- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 43-42-05 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to the exemption of the practice of sleep therapy from the regulation of respiratory
- 3 therapy.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 43-42-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is
6 amended and reenacted as follows:

7 **43**-

43-42-05. Application of chapter.

- This chapter does not prohibit a person an individual enrolled in a bona fide
 respiratory care training program from performing those duties essential for
 completion of a student's clinical service; provided, that the duties are performed
 under the supervision or direction of a physician or registered respiratory therapist
 and the person student is identified as a "student respiratory therapist".
- 13 2. A graduate of a bona fide respiratory care training program, who has applied for 14 licensure under this chapter may practice respiratory care under the supervision or 15 direction of a physician or a registered or certified respiratory therapist; provided, 16 that the graduate holds a temporary respiratory therapist's license and is identified 17 as a "graduate respiratory therapist". An applicant shall take the entry level 18 certification examination within six months following eligibility. Failure to pass any 19 examination that is taken results in termination of the privileges provided under this 20 subsection.
- If examinations prepared by the national board for respiratory care are no longer
 available or become unacceptable to the board, the board may develop, approve,
 and use examinations for the licensure of registered respiratory therapists and
 certified respiratory therapists.

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1	4.	This chapter does not prevent a licensed and qualified member of another health
2		care profession from performing any of the duties of a registered respiratory
3		therapist or a certified respiratory therapist that which are consistent with the
4		accepted standards of that person's individual's profession, provided the person
5		individual is not represented as a registered respiratory therapist or certified
6		respiratory therapist.
7	5.	This chapter does not prohibit self-care by a patient or the gratuitous care by a
8		friend or member of the family who does not represent or hold out to be a
9		registered or certified respiratory therapist.
10	6.	This chapter does not prohibit a respiratory therapist from performing advances in
11		the art or techniques of respiratory care learned through formal or specialized
12		training.
13	<u>7.</u>	This chapter does not prevent the performance of oxygen therapy or the initiation
14		of noninvasive positive pressure ventilation by a registered polysomnographic
15		technologist, relating to the study of sleep disorders, if such procedures are
16		performed or initiated under the supervision of a physician who is privileged in
17		sleep medicine at a state licensed hospital or health system or is board eligible or
18		a diplomate of the American board of sleep medicine. A technologist, technician,
19		or trainee performing activities under this subsection may not use any title, degree,
20		letters, symbol, or words that would tend to lead the public to believe that the
21		individual is a registered or certified respiratory therapist or that the individual is
22		authorized to practice or assume duties incident to the practice of respiratory
23		therapy.
