## FOURTH ENGROSSMENT - MAJORITY REPORT with House Amendments REENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2162

Introduced by

**Education Committee** 

(At the request of the Office of Management and Budget)

1 A BILL for an Act to provide for the reimbursement of certain reorganized districts; to create

- 2 and enact a new section to chapter 15-29 of the North Dakota Century Code, or in the
- 3 alternative to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-09 of the North Dakota Century
- 4 Code, and two new sections to chapter 15-40.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to
- 5 the joint employment of school district superintendents, contingent per student payments, and
- 6 proportionate payments for summer school programs; to amend and reenact sections
- 7 15-40.1-06, 15-40.1-07, 15-40.1-07.3, 15-40.1-08, subsection 1 of section 57-15-14.2, and
- 8 section 57-15-17.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to educational support per
- 9 student and payment factors; to provide for a legislative council study; to provide an
- 10 appropriation; and to declare an emergency.

## 11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. If House Bill No. 1034 does not become effective, a new section to
 chapter 15-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

14 School district superintendent - Joint employment - Accreditation. The

15 superintendent of public instruction may not impose through the accreditation process any

16 penalties or sanctions on a school district for employing a superintendent jointly with one or

- 17 more other districts.
- 18 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-06 of the 1997 Supplement to the North
  19 Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 20 15-40.1-06. Declaration of legislative intent Educational support per student 21 School district equalization factor Limitations.
- It is the intent of the legislative assembly<del>, not considering any separate and supplemental payments as may be provided by law,</del> to support elementary and secondary education in this state from state funds based on the educational cost

1		per	student. For purposes of this section, state funds include all appropriations for
2		fou	ndation aid, tuition apportionment, supplemental per student payments, special
3		<u>edu</u>	cation, vocational education, transportation aid, school district technology, the
4		gov	vernor's school, teacher centers, and the leadership in educational
5		<u>adr</u>	ninistration development consortium. In determining the educational cost per
6		stu	dent, the following criteria may not be used:
7		a.	Expenditures for capital outlay for buildings and sites, or debt service.
8		b.	Expenditures from school activities and school lunch programs.
9		<del>c.</del>	Expenditures for the cost of transportation, including the cost of schoolbuses.
10	2.	a.	The educational support per student during the first year of the 1997-99
11			<u>1999-2001</u> biennium must be <del>one thousand nine hundred fifty four</del> two
12			thousand one hundred thirty-four dollars and for the second year of the
13			1997-99 1999-2001 biennium the educational support per student must be
14			two thousand thirty-two two thousand two hundred forty dollars and is the
15			basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as provided in
16			sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08.
17		b.	The superintendent of public instruction shall monitor student enrollments. If
18			the superintendent determines that the student enrollment figures warrant an
19			adjustment in the amount of educational support per student set forth in
20			subdivision a, the superintendent shall make an adjustment and reflect the
21			adjustment in the March foundation aid payment, the April foundation aid
22			payment, and in the final remaining foundation aid payment distributed before
23			June thirtieth of each year, as provided for in section 15-40.1-05.
24		<u>C.</u>	School districts operating high schools not meeting the minimum curriculum
25			as provided in section 15-41-24 or the teacher qualifications in section
26			15-41-25 must be supported in the amount of two hundred twenty dollars,
27			which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as
28			provided in section 15-40.1-07.
29	<del>c.</del>	<u>d.</u>	School districts operating high schools that are not accredited pursuant to the
30			accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public instruction on
31			July 1, 1991, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding school year

1 must be supported for the 1991-92 school year or for the first year that they 2 become unaccredited in the amount of the educational support per student 3 established in subdivision a, which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on 4 a per student basis as provided in section 15-40.1-07, but those school 5 districts are not entitled to the amounts resulting from applying the factors in 6 that section. The amount of aid a school district is entitled to under this 7 subsection for each high school that is not accredited must be reduced by two 8 hundred dollars times the number of students in the school for the second 9 school year that the high school is unaccredited, and an additional two 10 hundred dollars per student in the unaccredited school for each additional 11 year the school remains unaccredited. Any high school that becomes 12 accredited is entitled to the per student payments provided for in section 13 15-40.1-07 for the entire school year in which the school becomes accredited. 14 <del>d.</del> <u>e.</u> School districts operating elementary schools that are not accredited pursuant 15 to the accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public 16 instruction on July 1, 1992, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding 17 school year must be supported for the 1992-93 school year or for the first 18 year that they become unaccredited in the amount of the educational support 19 per student established in subdivision a, which is the basis for calculating 20 grants-in-aid on a per student basis as provided in section 15-40.1-08, except 21 that the amount of aid that a school district is entitled to under this subsection 22 for each elementary school that is unaccredited must be reduced by two 23 hundred dollars times the number of students in the school each year that the 24 elementary school is unaccredited. Any elementary school that becomes 25 accredited is entitled to the per student payments provided for in section 26 15-40.1-08 for the entire school year in which the school becomes accredited. 27 3. In determining the amount of payments due school districts for tuition 28 apportionment provided in section 15-44-03, and per student aid under this 29 section, the amount of tuition apportionment, foundation aid, special education aid, 30 and transportation aid for which a school district is eligible must be added together, 31 and from that total, the following amounts must be subtracted:

1		a.	The product of thirty-two mills times the latest available net assessed and
2			equalized valuation of property of the school district.
3		b.	The amount that the unobligated general fund balance of a school district on
4			the preceding June thirtieth is in excess of three-fourths of the actual
5			expenditures, plus an additional twenty thousand dollars.

For each high school district having one hundred fifty or more, but less than five 16 hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, 17 the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.24 adjusted by 18 sixty-five seventy-five percent of the difference between 1.24 and the factor 19 representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, 20 as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high 21 school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, 22 times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. 23 Beginning July 1, 1998, the factor is 1.24 adjusted by seventy five percent of the 24 difference between 1.24 and the factor representing the five year average cost of 25 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 26 public instruction. 27 4. 28	received if it	had	the highest number of students in the next lower category. Payments may not
29	be made un	less	four or more units of standard high school work approved by the
30	superintend	ent o	f public instruction are offered during the current year, only certificated
31	teachers ha	ve be	een employed, and the other standards prescribed by this chapter have been

1 met. Payments must be made to the high school district in which the student is enrolled for 2 graduation and units of approved vocational education in accordance with the provisions of 3 chapter 15-20.1, and other courses approved by the superintendent of public instruction, 4 earned in another high school district must be included to meet the minimum four required 5 units. In the case of students enrolled in nonpublic schools for graduation or students enrolled 6 in less than four units of standard high school work who are in their fourth year of high school 7 coursework and who are enrolled in approved alternative high school curriculum programs, 8 proportionate payments must be made to the public school district in which the student is 9 enrolled for specific courses. School districts offering high school summer school programs are 10 eligible for proportionate payments provided each course offered satisfies requirements for 11 graduation, comprises at least as many clock hours as courses offered during the regular 12 school term, and complies with rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The 13 superintendent may adopt rules regarding eligibility for school districts to receive proportionate 14 payments for summer education programs. The proportionate payment made under this 15 section during the biennium for high school summer school programs may not exceed one and 16 one-half percent of the total amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for foundation aid 17 and transportation aid during the biennium. 18 SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15-40.1-07.3 of the 1997 Supplement to the 19 North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows: 20 15-40.1-07.3. Per student payments - Reorganization of school districts. 21 If any school district receiving per student payments calculated under section 1. 22 15-40.1-07 reorganizes with another school district under chapter 15-27.3 or 23 15-27.6 before August 1, 1997, the school district resulting from the reorganization 24 is entitled to receive the same per student payments for each high school student 25 as each separate school district received for each high school student prior to the 26 reorganization, for a period of four years. 27 2. If any school district receiving per student payments calculated under this chapter 28 reorganizes with another school district under chapter 15-27.3 or 15-27.6 after 29 July 31, 1997, the school district resulting from the reorganization is entitled to 30 receive the same per student payments for each high school and elementary

1		student as each separate school district received for each high school and
2		elementary student prior to the reorganization, for a period of four years.
3	3.	The weighting factor for each district will be adjusted proportionately over a period
4		of two years, following the period of time provided in subsection 1 or 2, until the
5		adjusted weighting factor equals the weighting factor for the combined enrollment
6		resulting from the reorganization.
7	<u>4.</u>	Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, no school district may receive less
8		in per student payments for the first year of its reorganization than the total amount
9		that the districts participating in the reorganization received in per student
10		payments for the school year immediately preceding the reorganization. If less
11		than a whole school district participated in a reorganization, the superintendent of
12		public instruction shall prorate the payments to which the newly reorganized district
13		is entitled under this subsection.

22		the factor 1.28 adjusted by sixty-five seventy-five percent of the difference
23		between 1.28 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education
24		per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public
25		instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one through eight
26		in average daily membership, up to a maximum of sixteen students, times the
27		educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. There must be
28		paid .9 times each additional student in its school in grades one through eight in
29		average daily membership times the educational support per student provided in
30		section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty
31		students in average daily membership. If the one-room rural school is located in a

1 school district with another elementary school, the weighting factor for the students 2 in grades one through six must be based on the average daily membership in the 3 district in grades one through six as provided in subsections 2 through 4. If the 4 one-room rural school is located in a school district with another school that has 5 students in grade seven or eight, the weighting factor for the students in grade 6 seven or eight must be the same as that provided for in subsection 5. Beginning 7 July 1, 1998, the factor is 1.28 adjusted by seventy five percent of the difference 8 between 1.28 and the five year average cost of education per student for this 9 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

10 2. For each elementary school in school districts having under one hundred students 11 in average daily membership in grades one through six, the amount of money 12 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.09 adjusted by sixty-five seventy-five percent 13 of the difference between 1.09 and the factor representing the five-year average 14 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 15 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in 16 grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 17 teacher, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, 18 except that no payment may be made for more than twenty-five students in 19 average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning 20 July 1, 1998, the factor is 1.09 adjusted by seventy-five percent of the difference 21 between 1.09 and the five year average cost of education per student for this 22 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

23 3. For each elementary school in school districts having one hundred or more 24 students in average daily membership in grades one through six, and provided the 25 districts in which such schools are located have an average daily membership of 26 less than one thousand elementary students in grades one through six, the amount 27 of money resulting from multiplying the factor .905 adjusted by sixty-five 28 seventy-five percent of the difference between .905 and the factor representing the 29 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 30 the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that 31 school in grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom

1or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section215-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in3average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning4July 1, 1998, the factor is .905 adjusted by seventy five percent of the difference5between .905 and the five year average cost of education per student for this6category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

7 For each elementary school in school districts having an average daily 4. 8 membership of one thousand or more elementary students in grades one through 9 six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .95 adjusted by 10 sixty five seventy-five percent of the difference between .95 and the factor 11 representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, 12 as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of 13 students in that school in grades one through six in average daily membership in 14 each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student 15 provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more 16 than thirty students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each 17 teacher. Beginning July 1, 1998, the factor is .95 adjusted by seventy five percent 18 of the difference between .95 and the five-year average cost of education per 19 student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. 20 5. For each of the above classes of elementary schools, except for one-room rural 21 schools that are not located in a district with another school having students in 22 grade seven or eight, there must be paid to each school the amount of money 23 resulting from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by sixty-five seventy-five percent 24 of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average 25 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 26 superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in

27 grades seven and eight in average daily membership in each classroom or for 28 each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 29 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in 30 average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning 31 July 1, 1998, the factor is 1.01 adjusted by seventy five percent of the difference

between 1.01 and the five-year average cost of education per student for this
 category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

3 6. For each elementary school having students under the compulsory age for school 4 attendance, but not less than three years of age, in a special education program 5 approved by the director of special education, the amount of money resulting from 6 multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted by sixty-five seventy-five percent of the 7 difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of 8 education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of 9 public instruction, times the number of special education students in that school 10 under the compulsory age for school attendance in average daily membership in 11 each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student 12 provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 1998, the factor is 1.01 adjusted 13 by seventy five percent of the difference between 1.01 and the five year average 14 cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the 15 superintendent of public instruction.

16 7. For each elementary school providing a kindergarten that is established according 17 to provisions of section 15-45-01, the amount of money resulting from multiplying 18 the factor .50 adjusted by sixty-five seventy-five percent of the difference between 19 .50 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student 20 for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times 21 the number of students in that school in average daily membership in each 22 classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student, as 23 provided under section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more 24 than twenty-five students in average daily membership in each classroom or for 25 each teacher. The full per student payment may be made only to those 26 kindergarten programs providing the equivalent of ninety full days of classroom 27 instruction during any twelve-month period. Programs providing shorter periods of 28 instruction during the same time period must receive a proportionately smaller per 29 student payment. Beginning July 1, 1998, the factor is .50 adjusted by 30 seventy five percent of the difference between .50 and the five year average cost

SECTION 11. REIMBURSEMENT - REORGANIZED DISTRICTS. In distributing per
student payments for the 1997-99 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall
ensure that no school district reorganized after June 30, 1997, and before July 1, 1999,
receives less in per student payments for the first year of its reorganization than the districts
participating in the reorganization received in per student payments for the school year
immediately preceding the reorganization.

10 SECTION 12. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STUDY OF EDUCATIONAL EQUITY AND 11 FUTURE EDUCATIONAL DELIVERY. The legislative council shall study the provision of 12 education to public school students in this state and shall examine the manner in which 13 education to public school students will be delivered in the ensuing five, ten, and twenty years. 14 Within this study, the council shall address demographic changes as they affect equity of 15 educational opportunities with respect to courses, facilities, and extracurricular activities; equity 16 with respect to teacher availability and qualifications; equity with respect to the organization and 17 administration of school districts; and taxpayer equity in both rural and urban school districts. 18 The legislative council shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any 19 legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the fifty-seventh legislative 20 assembly.

SECTION 13. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$2,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the superintendent of public instruction for the purpose of providing special education payments to each school district in the state on the basis of students in average daily membership for the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001.

SECTION 14. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the superintendent of public instruction for the purpose of providing supplemental per student payments to school districts, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001. The superintendent shall distribute the per

- 1 student payments to each school district in the state on the basis of average daily membership.
- 2 The superintendent shall distribute fifty percent of the moneys provided under this section
- 3 during the first year of the biennium and the remaining fifty percent during the second year of
- 4 the biennium.

5 **SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.** Section 11 of this Act is declared to be an emergency 6 measure.
