each regional director shall have the authority to employ the staff necessary to discharge the center's responsibilities. The regional director shall also have authority, subject to the approval of the executive director of the department and within the limit of legislative appropriations, to make contractual arrangements with public or private agencies or with individuals and organizations to discharge the regional human service center's service delivery responsibilities. The staff of each regional human service center shall include a qualified medical professional who must be designated as the medical director of the center. The medical director must be primarily responsible for coordinating mental health and medically related services. The medical director's position may be part time or full time as determined appropriate by the regional director, with the concurrence of the executive director. At the discretion of the executive director, the regional director of a center, if qualified therefor, could also be appointed medical director of that center. As used in this section, "qualified medical professional" means an individual possessing a degree of doctor of psychiatry, when such an individual can be employed, and when this is not possible, an individual possessing at least a medical degree."

"SECTION 16. Section 50-06-14.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

50-06-14.4. Alzheimer's and related dementia projects. The department of human services shall establish projects containing up to ten beds designed to meet the service needs of the alzheimer's and related dementia population. The projects established under this section must explore the financial and service viability of converting existing nursing facility or basic care capacity to a specific service environment that targets the alzheimer's and related dementia population. The state department of health shall cooperate with the department to ensure the success of the projects. The projects may be established notwithstanding subsections 2, 5, 10, and 11 and subdivision c of subsection 9 of section 50-24.5-01, relating to definitions for aid to aged, blind, and disabled persons, and subsection 1 of section 23-09.3-01, relating to the definition of a basic care facility.

SECTION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 50-24.1-02.2 of the 1995 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

50-24.1-02.2. Community spouse resource allowance. In determining eligibility for medical assistance applicants and recipients, the department of human services shall establish a community spouse resource allowance equal to the maximum community spouse resource allowance as provided by 42 U.S.C. 1396r-5(f)(2). This section applies to a community spouse of an institutionalized spouse. For purposes of this section, "institutionalized spouse" includes an individual who is described in 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(10)(A)(ii)(VI).

SECTION 18. AMENDMENT. The new section to chapter 23-09.3 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by section 2 of chapter 254 of the 1995 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

~~**Moratorium on expansion of basic care bed capacity.** During the period after July 31, 1995, and before August 1, 1997, Except when existing beds are converted for use by the alzheimer's and related dementia population under the projects provided for in section 50-06-14.4, the state department of health and consolidated laboratories may not issue a license under this chapter for any additional bed capacity unless the expanded bed capacity was approved by the health council under chapter 23-17.2 before August 1, 1995 above the state's gross capacity of one thousand four hundred seventy-one beds during the period between August 1, 1997, and July 31, 1999.~~

SECTION 19. AMENDMENT. The new section to chapter 23-16 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by section 3 of chapter 254 of the 1995 Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

Moratorium on expansion of long-term care bed capacity. Notwithstanding sections 23-16-06 and 23-16-10, ~~during the period after July 31, 1995, and before August 1, 1997~~ except when existing beds are converted for use by the alzheimer's and related dementia population under the projects provided for in section 50-06-14.4, the state department of health and consolidated laboratories may not issue a license for any additional bed capacity ~~unless the expanded bed capacity was approved by the health council under chapter 23-17.2 before August 1, 1995~~ above the state's gross capacity of seven thousand one hundred twenty-four beds during the period between August 1, 1997, and July 31, 1999.

SECTION 20. TRANSFER OF LAND AUTHORIZED.

1. The department of human services may sell to the department of corrections and rehabilitation the forensic unit building, the ET building and adjacent gymnasium, and surrounding real property.
2. The authorized sale is exempt from sections 54-01-05.2 and 54-01-05.5.

SECTION 21. EXEMPTION FROM BIDDING REQUIREMENTS. Notwithstanding any other provision of law relating to public contracts or bidding requirements, the department of human services may contract and expend funds for the renovation of the state hospital to accommodate patients as a result of any sale of the property described in section 20 of this Act.

SECTION 22. COMPUTER OPERATING AND DEVELOPMENT COSTS - BUDGET SECTION REPORTING. The department of human services shall allocate to the various divisions the appropriation contained in subdivision 5 of section 1 of this Act for computer operating and development costs subject to budget section approval. The department, as it develops the reforming and enhancing services for the people of North Dakota (RESPOND) computer system, shall periodically report to the budget section of the legislative council during the 1997-99 biennium on the status of the development of the system, system costs and benefits, and the receipt of the matching federal funds. The department may not spend general fund appropriations made by the fifty-fifth legislative assembly for the RESPOND computer system unless approval for the matching federal funds in the amounts estimated during the fifty-fifth legislative assembly has been received from the appropriate federal agency.

Except as may be waived by approval of the budget section of the legislative council, the department of human services shall meet the requirements provided by the administration for children and families of the United States department of health and human services in its communication dated February 12, 1997, related to the state's development of the reforming and enhancing services for the people of North Dakota (RESPOND) and training, education, employment, and management (TEEM) project. The requirements include information regarding client eligibility and expert system rules, cost benefit analysis for the TEEM and RESPOND projects, and a revised budget for the TEEM and RESPOND projects.

SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - COMPUTER DEVELOPMENT. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services not enter into contracts for computer development that require the expenditure of funds in future bienniums without the prior approval of the legislative assembly. It is also the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services not make interest payments on computer development contracts in the amount of \$632,450 during the 1997-99 biennium that were not authorized by the legislative assembly.

SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - CASE MANAGEMENT - PILOT PROJECTS. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the department of human services establish pilot projects for expanded long-term care case management to assist functionally impaired adults in accessing necessary services to maintain the appropriate level of independence in the least restrictive setting at the lowest possible cost and that these pilot projects be financed within available department resources.

SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - TRANSITIONAL SERVICES - DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED STUDENTS. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that the disability services division of the department of human services, the office of special education of the department of public instruction, and local special education units explore opportunities for collaboration and shared funding in the provision of transition services to developmentally disabled students between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one.

SECTION 26. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - WAGE INCREASES FOR LOW-INCOME DIRECT CONTACT STAFF OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES PROVIDER AGENCIES. In addition to any wage increases for direct contact staff financed out of the annual inflationary adjustments contained in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act, it is the intent of the legislative assembly that community developmental disabilities provider agencies attempt to mitigate staff turnover during the 1997-99 biennium by augmenting the wages of low-income direct contact staff with \$4,300,000 appropriated within subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act and allocated by the department of human services for such purpose. Each provider agency shall inform the department of human services of the hourly wages it pays to each direct contact staff before and after applying the augmenting funds. The department shall compile and report that information to the budget section. "Low-income direct contact staff" means, for purposes of the department's ratesetting process, positions with departmentally approved hourly wage funding, in effect on July 1, 1996, for residential services, in each residence, of \$8.71 for the first full-time equivalent, \$7.66 for the second full-time equivalent, and \$6.26 for any remaining full-time equivalents except standby staff; and for day service staff, individualized supported living arrangement staff, and family support services staff, \$6.73 for each full-time equivalent.

SECTION 27. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - WAGE INCREASES FOR CERTIFIED NURSE AIDE STAFF - NURSING HOME. It is the intent of the legislative assembly that annual inflationary adjustments contained in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act for nursing home reimbursement be used by nursing homes to emphasize reducing certified nurse aide staff turnover by adjusting staff wages.

SECTION 28. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated, in addition to amounts appropriated in subdivision 3 of this Act, out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$648,375, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from special funds, the sum of \$34,125, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of providing an increase in funding for the service payments for elderly and disabled program for the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999.

SECTION 29. REPEAL. Section 25-04-20 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

SECTION 30. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 13 of this Act becomes effective on July 1, 1998.

SECTION 31. EMERGENCY. The appropriation contained in subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act for the state hospital includes \$1,295,000 of other funds for remodeling of state hospital buildings to accommodate the relocation of patients from buildings to be sold to the department of corrections and rehabilitation, which is declared to be an emergency measure and those funds are available immediately upon filing of this Act with the secretary of state. Sections 16, 18, 20, and 21 of this Act are declared to be emergency measures and become effective immediately upon its filing with the secretary of state."

The amendment provides a single line item appropriation, except for capital improvements which are appropriated separately, for each of the human service centers, the State Hospital, and the Developmental Center rather than the object code line items recommended in the executive budget for the State Hospital, the Developmental Center, and in total for all human service centers. This amendment removes 15.5 FTE vacant positions at the human service centers and eight FTE at the State Hospital.

The amendment includes sections that:

- . Provide legislative intent regarding the expectations of services the human service centers are to provide during the 1997-99 biennium.
- . Provide legislative intent that the Emergency Commission authorize additional FTE positions for the human service centers, State Hospital, or Developmental Center relating to approved mental health or developmental disabilities supplemental funding.
- . Require the department to develop a reimbursement system for the 1999-2001 biennium based on service costs at the human service centers.
- . Allow the human service centers, the State Hospital, and the Developmental Center to provide employee bonuses in June 1999 of up to three percent of an employee's salary from program efficiencies accumulated during the 1997-99 biennium.
- . Exempt the human service centers, State Hospital, and Developmental Center general fund appropriations from the provision that cancels appropriations at the end of each biennium.
- . Regional human service center director positions are unclassified positions and that they serve at the pleasure of the executive director of the Department of Human Services.
- . Provide that the \$1,295,000 received by the State Hospital for the sale of land and buildings to the Department of Corrections and appropriated to the State Hospital is an emergency measure.

A new subdivision 5 is added appropriating \$32,263,866 for computer technology, of which \$13,000,000 is from the general fund. Total reductions of \$35,936,533, \$16,672,667 from the general fund, were removed from the individual subdivisions 1 through 4.

New sections are added to House Bill No. 1012 regarding:

- Receipt by the State Hospital of \$1,295,000 for the sale of land and buildings to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, authorizing the sale of the property and appropriating the proceeds as an emergency measure.
- The Department of Human Services meeting the requirements of correspondence dated February 12, 1997, except as waived by the Budget Section, and providing the department may not spend the related general fund appropriations until the requirements are met.
- The Department of Human Services reporting to the Budget Section regarding the status of the RESPOND computer system including system costs and benefits and the receipt of federal funds.
- Providing for a moratorium on basic care beds above 1,471 and nursing home beds above 7,124 and allowing for 10 Alzheimer's beds as a pilot project.
- Authorizing the Department of Human Services to have pilot projects for long-term care case management within available resources.
- Legislative intent regarding collaboration and shared funding in the provision of services to developmentally disabled students transitioning from school to other programs.
- Legislative intent relating to increasing wages for developmentally disabled direct contact staff.
- Allowing the community spouse resource allowance to apply to persons on home and community-based services (North Dakota Century Code Section 54-24.1-02.2).
- Legislative intent regarding case management pilot projects and regarding wage increases for developmentally disabled direct contact staff, and nursing home certified nurses aides.
- Repealing Section 25-04-20 regarding the Westwood Park Assets Management Committee.

A section is added appropriating \$682,500, \$648,375 of which is from the general fund to provide an increase in funding for the service payments for the elderly and disabled (SPED) program to allow a total increase of 10 SPED clients per month (an increase of 3.5 clients per month is included in the executive budget). Provides total funding of \$9,817,413, of which \$9,326,542 is from the general fund.

The authority to add Golden Valley county to its 911 service begins with the effective date of this Act and ends on June 30, 1999. State radio communications is then limited to providing 911 services to the counties being served as of June 30, 1999.

SECTION 12. FEDERAL PROGRAM TERMINATIONS - BLOCK GRANT - FUNDING REDUCTIONS - RELATED PROGRAM REDUCTIONS - REPORTS TO THE BUDGET SECTION. If the federal government during the 1997-99 biennium terminates funding for any program administered by an agency, department, or institution of the state of North Dakota, the agency, department, or institution, subject to budget section approval, may terminate the program and not replace the reduction in federal funds with state funds, notwithstanding any other provision of law. If the federal government combines funding for separate programs in a block grant resulting in a reduction of total federal funds available for those programs, the administering agency, department, or institution may, subject to budget section approval, prioritize or reprioritize programs as necessary in making programmatic reductions. The agency, department, or institution may administer funds available under a new federal block grant or similar measure, consistent with the terms of that measure, notwithstanding any other provisions of law intended to conform to or implement the provisions of the repealed federal Act, and shall report any program terminations, reductions, or changes resulting from this section to the budget section of the legislative council for its approval.

SECTION 13. RISK MANAGEMENT. The North Dakota insurance reserve fund shall transfer \$5,000,000 of excess equity investment in the North Dakota insurance reserve fund to the office of management and budget on July 1, 1997. This transfer represents final settlement with the North Dakota insurance reserve fund for any claim by the state to any funds held in reserve by the North Dakota insurance reserve fund for claims pending before July 1, 1997.

The recovery of the \$5,000,000, together with current reserves in the risk management fund, are considered sufficient reserves for claims anticipated in the 1997-99 biennium. Therefore, the following amounts shall be deducted from the budgets for risk management premiums as indicated:

SECTION 14. TRANSFER. The director of the office of management and budget shall transfer \$550,000, or an amount equal to the 1997-99 biennium costs relating to the information technology management division of the legislative council, whichever is less, from the information services operating fund to the general fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, and ending June 30, 1999. The transfer is to reimburse the general fund for costs relating to information technology research, planning, monitoring, reviewing, and auditing and for assistance provided to agencies by the information technology management division of the legislative council.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT. Section 32-12.2-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

32-12.2-06. (~~Contingent expiration date — see Note~~) Liability insurance - Reinsurance. Upon approval of the director of the office of management and budget, an entity of the state may participate in a government self-insurance pool or may purchase insurance against liability of the entity and its employees for damages resulting from claims under this chapter. The director shall limit participation in government self-insurance pools and, except as provided in this section, the purchase of insurance to exposures determined to cause an excessive financial risk to the state risk management fund including exposures reasonably expected to deplete the fund and have a significant detrimental impact on the state's budget. The director shall develop a state self-insurance program that provides as much coverage as possible of potential liability recognized by this chapter, but that includes supplemental insurance purchases in a manner that is determined appropriate by the director in consultation with the state risk manager. The insurance may be provided by an insurance company authorized to do business in this state which the commissioner of insurance has determined to be responsible and financially sound, considering the extent of the coverage required, or coverage may be provided by a government self-insurance pool. If a premium savings will result and the director of the office of management and budget approves, the insurance policy or memorandum of coverage may be in force from one through three years from the date of issue. The director may procure an excess loss reinsurance contract for the state."

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

The \$200,000 is to be used to establish a balance in the preliminary planning revolving loan fund, as recommended by the Budget Section. Pursuant to North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) Section 54-44.1-07, the Budget Section requested that the Office of Management and Budget include in the executive Budget presented to the 1997 Legislative Assembly money to be used for the preliminary planning revolving loan fund which is established by NDCC Section 54-27-22. The fund was originally established by the 1975 Legislative Assembly to be used for the prepayment of consultant and planning fees for capital improvement projects. The purpose of the fund is to assist agencies in preparing more accurate cost estimates for proposed capital projects.

This amendment also adds new Sections 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 as follows:

Section 12 provides that if federal funding for a program is terminated during the 1997-99 biennium, the administering state agency, department, or institution shall terminate the program. It also provides that if the federal government reduces federal funding by combining the funding for separate programs into a block grant, the agency, department, or institution shall prioritize or reprioritize programs as necessary.

Section 13 provides for a transfer from the North Dakota insurance reserve fund of \$5,000,000 of excess equity investment in the North Dakota insurance reserve fund to the Office of Management and Budget.

Section 14 provides for a transfer equal to the costs associated with the Legislative Council's Information Technology Management Division up to \$550,000 from the Information Services Division's operating fund to the general fund during the 1997-99 biennium. The amount is a portion of the estimated revenue that will be generated as a result of increasing the Information Services Division's overhead rate by two percent from 2.9 percent to 4.9 percent for the 1997-99 biennium. Funding for the increase has been included in agency budget requests and the increase is based on the recommendations of Wolfe and Associates, Inc., to provide funding for planning, reviewing, and for research and development costs. These functions were originally included in the Information Services Division but are now being transferred to the Legislative Council and provided a general fund appropriation.

Section 15 provides legislative intent regarding legislative renovations.

Section 16 amends Section 32-12.2-06 relating to the state risk management fund. The change directs the director of the Office of Management and Budget to develop a state self-insurance program.
