- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08 of the North
- 2 Dakota Century Code or in the alternative to amend and reenact sections 15.1-27-06 and
- 3 15.1-27-07 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the adjustment of weighting factors
- 4 for per student state aid payments to school districts.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. If House Bill No. 1045 does not become effective, section
 15-40.1-07 of the 1999 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and
 reenacted as follows:
 - **15-40.1-07.** High school per student payments Amount Proportionate payments. Payments must be made each year from state funds to each school district operating a high school and to each school district contracting to educate high school students in a federal school, subject to adjustment as provided in section 15-40.1-09, as follows:
 - 1. For each high school district having under seventy-five students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.625 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.625 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the educational support per student as provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

- 2. For each high school district having seventy-five or more, but less than one hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.335 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.335 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 3. For each high school district having one hundred fifty or more, but less than five hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.24 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.24 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 4. For each high school district having a total high school enrollment of five hundred fifty or more students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.14 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.14 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of high school students in grades nine through twelve registered in that school district, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the

1 five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by 2 the superintendent of public instruction. 3 5. For high schools having an approved alternative education program, the amount of 4 money resulting from multiplying the factor in: 5 Subsection 1 times the number of students registered in the alternative a. 6 education program, times the educational support per student provided in 7 section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has less than 8 seventy-five students in average daily membership. 9 Subsection 2 times the number of students registered in the alternative b. 10 education program, times the educational support per student provided in 11 section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has seventy-five or 12 more, but less than one hundred fifty students in average daily membership. 13 Subsection 3 times the number of students registered in the alternative C. 14 education program, times the educational support per student provided in 15 section 15-40.1-06, if the alternative education program has one hundred fifty 16 or more, but less than five hundred fifty students in average daily 17 membership. 18 Subsection 4 times the number of students registered in the alternative d. 19 education program times the educational support per student as provided in 20 section 15-40.1-06 if the alternative education program has five hundred fifty 21 or more students in average daily membership. 22 Every high school district must receive at least as much in total payments as it would have 23 received if it had the highest number of students in the next lower category. Payments may not 24 be made unless four or more units of standard high school work approved by the 25 superintendent of public instruction are offered during the current year, only licensed teachers 26 have been employed, and the other standards prescribed by this chapter have been met. 27 Payments must be made to the high school district in which the student is enrolled for 28 graduation and units of approved vocational education in accordance with the provisions of 29 chapter 15-20.1, and other courses approved by the superintendent of public instruction, 30 earned in another high school district must be included to meet the minimum four required 31 units. In the case of students enrolled in nonpublic schools for graduation or students enrolled

- 1 in less than four units of standard high school work who are in their fourth year of high school
- 2 coursework and who are enrolled in approved alternative high school curriculum programs,
- 3 proportionate payments must be made to the public school district in which the student is
- 4 enrolled for specific courses.

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SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. If House Bill No. 1045 does not become effective, section 15-40.1-08 of the 1999 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15-40.1-08. Elementary per student payments - Amount. Payments must be made from state funds to each school district operating an elementary school and to each school district contracting to educate elementary students in a federal school, employing teachers holding valid licenses in accordance with section 15-47-46 and chapter 15-36, adjusted as provided in section 15-40.1-09, as follows:

For each one-room rural school, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.28 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.28 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one through eight in average daily membership, up to a maximum of sixteen students, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. There must be paid .9 times each additional student in its school in grades one through eight in average daily membership times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty students in average daily membership. If the one-room rural school is located in a school district with another elementary school, the weighting factor for the students in grades one through six must be based on the average daily membership in the district in grades one through six as provided in subsections 2 through 4. If the one-room rural school is located in a school district with another school that has

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- students in grade seven or eight, the weighting factor for the students in grade seven or eight must be the same as that provided for in subsection 5.
- 2. For each elementary school in school districts having under one hundred students in average daily membership in grades one through six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.09 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.09 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher, times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty-five students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 3. For each elementary school in school districts having one hundred or more students in average daily membership in grades one through six, and provided the districts in which such schools are located have an average daily membership of less than one thousand elementary students in grades one through six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .905 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between .905 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

- 4. For each elementary school in school districts having an average daily membership of one thousand or more elementary students in grades one through six, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .95 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between .95 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades one through six in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 5. For each of the above classes of elementary schools, except for one-room rural schools that are not located in a district with another school having students in grade seven or eight, there must be paid to each school the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in grades seven and eight in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than thirty students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 6. For each elementary school having students under the compulsory age for school attendance, but not less than three years of age, in a special education program approved by the director of special education, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by

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- seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of special education students in that school under the compulsory age for school attendance in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student provided in section 15-40.1-06.

 Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 7. For each elementary school providing a kindergarten that is established according to provisions of section 15-45-01, the amount of money resulting from multiplying the factor .50 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between .50 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, times the number of students in that school in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher times the educational support per student, as provided under section 15-40.1-06, except that no payment may be made for more than twenty-five students in average daily membership in each classroom or for each teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The full per student payment may be made only to those kindergarten programs providing the equivalent of ninety full days of classroom instruction during any twelve-month period. Programs providing shorter periods of instruction during the same time period must receive a proportionately smaller per student payment.

The superintendent of public instruction shall make proportionate payments to each public school district educating students who are also enrolled in nonpublic schools.

Every school district must receive at least as much in total payments for elementary students as it would have received if it had the highest number of students in the next lower category.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-06 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by House Bill No. 1045, as approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-27-06. Per student payments - Weighting factors - High school students.

The superintendent of public instruction shall make payments each year, as provided for in this section, to each school district operating a high school and to each school district contracting to educate high school students in a federal school, subject to adjustment as provided in section 15.1-27-21.

- 1. Each district having under seventy-five students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.625 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.625 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in grades nine through twelve who are registered in that district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 2. Each district having at least seventy-five but fewer than one hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.335 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.335 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in grades nine through twelve who are registered in that district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 3. Each district having at least one hundred fifty but fewer than five hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve is entitled to

- receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.24 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.24 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in grades nine through twelve who are registered in that district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 4. Each district having at least five hundred fifty students in average daily membership in grades nine through twelve is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.14 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.14 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in grades nine through twelve who are registered in that district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 5. Each district having an approved alternative high school education program is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor in:
 - a. Subsection 1 by the number of students registered in the alternative education program, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04, if fewer than seventy-five students in average daily membership are enrolled in the alternative education program.
 - Subsection 2 by the number of students registered in the alternative education program, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04, if at least seventy-five but fewer than one hundred fifty students in average daily membership are enrolled in the alternative education program.

- c. Subsection 3 by the number of students registered in the alternative education program, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04, if at least one hundred fifty but fewer than five hundred fifty students in average daily membership are enrolled in the alternative education program.
 - d. Subsection 4 by the number of students registered in the alternative education program, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04, if at least five hundred fifty students in average daily membership are enrolled in the alternative education program.
- 6. In order to be eligible for enumeration under this section, a student:
 - a. Must have completed the work of the eighth grade;
 - b. Must not have completed the work of the twelfth grade; and
 - c. Must be a resident of this state or a nonresident attending a school in this state under the auspices of a foreign student exchange program.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-07 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by House Bill No. 1045, as approved by the fifty-seventh legislative assembly, is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-27-07. Per student payments - Weighting factors - Elementary school students. The superintendent of public instruction shall make payments each year, as provided for in this section, to each school district operating an elementary school and to each school district contracting to educate elementary students in a federal school, subject to adjustment as provided in section 15.1-27-21.

1. a. Each district having only a one-room rural school is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.28 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.28 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in average daily membership in grades one through eight in that school, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this

- category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The payment level provided for in this subdivision is applicable only to the first sixteen students.
- b. If the one-room rural school has more than sixteen students in average daily membership in grades one through eight, the district in which the school is located is entitled to receive ninety percent of the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04 for each additional student. The district is not entitled to any payment for more than twenty students in average daily membership.
- c. If a one-room rural school is located in a district having another elementary school, the weighting factor for the students in grades one through six must be based on the average daily membership in the district in grades one through six, as provided in this section.
- d. If a one-room rural school is located in a school district with another school that has students in grade seven or eight, the weighting factor for the students in grade seven or eight must be the same as that provided for in subsection 5.
- 2. Except as provided in subsection 1, each school district having fewer than one hundred students in average daily membership in grades one through six is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.09 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.09 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in average daily membership in grades one through six in the district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. The payment provided for in this subsection is applicable only to the first twenty-five students in average daily membership per classroom or per teacher. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 3. Each school district having at least one hundred students but fewer than one thousand students in average daily membership in grades one through six is

- entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor .905 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy-five eighty-five percent of the difference between .905 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in average daily membership in grades one through six in the district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The payment provided for in this subsection is applicable only to the first thirty students in average daily membership per classroom or per teacher.
- 4. Each school district having at least one thousand students in average daily membership in grades one through six is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor .95 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between .95 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in average daily membership in grades one through six in the district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The payment provided for in this subsection is applicable only to the first thirty students in average daily membership per classroom or per teacher.
- 5. Each school district having students in grades seven and eight is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of students in average daily membership in grades seven and eight in the district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents

- the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The payment provided for in this subsection is applicable only to the first thirty students in average daily membership per classroom or per teacher. The payments provided for in this subsection are not available for students who attend a one-room rural school if that school is the only one in the district that offers educational services to students in grades seven and eight.
- 6. Each school district having a special education program approved by the director of special education is entitled to receive, for each student who is enrolled in the program and who is at least three years of age but less than the compulsory age for school attendance, the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor 1.01 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by seventy five eighty-five percent of the difference between 1.01 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of special education students in average daily membership in the program who are at least three years of age but less than the compulsory age for school attendance, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 7. a. Each school district operating a kindergarten as provided for in section 15.1-22-02 is entitled to receive the amount of money that results from multiplying the factor .50 adjusted for the first year of the biennium by eighty-five percent of the difference between .50 and the factor representing the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction, by the number of kindergarten students in average daily membership in the district, times the per student payment provided for in section 15.1-27-04. Beginning July 1, 2002, the factor is that which represents the five-year average cost of education per student for this category, as determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The payment provided for in this subsection is

1 applicable only to the first twenty-five students in average daily membership 2 per classroom or per teacher. 3 In order to receive the full per student payment available under this section, a b. 4 district must operate a kindergarten program that provides the equivalent of ninety full days of classroom instruction during a twelve-month period. A 5 6 district is entitled to a prorated payment under this section if it operates a 7 kindergarten program of shorter duration. 8 8. Each school district that educates students who are also enrolled in nonpublic 9 schools is entitled to receive proportionate payments under this section. 10 9. Each school district is entitled to receive as much in total payments for elementary 11 students as it would have received if it had the highest number of students in the 12 next lower category. 13 A school district is not entitled to any payments provided for by this chapter unless 10. 14 each teacher employed by the district: 15 Holds a teaching license issued by the education standards and practices a. 16 board; or 17 b. Has been approved to teach by the education standards and practices board.
