5	WHEREAS, current North Dakota law provides that the duration of an easement,
6	servitude, or nonappurtenant restriction on the use of real property must be specifically set out,
7	and may not exceed 99 years; and
8	WHEREAS, a perpetual conservation easement or perpetual conservation restriction is
9	a legal agreement between a landowner and a land trust or government agency that
10	permanently protects its conservation and historic preservation values; and
11	WHEREAS, perpetual easements, including perpetual conservation easements, are no
12	allowed under current North Dakota law; and
13	WHEREAS, some North Dakota landowners wish to take advantage of perpetual
14	easements to protect their land's agricultural, conservation, and historic preservation values in
15	perpetuity and if a landowner grants an easement in perpetuity as a charitable gift, the
16	landowner may be entitled to federal income and estate tax advantages; and
17	WHEREAS, perpetual conservation easements would allow for permanent flood
18	easements as a mitigation tool in dealing with the devastating floods that impacted the Red
19	River Valley during much of the 1990s and continue to adversely impact other areas of the
20	state; and
21	WHEREAS, the Uniform Conservation Easement Act was approved by the National
22	Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws in 1981 and has been approved by the
23	American Bar Association and adopted by 22 states; and

1	WHEREAS, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has acquired many perpetual
2	easements for waterfowl production areas, wildlife refuges, and other wildlife or waterfowl
3	purposes;
4	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF NORTH DAKOTA,
5	THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:
6	That the Legislative Council study perpetual and nonperpetual easements; the
7	feasibility and desirability of enacting legislation authorizing perpetual conservation easements;
8	and the modification, salability, and termination of existing perpetual easements; and
9	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislative Council report its findings and
10	recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to
11	the Fifty-ninth Legislative Assembly.
