- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 54-03.1-03 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to the agenda of the organizational session.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 54-03.1-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 54-03.1-03. Agenda. The agenda of the organizational session must include, but is not
 limited to, the following:
- 8 1. Orientation classes upon legislative rules and procedure for new legislators;
- 9 2. Presentation of reports by legislative interim boards or committees or
- 10 <u>commissions;</u>
- Party caucuses to determine which party has a majority in each house of the
 legislative assembly and thereafter proceed to select party nominees for officers of
- 13 cach body review proposed legislative rules and committee assignments, as
 14 appropriate;
- 15 4. Appointment of employment procedural committees to process applications for
- positions of employment with the legislative assembly and make recommendation
 for hiring the selected employees;
- 18 5. Appointment of a senate committee on committees;
- Each legislator shall present the legislator's committee appointment preferences to
 the speaker of the majority party or the chairman of the interim senate committee
 on committees;
- 22 7. Presentation of the budget and revenue proposals recommended by the governor
 23 as provided in section 54-44.1-07; and

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- 1 8. <u>6.</u> All other similar matters, in order that the legislative assembly be fully organized
 - and ready to begin its business by the first day of the regular session.

NOTE: The proposed amendments to Section 54-03.1-03 update the section's contents, which are to be included in the agenda for the organizational session, as identified in the caption to the section.

The change to subsection 2 recognizes that there are interim commissions, e.g., the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, rather than boards. The change to subsection 3 recognizes the current practices of selecting leaders before the organizational session convenes, rather than during the organizational session. The change to subsection 4 recognizes that all procedural committees are appointed and some begin work during the organizational session, e.g., the Committees on Committees and the Rules Committees. A reference to appointment of standing committees is not included because in some cases appointments have been made when the regular session convenes in January. Subsections 5 and 6 are deleted to remove a specific reference to appointment of the Senate Committees, which is now covered by the amended subsection 4. Subsection 6 is deleted because presentation of committee preferences is not technically an agenda item and occurs before the organizational session convenes. Subsection 6 (currently subsection 8) is a generic provision, which allows any other item to be on the agenda.
