## SENATE BILL NO. 2099

- A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact subsection 3 of section 38-08-04.5, section 38-08-21,
- 2 and subsection 7 of section 38-12-01 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the
- 3 abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund, control of gas and oil resources,
- 4 and subsurface mineral regulation.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 3 of section 38-08-04.5 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
  - 3. All moneys collected under this section must be deposited in the abandoned oil and gas well plugging and site reclamation fund. This fund must be maintained as a special fund and all moneys transferred into the fund are hereby appropriated and must be used and disbursed solely for the purpose of defraying the costs incurred in carrying out the plugging or replugging of wells, the reclamation of well sites, and all other related activities. However, when the money fees accumulated in the fund exceeds two hundred fifty thousand dollars, any additional fees collected by the oil and gas division of the industrial commission must be deposited in the general fund.
- **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Section 38-08-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- **38-08-21.** Regulation of carbon dioxide and nitrogen gas. The commission is hereby vested with the authority and duty to regulate the exploration, development, and production of carbon dioxide, coal bed methane gas, helium gas, and nitrogen gas within the state, used for the development of oil and gas resources, in the same manner, insofar as is practicable, as it regulates oil or gas as defined in this chapter.

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- **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 7 of section 38-12-01 of the 1999 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
  - 7. "Subsurface minerals" means all naturally occurring elements and their compounds, volcanic ash, precious metals, carbonates, and natural mineral salts of boron, bromine, calcium, fluorine, helium, iodine, lithium, magnesium, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, sodium, thorium, uranium, and sulfur, and their compounds, but does not include sand and gravel and rocks crushed for sand and gravel.
