- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 16.1-01-04, 16.1-07-01, 16.1-07-05,
- 2 16.1-07-06, 16.1-07-08, 16.1-07-08.1, and 16.1-07-12 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 3 relating to absentee voting.

## 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 16.1-01-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is 6 amended and reenacted as follows:

- 7 **16.1-01-04.** Qualifications of electors.
- Every citizen of the United States who is eighteen years or older; a resident of this
   state; and has resided in the precinct at least thirty days next preceding any
   election, except as otherwise provided in regard to residency in chapter 16.1-14, is
   a qualified elector.
- For the purposes of this title, every qualified elector may have only one residence,
   shown by an actual fixed permanent dwelling, establishment, or any other abode.
- Except as otherwise provided in this section, an individual's residence must be
   determined in accordance with the rules for determining residency as provided in
   section 54-01-26.
- Pursuant to section 2 of article II of the Constitution of North Dakota, voting by
   individuals convicted and sentenced for treason or felony must be limited according
   to chapter 12.1-33.
- 5. For the purposes of this title, an individual may not be deemed to have gained or lost a residence solely by reason of the individual's presence or absence while enrolled as a student at a college, university, or other postsecondary institution of learning in this state.

1	6.	For the purposes of this title, a member of the armed forces of the United States
2		may not be deemed to have gained or lost a residence in this state solely by
3		reason of the member being stationed on duty in this state.
4	7.	For the purposes of this title, an individual may not be deemed to have lost
5		residence in the individual's precinct or in the state by reason of the individual
6		engaging in temporary government service or private employment outside the
7		individual's precinct or outside the state. As used in this title, "temporary" means a
8		period of time equal to or less than four years.
9	<u>8.</u>	A qualified elector who does not retain a residence as described in subsection 2,
10		who moved away from the United States immediately upon leaving North Dakota,
11		and who has lived outside of the United States for a period of more than four years
12		will be considered a qualified elector for North Dakota federal elective offices in the
13		precinct in which the voter last lived.

7		Such an elector may vote only in federal elections, which means any election held
8		solely or in part for the purpose of electing or nominating any candidate for the
9		office of president, vice president, presidential elector, member of the United
10		States senate, or member of the United States house of representatives.
11	3.	An elector who votes by absentee ballot may not vote in person at the same
12		election.

18	<u>1.</u>	At any time in an election year, any qualified elector may apply to the county
19		auditor, the auditor or clerk of the city, or the business manager of the school
20		district, as the case may be, by facsimile or otherwise, for an official ballot to be
21		voted at that election. A voter may obtain an application form for an absent voter's
22		ballot for a general, special, primary, or county election from either the county
23		auditor or a city auditor. The application form, for a member of the United States
24		armed forces or the United States merchant marine or for a qualified elector living
25		outside the United States, must include a space for the applicant to indicate
26		whether the application is for all statewide elections in the calendar year or only for
27		the election that is immediately after the date of the application.
28	<u>2.</u>	An applicant who is a qualified elector and on active duty as a member of the
29		United States armed forces or the United States merchant marine may receive an
30		absentee ballot by mail, facsimile, or electronic mail. In the event that returning the
31		voted ballot by mail is not practicable, qualified electors meeting the stated criteria

1		of this subsection may return a voted ballot and other required documents to the
2		county auditor by means of facsimile transmission or electronic mail. To return a
3		voted ballot and other required documents by electronic mail, the eligible voter
4		must have access to the technology to scan the documents, save the documents in
5		a secure format approved by the secretary of state, and return the documents as
6		an electronic mail attachment directly to the electronic mail address assigned by
7		the auditor, clerk, or business manager for that purpose prior to midnight in the
8		voter's county of residence on the day before the election. The secretary of state
9		shall develop written guidelines relating to security measures for voted ballots
10		returned by electronic mail.
11	<u>3.</u>	Spouses, children, or other dependents of active duty members of the United
12		States armed forces or merchant marine who are qualified electors and stationed
13		as a family outside the United States are granted the same absentee voting rights
14		as the individual's spouse, parent, or guardian has under subsection 2.
15	<u>4.</u>	An applicant who is a member of the United States armed forces or the United
16		States merchant marine living outside the United States or is a qualified elector
17		living outside the United States may apply for and vote by facsimile if otherwise
18		qualified to apply for and vote by absentee ballot. An auditor, clerk, or business
19		manager may send and receive facsimile absentee ballot applications and
20		facsimile absentee ballots to any individual eligible to apply for and vote by
21		facsimile under this section.
22	<u>5.</u>	No auditor or clerk may issue ballots for absentee voters on the day of the election
23		except to persons prevented from voting in person on the day of the election due to
24		an emergency. A person requesting an absentee ballot on the day of the election
25		due to an emergency must do so through an agent as set forth in this chapter. An
26		agent may represent only one person. The absentee ballot must be returned to the
27		county auditor's office by four p.m. on the day of the election.
28	<u>6.</u>	A completed application must be submitted to the appropriate election official in a
29		timely manner so as to allow the applicant to receive, complete, and mail the

12		a facsimile telephone number if the voter desires to vote by facsimile.

16	envelope -	Challenging electors voting by absentee ballot - Inability of elector to sign	
17	name.		
18	1.	Upon receipt of an application for an official ballot properly filled out and duly	
19		signed, or as soon thereafter as the official ballot for the precinct in which the	
20		applicant resides has been prepared, the county auditor, city auditor, or business	
21		manager of the school district, as the case may be, shall send to the absent voter	
22		by mail, at the expense of the political subdivision conducting the election, one	
23		official ballot, or personally deliver the ballot to the applicant or the applicant's	
24		agent, which agent may not, at that time, be a candidate for any office to be voted	
25		upon by the absent voter. The agent shall sign the agent's name before receiving	
26		the ballot and deposit with the auditor or business manager of the school district,	
27		as the case may be, authorization in writing from the applicant to receive the ballot	
28		or according to requirements set forth for signature by mark. The auditor or	
29		business manager of the school district, as the case may be, may not provide an	
30		absent voter's ballot to a person acting as an agent who cannot provide a signed,	
31		written authorization from an applicant. No person may receive compensation,	

1		including money, goods, or services, for acting as an agent for an elector, nor may
2		a person act as an agent for more than four electors in any one election. A voter
3		voting by absentee ballot may not require the political subdivision providing the
4		ballot to bear the expense of the return postage for an absentee ballot.
5	2.	If there is more than one ballot to be voted by an elector of the precinct, one of
6		each kind must be included and an envelope must be enclosed with the ballot or
7		ballots. The front of the envelope must bear the official title and post-office
8		address of the officer supplying the voter with the ballot and upon the other side a
9		printed statement voter's affidavit in substantially the following form:

14		Under penalty of possible criminal prosecution for making a false
15		statement, I swear that I reside at the residential address provided
16		above, that I have resided in my precinct for at least thirty days

21		If the absent voter is unable to sign the voter's name, the voter shall mark (X) on
22		the statement in the presence of a disinterested person. The disinterested person
23		shall print the name of the person marking the X below the X and shall sign that
24		the disinterested person's own name following the printed name together with the
25		notation "witness to the mark".
26	3.	The county auditor, city auditor, or business manager of the school district, as the
27		case may be, may challenge the right of anyone to vote an absent voter's ballot
28		whom that officer knows or has reason to believe is not a qualified elector. When
29		challenging a voter who has applied for an absentee voter's ballot, the election
30		official shall follow the procedures and use the affidavit provided for in section
31		16.1-05-06 and include a voter's affidavit with the outgoing absentee voter's ballot

- 1 along with an explanation that the voter's right to vote is being challenged and that the voter's affidavit must be completed and returned with the voter's absentee 2 3 voter's ballot to be accepted.
- 4 4. Each person requesting an absent voter's ballot under this chapter must be 5 provided a set of instructions, prescribed by the secretary of state, sufficient to 6 describe the process of voting by absent voter's ballot. The voting instructions 7 must contain a statement informing the individual that the individual is entitled to 8 complete the absent voter's ballot in secrecy.
- 9 Each individual requesting an absent voter's ballot under this chapter who cannot <del>5.</del> 4. 10 read the English language or who because of blindness or other disability is unable 11 to mark the voter's ballot, upon request, may receive the assistance of any person 12 of the voter's choice, other than the voter's employer, an officer or agent of the 13 voter's union, a candidate running in that election, or a relative of a candidate as 14 described in subsection 2 of section 16.1-05-02, in marking the voter's ballot.
- 15 **SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Section 16.1-07-08.1 of the North Dakota Century Code 16 is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 17
  - 16.1-07-08.1. Procedures for voting with special write-in or federal write-in
- 18 absentee ballot.
- 19 Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a qualified absentee elector 1. 20 may apply to the county auditor for a special write-in absentee ballot. This ballot 21 may be used to vote for presidential electors and members of the United States 22 senate and of the United States house of representatives.
- 23 2. The application for a special write-in absentee ballot may be made on a form 24 prescribed by the secretary of state. In order to qualify for a special write-in 25 absentee ballot, the voter shall state on the application that the voter is unable to 26 vote by regular absentee ballot or in person due to requirements of military service 27 or due to living in isolated or extremely remote areas of the world.
- 28 Upon receipt of the application, the county auditor shall issue the special write-in 3. 29 absentee ballot, which must be in the form prescribed by the secretary of state. 30 The ballot must permit the elector to vote by writing in a party preference for each

office, the names of specific candidates for each office, or the name of the person
 whom the voter prefers for each office.

- <u>4.</u> If the voter is temporarily residing outside the United States or is a member of the
   <u>United States armed forces, merchant marine, or a family member and a qualified</u>
   <u>elector, the voter may use the federal write-in absentee ballot in general, special,</u>
   and primary elections for local, state, or federal offices.
- 5. If the voter is residing outside the United States, or is a member of the United
  States armed forces, merchant marine, or a family member, and a qualified elector
  stationed outside the United States, the voter may use the federal write-in
- 10 <u>absentee ballot transmission envelope as an absentee ballot application</u>
- 11 <u>simultaneously with the submission of the federal write-in absentee ballot if the</u>
- voter is otherwise eligible to vote absentee in the jurisdiction where the request is
  submitted.
- SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 16.1-07-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is
   amended and reenacted as follows:
- 16 16.1-07-12. Opening ballot Voting or rejecting Depositing in ballot box -

17 **Preserving.** At any time between the opening and closing of the polls on election day, the 18 election judges of the relevant precinct first shall open the outer envelope and compare the 19 signature on such application for an absent voter's ballot with the signature on the statement 20 provided for in section 16.1-07-08. If the judges find that the statement is sufficient and that the 21 signatures correspond, and that the applicant is then a duly qualified elector of such precinct 22 and has not voted at the election, they shall open the absent voter's envelope in such manner 23 as not to destroy the statement thereon. They shall take out the ballot or ballots contained 24 therein without unfolding the same, or permitting the same to be opened or examined, and after 25 stamping and initialing or initialing the same as other ballots are stamped and initialed or 26 initialed, they shall deposit the ballot in the proper ballot box and show in the pollbook of the 27 election that the elector has voted. If the statement is found to be insufficient, or that the 28 signatures do not correspond, or that the applicant is not then a duly gualified elector of the 29 precinct, the vote may not be allowed, but without opening the absent voter's envelope, the 30 election inspector or election judge shall mark across the face thereof "rejected as defective" or 31 "rejected as not an elector", as the case may be. These rejected ballots are then turned over to

- 1 the county canvassing board for final determination of eligibility. The subsequent death of an
- 2 absentee voter after having voted by absentee ballot does not constitute grounds for rejecting
- 3 such ballot.
