SECOND ENGROSSMENT with Senate Amendments REENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1344

1 A BILL for an Act to provide for teacher mentoring and evaluation programs and for contingent 2 payments for declining enrollment; to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-02 and a 3 new section to chapter 15.1-09 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a school district 4 employee compensation report and bonuses; to amend and reenact section 15-40.1-06 of the 5 North Dakota Century Code or in the alternative to amend and reenact sections 15.1-27-04 and 6 15.1-27-05 of the North Dakota Century Code and to amend and reenact section 57-15-27 of 7 the North Dakota Century Code, relating to per student payments and ending fund balances; to 8 provide for a legislative council report; to provide an appropriation; and to provide an effective 9 date.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. If House Bill No. 1045 does not become effective, section
 15-40.1-06 of the 1999 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and
 reenacted as follows:

14 15-40.1-06. Declaration of legislative intent - Educational support per student 15 School district equalization factor - Limitations.

16 1. It is the intent of the legislative assembly to support elementary and secondary 17 education in this state from state funds. For purposes of this section, state funds 18 include all appropriations for foundation aid, tuition apportionment, supplemental 19 per student payments, special education, vocational education, transportation aid, 20 school district technology, the governor's school, teacher centers, and the 21 leadership in educational administration development consortium. For purposes of 22 distributing state funds, the superintendent of public instruction shall determine the 23 educational cost per student. In determining the educational cost per student, the 24 superintendent may not use:

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1		a.	Expenditures for capital outlay for buildings and sites, or debt service.		
2		b.	Expenditures from school activities and school lunch programs.		
3		C.	Expenditures for the cost of transportation, including the cost of schoolbuses.		
4	2.	а.	The educational support per student during <u>for</u> the first year of the 1999-2001		
5			<u>2001-03</u> biennium must be is two thousand one <u>four</u> hundred forty five		
6			twenty-seven dollars and. The educational support per student for the		
7			second year of the 1999-2001 2001-03 biennium the educational support per		
8			student must be is two thousand two four hundred thirty <u>ninety</u> dollars and .		
9			The educational support per student is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid		
10			on a per student basis as provided in sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08.		
11		b.	School districts operating high schools not meeting the minimum curriculum		
12			as provided in section 15-41-24 or the teacher qualifications in section		
13			15-41-25 must be supported in the amount of two hundred twenty dollars,		
14			which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as		
15			provided in section 15-40.1-07.		
16		C.	School districts operating high schools that are not accredited pursuant to the		
17			accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public instruction on		
18			July 1, 1991, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding school year		
19			must be supported for the first year that they become unaccredited in the		
20			amount of the educational support per student established in subdivision a,		
21			which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per student basis as		
22			provided in section 15-40.1-07, but those school districts are not entitled to		
23			the amounts resulting from applying the factors in that section. The amount		
24			of aid a school district is entitled to under this subsection for each high school		
25			that is not accredited must be reduced by two hundred dollars times the		
26			number of students in the school for the second school year that the high		
27			school is unaccredited, and an additional two hundred dollars per student in		
28			the unaccredited school for each additional year the school remains		
29			unaccredited. Any high school that becomes accredited is entitled to the per		
30			student payments provided for in section 15-40.1-07 for the entire school year		
31			in which the school becomes accredited.		

1		d.	School districts operating elementary schools that are not accredited pursuant
2			to the accreditation standards adopted by the superintendent of public
3			instruction on July 1, 1992, or that become unaccredited in any succeeding
4			school year must be supported for the first year that they become
5			unaccredited in the amount of the educational support per student established
6			in subdivision a, which is the basis for calculating grants-in-aid on a per
7			student basis as provided in section 15-40.1-08, except that the amount of aid
8			that a school district is entitled to under this subsection for each elementary
9			school that is unaccredited must be reduced by two hundred dollars times the
10			number of students in the school each year that the elementary school is
11			unaccredited. Any elementary school that becomes accredited is entitled to
12			the per student payments provided for in section 15-40.1-08 for the entire
13			school year in which the school becomes accredited.

15		appo	ortionment provided in section 15-44-03, and per student aid under this
16		sect	ion, the amount of district, the superintendent of public instruction shall add the

18		educ	cation aid, and transportation aid for which a school district is eligible must be
19		adde	ed together, and from that total, subtract the following amounts must be
20		subt	racted:
21		a.	The product of thirty-two mills times the latest available net assessed and

23		b.	The amount that the unobligated general fund balance of a school district on
24			the preceding June thirtieth is in excess of three-fourths sixty percent of the
25			its actual expenditures, plus an additional twenty thousand dollars.

3		valuation and mill levy certifications are on file with the department of public		
4		instruction by December fifteenth.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-04 of the North Dakota Century Code as
 created by House Bill No. 1045, as approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-27-04. Per student payment. The per student payment to which each school
district is entitled for the first year of the biennium is two thousand one four hundred forty-five
twenty-seven dollars. The per student payment to which each school district is entitled for the
second year of the biennium is two thousand two four hundred thirty ninety dollars. The per
student amount is the basis for calculating state payments to school districts, as provided in
sections 15.1-27-06 and 15.1-27-07.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-05 of the North Dakota Century Code as
 created by House Bill No. 1045, as approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

13 15.1-27-05. School district equalization factor. To determine the amount of
payments due a school district, the superintendent of public instruction shall add the tuition
apportionment payments, per student payments, special education aid, and transportation aid
for which a school district is eligible and from that total subtract the following:

- The product of thirty-two mills times the latest available net assessed and
 equalized valuation of property in the district.
- The amount by which the unobligated general fund balance of the district on the
 preceding June thirtieth is in excess of seventy-five sixty percent of its actual
 expenditures, plus twenty thousand dollars.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 57-15-27 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

24 57-15-27. Interim fund. The governing body of any county, city, school district, park 25 district, or other municipality, other than a school district, which is authorized to levy taxes may 26 include in its budget an item to be known as the "interim fund" which must be carried over to 27 the next ensuing fiscal year to meet the cash requirements of all funds or purposes to which the 28 credit of the municipality may be legally extended, for that portion of such fiscal year prior to the 29 receipt of taxes therein. In no case may such the interim fund be in excess of the amount 30 reasonably required to finance the municipality for the first nine months of the next ensuing 31 fiscal year. Such The interim fund may not be in excess of three-fourths of the current annual

1	appropriation for all purposes other than debt retirement purposes and appropriations financed				
2	from bond sources and, for school districts, an additional twenty thousand dollars.				
3	SECTION 7. TEACHER MENTORING AND EVALUATION PROGRAMS -				
4	APPROVAL - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.				
5	1.	The education standards and practices board, with the advice and consent of the			
6		superintendent of public instruction, shall develop a proposal for:			
7		a. The development and implementation of teacher mentoring programs and			
8		teacher evaluation programs by school districts; and			
9		b. The approval of teacher mentoring and evaluation programs by the board.			
10	2.	The education standards and practices board shall present the proposal to a			
11		committee designated by the Legislative Council before July 1, 2002.			
12	SEC	CTION 8. CONTINGENT PAYMENT - DECLINING ENROLLMENT.			
13	1.	If the superintendent of public instruction determines that the portion of the			
14		grants-foundation aid and transportation line item designated for per student			
15		payments during the first year of the 2001-03 biennium in House Bill No. 1013, as			
16		approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, exceeds the estimated			
17		expenditure for per student payments during the first year of the biennium by an			
18		amount sufficient to provide for a distribution of \$150 per student to school districts			
19		whose 2000-01 fall enrollment is less than their 1997-98 fall enrollment, the			
20		superintendent shall distribute \$150 per student to those school districts.			
21	2.	If the superintendent of public instruction determines that the portion of the			
22		grants-foundation aid and transportation line item designated for per student			
23		payments during the first year of the biennium in House Bill No. 1013, as approved			
24		by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, does not exceed the estimated			
25		expenditure for per student payments during the first year of the biennium by the			
26		amount required for a payment under subsection 1, the superintendent may not			
27		distribute any amounts under subsection 1.			
28	3.	If the superintendent of public instruction determines that the portion of the			
29		grants-foundation aid and transportation line item designated for per student			
30		payments during the second year of the 2001-03 biennium in House Bill No. 1013,			
31		as approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, exceeds the estimated			

1		expenditure for per student payments during the second year of the biennium, the		
2		superintendent shall distribute \$250 per student to each school district in which the		
3		district's 2000-01 fall enrollment was less than the district's 1997-98 fall enrollment		
4		or a lesser proportionate amount if the amount available is insufficient to provide		
5		for a distribution of \$250 per student to those school districts.		
6	4.	No school district may receive payments for declining enrollments in excess of four		
7		hundred students under this section.		
8	SEC	TION 9. APPROPRIATION - GRANTS FOR NATIONAL TEACHER		
9	CERTIFICA	TION.		
10	1.	There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury,		
11		not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$83,000, or so much of the sum as may be		
12		necessary, to the education standards and practices board for the purpose of		
13		making grants to assist teachers in obtaining national certification, for the biennium		
14		beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2003.		
15	2.	An individual who is licensed to teach by the education standards and practices		
16		board or approved to teach by the education standards and practices board may		
17		file an application with the board for a grant to assist with the cost of obtaining		
18		national teacher certification after July 1, 2001.		
19	3.	The education standards and practices board shall review each application		
20		chronologically.		
21	4.	A successful applicant is eligible to receive a grant in the amount of \$1,150 to		
22		assist with the assessment costs of national teacher certification.		
23	5.	At the conclusion of each of the first four full school years after the individual		
24		obtains the national teacher certification, the individual is entitled to receive an		
25		additional \$1,500, if:		
26		a. The individual served during the school year as a full-time classroom teacher		
27		in a public school in this state; and		
28		b. The individual participated in any efforts of the employing school district to		
29		develop and implement teacher mentoring programs and teacher evaluation		
30		programs.		

1	SECTION 10. APPROPRIATION - PILOT PROJECT - STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT				
2	AND TEACHER QUALITY.				
3	1.	There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury,			
4		not	otherw	ise appropriated, the sum of \$340,000, or so much of the sum as may	
5		be r	necess	ary, to the superintendent of public instruction for the purpose of funding	
6		a pil	lot proj	ect designed to enhance student achievement and teacher quality as	
7		prov	vided ir	n this section, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2001, and ending	
8		Jun	e 30, 2	003.	
9	2.	The	superi	intendent of public instruction shall select two school districts, based on	
10		an a	applica	tion process, for participation in a pilot project designed to enhance	
11		stuc	lent ac	hievement and teacher quality during the 2001-03 biennium as provided	
12		in th	in this section. The school districts must be in different parts of the state.		
13	3.	To b	be eligi	ble to participate in the pilot project as provided in this section, a school	
14		disti	rict mu	st:	
15		a.	Have	over two thousand five hundred students in average daily membership;	
16		b.	Comr	nit to develop and implement:	
17			(1)	A mentoring program for individuals in their first three years of teaching;	
18			(2)	A professional development program that supports individual teacher	
19				improvement which is aligned to the district's student achievement	
20				goals and which provides research-based strategies for teaching,	
21				learning, and leadership;	
22			(3)	An evaluation program that establishes standards for teachers with	
23				respect to content knowledge, planning and preparation for instruction,	
24				instructional delivery, student assessment, classroom management,	
25				and professional responsibilities, and that requires an annual review by	
26				a team to determine adequate performance and eligibility for	
27				advancement; and	
28			(4)	A teacher compensation package that recognizes four categories of	
29				teachers from beginning to advanced and which sets the compensation	
30				level for each category based on the individual teacher's ability to meet	
31				or exceed the district's established standards for content knowledge,	

1			planning and preparation for instruction, instructional delivery, student	
2			assessment, classroom management, and professional responsibilities;	
3		C.	Contract with an individual who has the academic skills and managerial	
4			experience necessary to achieve the purposes of this section; and

6			the legislative council and obtain the approval of that committee.

8		sele	ected to participate in the pilot project the sum of \$20,000 to cover the direct

12		dist	rict has implemented a mentoring program, a professional development

16		yea	r, the superintendent shall forward \$150,000 to the district for use in funding	
17		the	teacher compensation package.

19	There is ap	propr	iated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise	
20	appropriate	d, the	e sum of \$200,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the	
21	superintend	dent c	of public instruction for the purpose of developing and implementing a school	
22	2 district employee compensation report as provided in section 2 of this Act, for the biennium			
23	beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2003.			
24	SECTION 12. APPROPRIATION - PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT. There is			
25	appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise			
26	appropriated, the sum of \$2,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the			
27	superintend	dent c	of public instruction for the purpose of funding an extension to the school	
28	calendar for professional development activities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2001, and			
29	ending Jun	e 30,	2003. Each school district shall extend its 2001-02 school calendar and its	
30	2002-03 sc	hool	calendar by one day beyond that of the district's 2000-01 school calendar.	
31	Each schoo	ol dist	rict shall use the additional day as a single block of time or incrementally for	

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- 1 professional development activities. As a result of the school calendar extension required by
- 2 this section, each school district shall ensure that the annual salary payable to each district
- 3 teacher reflects a proportionate increase.

SECTION 13. EFFECTIVE DATE. Subdivision b of subsection 3 of section 15-40.1-06
of the North Dakota Century Code as amended by section 1 of this Act and sections 5 and 6 of
this Act become effective on July 1, 2004.
