1 A BILL for an Act to create a new section to chapter 43-25 of the North Dakota Century Code,

2 relating to student massage; to amend and reenact sections 43-25-02, 43-25-03, and 43-25-04

3 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to massage therapist licensing requirements; and to

4 declare an emergency.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

6 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 43-25-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is 7 amended and reenacted as follows:

7		includes reflexology. Variations of the following procedures are used: touch,
8		stroking, friction, kneading, vibration, percussion, and medical gymnastics.
9		Massage therapists may not diagnose or treat classified diseases, practice spinal
10		or other joint manipulations, or prescribe or administer vitamins.
11	SEC	CTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 43-25-03 of the 1997 Supplement to the North
12	Dakota Cer	ntury Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
13	43-2	25-03. Massage therapists to be licensed. A person may not:
14	1.	Engage in the practice or attempt to practice massage for a fee or gratuity or to
15		conduct or teach massage without a license issued under this chapter;
16	2.	Operate or conduct a massage establishment unless it the establishment meets
17		the sanitary requirements of this chapter and any regulations rules adopted by the
18		board;
19	3.	Employ an unlicensed person to work as a massage therapist; or
20	4.	Practice any branch of massage as defined in subsection 3 of section 43-25-02,
21		whether for payment or free demonstration, without first being a licensed massage
22		therapist under this chapter, or without operating and maintaining a bona fide
23		massage establishment, and without first paying a license fee to the board.
24	SEC	CTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 43-25-04 of the 1997 Supplement to the North
25	Dakota Cer	ntury Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
26	43-2	25-04. Exemptions. Any exemption granted under this section to a class of
27	professiona	Is only applies to the extent the practice of the profession overlaps the practice of
28	massage.	The following classes of persons are exempt from this chapter:
29	1.	Persons Any person authorized by under the laws of this state to practice
30		medicine, surgery, osteopathy, chiropractic, <u>or</u> podiatry , or persons holding a
31		drugless practitioner's certificate under the laws of this state.

12	<u>8.</u>	Any student of a school of massage who is practicing massage under section 4 of			
13		this Act.			
14	Any exemption granted under this chapter is effective only insofar as and to the extent that the				
15	bona fide practice of the profession or business of the person exempted overlaps into the field				
16	comprehended by this chapter, and exemptions under this chapter are only for those activities				
17	which are performed in the course of the bona fide practice of the business or profession of the				
18	person exempted.				
19	SECTION 4. A new section to chapter 43-25 of the North Dakota Century Code is				
20	created and enacted as follows:				
21	Student massage. A school of massage may allow a student to practice massage in				
22	the course of fulfilling a required massage therapy practicum or in the course of participating in				
23	a school-supervised student massage clinic. The school of massage must meet the curriculum				
24	standards set by the board for vocational and technical education or other appropriate state				
25	governing body, and the standards must be established in consultation with the board of				
26	massage.
