Mark Bachmeier (Commissioner of Labor): Supports with written testimony. In addition, Bachmeier noted that when the law was written, employment agencies charged job seekers.

Laws were in place so they did not charge too much. Now employers pay. This has been a fundamental shift in the industry.

Chairman Mutch and members of the Industry, Business, and Labor Committee, good morning. For the record, I am Mark Bachmeier, Commissioner of Labor.

North Dakota Century Code Chapter 34-13 is North Dakota's employment agency licensing law. It requires permanent-placement employment agencies operating in the state to submit an application, a \$200 license fee, proof of a bond, and copies of all fee schedules and contracts for approval by the Commissioner of Labor annually.

When ours, and similar laws in other states, were enacted, employment agencies were businesses that charged fees to individual workers to find jobs for them. Employment agency licensing laws were enacted to protect individual workers from being charged excessive fees or asked to agree with other unreasonable terms in exchange for a job. Over time, however, the employment agency industry has become one in which employment agencies charge fees to employers to provide workers for them. Of twenty-three agencies currently licensed in North Dakota, only one charges any fee to an individual worker under any circumstance.

Because of this fundamental change in the industry, from "employee paid" to "employer paid", the regulatory purpose for which employment agency licensing laws were intended no longer exists. For exactly this reason, many states, including Minnesota, lowa, South Dakota, and Montana, have repealed their employment agency licensing laws. I am not proposing to repeal our law entirely because we cannot be absolutely certain that economic or other conditions will never turn the industry back to charging fees to individual workers again. Instead, I am to proposing, in SB 2079, to stipulate that employment agencies are not subject to licensure if they charge fees exclusively to employers. I believe this proposal eliminates an unnecessary set of regulations for practical purposes without eliminating protections for individuals if and when they are asked to pay fees for employment agency services.

This bill carries a small fiscal impact of approximately \$4,400 per year because it would largely eliminate the collection of employment agency licensure fees.
