## ENGROSSED SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4032

1	A concurrent resolution directing the Legislative Council to study perpetual and nonperpetual
2	easements and the feasibility and desirability of enacting legislation authorizing perpetual
3	conservation easements.
4	WHEREAS, current North Dakota law provides that the duration of an easement,
5	servitude, or nonappurtenant restriction on the use of real property must be specifically set out,
6	and may not exceed 99 years; and
7	WHEREAS, a perpetual conservation easement or perpetual conservation restriction is
8	a legal agreement between a landowner and a land trust or government agency that
9	permanently protects its conservation and historic preservation values; and
10	WHEREAS, perpetual easements, including perpetual conservation easements, are not
11	allowed under current North Dakota law; and
12	WHEREAS, some North Dakota landowners wish to take advantage of perpetual
13	easements to protect their land's agricultural, conservation, and historic preservation values in
14	perpetuity and if a landowner grants an easement in perpetuity as a charitable gift, the
15	landowner may be entitled to federal income and estate tax advantages; and
16	WHEREAS, perpetual conservation easements would allow for permanent flood
17	easements as a mitigation tool in dealing with the devastating floods that impacted the Red
18	River Valley during much of the 1990s and continue to adversely impact other areas of the
19	state; and
20	WHEREAS, the Uniform Conservation Easement Act was approved by the National
21	Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws in 1981 and has been approved by the
22	American Bar Association and adopted by 22 states;
23	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF NORTH DAKOTA,
