- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact sections 20.1-03-36.1, 20.1-03-36.2, 20.1-03-38,
- 2 20.1-03-39, and 20.1-03-40 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the licensing of
- 3 guides and outfitters; to amend and reenact sections 20.1-01-02, 20.1-02-05, 20.1-03-11.2,
- 4 20.1-03-12, 20.1-03-36, and 20.1-03-37 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to guides
- 5 and outfitters; to provide a penalty; to provide for application; and to provide an effective date.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is
amended and reenacted as follows:

9 20.1-01-02. Definitions. In this title, unless the context or subject matter otherwise
10 requires:

- "Afield" means being away from one's home or camp. The term does not include
 driving or being in actual physical control of a motor vehicle in violation of section
 39-08-01 or equivalent ordinance.
- "Any part thereof" or "the parts thereof" includes the hide, horns, or hoofs of any
 animal specified and the plumage, skin, and every other part of any bird specified.
- 16 3. "Associated equipment" means:
- 17 a. Any system, part, or component of a boat as originally manufactured or any
 18 similar part or component manufactured or sold for replacement, repair, or
 19 improvement of such system, part, or component;
- b. Any accessory or equipment for, or appurtenance to, a boat; and
- c. Any marine safety article, accessory, or equipment intended for use by a
 person on board a boat; but
- 23 d. Excluding radio equipment.

1	4.	"Big game" means deer, moose, elk, bighorn sheep, mountain goats, and
2		antelope.
3	5.	"Boat" means any vessel:
4		a. Manufactured or used primarily for noncommercial use;
5		b. Leased, rented, or chartered to another for the latter's noncommercial use; or
6		c. Engaged in the carrying of six or fewer passengers.
7	6.	"Confiscate" or "confiscated" means to hold subject to the order of a court of
8		competent jurisdiction.
9	7.	"Consideration" means something of value given or done in exchange for
10		something of value given or done by another.
11	<u>8.</u>	"Day leasing" means the practice of an outfitter entering a short-term lease
12		agreement that is intended to and does last less than twenty-four hours.
13	<u>9.</u>	"Department" means the game and fish department.
14	8. <u>10.</u>	"Deputy director" means the deputy director of the department.
15	9. <u>11.</u>	"Director" means the director of the department.
16	10. <u>12.</u>	"Endangered species" means any species whose prospects of survival or
17		recruitment within the state are in jeopardy due to any of the following factors:
18		a. The destruction, drastic modification, or severe curtailment of its habitat.
19		b. Its overutilization for scientific, commercial, or sporting purposes.
20		c. The effect on it of disease, pollution, or predation.
21		d. Other natural or manmade factors affecting its prospects of survival or
22		recruitment within the state.
23		e. Any combination of the foregoing factors.
24		The term also includes any species classified as endangered pursuant to the
25		Endangered Species Act of 1973, Public Law 93-205.
26	11. <u>13.</u>	"Established road or trail" means any public highway or road, improved or
27		otherwise, dedicated for public ingress or egress, or any other road or trail
28		normally used for travel but does not include temporary trails across cultivated land
29		used for agricultural purposes.

1	12.	<u>14.</u>	"Fur-bearers" includes mink, muskrats, weasels, wolverines, otters, martens,
2			fishers, kit or swift foxes, beavers, raccoons, badgers, wolves, coyotes, bobcats,
3			lynx, mountain lions, black bears, and red or gray foxes.
4	13.	<u>15.</u>	"Game birds" includes all varieties of geese, brant, swans, ducks, plovers, snipes,
5			woodcocks, grouse, sagehens, pheasants, Hungarian partridges, quails,
6			partridges, cranes, rails, coots, wild turkeys, mourning doves, and crows.
7	14.	<u>16.</u>	"Guide" or "outfitter" means any resident an individual who holds that person out to
8			the public as a guide or outfitter, and who provides, for compensation,
9			transportation, equipment, arrangement of lodging, or that person's own or
10			another's personal services for the primary purpose of assisting a person or
11			persons to locate or catch fish or to locate, pursue, or hunt small game, big game,
12			or fur-bearers. Nonresidents are not entitled to act as guides or outfitters in this
13			state is employed by or contracts with a licensed outfitter to help the outfitter
14			furnish personal services for the conduct of outdoor recreational activities directly
15			related to the conduct of activities for which the employing outfitter is licensed.
16	15.	<u>17.</u>	"Gun dogs" includes any dog used to hunt protected wildlife.
17	16.	<u>18.</u>	"Harmful wild birds" includes blackbirds, magpies, English sparrows, and starlings.
18	17.	<u>19.</u>	"Harmless wild birds" includes all wild birds not defined herein as "harmful wild
19			birds" or "game birds".
20	18.	<u>20.</u>	"Hunt" or "hunting" means shooting, shooting at, pursuing, taking, attempting to
21			take, or killing any game animals and game birds; searching for or attempting to
22			locate or flush any game animals and game birds; luring, calling, or attempting to
23			attract game animals and game birds; hiding for the purpose of taking or
24			attempting to take game animals and game birds; and walking, crawling, or
25			advancing toward wildlife while possessing implements or equipment useful in the
26			taking of game animals or game birds. The term does not include possessing or
27			using photographic equipment.
28	19.	<u>21.</u>	"Manufacturer" means any person engaged in:
29			a. The manufacture, construction, or assembly of boats or associated
30			equipment.

1			b. The manufacture or construction of components for boats and associated
2			equipment to be sold for subsequent assembly.
3			c. The importation into the state for sale of boats, associated equipment, or
4			components thereof.
5	20. 2	2.	"Motorboat" means any vessel propelled by machinery, whether or not the
6			machinery is the principal source of propulsion. The term does not include a
7			vessel having a valid marine document issued by the bureau of customs of the
8			United States government or any federal agency successor thereto.
9	21. 2	<u>.</u>	"Motor-driven vehicle" means any land vehicle, with or without wheels, that is
10			propelled by any motor.
11	22. 2	<u>.</u>	"Operate" means to navigate or otherwise use a motorboat or a vessel.
12	23. 2	<u>25.</u>	"Outfitter" means an individual who, while engaging in any of the acts enumerated
13			in this subsection in any manner, advises or otherwise holds the individual's
14			business operation out to the public for hire or consideration; provides facilities or
15			services for consideration; or maintains, leases, or otherwise uses equipment or
16			accommodations for consideration for the conduct of outdoor recreational
17			activities, including hunting animals or birds and fishing on lakes, reservoirs, rivers,
18			and streams. An outfitter may act as a guide. The term does not include a person
19			holding title or an equitable interest in business operations if the primary purpose
20			of the business operation is to provide food or lodging to the general public,
21			chamber of commerce activities, travel agencies, or others that offer free
22			information to attract outdoor and recreational use of their communities.
23	2	6.	"Owner" means a person, other than a lienholder, having the property in or title to
24			a motorboat. The term includes a person entitled to the use or possession of a
25			motorboat subject to an interest in another person, reserved or created by
26			agreement and securing payment or performance of an obligation, but the term
27			excludes a lessee under a lease not intended as security.
28	24. 2	<u>.</u> 7.	"Passenger" means every person carried on board a vessel other than:
29			a. The owner or the owner's representative.
30			b. The operator.

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- 1c.Bona fide members of the crew engaged in the business of the vessel who2have contributed no consideration for their carriage and who are paid for their3services.
- 4 d. Any guest on board a vessel which is being used exclusively for pleasure
 5 purposes who has not contributed any consideration, directly or indirectly, for
 6 that person's carriage.
- 7 25. 28. "Person" includes every partnership, association, corporation, and limited liability
 8 company. No violation of this title may be excused because it was done as the
 9 agent or employee of another, nor because it was committed by or through an
 10 agent or employee of the person charged.
- 26. <u>29.</u> "Personal watercraft" means a motorboat that is powered by an inboard motor
 powering a water jet pump or by an inboard or outboard marine engine and which
 is designed to be operated by a person sitting, standing, or kneeling on the craft,
 rather than in a conventional manner of sitting or standing inside a motorboat.
- 15 27. 30. "Possession" means control, actual possession, and constructive possession of
 16 the article or thing specified.
- 17 28. 31. "Private fish hatchery" means a body of water, whether natural or artificial, and any 18 other facilities used, maintained, or operated by any private person, firm, 19 corporation, or limited liability company for the propagation and production of fish 20 for sale or planting in other waters. Except in the case of trout, walleye, northern 21 pike, and crappie, which may be raised in a private fish hatchery without the 22 director's approval, the director may, by rule, regulate the species of fish which 23 may be raised in a private fish hatchery. No waters stocked by any state or federal 24 governmental agency may be considered a private fish hatchery.
- 25 29. <u>32.</u> "Public waters" means waters to which the general public has a right to access.
- 30. 33. "Resident" means any person who has actually lived within this state or maintained
 that person's home therein for at least six months immediately preceding the date
 that residence is to be determined. A "nonresident" is any person who has not
 done so.
- 30 31. 34. "Resident species" means any species nearly all of whose individuals in this state
 31 are located within this state for at least three-fourths of annual cycle of the species.

1	32.	<u>35.</u>	"Retrieve" means to have taken possession and made ready for transportation.
2	33.	<u>36.</u>	"Sell" and "sale" means any sale or offer to sell, or possession with intent to sell,
3			use, or dispose of, the article or thing specified, contrary to law.
4	34.	<u>37.</u>	"Shooting preserve" or "preserve" means any privately owned or leased acreage
5			[hectarage] on which hatchery-raised game birds are released to be hunted for a
6			fee over an extended season.
7	35.	<u>38.</u>	"Sinkbox" or "sunken device" means a raft or any type of low floating device having
8			a depression that affords a hunter a means of concealing that person below the
9			surface of the water.
10	36.	<u>39.</u>	"Slow or no wake speed" means the slowest possible speed necessary to maintain
11			steerage.
12	37.	<u>40.</u>	"Small game" includes all game birds and tree squirrels.
13	38.	<u>41.</u>	"Species" includes any subspecies of wildlife and any other group of wildlife of the
14			same species or smaller tax in common spatial arrangement that interbreed when
15			mature.
16	39.	<u>42.</u>	"Threatened species" means any species which is likely to become an endangered
17			species within the foreseeable future and includes any species classified as
18			threatened pursuant to the Endangered Species Act of 1973, Public Law 93-205.
19	40.	<u>43.</u>	"Undocumented vessel" means a vessel which does not have a valid marine
20			document as a vessel of the United States.
21	41.	<u>44.</u>	"Vessel" means any watercraft, other than a seaplane on the water, used or
22			capable of being used as a means of transportation on water.
23	42.	<u>45.</u>	"Waterfowl" includes all varieties of geese, brant, swans, ducks, rails, and coots.
24	43.	<u>46.</u>	"Waters" when not qualified means waters not open to the general public.
25	44.	<u>47.</u>	"Waters of the state" means all waters of this state, including boundary waters.
26			This title extends to and is in force and effect over, upon, and in all such waters.
27	45.	<u>48.</u>	"Wildlife" means any member of the animal kingdom including any mammal, fish,
28			bird (including any migratory, nonmigratory, or endangered bird for which
29			protection is also afforded by treaty or other international agreement), amphibian,
30			reptile, mollusk, crustacean, or other invertebrate, and includes any part, product,
31			egg, or offspring thereof, or the dead body or parts thereof. Wildlife does not

1 include domestic animals as defined by section 36-01-00.1 or birds or animals held 2 in private ownership. 3 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-02-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is 4 amended and reenacted as follows: 5 **20.1-02-05. Powers of director.** The director may: 6 1. Fix the salaries and the necessary travel and other expenses of department 7 personnel subject to law and legislative appropriations. 8 2. Employ any part-time personnel necessary to run the director's office and remove 9 the employees at will. Salaries and necessary traveling and other expenses of 10 these appointees must be authorized, audited, and paid in the same manner as 11 salaries and expenses of state officers. 12 3. Accept from any person, or gather, or purchase, fish, spawn, or fry, for distribution 13 in state waters. 14 Take alive at any time, under the director's personal supervision or under the 4. 15 personal supervision of any of the director's bonded appointees, any birds or 16 animals for propagation purposes or for exchange with other states and foreign 17 countries for game birds and animals of other species. 18 5. Order additional protection for any fish with an open season when, after 19 investigation, the director finds danger of extinction, undue depletion in any waters, 20 or to aid in the propagation and protection of immature fish, by prescribing how, 21 how many, where, and when the fish may be taken. The orders have the force of 22 law. 23 6. Take or cause to be taken at any time from any state public waters any suckers, 24 carp, or pickerel. 25 7. With the governor's approval, purchase, lease, or condemn real estate, when it is 26 required to carry out this title, and sell it when it is no longer required, in the name 27 of the state. 28 Lease up to ninety-nine years any department land, for the purpose of 8. 29 development and improvement, to any nonprofit corporation, upon consideration of 30 specified improvements to be made by the corporation and other improvements 31 the department and the corporation may agree upon. The lease must provide that

1 all funds received by the corporation through lease of the property be expended 2 upon the leased premises for development and improvements. The corporation 3 has the authority, subject to approval by the director, to sublease the premises for 4 cabin sites and other recreational purposes. Upon termination of the lease, the 5 leased property, together with all improvements, reverts to the department. 6 9. With the governor's approval, enter into agreements with the bureau of reclamation 7 for the management of lands in the Heart Butte area acquired by the bureau for the 8 construction of dams on lakes or streams. Revenues derived from the 9 management of these lands or received from any federal agency for expenditure 10 upon these lands may not be commingled with other game and fish funds, but 11 must be deposited by the director in a separate account. These funds are hereby 12 appropriated for expenditure for purposes as may be agreed upon by the bureau of 13 reclamation, the United States fish and wildlife service, the national park service, 14 and the director. The authority herein granted by this subsection is effective only 15 until the lands are resold to the former landowners by the bureau of reclamation.

- 16 10. Secure specimens of game birds, animals, and fish for breeding purposes by
 17 purchase or otherwise and by exchange with the game commissions or state game
 18 wardens of other states or countries.
- 19 11. Issue special permits to shoot wildlife from a stationary motor vehicle upon 20 application from individuals who are physically unable to walk for purposes of 21 hunting or taking wildlife or who have lost the use of an arm at or below the elbow. 22 The application must be accompanied by a physician's statement verifying the 23 person's condition, and if used to hunt on lands controlled by the board of 24 university and school lands, must designate the land on which the individual 25 intends to hunt. The permittee must have permission from the lessee and the 26 commissioner of university and school lands to hunt on lands controlled by the 27 board of university and school lands. A permit issued under this subsection allows 28 the permittee to drive, or to be driven, onto any land for the purposes of hunting 29 wildlife, except that neither any other passenger within the vehicle nor the driver, if 30 someone other than the permittee, may be a hunter, unless the other person is 31 also a permittee. Provided, however, that if the land is privately owned and if the

- permittee is not going to drive or be driven along an established road or trail, the
 permittee must first obtain the consent of the owner or lessee to hunt on the land in
 the manner provided in this title.
- Issue to any person individual, who is a paraplegic or who has lost the use of one
 or both arms, a special permit to hunt game with a crossbow if that person
 individual otherwise complies with and qualifies under the licensing and other
 provisions of this title.
- 8 13. Issue any resident license prescribed by this title to a person an individual who has 9 come to the state with a bona fide intention of becoming a resident, even though 10 that person individual has not been a resident of this state for the required time 11 period immediately preceding the application for the license, or to any person 12 individual who is a member of the United States armed forces and who is within 13 the state on duty or leave, or to any employee of the United States fish and wildlife 14 service or the conservation department of any state or province of Canada in the 15 state to advise or consult with the department. No license may be issued under 16 this subsection unless an affidavit of a bona fide resident, setting forth the actual 17 conditions, accompanies the application. This subsection does not apply to lottery 18 permits, except that the director shall issue a resident deer hunting license to any 19 resident of this state who is a member of the United States armed forces stationed 20 outside this state and who shows proof of North Dakota residence and who pays 21 the appropriate licensing fee. A deer license issued to a member of the United 22 States armed forces under this subsection must be issued without being subject to 23 the lottery for deer hunting licenses.
- 14. Adopt rules, and issue permits for the transporting or introducing of fish, fish eggs,
 small game, big game, or fur-bearers after determining that the fish, fish eggs,
 birds, or animals have been properly inspected for disease, and that the
 transplanting or introduction will be in compliance with state laws and rules. No
 person may transplant or introduce any fish or fish eggs into any of the public
 waters of this state, or transplant or introduce any species of small game, big
 game, or fur-bearers into this state without obtaining a permit from the director.

- 1 15. Pursuant to section 4-01-17.1, cooperate with the agriculture commissioner, the 2 United States fish and wildlife service, and other agencies in the destruction of 3 predatory animals, destructive birds, and injurious field rodents. The director is 4 hereby authorized to may adopt rules in accordance with organized and systematic 5 plans of the department of the interior for the destruction of these birds and 6 animals. The director may determine the necessity and issue permits and rules 7 and regulations therefor for the operation and use of private aircraft to assist in the 8 destruction of the above birds and animals and aid in the administration or 9 protection of land, water, wildlife, livestock, domesticated animals, human life, or 10 crops. 11 16. Exercise authority to establish programs and rules and administer state and 12 federal funds provided to the state for the preservation and management of 13 resident species determined by the director to be threatened or endangered 14 species of wildlife. The authority exercised must be in compliance with the
- Endangered Species Act of 1973, Public Law 93-205. Any person who violates
 rules established adopted under this subsection is guilty of a class B
 misdemeanor.
- Subject to chapter 28-32, adopt rules for the licensing of guides or outfitters and
 may require records and reports as the director determines necessary. The
 director may, after due hearing as provided in chapter 28-32, revoke or refuse to
 renew the license of a person who violates the rules or fails to provide the records
 and reports.
- Provide for the funding of a private land habitat and access improvement program
 with moneys derived from the interest earned on the game and fish fund and
 habitat restoration stamp fees. The director shall place these funds in a special
 fund called the "game and fish department private land habitat and access
 improvement fund".
- 28 <u>19.</u> <u>18.</u> Carry out a private land habitat and access improvement program by:
- a. Entering into cost-sharing, habitat enhancement, and access agreements with
 landowners or agencies working on private land to help defray all or a portion

1		of their share of local, state, or federally sponsored conservation practices
2		considered beneficial to fish and wildlife.
3		b. Leasing and developing fish and wildlife habitat or sport fishing areas on
4		private land. Public access to leased land may not be prohibited.
5		c. Carrying out practices that will alleviate depredations caused by predatory
6		animals and big game animals.
7		d. Publishing a brochure on an annual basis describing areas funded from the
8		game and fish department private land habitat and access improvement fund
9		which are open to public access in this state.
10		e. Receiving advice from the game and fish advisory board concerning
11		expenditures from the game and fish private land habitat and access
12		improvement fund.
13	20. <u>19.</u>	Subject to prior approval of the attorney general, lease or exchange lands under
14		the director's jurisdiction or control which are deemed necessary for the improved
15		management of wildlife resources.
16	21. <u>20.</u>	Subject to prior approval of the attorney general, impose any conditions or
17		reservations to the leases or exchanges as the director determines necessary.
18	22. <u>21.</u>	Adopt rules and issue permits for conducting fishing contests involving public
19		waters of the state. The director by rule shall define the term "fishing contest" and
20		shall set criteria for which a fishing contest permit is required. The director may
21		deny permits. No person may conduct a fishing contest on public waters without
22		first receiving a permit issued by the director.
23	23. <u>22.</u>	Issue duplicates of lost or destroyed game and fish licenses or permits. The
24		procedure for reissuing the licenses or permits and fees to be charged must be
25		prescribed by the director by rule.
26	24. <u>23.</u>	Establish noncriminal penalties for any rules adopted by the director. The
27		maximum noncriminal penalty that may be set by the director is a fine of two
28		hundred fifty dollars. Violation of any rule not designated as having a noncriminal
29		penalty is considered a criminal violation as established in the appropriate chapter
30		of this title.

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- 125. 24.Issue, as a means of encouraging and promoting economic development in this2state, complimentary fishing licenses to nonresident visiting dignitaries. The3circumstances and conditions of complimentary fishing licenses issued must be4determined by the director. The number of complimentary licenses may not5exceed fifty licenses per year. The director shall determine the visiting dignitaries6to be of national or international stature before they are eligible for complimentary7licenses.
- 8 <u>26.</u> <u>25.</u> Carry out a coyote depredation prevention program by conducting practices that
 9 will alleviate depredations caused by coyotes.
- 10 27. 26. Issue, as a means of rewarding dedication to teaching firearm hunter safety, 11 complimentary lifetime resident certificates provided under subsection 53 of 12 section 20.1-03-12 and combination licenses provided under section 20.1-03-11.1 13 to resident certified hunter education volunteer instructors. Eligible persons must 14 have served as a lead or assistant certified hunter education volunteer instructor in 15 this state for a minimum of one course in each of thirty years. The license is 16 known as the "lifetime combination license" and must be signed by the director and 17 the person receiving the license. The license must be revoked by the director if 18 the license holder is convicted of a felony or found to have violated any provision 19 of this title.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-03-11.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

22 20.1-03-11.2. Certified guides and Hunting outfitters - White-tailed deer licenses -23 **Fees.** The governor shall make one-half of the antlered white-tailed deer licenses and permits 24 allocated to nonresidents under subsection 4 of section 20.1-03-11, up to a maximum of one 25 hundred licenses, available to certified quides or hunting outfitters licensed in this state. A 26 certified guide or hunting outfitter may not purchase or obtain more than five white-tailed deer 27 licenses under this section in any one year. A certified guide or hunting outfitter shall pay the 28 fee required for a white-tailed deer license sold to guides or outfitters and provided by them to 29 nonresidents for each license purchased under this section. A certified guide or hunting 30 outfitter may provide to nonresidents, for compensation, big game guiding and outfitting 31 services and one white-tailed deer license per nonresident as provided in this section to hunt

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1	15.	For a license to a resident buyer or shipper of green furs, eight dollars for each
2		place of business maintained by that person within this state.
3	16.	For a license to a resident traveling agent, buyer, or shipper of green furs, twenty
4		dollars.
5	17.	For an annual license to practice taxidermy, twenty-five dollars.
6	18.	For a permit to ship, by a person having a resident hunting license, during the
7		respective open seasons, not to exceed in any one season twenty-five game birds,
8		to points within this state other than that person's home or to points outside this
9		state, three dollars.
10	19.	For a permit to make collections of protected birds and animals for scientific
11		purposes, ten dollars.
12	20.	For a motorboat certificate of number and license: Each motorboat under sixteen
13		feet [4.88 meters] in length, and all canoes, regardless of length, powered by a
14		motor, twelve dollars. Each motorboat sixteen feet [4.88 meters] in length and
15		over but shorter than twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length, excluding canoes,
16		twenty-four dollars. Each motorboat twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length or over
17		excluding canoes, thirty-three dollars.
18	21.	To operate watercraft used for hire, the following license fees apply for three years:
19		Class 1. Each craft capable of carrying two adults of average weight,
20		six dollars.
21		Class 2. Each craft capable of carrying three adults of average weight,
22		six dollars.
23		Class 3. Each craft capable of carrying four adults of average weight,
24		six dollars.
25		Class 4. Each craft capable of carrying five adults of average weight,
26		six dollars.
27		Class 5. Each craft capable of carrying up to eight adults of average weight,
28		nine dollars.
29		Class 6. Each craft capable of carrying up to ten adults of average weight,
30		twelve dollars.
31		Class 7. Each craft capable of carrying up to fifteen adults of average weight,

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1		twenty-four dollars.
2		Class 8. Each craft capable of carrying sixteen or more adults of average weight,
3		thirty dollars.
4	22.	For the taking of undesirable fish from the waters of this state pursuant to section
5		20.1-06-05, fifteen dollars for each hoop-net or trap, and fifteen dollars for each
6		seine of fifty feet [15.24 meters] or any fraction thereof.
7	23.	For a license to erect, have, and maintain on the ice in this state a fishhouse used
8		or to be used to protect one while ice fishing or a dark house used or to be used
9		for spearfishing, ten dollars for each unit.
10	24.	For a resident paddlefish tag annual license, three dollars per tag.

8	distinct offenses. In addition to this penalty, the director may initiate civil action in a court of			
9	competent jurisdiction as necessary to enforce this chapter or any rule adopted under this			
10	chapter, including an injunction to restrain a violation, without proof of actual damages			
11	sustained by any person. Any individual guiding or outfitting while under suspension,			
12	revocation, or denial is guilty of a class A misdemeanor. Any individual who commits for			
13	remuneration or compensation an act of fraud involving hunting or fishing or any individual who			
14	illegally takes or causes death to fish or wildlife for remuneration or compensation may be			
15	prosecuted for theft, fraud, or conspiracy under title 12.1 and is, upon conviction, liable for the			
16	higher amount between the actual compensation received or the value of the fish or wildlife

18	SECTION 12. APPLICATION - EFFECTIVE DATE. Licenses issued by the director			
19	under section 20.1-02-05 are valid for the term of issuance and an individual with this license is			
20	entitled to a one-time irrevocable decision to be an outfitter before the term of the license ends
