4 STATEMENT OF INTENT

- 5 This amendment would require deposit in the health care trust fund of all funds received by the
- 6 state as a result of the 1998 settlement agreement with tobacco product manufacturers and any
- 7 successor agreements and would allow use of the earnings of the trust fund for statewide
- 8 health care concerns.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE HOUSE OF

REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:

That the following proposed new section to article X of the Constitution of North Dakota is agreed to and must be submitted to the qualified electors of North Dakota at the general election to be held in 2000, in accordance with section 16 of article IV of the Constitution of North Dakota.

SECTION 1. A new section to article X of the Constitution of North Dakota is created and enacted as follows:

All funds received by the state pursuant to the 1998 settlement agreement with tobacco product manufacturers, or any successor agreement, must be placed into a permanent health care trust fund in the state treasury to be held in trust and administered by the board of university and school lands. The board may invest the health care trust fund as provided by law. The principal of the trust fund may not be expended. Eighty percent of annual earnings of the trust fund may be used to address statewide health care concerns. Beginning with the biennium after the trust fund principal balance has reached one billion dollars, all of the annual earnings of the trust fund may be used to address statewide health care concerns.
