## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3040

1	A concurrent resolution urging the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Army,
2	and the United States Army Corps of Engineers to adopt and implement an updated Missouri
3	River Master Water Control Manual that gives fair consideration to the substantial recreation
4	values present on Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the Missouri River in North Dakota.
5	WHEREAS, potential for economic growth and long-term stability in western North
6	Dakota rests to an increasing degree on the recreational usability of and tourist visitations to
7	Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the Missouri River in North Dakota; and
8	WHEREAS, visitations to Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the Missouri River in North
9	Dakota are forecast to increase dramatically due to the bicentennial celebration of the
10	exploration of the Missouri River by Lewis and Clark; and
11	WHEREAS, after 50 years since the closing of the Garrison Dam the federal
12	government generally and the United States Army Corps of Engineers specifically have failed to
13	adequately develop the recreation potential that exists in Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the
14	Missouri River in North Dakota; and
15	WHEREAS, failure of the federal government and the United States Army Corps of
16	Engineers to facilitate development of recreation potentials will result in an unsatisfactory
17	experience for the hundreds of thousands of North Dakota visitors expected during the Lewis
18	and Clark Bicentennial; and
19	WHEREAS, the United States Army Corps of Engineers' delays in accounting for
20	contemporary system uses and economic growth potential have severely hampered private and
21	local government recreation development along Lake Sakakawea, Lake Oahe, and the Missouri
22	River in North Dakota; and
23	WHEREAS, system management based on the current Missouri River Master Water
24	Control Manual during the current and recent droughts has unnecessarily caused Lake
25	Sakakawea and Lake Oahe water levels to fall to crisis levels; thus, compounding the negative

1	environment for state, tribal, and local governments and the private sector to develop the
2	economic potential of one of North Dakota's most important natural resources; and
3	WHEREAS, system management based on the current Missouri River Master Water
4	Control Manual effectively gives unfair, higher priority to downstream business interests at the
5	expense of upstream business, recreation, and environmental interests; and
6	WHEREAS, any proposed change to the current Missouri River Master Water Control
7	Manual included in the United States Army Corps of Engineers' revised draft environment
8	impact statement would be an improvement for endangered species in the Missouri River
9	System, specifically the pallid sturgeon, least tern, and piping plover; and
10	WHEREAS, the United States Army Corps of Engineers has delayed updating its
11	Missouri River Master Water Control Manual even though the mandatory deadline for such an
12	update has long passed;
13	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
14	OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:
15	That the Fifty-eighth Legislative Assembly urges the President to direct the United
16	States Army Corps of Engineers to complete and release a final, updated Missouri River Master
17	Water Control Manual as its highest priority and to commit sufficient funds and other resources
18	to fully develop the recreation potentials of the Missouri River System in North Dakota; and
19	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of State forward copies of this
20	resolution to the Division Commander of the Missouri River Division of the United States Army
21	Corps of Engineers; the Secretary of the Army; the Secretary of the Interior; the District
22	Engineer, Omaha District, United States Army Corps of Engineers; the Governor; each member
23	of the State Water Commission; and each member of the North Dakota, South Dakota,
24	Wyoming, and Montana Congressional Delegations.
