A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapter 43-26.1 of the North Dakota Century Code,

4 chapter 43-26 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the practice of physical therapy;

5 and to provide a penalty.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

7 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 1 of section 10-31-04 of the North Dakota
8 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

9	1.	A professional organization may be created pursuant to this chapter only for the
10		purpose of rendering one specific type of professional service and services
11		ancillary thereto or for the purpose of rendering two or more kinds of professional
12		services that are specifically authorized to be practiced in combination under the
13		licensing laws of each of the professional services to be practiced by a licensed
14		individual or partnership of licensed individuals and ancillary services. This
15		subsection does not preclude an organization created pursuant to this chapter
16		from rendering more than one specific type of professional service if the services
17		rendered are set forth in chapters 43-03 and 43-19.1 or if the services rendered
18		are set forth in chapters 43-26 43-26.1 and 43-40.
19	SEC	CTION 2. Chapter 43-26.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and
20	enacted as	follows:

21 43-26.1-01. Definitions. In this chapter, unless the context or subject matter otherwise 22 requires:

23 <u>1.</u> <u>"Board" means the North Dakota board of physical therapy.</u>

1	<u>2.</u>	"Examination" means a national examination approved by the board for the
2		licensure of a physical therapist or the licensure of a physical therapist assistant.
3	<u>3.</u>	"Manual therapy" means the use of techniques such as mobilization or
4		manipulation, manual lymphatic drainage, and manual traction on one or more
5		regions of the body.
6	<u>4.</u>	"Onsite supervision" means the supervising physical therapist is onsite and
7		present in the department or facility where services are provided, is immediately
8		available to the person being supervised, and maintains continued involvement in
9		appropriate aspects of each treatment session in which a physical therapist
10		assistant or a physical therapy aide is involved in components of care.
11	<u>5.</u>	"Physical therapist" means a person licensed under this chapter to practice
12		physical therapy. The term "physiotherapist" is synonymous with "physical
13		therapist" under this chapter.
14	<u>6.</u>	"Physical therapist assistant" means a person who is licensed under this chapter
15		and who assists the physical therapist in selected components of physical therapy
16		intervention.
17	<u>7.</u>	"Physical therapy" means the care and services provided by or under the direction
18		and supervision of a physical therapist licensed under this chapter.
19	<u>8.</u>	"Physical therapy aide" means a person trained under the direction of a physical
20		therapist who performs designated and supervised routine tasks related to physical
21		therapy.
22	<u>9.</u>	"Practice of physical therapy" means:
23		a. Examining, evaluating, and testing individuals with mechanical, physiological,
24		and developmental impairments, functional limitations in movement and
25		mobility, and disabilities or other health and movement-related conditions in
26		order to determine a diagnosis for physical therapy, prognosis, and plan of
27		therapeutic intervention, and to assess the ongoing effects of intervention.
28		b. Alleviating impairments, functional limitations in movement and mobility, and
29		disabilities by designing, implementing and modifying therapeutic
30		interventions that may include, but are not limited to, therapeutic exercise;
31		neuromuscular education; functional training related to positioning,

1			movement, and mobility in self-care and in-home, community, or work	
2			integration or reintegration; manual therapy; therapeutic massage;	
3			prescription, application and, as appropriate, fabrication of assistive, adaptive,	
4			orthotic, prosthetic, protective, and supportive devices and equipment related	
5			to positioning, movement, and mobility; airway clearance techniques;	
6			integumentary protection and repair techniques; debridement and wound	
7			care; physiotherapy; physical agents or modalities; mechanical and	
8			electrotherapeutic modalities; and patient-related instruction.	
9		<u>C.</u>	Engaging as a physical therapist in reducing the risk of injury, impairment,	
10			functional limitation and disability, including the promotion and maintenance	
11			of fitness, health, and wellness in populations of all ages.	
12		<u>d.</u>	Engaging as a physical therapist in administration, consultation, education,	
13			and research.	
14	<u>10.</u>	<u>"Res</u>	stricted license" for a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant means a	
15		licer	nse on which the board places restrictions or conditions, or both, as to scope of	
16		prac	tice, place of practice, supervision of practice, duration of licensed status, or	
17		type	or condition of patient or client to whom the licensee may provide services.

26		attempted to engage, in conduct that subverts or undermines the integrity of the			
27		examination process, the board may disqualify the applicant from taking the			
28		examination.

22	<u>5.</u>	A physical therapist's responsibility for patient care management shall include
23		accurate documentation and billing of the services provided.

1	<u>2.</u>	A patient has freedom of choice in selection of services and products.
2	<u>3.</u>	Information relating to the physical therapist-patient relationship is confidential and
3		may not be communicated to a third party who is not involved in that patient's care
4		without the written authorization of the patient or as permitted by law.
5	<u>4.</u>	Any person may submit a complaint to the board regarding any licensee, or any
6		other person potentially in violation of this chapter.
7	<u>43-2</u>	26.1-13. Grounds for disciplinary actions. The board may refuse to license any
8	physical the	erapist or physical therapist assistant, may discipline, or may suspend or revoke the
9	license of a	ny physical therapist or physical therapist assistant for any of the following grounds:
10	<u>1.</u>	Violating any provision of this chapter, board rules, or a written order of the board.
11	<u>2.</u>	Practicing or offering to practice beyond the scope of the practice of physical
12		therapy.
13	<u>3.</u>	Failing to refer a patient or client to an appropriate practitioner if the diagnostic
14		process reveals findings that are outside the scope of a physical therapist's
15		knowledge, experience, or expertise.
16	<u>4.</u>	Obtaining or attempting to obtain a license by fraud or misrepresentation.
17	<u>5.</u>	Engaging in the performance of substandard physical therapy care due to a
18		deliberate or negligent act or failure to act, regardless of whether actual injury to
19		the patient is established.
20	<u>6.</u>	Engaging in the performance of substandard care by a physical therapist assistant,
21		including exceeding the authority to perform components of intervention selected
22		by the supervising physical therapist regardless of whether actual injury to the
23		patient is established.
24	<u>7.</u>	Failing to supervise physical therapist assistants or physical therapy aides in
25		accordance with this chapter and board rules.
26	<u>8.</u>	A determination by the board that a licensee's conviction of an offense has a direct
27		bearing on the licensee's ability to serve the public as a physical therapist or
28		physical therapist assistant or that, following conviction of any offense, the holder
29		is not sufficiently rehabilitated as provided under section 12.1-33-02.1.

1	<u>9.</u>	Practicing as a physical therapist or working as a physical therapist assistant when
2		physical or mental abilities are impaired by the use of controlled substances or
3		other habit-forming drugs, chemicals, alcohol, or by other causes.
4	<u>10.</u>	Having had a license revoked or suspended, other disciplinary action taken, or an
5		application for licensure refused, revoked, or suspended by the proper authorities
6		of another state, territory, or country.
7	<u>11.</u>	Engaging in sexual misconduct. For the purpose of this paragraph sexual
8		misconduct includes:
9		a. Engaging in or soliciting sexual relationships, whether consensual or
10		nonconsensual, while a physical therapist or physical therapist
11		assistant-patient relationship exists, except with a spouse.
12		b. Making sexual advances, requesting sexual favors, or engaging in other
13		verbal conduct or physical contact of a sexual nature with patients or clients.
14		c. Intentionally viewing a completely or partially disrobed patient in the course of
15		treatment if the viewing is not related to patient diagnosis or treatment under
16		current practice standards.
17	<u>12.</u>	Failing to adhere to the standards of ethics of the physical therapy profession
18		adopted by rule by the board.
19	<u>13.</u>	Charging unreasonable or fraudulent fees for services performed or not performed.
20	<u>14.</u>	Making misleading, deceptive, untrue, or fraudulent representations in violation of
21		this chapter or in the practice of the profession.
22	<u>15.</u>	Having been adjudged mentally incompetent by a court.
23	<u>16.</u>	Aiding and abetting a person who is not licensed in this state in the performance of
24		activities requiring a license.
25	<u>17.</u>	Failing to report to the board, where there is direct knowledge, any unprofessional,
26		incompetent, or illegal acts that appear to be in violation of this chapter or any
27		rules established by the board.
28	<u>18.</u>	Interfering with an investigation or disciplinary proceeding by failure to cooperate,
29		by willful misrepresentation of facts, or by the use of threats or harassment against
30		any patient or witness to prevent that patient or witness from providing evidence in
31		a disciplinary proceeding or any legal action.

1	<u>19.</u>	Failing to maintain adequate patient records. For the purposes of this subsection,	
2		"adequate patient records" means legible records that contain at a minimum	
3		sufficient information to identify the patient, an evaluation of objective findings, a	
4		diagnosis, a plan of care, a treatment record, and a discharge plan.	
5	<u>20.</u>	Failing to maintain patient confidentiality without the written authorization of the	
6		patient or unless otherwise permitted by law. All records used or resulting from a	
7		consultation under section 43-51-03 are part of a patient's records and are subject	
8		to applicable confidentiality requirements.	
9	<u>21.</u>	Promoting any unnecessary device, treatment intervention, or service resulting in	
10		the financial gain of the practitioner or of a third party.	
11	<u>22.</u>	Providing treatment intervention unwarranted by the condition of the patient or	
12		continuing treatment beyond the point of reasonable benefit.	
13	<u>23.</u>	Participating in underutilization or overutilization of physical therapy services for	
14		personal or institutional financial gain.	
15	15 <u>43-26.1-14. Lawful practice.</u>		
16	<u>1.</u>	A physical therapist licensed under this chapter is fully authorized to practice	
17		physical therapy as defined herein. The board shall require each licensee to	
18		provide the board with evidence of competence regarding the various elements of	
19		manual therapy the licensee practices so that the board may determine	
20		satisfactory competency levels and requirements as provided under section

12		provides, or bills any other person for services shall not characterize those
