Mr. Hanson stated: The majority of the requested funding is one-time funding. Equity funding for salaries is a critical, high priority issue. Two major areas of concern impacting our office and our state's veterans which were requested but are not included in the Governor's budget are: 1) A women veteran's coordinator and 2) An outreach training program for the state's county veterans' service officers. Questions and discussion regarding chain of command in the county service officers and Veterans Affairs. Refer: 36:00 - 50:00

Cathy Halgunseth, Administrative Assistant of the Department of Veterans' Affairs, testified. Briefly outlined the department's budget. Refer: 50:30 - 52:55

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Lorraine Jenson, Nurse with the ND Air National Guard, testified in support of the bill and approving the position of a Women's Veterans Coordinator. (Copy of testimony attached)

Question was asked as to how many states have a Women's Veterans Coordinator. The reply was 20 states. Refer: 53:00 - 58:52

Kelly Schmidt, ND State Treasurer, testified in support of the bill. (Copy of written testimony attached) Question was asked about where the special funds are invested. Question asked regarding cemetery funds. Refer: 60:00 - 63:15.

Brendan J. Brazil, Veterans Service Officer for Walsh County, testified in support of the bill and a Women's Veterans Coordinator. Told about having two women veterans in his county who had needed services. Refer: 64:10 - 66:23

Noreen Bartlett, Desert Storm Veteran of the Army Reserve, testified in support of the Women's Veterans Coordinator. Refer: 66:50 - 68:00

John Jacobson, Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the ND Veterans

Chairman Pollert: Opened the hearing for amendments.

Representative Kreidt: Presented amendment 78007.0102. Intent is for purchasing

furniture. Looking at plan for facility - either new or remodeling. Take out \$120,000.

Representative Kreidt: Made a motion to pass this amendment.

Representative Bellew: Seconded the motion.

Roll Call Vote: 8 yes and 0 no. Passed.

Representative Kreidt: Reviewed amendment 78007.0103. Intent is for removing

funding of \$120,000 which would replace an elevator installed in 1950.

Representative Kreidt: Made a motion for a "Do Pass."

Representative Metcalf: Seconded the motion.

Discussion: Questions about the elevator.

Roll Call Vote: Yes 8 and No 0. Motion passed.

Chairman Pollert: Introduced Amendment 78007.0101. Identifies a one-time spending in HB 1007.

Representative Bellew: Requested discussion on the Item #6 on the Green Sheet that adds funding for marketing for the Veterans Home.

Mark Johnson, Administrator of the Veterans Home, explained their marketing plan.

Discussion. Refer: 15:50

Chairman Pollert: Turned to Veterans Affairs.

Explained the intent on Amendment 78007.0101. Deals with the tracking of the one-time expenditures.

Representative Bellew: Motion for a "Do Pass."

Representative Ekstrom: Seconded the motion.

Discussion: Question about electronic tracking devices.

Bob Hanson, Veterans Affairs, explained the needed process of putting documents on computer. Now, all are paper. Continued discussion.

Chairman Pollert: Called for a Voice Vote on Amendment 0101 for Veterans Affairs. All in favor. Motion passed.

Chairman Pollert: Turned to discussion on the Veterans' Home. Referred to Proposed Amendment Sheet which intent is to provide funding of \$630,000 to implement improvements addressing life safety code deficiencies as identified by the ND Department of Health and ND State Fire Marshall.

Darlene Bartz, DOH, gave a brief history on what is happening at the Veterans Home in Lisbon. Venting shafts were inspected and found to be out of compliance; and, if there was a fire, it would run throughout the building because of the venting. This was cited as a deficiency

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in November, 2006. They are working with the Veterans Home to respond to that issue. A plan of correction will be brought to them on Monday. Refer: 26:53

Discussion: Continued questions and answers regarding roof deficiency, how many inspections past years, whether unsafe, how many fires in past years, the venting, staffing in case of fire, fire safety standards, funding for two temporary staff, smoke alarm system, fire alarms, matter of weeks to put in smoke detectors for only a short period of time, repairing air shafts may cause more expense, and repair of wardrobes, no intent to leave Mark Johnson, Administrator, out of meetings with Health Department, trying to implement a temporary fix by OMB based on Health Department's suggestion, room sprinklers, and time frames. It was stated that in the next few weeks more information would be coming forth.

Representative Metcalf: Motion to approve amendments. Refer: 72:33

Representative Bellew: Made substitute motion to remove \$335,000.

Representative Kreidt: Seconded the motion.

Discussion. It was stated the Health Department is on the line; \$205,000 to provide immediate protection of the residents, \$85,000 to install a smoke alarm system, \$120,000 temporary salaries to provide 24 hours, 7 days per week fire watch until repairs are completed, \$335,000 to remedy unprotected air shafts, and \$90,000 for a pre-planning document to address concerns contained in the condition assessment explained. Debate. Laurie of OMB stated there was no Emergency Clause included in the amendment.

Representative Nelson: Stated that the committee would be at the mercy of the Senate due to the fact finding mission that would be taking place.

Darlene Bartz, of DOH, stated the time lines and the information coming in would be looked at. In looking a new building being built, it would take 2-3 years. In the meantime, an intermediate measure would be called for.

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Chairman Pollert: Roll Call Vote for the substitute motion to remove the \$335,000

which drops the \$630,000 to \$295,000. Yes - 4 and No - 4. Motion failed.

Roll Call Vote on Original Motion: Yes - 8 and No - 0. Motion passed.

Representative Bellew: Motion to remove Line #6 of \$50,000 on the Green Sheet.

Representative Wieland: Seconded the motion.

Voice Vote: All in favor. Motion passes.

Representative Nelson: Made motion to add the Emergency Clause to this section.

Representative Metcalf: Seconded motion.

Voice Vote: 7 in favor, and 1 no. Motion passes.

Representative Metcalf: Recommended a "Do Pass" on HB 1007 as amended.

Representative Wieland: Seconded the motion.

Roll Call Vote: 8 yes and 0 no. Motion passes.

Chm. Svedjan opened the hearing on HB 1007.

Rep. Pollert distributed amendment .0104 (Attachment A).

Rep. Metcalf motioned to adopt amendment .0104. Rep. Ekstrom seconded the motion.

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Rep. Metcalf began by saying there are life safety issues at the Veterans' Home. He then proceeded to describe the amendment. Section 4 includes \$630,000 for the veterans' home. Refer to p.2, footnote 4 of amendment .0104 for specifics). If we want to have the home replaced in 2009, we have to provide \$8 million now to provide the state share of this fund. \$120,000 of the \$630,000 to address life safety issues is for temporary salaries to provide continuous fire watch until repairs are completed. This amendment adds a section identifying one-time expenditures for the Dept. of Veterans' Affairs and provides for a report to the Appropriations Committees of the 61st Legislative Assembly regarding the use of the funding. Rep. Pollert: There was much discussion about the \$630,000 – especially the money for temporary salaries. There are 90 employees there already but because of life safety code, they are required to have temporary employees to go around and check the airshafts. We thought some of the 90 employees could pick up this work. The \$90,000 for the study MUST happen.

Rep. Kreidt: This building is 50+ years old and has a wood type ventilation system that runs in

the closets. There has never been a fire. I'm concerned that we're throwing money away. If we

had put the \$59,000 into the alarm system would have sufficed. If there was any fire, the staff would have been alerted. My concern is the \$335,000. Don't be surprised if we're back here looking at another \$1 million to add to that. Once you rip into that, they will find who knows what – asbestos, you name it.

Rep. Monson: Schools have had these same types of issues and they've put in heat detector alarms instead of having to remove other dangerous things. Has that been thought about?

Rep. Kreidt also voiced his concern over the two temporary positions.

Rep. Pollert: The alarms must be put another foot higher than they are now.

Rep. Ekstrom: None of the rooms have smoke alarms. They are in the halls. There are dropped ceilings in the rooms and the air shaft has access so fire can start and not be seen. The Health Dept. mandated this because of life safety issue. The Health Dept. is liable. In my view we don't have a choice.

Rep. Gulleson voices her opinion that we follow the architect's recommendation. It's time to invest in this home.

Rep. Metcalf: \$335,000 for airshafts – there is no intention of going into those airshafts. There are going to put dampers in. Dirt has been collecting in that space for years and that could explode at any time. That is the concern. When construction does actually begin, there is also concern that there will be more of a chance for fire.

Rep. Kreidt: The state architect never stepped foot in the building. There is a sprinkler system in the building. My concern is the safety of the tenants and the staff, but I think the \$335,000 is going to turn into \$1.35 million.

Rep. Carlson: I agree the costs will exceed \$335,000. It is impractical to expect to rebuild every old building to meet today's codes.

Rep. Metcalf: We have less than three months to fix life safety issues.

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Hearing Date: February 13, 2007

Rep. Pollert: The Veterans' Home did not have any input into the \$630,000. It was done

through OMB and probably the Dept. of Health.

Chm. Svedjan: There was a push to access federal funds to construct a new facility.

Rep. Poliert: That's part of the \$90,000 and \$630,000.

Rep. Ekstrom: It's possible to get fire protection with multiple layers of drywall. I think we would all agree that we don't want to go tearing into this building. You are likely to find many other things wrong. Maybe we need to specify in the bill to take the repairs just as far as you need to just to fix this hazard.

Rep. Kempenich made a substitute motion to take \$335,000 out for right now. Rep. Carlson seconded the motion.

Rep. Metcalf does not think the money should be taken out.

Rep. Wieland: We decided in section to leave the \$335,000 in. Taking the money out puts the Health Dept. in a tough spot.

Rep. Gulleson also voiced her opinion to resist the substitute motion.

The substitute motion failed by voice vote.

The motion to adopt amendment .0104 carries by voice vote and the amendment is adopted.

Rep. Metcalf motioned a Do Pass as Amended by .0104. Rep. Pollert seconded the motion. The motion carried by a roll call vote of 24 ayes, 0 nays and 0 absent and not voting. Rep. Metcalf was designated to carry the bill.

"SECTION 4. ONE-TIME FUNDING - EFFECT ON BASE BUDGET - REPORT TO SIXTY-FIRST LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The total general fund appropriation line item in subdivision 2 of section 3 of this Act includes \$59,606 for the one-time funding items identified in this section. This amount is not a part of the agency's base budget to be used in preparing the 2009-11 executive budget. The department of veterans' affairs shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-first legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009.

Minutes:

Chairman Holmberg opened the hearing on HB 1007 at 2:00 pm on February 21, 2007 regarding the Veteran's Home and Department of Veteran Affairs.

Rudy Jenson, Chairman of the Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs, (ACOVA) presented written testimony (1) and gave oral testimony in support of HB 1007. He stated his organization is here to help the state's 60,000 veterans, their spouses and dependents. He respectfully asks for the committees' consideration to support the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DAV) request for funding of two extremely vital issues impacting our state's veterans:

- 1. Women Veterans Coordinator.
- 2. Funding for the DAV to do outreach work with county veterans service officers.

Bob Hanson, Commissioner of Veterans' Affairs, presented written testimony (2) and oral testimony in support of HB 1007. He gave an overview of his department. Also gave testimony regarding the grant programs, new outpatient clinics, and gave information regarding the vans that are being purchased and used to transport veterans to the clinics and hospitals. Except for the two areas that were discussed, his department is very pleased with the Governor's recommendation for the department, but we also feel the outreach program and the women veterans coordinator are critical for our state's veterans now.

Chairman Holmberg Bob, just to set the record straight, when I looked at the sheets we get that analyze what happened in the House, the House made changes in the Veteran's Home but in the other portion of the budget for the department they did not make any changes. They accepted the Governor's budget. Is that correct?

Bob Hanson replied that is correct.

Cathy Halgunseth, Chief Administrator for the Department of Veterans Affairs presented written testimony with attachments (3) and oral testimony in support of HB 1007. She presented an outline of her agency's current budget and the proposed 2007 – 2009 budget. She explained that their budget is referred to as a "lump sum" budget, meaning we have no line items. The first attachment has the "lump sum" amount. The second attachment shows the breakdown of our budget dollars. Also listed are the optional package requests we would like considered, the Women's Veterans Coordinator and Outreach to Counties.

Senator Robinson requested a breakdown regarding the Women's Veterans Coordinator costs and Outreach to Counties Costs. He was informed these items are listed on the budget.

Kristin Lunneborg, Accounting Manager at the North Dakota Veterans Home presented written testimony (4) and gave oral testimony in support of HB 1007. She stated the majority of the changes to our 2007- 2009 budget revolve around changes brought on by the VA Medical Center in Fargo, ND. The first of those changes being the cost shift of expenses relating to pharmaceuticals. The second major change involves primary care services for the Veteran residents.

Senator Seymour asked how many residents are private pay. He was informed there are 12 private pay residents.

Mark Johnson, Administrator North Dakota Veterans Home, Lisbon, ND presented written testimony (5) (Facility Analysis and Master Plan Studies) and gave oral testimony in support of

building it is just not a real good image.

HB 1007. He stated they have been in business for almost 116 years. He stated that the facility is licensed to service 111 residents in Basic Care and 38 residents in Skilled Care. He stated they had two Life Safety Surveys, one was done by the State Fire Marshall on September 12, 2006 and the other Life Safety Survey was from the Department of Health done November 22, 2006. He went through the handout, explaining several problems with the duct system, ventilation system, open air chambers. The entire campus was surveyed. It was found that the 1940 building has a little bit of lean to it and would not withstand a critical storm, earthquake, etc. He explained all the buildings are old and need either renovation or maybe replaced. They looked at the whole building, the site, the structure, the codes, the interiors, and the mechanical system. The current issues that we have with our building is the HIPPA issue, sharing bathrooms, crowded conditions, no waiting room when the doctors come out and visit, a lot more people with mobility issues, 6 foot hallways come into a 4 foot doorway, therapists don't have the time to sit down and document their information like they should be able to. We have great people who work in our building, but when you look at the front of our

Senator Krauter asked if he could review with the committee the numbers of licensed skilled and basic occupancy rate, and the waiting period.

Mark Johnson stated they are licensed for 38 skilled beds. Our occupancy rate runs more in the 90 or 95 %. With our basic care side we are licensed for 112 beds, and our occupancy today is 89 beds. We could fill them. Right now we have 8 people on our waiting list in basic care. But we have a very difficult time trying to put anybody with some of the residents because of not having private rooms. On our skilled side we have 4 to 6. Some of the issues you run into when you look at the occupancy piece is that we are a primary population, over

90% is male, and so we do have some females and I have one bed open that has been open for a couple of weeks and we just can't find a female at this time.

Senator Mathern asked if we have any plans for cleaning up some of these issues, like the ventilation system. Can that be cleaned up before we get into the building phase.

Mark Johnson we will discuss this after Brad brings his presentation. We have an amendment to propose at the end of testimony today. We know we have to stay in our existing structure for a couple of years while we'll be looking at building a new building.

Senator Bowman had a question regarding their appropriations on page 3, line 18 of your appropriations regarding this budget, the dollar amount concerning the Life Safety Improvements. Why would you invest that much money in this today if you are going to build a new building? Seems to me most of your testimony leans towards a new building so why spend this money on these improvements. Do something more positive than spend it and then tear it down,.

Mark Johnson stated that this has been kind of a work in progress and kind of a snapshot in time and at that time we were dealing with the best numbers we had. Those numbers are going to be adjusted. We've been working with the Health Department regarding improvements that are necessary. We are trying to get that number as far down as we can, but we also have to assure those residents a safe environment during that transition phase.

Senator Fischer asked how long the Health Department given you before they start having major concerns like locking doors.

Mark Johnson they have been working with us, week by week. We just got done meeting with representatives from the Health Department and we're working with them and they are looking at what is going to come out of the Legislature. We have a good relationship with them.

Brad Moago, Chairman of Governing Board for the North Dakota Veterans Home

presented the Powerpoint presentation. He stated he wanted to give a little perspective from the historical angle of where we are and where we need to go. Perhaps you can recall that 5 years ago things were not so good for the Veterans Home. The Home had failed an audit, we had some leadership problems, we had quite an element of mistrust between agencies, legislators, employees, staff, and government associated with the home. In the 03 session we made some changes where we were working with your colleague, John Andrest, to draft a bill, We created the governing board, we created a charter to have a strategic plan, implemented some modern management principles, affected a change in leadership and in that strategic planning process we did all the things we can do in strategic planning. We developed a mission, a vision of the future, a mission statement to support that organization, rules and objectives to measure how we are doing and a whole series of plans to support that top level of communications and technology improvement plan, a personal improvement plan, and on range capitol improvement plan and that is what we are talking about today. We have major problems at the home, we need to fix what is necessary at this time. There is some federal money available.

Senator Robinson asked if we have any thing in writing from the federal government, any guarantees that we know that it's a pretty good chance that it's coming through.

Brad Moanjo stated yes. The federal government has some criteria under the Secretary of Veterans Affairs. One of the criteria is for those it has been the longest since they have asked for something to come to the line. There are 4 states in the union that have never asked for anything in the form of a VA Grant and North Dakota is one of them. The second criteria is if you have a Life Safety Code Issue that also bumps you to the top of the line. The two of those together, we've had conversations with the Under Secretary that works at the Department and

he says if you come forward with this request I can just about guarantee that you will come to the top of the line. We've also been working with Senator Conrad's staff and they have had their priority conversations with the VA and Senator Conrad has indicated it is a high priority for him. He will work very hard. He assures us that if we match the money that he'll find the money to match us. In fact, I have it on good authority that he is communicating with our governor. He did a comparison of the Higher Education costs and Veteran's costs in his presentation. He supports HB 1007. He also shared about the injuries that our veterans incur while serving our country.

Chairman Holmberg stated a Subcommittee will be appointed.

DuWayne Ternes, Member of Governor's Board for Veterans Home gave oral testimony in support of HB 1007. He stated his is new to the board and was asked to serve on the Board as a Non Vet, and a retired general contractor. Well within the first 15 minutes of my tour, prior to my first meeting of this facility, the only thing I could say was that I was embarrassed as a nonvet seeing how we house our vets. It was terrible. I was contractor in this area for many years, we did a couple additions to the penitentiary, and I have tore down some facilities at the penitentiary that were probably in better shape than what this building is in. But after seeing that I commented on a couple of things. I, as an owner of buildings in Bismarck, would not want to be the owner of this building for a couple of reasons. The hallways are more of a firetrap for any of these people who are staying there. I think you're creating a hazard by having them there. That's something we can do. I don't want to spend \$600,000, but some of that may have to be spent in the interim just to take care of some of the situations. I saw a lot of violations there. I seen a lot of them as a private general contractor and also I serve for the State of North Dakota on the UBC Building Code. Coming up with the codes for the last 10 to 14 years I've served for the State of North Dakota and in that I have seen so many things.

Aside from that there's some utility problems that are there that we discussed earlier is that we're almost at four dollars and some cents a square foot for utilities in a biennium per square foot to take care of this you could save almost \$250,000 per biennium just by changing to a new underground heat source system which is so great for everybody because you're not putting anything bad into the air and it's using our natural resources. I have other issues about the building but if anybody has questions relating to the construction of it, and again, I'm here to say, yes, it is a better way to go is to build a new one, If you look at some of the drawings and you have to add on both ends to remodel and provide a space for those people to stay while you're doing the construction work, by the time you add on to both ends of this building you've created a dinosaur. You now have more to heat and more to cool and yet you don't have a proper heat source to do so.

Chairman Holmberg stated the subcommittee might contact him.

Mark Johnson presented written testimony (6) Survey North Dakota State Fire Marshal Safety Inspection, which outlines the citations the home received. Written testimony (7) Technical Condition Assessment and that total comes to \$165,700.00 that is what's proposing to make our building safe. We are offering a proposed amendment to Engrossed House Bill No 1007 (8) and \$630,000 is going to be adjusted down to the \$255,700 number and as you go through it basically some of the things we talked about is 65/35 % match, bed capacity at the home, and other issues with the home. The last page tells us what our current rate is from the VA. And with the amendment we also offered to one of the signs here was \$23,000,000 to build a new building and that was at 150 beds. There's lots of different issues, 121 beds is an issue because that is when the VA will fund us and that goes back to a 1960 decision on how many beds the VA will allow us to have in North Dakota. Our number has been brought down to a little over \$18,000,000 and so the amendments added onto here is for \$6,483,226.00 and

that's for the 35% that the Legislature will have to match for doing a new building and that will be at 121 beds.

Chairman Holmberg I have a specific question for you. Earlier when this came over from the House as I understood it, one of the reasons for the large amount of money, the 630 had to do with requirements that you and the Department of Health were discussing. This \$255,700.00 is what you have worked with the Department and as far as you know the Department supports this 255 now rather than the 630.

Mark Johnson that's correct.

Chairman Holmberg ok. We want to have this because it is going to be exactly that in the minutes. Is there anyone else wishing to testify?

Brad Moanjo If I could add one point to the question on this support from Washington, Senator Conrad's office added two points that I forgot to mention.

- 1. They are working on that number 121 that's in the amendment for North Dakota for that very demographic reason that I talked about that in the 70's when we had a draft that was an equitable number across all 50 states but today that does not reflect reality and indeed the lower interior states are bearing a higher burden and have a good pace for that number to be raised. That's a national issue not a state issue but they are working on that.
- 2. The second point I failed to mention is a concern that they can get this money, this federal congress and with the turmoil that's going on, with OMB at the federal level, he is not as confident in two years from now.

Senator Mathern Why do you think that there wouldn't be more money coming from the federal government? These veterans are serving an American war, not a North Dakota war. Why is there a limitation of 65%?

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Brad Moanjo I really don't know the background for the 65% matching grant. I know that state homes are reimbursed because they actually care for veterans that would be authorized to be cared for at a federal facility and since there's not room the feds reimburse them. So that's a great question. Perhaps we should raise that up at the same time as the 121 limit.

Chairman Holmberg let us turn this over to the Subcommittee, some old faces and some new faces on the subcommittee, Senator Kilzer, would you want to chair this subcommittee, and Senator Bowman will serve on it and Senator Krauter. This is one of those that Senator Lindaas was on, but you have to have been here to hear the testimony in order to dig right into that so lets close that hearing right now.

Subcommittee members are: Chairman – Senator Kilzer, Senators Bowman and Krauter.

Written testimony (9) from Lorraine Jenson was submitted but no oral testimony given.

Chairman Kilzer opened the subcommittee hearing on HB 1007 at 4:00 pm. Regarding the Veteran's Home. Senators Robinson, Bowman and Mathern were present. Chairman Kilzer asked about the pharmacy for the Veteran's Home and how long is the contract with them. He was informed it is an ongoing thing. He also asked if they could shut it down tomorrow, and he was informed the Veteran's Home does not see that happening. Further discussion followed regarding the pharmacy, stating that one time they said they were not going to pay for them anymore, and they could renig on this contract. He was informed that the contract is with McKesson Drug, the VA supplier. It is not with the VA but actually with the drug company. The \$800,000.00 is an increase over the 212 over the present biennium, is that still true. He was told yes. 2nd major change is the Primary Care Services, and you got \$150,000.00 from the emergency commission because of your increased lab costs and things you had to take over from the VA. He was told yes. He asked if that is in the House version now. He was told yes. If it stays there it is ok and they answered yes. He asked about Public Law 108.422 regarding the Residence Daily Rates, is that the same as it is here and ok in the budget. He was informed yes. You asked for support an increase of \$1.4 million, \$621, 000 to the governor's salary recommendations, \$349,000 to one time expenditures and \$309,000 to the medical center services. He was told that would have changed a little bit with some of the items that

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was pulled out in the House. Chairman Kilzer asked if the reductions in the House do affect these numbers.

Kristin Lunneborg stated that the elevator was \$120,000, another \$50,000 for marketing. Chairman Kilzer commented that the dressers were reduced. He was told by Mark Johnson that they funded the beds. Chairman Kilzer commented the night stands were \$120,000 that was removed, the 40 electric hospital beds are still in the budget yet.

Kristin Lunneborg stated there would be \$240,000.00 of one time expenditures that the House removed.

Senator Mather asked what is your need for those.

Kristin Lunneborg stated regarding the elevator, it's fine to pull out if we're planning on a new building. We can piece it together for a couple more years.

Mark Johnson said one of the things they are looking at with the existing building we need to have furniture where the guys can put fridges or tv's on them because of lack of space in the rooms, but that condition would change if we build a new building. The statement was made by Kristen if they build a new building the funding would probably be there to help purchase they types of equipment or bedroom furniture that we would want. Senator Mathern asked what else is conditional if a new building is built. He was informed that the VA will assist in funding some of those capital items as well. The thing we look at is the beds, they are shot. There was further discussion of the dollar amount they need. The \$240,000 is only the beds and the elevator and the other items is \$50,000 for marketing, we would like to see it back in. Senator Mathern asked the rational for that if you are filled. He was informed the home is at capacity. The \$50,000 is for strategic planning, and that was removed in the House. Kristen stated they have a waiting list right now, but we can't admit any more because we don't know what's happening regarding building. Senator Mathern wanted more information regarding the

marketing. He was informed the House took this out. Mr. Goetz stated they just went through an extensive review and gave information to VA. Mark Johnson said the VA needs drawings and they are afraid we will run out of dollars to fund that but that is what that money is for. Senator Mathern asked if this piece was also conditional and he was told yes.

Senator Bowman asked if any research has been done regarding soil samplings, the water plain, and things that have to be done if you decide to build. It is imperative to know these things before the decision to build is done because of the costs.

Mark Johnson stated we sit on a campus of 93 acres and we can build anywhere. We will find the best placement for the building. Discussion followed regarding the footings on the skilled side. He stated the 1950 building is built like Fort Knox.. There are no cracks, it is a solid building. But the issues we have the 6 foot walls for the corridors and cast concrete. The other building was poured with elephant footings, we do have cracks in the bottom walls, and some going up some of the other walls. When they came in and looked at all that, overall, it is a golden opportunity to have the VA come in because they will fund towards a new building 65%. Senator Kilzer asked if they want to build on that 93 acres. They said yes, it is a good location, close to the VA Hospital in Fargo. He was asked if \$50,000 is enough. Senator Bowman asked the cost of the project. Several figures were discussed, however total costs is \$19 million for 121 placement and the VA will pick up 65%.

Senator Bowman stated we need to do a lot of ground work before we start and everything is spelled out for the architect The comment was made that they have a new board member, who is a contractor, DuWayne Ternes, and he will assist us to be sure everything is done correctly. Chairman Kilzer asked for some explanations regarding fixing up the building. He was told they have worked with OMB and the health department concerning the upgrades to the present building. Discussion followed regarding the amounts needed for fixing up the present building,

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the strategic planning costs and the estimated costs for the assessment for the VA. Mark said basically the fixup of the present building will be \$165,700.00, The \$90,000 is what we are looking at doing the assessments and getting everything on line so that we can have everything in place for the VA. We have to make application by August 15, 2007, and then in September they will make the determination where we stand in their project.

Comment was made that ND has never gone to the VA for funding, we are one of 4 states, we are at the top of the list because of Life Safety Code Issue. They have talked to VA in Washington DC and ND is one of three for top funding so they feel there is a very good chance that we will get the help from VA if we build a new building. The second thing is the Life Safety Code Issue and with that issue there is kind of a prioritizing list with the VA, because we have a life safety code it puts us into a Sub-priority One and so when we talked with Frank from Washington he felt that we probably would be one of three that he would be funding, But he has numerous projects that he funds. Mark stated they will fund up to 65% on the fixup on the building as well. Senator Kilzer asked about the physical things, the borings, the water plain, and if all this has been cleared yet. He was told that these are all the things we have to have done for the VA to accept our project. More discussion was held concerning the strategic planning and the amount taken out in the House. Mark said that Lisbon is listed in the North Dakota Constitution and in the NDCC as the Veteran's Home location. It would be our goal to build there simply because of the close location to Fargo, the VA Hospital. He stated the \$50,000 would go for the strategic planning, the \$90,000 for things with the architect, we have to write to the Historical Society, all those letters to wildlife concerning the Wildflowers and issues of that nature.

Senator Bowman asked how soon this will transpire. All information needs to be with the VA by August 15. We will be contacted in September. Once that goes to get funded congressionally

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they will then fund it in October of the following year. Senator Bowman asked if that is when we have to come up with that \$6.4 million to match that. Is that what our cost is going to be? He was informed yes Mark's understanding is we don't have to come up with any \$ at this time. We will need legislation signed by the governor, passed by the legislature, basically to say to instruct the Secretary of State to or Treasurer of the State to set aside that matching fund. Mr. Goetz commented he talked to the VA. If there is going to be funding grounds this go around, there has to be a contingency appropriation of \$6.4 million. That is an absolute requirement.

Senator Bowman asked if that can be a bonding. He was informed no. This has to be an upfront appropriation so that the money is available and that we have demonstrated good faith by this contingency appropriation. This has to be done by August 15, 2007. The VA is very supportive that this could be possible. The subcommittee was informed the VA has a yearly appropriation.

Senator Mathern stated Senator Robinson did some work with Legislative Council and OMB and distributed the potential amendments to address that wording. He reviewed Section 5, which provides for the legislative intent would be a way to consider this. This would allow us to change from the present bill to a bill we would have to have in place if we go ahead with the building.

Senator Kilzer asked if this matter was reviewed at the time of the hearing in either side. He was told no. This is really the first time this is brought to consideration. I think the hearing we had in the Senate raised all of these issues, but we never had amendments proposed by the Veteran's Home that reflect this. I think this addresses what the governor's office and the Veteran's Home is saying is needed. Maybe we have two sets of amendments before us: 1. Not to build and 2, to build. And this will address that we are building.

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Senator Kilzer stated we've had no public testimony on this. The only side we've seen is the nonbuilding side.

Senator Bowman stated he wants to know about the \$165,000 that we put in, is it recoupable. Mark commented that we do have the potential to get dollars from the VA to fund 2/3 of that, or 65% of that \$165,000 fixup. The other piece is we may be able to look at the smoke detectors we are putting in, but it will be difficult because we still are going to have an existing plant while we are building a new plant. Our plant is about 58 years old.

Senator Bowman commented that anytime you can save money, whether federal \$ or not, because federal \$ is our \$ and we have to put that into prospective. The archetect needs to know what you are putting in to see if that' something that has value when this building is being built. Mark assured him that we will look at the issues and if we build, what we can move over from plant A to plant B.

Senator Mathern stated we did receive testimony about this and we heard from the architect as well as the Veteran's Home, so I don't see these amendments as being outside of having received public testimony. These amendments clarify a little more what would it literally cost and when will we do this. I think the subcommittee has an opportunity to make sure that the testimony that we heard actually represents today;s understanding of the costs, today's understanding from the governor's office, from Senator Conrad's office about what resources are really being supported.

Senator Kilzer asked Mr. Goetz if this was considered at the time the executive budget was being considered. He was informed no. This information was not available then. The Governor is very concerned, particularly about the Life Safety Issues at the Home and I have had several discussions with the Governor and I have some comments that I have written on behalf of the Governor that I will leave with the subcommittee.

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Senator Robinson stated if you recall the hearing on the Senate side, we had the Department

of Veteran's Affairs first with Mr. Hanson, and then we moved into the Veteran's Home and

there was a discussion. In fact there was an overhead presentation powerpoint that didn't work

that day, so they had to use their paper testimony, we were rushed, but Mr. Ternes testified as

a former contractor and member of the Board, as did Brad Moanjo on the urgency of this

project. \$165,000 in repairs, as I understand, is the absolute minimum to address the

immediate concern of safety issues for the short term, and we all share the concern, as Mr.

Goetz pointed out something has to be done in a very short term before we have tremendous

liability before us. The amendments are a resolve of the discussions that have been taking

place in the last few months in working with the Governor's Office, OMB, VA, Veteran's Home,

what has to happen to keep this process on schedule. Brad has received a letter from the

Congressional people stating they will incorporate with the State to address this issue. There is

a time issue here in terms of federal funding as well. The longer we put this off, the greater the

risk is that the federal funding will not be available. As Mr. Ternes pointed out, a building of this

age, once you tear into it, you really run into a host of issues regarding asbestos, ect, the list

goes on. There was a similar presentation over in the House side.

Senator Kilzer asked if the VA Home is comfortable if what these amendments reflect if we go ahead with the building, would these amendments address the other issues we talked about earlier is that in addition to that. He also asked if marketing is put in. He was informed the marking was pulled from original budget in the House. He also asked what else does it not

address. He was told just the \$50,000. Kristen said if they build they do not need the new

furniture or funds for a new elevator.

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Don from OMB asked Kristen if they build in August of 2008 would you need spending authority for the federal funds for the 65% match to be able to receive and use those funds. We would have to add spending authority for \$13 million to start construction on the building. Senator Mathern stated we will need that to the amendments regarding the spending authority. Senator Kilzer asked if these amendments of Senator Robinson's are very close to what you gave out to me. Kristen that is correct, except the only change is the funding of a night watchman position, that was in our original plan. Senator Kilzer said we should still have that here, it has not been acted on. Mark stated it would be very nice to have that position and shared the necessity of that position.

Senator Mathern suggested that Legislative Council redraft amendments including the federal authority spending, the \$50,000 marketing and the night watchman position and we'll look at it again. There was further discussion regarding building the new building, questions regarding the waiting list and he was told skilled side is full, 10 on the waiting list for basic care.

Senator Robinson referred to HB 1425, the fact that he is proud of what is going on concerning the VA Home, the building project creates a real challenge but we need a good veteran's home.

Senator Kilzer announced the next subcommittee meeting would be Friday, March 9, and requested the amendments to be drawn up. Meeting adjourned.

Senator Kilzer opened the subcommittee hearing on HB 1007.

Sheila Peterson indicated there is a grant fund available less then ½ million

Senator Kilzer asked that she have this information available for us at the next sub-committee

hearing. She indicated she would have information available on the fund.

Discussion continued on this grant fund, where the sources are coming from, whether it is the

Veteran's Home budget, why there is one bill for multiple agencies instead of separate bills.

It was indicated that like agencies are often grouped together.

Senator Mathern asked if there were any new issues that have come up regarding

consideration of the new facility or communication that has been had with the Governor's office

or anyone.

Senator Kilzer asked when there is a waiting list of nine or more veterans, is that good or bad

or do you feel you are not meeting the needs. The response was, sometimes when there is a

waiting list are sometimes not ready and the list can be deceiving. At this time the home has

put a ban on new admissions so that work can be done. It was indicated the home is licensed

at 150 beds but the VA will pay for 121 beds.

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Senator Mathern asked if there is a market for the other beds. The response was now they want to be a 121 and later look at how to fund the next 29 beds. They do have the call for that many beds.

Senator Mathern asked if there was a plan through the architect as to where the c boc would be located. The response was it is located in the building and then he described what else would be located there.

Senator Bowman asked about the extra guard and whether that was if the plan goes forward. It was indicated the security person would be hired now. There are several security issues that have come up and not the staff to deal with it.

Senator Kilzer indicated that he would like this guard as a stand alone amendment so that if areas are not agreed on or other amendments are made we want to be sure and have this position in.

The committee then discussed the amendments that the house adopted, the proposed amendment of Senator Kilzer

Senator Mathern asked if the security position would be a contract position, an FTE position or so many dollars per hour to hire who they want.

Mark Johnson indicated they are doing a very minimal fix to the building and if there is a potential fire, having two people evacuate over 90 would be very difficult. They have an egress formula that is getting high for the residents. Part of the existing criteria is a resident has to be capable of evacuating from the third floor.

Senator Kilzer indicated the committee would meet again toward the end of next week, maybe Thursday or Friday. He also questioned what the CBOC acronym stands for. (Community Based Outreach Clinic)

Senator Kilzer called the Sub Committee to order to discuss HB 1007. Those present were: Senator Kilzer, Bowman and Mathern.

Senator Kilzer called the meeting to discuss some major changes since they met the last time. Senator Bowman, Senator Robinson, and Senator Kilzer along with the Governor visited the Veterans Home in Lisbon this last Tuesday. A project for a new home is on the Governor's priority list. The Governor and Congressional delegation have asked the ND Legislature to have contingency funding of 6.45 million dollars available as a matching grant with federal funding of 12 or 13 million for a total project of 22 million or a little higher. The Republican Senate Caucus reviewed the situation on 3/14/07. Their concerns are: The Republican leadership in the senate is asking for a separate bill rather than putting it on as an amendment to 1007. The major reason for that is procedural. This whole project has not had a public hearing, and they feel it is necessary to have that public hearing for this amount of money. The path is open for a delayed bill submission and this bill would receive a public hearing. He said if we go that path, the process will be done properly. He also stated that this is something the leadership desires.

Senator Mathern said that he was on the delayed bill committee and they have heard the bill already and it has been approved by the Late Bills committee. He had a different opinion

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about the issue of a hearing; he believes the new veteran's home was presented to the House and to this sub committee. He believes that this committee could make a decision but he has no problem with a delayed bill process.

Senator Bowman said that this is a nonpartisan bill with Senator Robinson on it and the Governor's support. He said that we have the support but a public hearing is to bring the issue to the attention of the state. He said this lets everyone come in and testify and be a part of the process. He said that they were going to support the Veteran's Home where it is at, in Lisbon. He said some of the questions that will be asked at the hearing will be: Why does it cost so much more to build a vet's home compared to nursing home or senior center? Someone needs to explain this. He stated that the tour definitely showed the need and was a very good tour. There is a safety issue. The hearing will bring all this information out and the story will be told to all the citizens of ND because it is their money, not our money.

Senator Kilzer asked Kristen or Mark if the \$90,000 preliminary study is in the bill as it came out of the House.

Mark said yes. He also said the \$50,000 was taken out for the market study in the House.

Senator Kilzer said that we really don't need to worry about any amendment for that and we don't need to worry about duplication.

Senator Mathern said that there are still four issues on this bill and Veteran Affairs issue still has to be addressed.

Senator Kilzer said we have to address the Home first. He asked amendments to be drawn up for the night watchman. What were the other items: The \$50,000. to continue the planning work related to the new facility; the reduction in the amount of money needed.

Senator Kilzer asked Mark to review the \$50,000 This is not the marketing.

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Mark said that they are looking at getting brochures about the Home done and study along with what the VA request and several mandated items.

Senator Kilzer asked how the House justified in taking it out.

Mark said he was caught off guard and they said it was duplicating services. When we really looked at it, we were not duplicating services, just that architecture piece is probably going to be close to \$90.000. They have to do a full blown architectural drawing. They want the size of rooms and they mandate every thing and the VA has higher standard than the States. It will cost more to build a VA facility.

Senator Bowman asked if the archetect and engineers are part of the total project. It's not over and above.

Senator Mathern said the delayed bill does not include those costs.

Senator Kilzer asked, that on the 22 million dollar figure which appears to be on the low side, does the \$50,000 or even the \$90,000 study help clarify what figure it is going to be?

Mark explained the mandates from the Federal government. You have to hire the architect and that will probably take the entire \$90,000.

Duane Ternes clarified that we are talking 22 million dollars and in that there should be architectural fees and that is based on about a 7% fee. What Mark is talking about is preliminary drawings that may never be used but an architect is going to be asked to draw up and provide it to the Federal Government and they will scratch them up and work them over and send them back and then the architect will start over. At that point the 7% fee will kick in but all those up to that point are going to have to be paid for upfront.

.....So you feel there is a need for the \$50,000.

Mark said yes. Once our application is accepted the VA will start picking up 65% of all the costs.

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Senator Kilzer asked if this project will be for sure at a 65/35 match.

Mark said yes. Because of the Life Safety Code at the hospital we are at the very top of his funding money.

Senator Kilzer said on the Life Safety code what are the final general fund figures.

Kristen said the amount of money is \$255,700 and that includes the \$90,000 for the architect.

Senator Mathern said that we may not have addressed the disparity of 121 beds and the 150 beds that we are licensed for. He felt that there were further requirements here to either authorize the spending for addional beds or decommission for less beds. I don't see that being address in this bill.

Mark said we should look at this in the next legislative session. For the 121 the Federal government will match and we do have the Congressional delegation working on this.

Senator Mathern said that if we are considering 121 beds and we are considering 150 beds but we don't figure that in are playing plan, there is going to be 29 beds that are lost and the next legislative session people are going to ask why we are going to add 29 beds.

Kristen said that the thinking was that the Federal Government said we could have 121 beds but we still want the 150 beds. The Federal government will match up to the 121 beds. At present we would have to come up with the full price of the 29 beds. Those beds will stay with us for four years, so the plan is we design the building so we can add a wing on and at some point can add those 29 beds and hopefully the Federal law will get changed and we can get the 65% funding for the additional 29 beds.

Senator Mathern asked why we just didn't build the extra 29 beds now.

Kristen said that is ideally what we want. She said the extra revenue generated by those 29 beds would pay for them in two bienniums.

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Senator Mathern is concerned if we don't plan for them now in the future the legislature may not want to put an addition onto a brand new building.

Senator Bowman said it is all about money. He said when they toured the facility there were three different add ons. It is all about money. The government gives you so much and you do it and then another program comes along and there is a need, you do it. Sometimes you can't do everything at once. We will have a major accomplishment to get this done right now.

Maybe someplace, along the line we can look at a location in western ND because it is quite a distance for everybody to travel down there when they have people in the home. He has never seen a list of where all the people are that are in the home right now. He did ask for that while they were down in Lisbon, but he still has never seen the list. Are their clients scattered all over ND or are the majority of them Bismarck and east?

Mark said that they have a number of guys from the Williston area but they are from all over.

Senator Bowman said in 1990 when the Beach hospital closed they tried to get something done out west but that got voted down. An opportunity like that might come along again.

???? said the demographics of Grand Forks, Minot, Bismarck and Fargo are the four hot spots. Could not hear the speaker clearly:

Rudy Jensen, Chairman of Administrative Committee said he was wondering on those other 29 beds, why can't we bond that money like we did the other two additions on the home and pay for it with the home funds. Then we could do it all at one time. If we put the 29 beds on now and bond it ourselves and put it up as one building. Right now they have 125 people and if we build for only 121 beds what will we do kick 4 people out of the home because we only have 121 beds. With more veterans coming home we will need more beds not less. He asked that the committee would consider bonding the addition of 2.2 million.

Mark said that is a great idea.

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would allow that.

Senator Kilzer said he wasn't sure how that worked but he knows that the state has bonding limits. We use bonding in some of our institutions of higher education and laboratories and other state buildings and we have limits in how much indebtedness the state can have in bonds. At the beginning of the session we are told how close to the ceiling we are on the allowable limits of the state project ladder. He thinks the 2.2 million wouldn't be a huge problem but he is more concerned about the State/Federal partnerships and how much they

Rudy Jensen said the reason he brought it up was that they have their bond all paid off for the two additions that they put on. I think it would be a great idea to build the 150 bed facility and bond the extra 29 beds that the federal government will not give matching funds for.

Senator Mathern wondered if the reimbursement that we get from the Federal government for the care for persons on the skilled nursing side would be enough to make the bond payment. **Kristen** said we would easily make the payment with what the federal government pays us and what the residents pay in rent.

Senator Bowman said that in this political process we don't want to upset the fruit basket and lose it all. We want to work with the people, we have a good project going, we have the support of both parties and now all of a sudden from what we have been told and what we are trying to do, now we are trying to do something else. So that leaves a little bit of question from a Legislative stand point if this was part of the original plan. It is different than what we went down there to look at and what we went down there to do. He said if you confuse legislatures like you just confused me, the tension gets a little higher on what we are actually trying to do. He said that support could be lost. I don't want to lose what we have gained; we've already changed the original intent. We have to have a balance.

Senator Mathern said just for clarification that he saw the veterans home come here as 150 bed facility, he does not see that as new. The Federal Government said that they will only participate in 121 beds. He does not see that going from 121 to 150 as a change. We are at a 150 it is only the number 121 that comes from the Federal Government.

Senator Kilzer said by the same token we have 4 years if something is going to be done about that.

Senator Mathern said that the bond difference is that this would be a revenue bond it really doesn't apply to the limits as other bonds. The specific revenue bond has no cap. Another issue we have to talk about.

Senator Kilzer said he was not sure that revenue bonds are entirely off the table when it comes to limits, just because we produce income.

Senator Kilzer asked if there is general agreement on the things that we have talked about so far because he said he is ready to talk to Bob Hanson.

Board said they would accept with gratitude the 121 beds and preserve the 29 for 4 years after we vacate the present building that would give us a lot of time to consider and they are willing to take that.

Mark said the Department of Health authorized the 150 but we are licensed 150 beds from the VA as well. The grant construction program limits us to 121.

Mr. Ternes said if this all takes place and we have 6 months of planning, and a year and a half of construction, that puts us to the next biennium. Any architectural firm can be told up front to allow this area for an additional building to keep the cost down.

Senator Bowman said that when we have the hearing on this it would be an excellent time to let the state know those plans. It should be explained upfront the long term goals and than write the language in the bill to allow for this. Then you can go ahead and start to plan toward

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that. We don't want to get the cart in front of the horse on this deal and get people upset.

Tempers get pretty short because of all the bills we have had to kill. He just wanted to give some advice on holding what we have and presenting it so that we could give the state time to consider letting us do this if we can get the revenue bonds.

Senator Mathern had some issues on Veteran Affairs. One of the issues was having a woman available to deal with Veterans Affairs. More money available for outreach. And in the notes we have adding the women's veterans' coordinator \$84,000 for the biennium and the outreach to the counties would cost \$23,206.

Senator Kilzer asked if these items were removed by the House.

Senator Mathern said the department requested these but they were not placed in the Governor's budget.

Rudy said the Veterans Home forgot to consider a woman's coordinator and asked someone to bring it up. We really need it because 10% of our troops are women.

Senator Kilzer asked how many coordinators they have now.

Bob Hanson said that they don't have any women coordinators. They have two vet specialist both men, one in Bismarck and one in Fargo.

Senator Bowman said they should be a vet first and doesn't have to be a woman.

Senator Mathern asked if the coordinator served all the counties.

Bob Hanson said yes. There are 50 veterans Service officer and 5 are women. They are paid by the county and they get Spring and Fall conferences. We are looking for someone to go out to talk to women.

Senator Mathern said basically there are more men.

Bob Hanson spoke on the outreach program, they did a study in May......Can't hear.

Senator Mathern said he would like an amendment drawn up on that.

Senator Kilzer asked for additional comments beside the women coordinator.

The \$23,000 would be used for the central office to make county contacts. Staff does support the Veteran Services out there. This money would be for travel money.

Bob Hanson said it was included in the optional package.Hard to hear.....we do 2 training sessions a year and we need to educate more.

Senator Mathern said we need to reach out to those counties and come out and provide support from the central office.

Senator Bowman said as a county commissioner no one has ever asked for this.

Senator Kilzer said he had to talk with Chet about these two last requests.

Committee favors all the items relating to the Home that we talked about today but the items relating to women service coordinator and travel expenses we can discuss that at the time of the hearing of the delayed bill whenever that is scheduled.



Representative Nelson questioned the footnote #2, the \$50,000 for planning and marketing. He said it was his understanding that it was more a marketing effort - advertising in the local papers.

Senator Mathern saw this as a bigger effort, before expenditures for the new facility. There will be considerable work to plan for that and is part of it. Several things will still need to be done.

Representative Metcalf stated he had information from the Veterans Home. He said the \$90,000 added was basically for the architectural drawings. Might be some testing, ground soil testing that might be included, too. But, the \$50,000 is to cover incidental expenses such as environmental impact studies - phase 1 environmental survey - phase 2 environmental assessments, demographic studies as far as needs analysis, 5 year capital program and a financial plan for 3 years. It is essential that it be added back in.

Senator Bowman emphasized that the soil be suitable for that large building, that the soil will handle that much volume of weight, which would add to the expense to this facility in the future, part of the planning.

Representative Nelson: Isn't that part of the due diligence with the Federal requirements?

Senator Bowman: Not familiar with the requirements - it was their committee's concerns.

Representative Nelson: Has been involved with some projects with USDA, and it is certainly a requirement with them and they follow strict guidelines.

Representative Metcalf: Correct. I am positive that it is included in the plan. It is our responsibility to provide the funding and that is where the \$50,000 comes into play.

Representative Kreidt: Stated he was going to a little follow up on the \$50,000.

Senator Kilzer: During our hearings on the bill, the Veterans Home presented an experienced contractor, Duane Ternes, who had some good ideas and he was very strong in need for this part of the budget.

Senator Bowman: He also had a lot of experience in building and the owner of Capital Construction. He understands what architects can and can't do, sometimes.

Senator Mathern: Recalled major study of the facility some years back - major shake up - major long term concerns raised and the administration now has addressed many of those concerns. However, part of the follow up to that is to make sure that they have a good long range plan that includes making sure that all of these facilities are used well. That is partially what we are talking about with the \$50,000. Want to make sure the many positive things stay in place, but need resources to work on marketing and long range plan areas. There is a lot of work put on the administration to make sure that it is all done right. The \$50,000 helps make sure that our demands of a few years ago about the development of this facility met and give them a few dollars to make sure they can continue working on those demands that we created with our past studies.

Representative Kreidt: Wants to follow up on a few things ... not going to finish today.

Don Wolf of Legislative Council: Have everything covered.

Representative Nelson: Refresh my memory on the night watchman situation. Has that left the House. We thought we could use residents to monitor that. Was there any compensation that was considered for that?

Representative Kreidt: That was included in the \$630,000 item that went over to the Senate which was for 2 temporary employees and doing whatever they needed to do to bring the facility up to compliance for the new construction.

Representative Metcalf: When we are looking at the clientele that we serve in that particular facility, they have liberties that they normally don't have at other types of facilities. For instance, if they decide they want to go downtown and have a few libations, they are free to do that. But, they can come back to the basic care facility at any time they so desire. And, sometimes they get a little bit out of hand. This happens on a routine basis. At this particular time the Veterans Home has basically all females that are working there late in the evenings and into the night time hours. It gets to be a real safety issue for the employees there without having an individual that could explain the situation to the veteran that is getting out of hand and bring them under control if that is necessary. So, this is the purpose of maintaining them afterwards.

Representative Kreidt: Looking at a type of security person ... ward off situations. They are using some residents to do this now and the residents are a little intimidated by these individuals. There are still some questions to be answered.

Representative Nelson: Have they requested a security position in previous bienniums?

Representative Kreidt: Not that I am aware of. Question whether this is something they feel is going to be an ongoing situation or things could change.

Senator Mathern: They have wanted to professionalize this more ... want to be more responsive to the citizens of ND ... board more active as they have looked at long-term planning ... ways of making this area higher quality ... more responsible to security.

Representative Metcalf: Response to Representative Nelson - they have been providing a certain amount of security with the veterans that were there that were willing to take on the extra jobs. But, they just feel that it is getting to the point where these individuals who do not have continuity. It is their first chance in requesting security.

Senator Bowman: Can relate to why they are doing it. Recalled days when back in the service and when guys when come in late at night and had a little too much spirits and would get out of control. When the captain came in, all of a sudden they changed. It is just a matter of identification. A security uniform means authority.

Representative Nelson: I don't disagree ... the value of security in a workplace is the piece of whole puzzle. Why didn't they include it in the OMB request? This came to us after the life safety issue was raised and we wanted somebody to monitor the facility the night time hours. Now, it has gone from a life safety issue to a full-time security position. I have some real problems with the way this has been handled in this particular budget. I think it should have gone through the channels of day one if it was that important and got it included in the Executive Budget and then come to full committee, not through an amendment process.

Conference Committee met in the Roughrider Room with Representative Kreidt,

Chairman, Representatives Nelson and Metcalf, Senators Kilzer, Bowman, and Mathern.

Representative Kreidt opened the conference committee meeting. He stated the last meeting we had some discussion in regard to the \$90,000 and the \$50,000. We were talking about the 1.4 FTE being added on Senate side in regards to security. Pretty clear and information received and would like to run by the committee at this time. The \$90,000 would be for preplanning of the new facility. The House session did pass the new Veterans Home bill and over to the Senate. It looks like this project will going forward at this time. At this point, I believe the Veterans Home is going need some up-front money to begin that project. What I would like to see with that \$90,000 is the management and board go forward with contracting with an architect, getting their contractor on board and engineers, and moving forward with the project. After all the hiring, you build that cost into the overall construction of the facility.

Senator Bowman: Question whether reimbursable back to the state.

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Representative Kreidt stated that it would come back to the state. It would become a part of 6.5 million dollars.

Senator Bowman: They would money to start up front to start the project, the \$90,000, so it would be a "wash".

Senator Mathern: Suggested that wording be added there would be some reimbursement.

Representative Kreidt: That is correct.

Representative Metcalf: Met with the architect and the \$90,000 probably will cover this cost, but he says it going to be very close. I would wonder if we could be receptive to possibly increasing the amount by \$10,000 to make it an even \$100,000. It is going to be a little over \$100,000 the way he estimated. We probably will be making an amendment, to add this wording to \$100,000 just make sure we have enough up font money.

Senator Bowman: "Up to" \$100,000.

Representative Metcalf: Motion?

Representative Kreidt: As chairman I'm always in a negotiating mood. I could support that, but I have a real problem with the additional \$50,000 for planning. Would like to see that go away. I would be open to two motions - one to remove the \$50,000 and one to state "up to \$100,000" regarding the preplanning for the new facility.

Senator Mathern: In light of the possibility that we move this up to \$100,000 and make it reimbursable, it would seem to me that we have would have some room here to make the \$50,000 available. Referred to the study done some years back and difficulties uncovered. Numerous changes have been made, staff changes were made, and good staff people, board involved, and those are all follow-ups from those earlier problems. I think the \$50,000 is crucial to make sure that all of the positive changes that have been made and the staff team have the resources to do the strategic planning. They have a building to build in the next few

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years. They need the \$50,000 to get some help on the general issues, or, I think we're putting them into a bind.

Representative Kreidt: At this point, resist that. I understand that - we have new administration on board - progress made in the operation of the facility. The new building is going to be happening now and they're getting some of the free best PR that anybody could have right now. Increasing skilled nursing beds up to 52 now. There is a waiting list there. If they're going to market, a good operated, efficient facility really shouldn't have to do any marketing. Word of mouth is the best advertisement. Refer: 12.20

Senator Mathern: Just to clarify, this isn't just for marketing - it is for strategic planning. What if we considered doing the \$50,000 and the \$90,000 in the general amendment? Instead of eliminating the possibility, try to create some vehicles where they could move as much of those costs into the building of the new facility.

Chairman Kreidt: I am willing to negotiate on \$100,000 - I am willing to bend that far.

Representative Nelson: Motion to remove the \$50,000 and appropriate up to \$100,000 for the planning and the design of the new facility.

Senator Kilzer: Seconded the Motion.

Representative Nelson: I understand what Senator Mathern is talking about. I am uncertain as to how you could work a long-term strategic plan into a construction project. We're talking two different subject matters here.

Chairman Kreidt: With your motion, would you include this as becoming an overall cost of the project?

Representative Nelson: Yes, I would.

Senator Bowman: What I concerned about is this enough money to make sure that we have everything done required by the government before the bids are left? Why wouldn't we want to

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Human Resources Division
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provide money to make sure that it is done right upfront if it is reimbursable. Is this going to be what they need to make sure that all of the preplanning is done, the part of checking the ground, and all those things are done? What is the magical number?

Representative Metcalf: I will say that people who work at the Veterans Home have been very involved in making sure that all questions that you have just asked are being taken care of. The Department of Veterans Affairs has come with a list such as this and it tells just exactly what has to be done with preconstruction. They have gone ahead and obtained estimates from local people that can provide this and have come up with \$101,000. My \$100,000 estimate beforehand was basically on this estimate on this slip right here. The preconstruction costs that you are concerned about are covered. Justifiably, I can't see any real problem with it.

Senator Mathern: I am wondering if Representative Nelson would be willing to withdraw his motion and just make it on the basis of the \$50,000, and then we address the other issue that Senator Bowman is bringing up. We really have two issues here.

Representative Nelson: I will withdraw my motion. Then, I would move to drop the \$50,000 appropriation for planning and marketing.

Chairman Kreidt: Seconded the motion.

Roll Call Vote: Kreidt - yes, Nelson - yes, Metcalf - yes, Kilzer - yes, Bowman - yes, Mathern - no.

Motion carried.

Senator Mathern: Moved that we authorize the expenditure of \$140,000 for the architecture work and the strategic work to be made available to the Veterans Home immediately and that they be authorized to do what they can to make a part of the whole project, and whatever is reimbursable be part of the project as reimbursable.

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Representative Metcalf: Seconded the motion.

Senator Bowman: Questioned the amount.

Senator Mathern: See this as a way to tell the Veterans Home that they have up to \$140,000 to assist them in the architectural and strategic planning work to move forward with the

Senator Kilzer: I would hope we would defeat this proposed amendment and have a new amendment of an appropriation of \$265,000 to include all of the life safety code deficiencies and the \$100,000 for the preplanning and other items that we have just discussed.

Roll Call Vote: Kredit - no, Nelson - no, Metcalf - no, Kilzer - nay, Bowman - no, Mathern aye.

Motion failed.

Senator Kilzer: Move that we ask for an appropriation for \$265,000 to include the life safety code deficiencies and the \$100,000 for the preplanning and other items that we have just discussed.

Senator Bowman: Seconded the motion.

Senator Mathern: How this relates to Senate action?

Representative Kreidt: The \$165,000 is included for the life safety.

Discussion.

Don Wolf of Legislative Council: Since we are working off the House amendments, the House version is \$630,000. The Senate removed \$374,300 to bring it down to \$255,700. I think what Senator Kilzer is trying to propose is that we actually have a reduction from the current version of \$630,000 to \$265,700. Is that correct?

Representative Kreidt: That would be in order.

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Senator Bowman: That includes the money to fix those safety issues before they tear down plus the \$100,000 to do the preplanning and everything.

Representative Metcalf: Question regarding the FTEs that was also included?

Representative Kreidt: We will look at that as a separate motion.

Representative Nelson: In the \$165,700, that is as I understand it includes the work to be done with the smoke alarms and some of the dampers in the air ducts. It doesn't include the personnel that were added in the House version for monitoring during the night hours for fire possibilities. Is that correct?

Representative Kreidt: That is correct.

Representative Nelson: Question the motion put forward - some of this money, the \$100,000 may be eligible for reimbursement through Veterans Administration. The \$165,700 wouldn't be, is that correct? Would they conflict in this motion?

Senator Mathern: They were put together in our bill as we received it and that is why I kept them together. The original was \$165,000 plus \$90,000 and the total was \$255,000. It was put together that way and I just added the \$10,000 because we had gone to up to the \$90,000 to \$100,000.

Senator Bowman: Questioned whether inclusive to the language we had discussed and reimbursable - inclusive to that amendment?

Senator Mathern: Questioned whether the committee would be seeing the amendments before the conference committee is dissolved.

Voice Vote: 7 yes and 1 nay.

Motion carried.

Conference Committee met in the Roughrider Room with Representative Kreidt,

Chairman, Representatives Nelson and Metcalf, Senators Kilzer, Bowman, and Mathern.

Representative Kreidt reopened the conference committee meeting. He stated the amendments .0209 were discussed at the last meeting. Everything that had been discussed had been included in the amendments.

Senator Mathern: Moved the amendments be adopted.

Representative Metcalf: Seconded the motion.

Senator Mathern: Questioned what the difference was between .0209 and .0202?

Representative Nelson: Just handed out .0210.

Representative Kreidt: Stated we would take up .0209.

Senator Bowman: Stated he wanted to be sure he had the right one which includes the preplanning, the night watchman - the life safety code deficiencies, and the Women's Veterans Coordinator position.

Representative Kreidt: That is correct.

Senator Mathern: For further clarification, this deletes the \$50,000 and for the new Section 4 where we do the \$100,000 preplanning - that does not change the Emergency Clause and we still have the Emergency Clause here.

Representative Kreidt: This is correct. We did receive Amendment .0210. This refers back to the watchman. Some of that is being done by residents of the facility ... bringing on some temporary staff to continue when those individuals aren't available to watch for any situations in regards to life safety codes that are being corrected during the period of time. This amendment would lower the \$101,604 to the \$50,000 figure that is in there.

Representative Nelson: The reason for the version .0010 is that I am still uncomfortable with the fact that this security position, although may be warranted, wasn't included in their Executive Request. I think it should go through the proper channels to make that position a full time equivalent position. The \$50,000 that is appropriated in here will allow for the 1.4 positions to be hired for that very purpose - only they will be temporary. So, the first decrease to the \$100,000 was the benefit package that was part of the full time equivalent. Currently being done at the Home is that they are paying residents \$6 an hour to monitor for the security that's taking place. With the hiring of the temporary staff, that wouldn't be necessary.

Continued explanation. Refer: 05:39

Representative Metcalf: Basically, we have to understand the need for a night watchman and that should have been done for years. We have people on the staff that are new at the process since June of last year which was after the budget was submitted. Then, they try to understand the entire philosophy what is happening at the Veterans' Home, and try to come up with everything that's needed, I am sorry but I don't feel that this will work. I think we should go with .02.09 and fully fund 1.4 FTEs. Concern about hiring residents because in many cases the residents are there for a reason. Refer: 07:20

Representative Nelson: Agree - not to use residents. This has never been part of an executive request and should be. I think we should begin as a temporary position and they can justify it as a full time position in the next biennium.

Representative Metcalf: Have to take a serious look at the \$50,000 figure. Are you going to find responsible people for \$12 an hour for two years? We should stay with the original .0109. Representative Kreidt: Asked for the person who made the motion on .0209 to withdraw and the second, if they would. Motions withdrawn. We will take up .0210 and have a motion and second for that amendment.

Representative Nelson: Made a motion for amendment .0210.

Chairman Kreidt: Seconded the motion.

Senator Mathern: Stated the .0210 amendment goes too far. Basically, we have taken \$50,000 out with the original amendment - .0209. Then, we're taking out \$50,000 for the watchman with this amendment which is essentially further management work. Reject motion.

Chairman Kreidt: House looked at life safety issues. Being more than fair.

Representative Nelson: There wasn't the intention to short staff. This is an improvement over the present situation. Right now and they have been doing it for years is having residents take care of the security position. It came up because of the life safety situation. We are giving them this position, the only difference is we are making it a temporary position for this biennium. They would have to justify the position in the next biennium. It has nothing to do with developing the plan, drawings, or construction of the new facility. The numbers - the \$12 an hour amounts to \$43,000 and we kicked it up to \$50,000 so they would have some latitude to farther than \$12 an hour if they needed to find somebody.

Senator Kilzer: What is the fringe benefit status?

Representative Kreidt: Temporary employees don't receive any fringe benefits.

Senator Bowman: I agree these things should have been included in the bill originally. But, I have seen us make a lot of other changes before. Don't want to interrupt the process. We all agreed on the .0209 amendment the other day, we gave up the \$50,000 but then added an extra \$10,000. I am prepared to vote yes on that now. I am not prepared to vote on this new amendment.

Roll Call Vote on .0210: Kreidt - no, Nelson - yes, Metcalf - no, Kilzer - no, Bowman - no, Mathern - no.

Senator Mathern: Moved that the amendments .0209, that the Senate recedes from its amendments and we amend as follows, the amendments we have before us: 78007.0209.

Representative Kreidt: Would like to see what the committee thinks about this. If we put in the full time FTE with the \$101, 604. If we could change that to a temporary employee and let the facility work out the numbers with the \$101,604.

Representative Metcalf: Would we be better off just putting a termination point on this particular FTE authorization ... that it would terminate on 30th of June, 2009. I would say that would be something that would meet our needs.

Senator Mathern: Like a Sunset Clause?

Representative Metcalf: Made a motion to add the Sunset Clause termination date of June 30, 2009 to the amendment .0209.

I assume with this amendment, we are letting them have the flexibility to spend that however they want. \$37,000 that they are paying staff residents ... no need to pay once these people are brought on. We're comfortable of letting that number just float and spent the way that they want to do it.

Representative Kreidt: Questioned OMB, if we apply the \$101,604, what happens to the \$37,000?

Lori Laschkewitsch of OMB: The \$37,000 would remain in temporary salaries for other chores unless it was removed by amendment. If the money is not used, it can be turned back at the end of the biennium.

Senator Mathern: I'm sure they will need every cent.

Representative Kreidt: No groundbreaking for a year or longer. Would like to see at least \$25 thousand of that money. If we would leave in \$12,000, that is still considerable amount. Senator Bowman: We don't know for sure when FTEs will be hired. The flexibility of temporary people is management's decision ... facilitating FTEs ... if money is turned back, they are recognizing the fact we are giving you an opportunity to make a decision.

If we pass this bill the way it is, there is an understanding.

Representative Nelson: If you want to give flexibility, why don't we give it to them in their operating budget? We don't do this in any other agency.

Representative Kreidt: We have \$37,000 for resident employees. I suggested that we hold back \$25,000 leaving them \$12,000 for in-house staff plus \$101,000 for the 1.4 staff that they want to bring for security persons that will Sunset in 2009.

Representative Metcalf: I would accept that concept.

Representative Nelson: Changing \$101,604 would change to \$76,000?

Representative Kreidt: Yes.

Senator Mathern: We are building a \$22 million dollar facility, they need this money. We have taken away \$50,000 already, We're just taking it out on the other end. I bet there are a bunch of veterans who see the \$6 bucks as part of their livelihood.

Representative Kreidt: \$50,000 had nothing with the building project - that was for marketing.

Representative Metcalf: Is that \$37,000 currently in their budget?

Senator Bowman: Made a motion to remove \$25,000 from the \$101,000 fund.

Representative Nelson: Question as what kind of flexibility does the Veterans Home have with the .101604? Would they have the ability to utilize that? Do they have some flexibility in that budget line to utilize that for temporary positions until they're made full time?

Representative Kreidt: Assuming the \$37,000 to be used. Is there an Emergency Clause on this bill?

Lori Laschkewitsch of OMB stated that there was not.

Representative Nelson: If they hire before August 1, there is the possibility of turn back money - the \$37,000 in their current budget and that should suffice until the new biennium. Do they have the flexibility to hire any body but a FTE to begin with?

Lori Laschkewitsch of OMB stated they have the flexibility - they would be able to use it as long as it was within the salary line.

Senator Mathern: We're making an assumption that there is great additional stuff we're doing here. That is just not the case. They have over 100 people there at night with one staff person a lot of needs there with the residents ... dangerous situation ... need to make sure position is there. Hope to get back to original amendments.

Representative Kreidt: I am going to bend the rules. Asked Mark Johnson, Administrator of the Veterans Home to come forward. Looking at numbers ... question whether there is flexibility to do without the \$37,000.

Mark Johnson, Administrator of the Veterans Home: Stated he was not sure because he was new at this. Planning for the next two years ...they are running an Emergency Clause on all of this. It started with a Life Safety Issue. We, on the basic care side have 85 to 87 residents. We have only 1 CNA and 1 nurse. We deal with a lot of egress issues because of the third floor issue. We have had three altercations that have happened at night. It would be nice to have someone that could be there. What we have at night are all women in our building. We do not have any males. It would be great to have somebody there.

Representative Kreidt: In the budget under the salary line item, you must have some flexibility within the budget to go ahead and do this without the \$101,000.

Mark Johnson: One of the issues last year, we ended up doing a contract service with a nurse. By the time all this was done, we spent close to \$60,000 doing contract work. Yes, we

may have extra dollars there. There could be dollars there, having a little bit of leverage to look at our dollars ... leverage important, too.

Senator Mathern: Literally two women in charge all night?

Mark Johnson: On the basic care side, yes. On the skilled side, we have 1 nurse and 2 CNAs.

Representative Nelson: No difference in what we're talking about. We are funding the position you are asking for. The only question is how much money we need to cover that position. Those needs are being met with the security in either of the amendments that we have passed. This is the first time that I have heard from the Veterans Home that you wanted that money for flexibility. Contract nursing didn't come in testimony when we first heard it. My contention is that we have money in this line item than we need for the two security people that you have identified. Question is the funding.

Representative Kreidt: In previous testimony, looking at the \$37,000 and \$50,000.

Representative Metcalf: Have to take a look at the actual dollar needs. First of all, we want these people to be full time. We want them to have the benefits in addition to a decent salary. Second thing, we have to realize the chances of finding a full time person for \$12 an hour is about nil. The average wage is closer to \$20 - \$25 per hour ... need good solution to this problem ... willing to make concession of about \$25,000 short - not the whole \$50,000.

Senator Kilzer: I was never under the assumption that \$50,000 is going to take care of two people for a biennium ... just isn't going to supply what we are looking for.

Representative Kreidt: Question flexibility in the salary line item.

Senator Bowman: We are so worried about what these dollars are going to be and what we can maybe save. They have to hire people to do this whatever the wage will be established.

We are going to fund what their need is in the wage line item. We're talking about a zero

issue. Give them the money that they need, and if they have a few dollars left over, those dollars come back to the General Fund. And they can come into the Board at the next biennium.

Representative Nelson: What kind of turn back did the Veterans Home have?

Representative Kreidt: They returned about 1 million dollars.

Senator Mathern: See us as dirtying up. We did some compromises ... why don't we just pass those amendments ... send these people home. No indication that anyone is doing anything irresponsible.

Senator Kilzer: These people do have a lot of forms to fill out by April 15th.

Representative Kreidt: We will come back.

Getting back to funding for the night watchman, I have one proposal we can discuss. Going back to Section 4, we were talking about \$90,000 there. We did add \$10,000 into that, we felt comfortable ... a legitimate figure. We did forward with a proposal of \$50,000 for the night watchman. We talked about upping that \$25,000 ... we talked about the \$37,000 they do have in the budget right now for additional staffing.

Proposed that the committee consider the salaries and wages dollar figure of \$90,000. They do have the \$37,000 ... \$127,000 total in that salary line item.

Representative Metcalf: Asked to review it one more time. You are suggesting that the salaries and wages be reduced to \$90,000 and then they can use the additional \$37,000 on top of that if so needed.

Made a motion to the proposal.

Representative Nelson: Seconded the Motion.

Senator Mathern: Questioned if the 1.4 FTE stays in?

Chairman Kreidt: That's correct, it stays in ... full time - receive benefits.

Senator Kilzer: Questioned 1.4 (2 people) getting health insurance. It does trouble me a bit about adding 37,000 thousand and 90,000. The proposed amendment in .0209 is better because when the \$101,000 salaries start, then the \$37,000 ends and comes back as turn back.

Representative Metcalf: The \$37,000 is not part of this bill. It is something that has been in their budget for years. In their rules, an employee has to work so many hours a week in order to be eligible for benefits. Refer: 07:45

Chairman Kreidt: In a nursing home, you work with a lot of part time people. A 16-hour position is not uncommon. The management would have to work out the details.

Senator Mathern: I hope we will reject this motion and go to .0209. It is going to make it more difficult for the staff to add this additional of night watchman, planning for the new facility, and building the new facility.





Continuing Appropriations

Veterans' aid fund - NDCC Section 37-14-03.3 - The purpose of the veterans' aid fund is to make loans or advancements to any veteran and to a surviving spouse of a veteran if the spouse has not remarried.

Major Related Legislation

Senate Bill No. 2142 - This bill provides that a veteran or surviving spouse of a veteran may receive additional loans from the veterans' aid fund provided that the total value of the loans does not exceed \$5,000. Currently additional loans may not be issued until the previous loan is repaid.

Testimony on HB 1007 House Appropriations Committee Rudy Jenson, Chairman ND Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs January 12, 2007

Good morning Chairman Pollert and committee members. I am Rudy Jenson, Chairman of the Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs.

The Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs is a 15 member committee appointed by the Governor from names submitted by each of the state's 5 major veterans organizations. We are responsible for overseeing the operations of the North Dakota Department of Veterans' Affairs and the North Dakota Veterans' Home.

Our committee is responsible for assuring compliance with federal and state laws in the administration of both the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the Veterans' Home. For example, we oversee the emergency hardship grants program, veterans aid loan program, and van transportation program run by the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

These programs, as will be reported in later testimony, have helped manyof the state's veterans and their dependents. Most of these programs are funded from the interest earned on the Veterans' Postwar Trust Fund.

As Chairman of the Administrative Committee, I am pleased to inform you that during the current biennium we have been able to increase the amounts allowed for the dental, optical and hearing aid grants for our state's veterans and their spouses. Yet, some amounts still do not adequately meet the needs of our most needy veterans. In addition, with the VA's opening 3 new Outreach Clinics in our state we will be adding two additional vans to help transport veterans to a VA facility to receive the specialty care they need.

We are here to help our state's 60,000 veterans, their spouses and dependents. Working together with county veterans' service officers, numerous federal, state, tribal and local agencies, as well as community and professional groups our two departments, the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the State Veterans' Home, are able to assist our veterans in their obtaining the benefits and services to which they are entitled.

I want to respectfully ask for your consideration to support the Department of Veterans' Affairs requests for the funding of two extremely vital issues impacting our state's veterans. First is the Womens' Veterans Coordinator. This is a desperately needed program. We recognize the role of women in the military is changing rapidly. Women are serving in every branch of the service. The services required and the issues these women face are different upon their return to civilian life compared to the male veteran. By the year 2010, we expect women will comprise well over 10 percent of the veterans population. We are here to ask for your consideration, the addition of a state womens'



coordinator, who would perform outreach to women veterans', assess the needs of women veterans and participate in national forums and committees for women veterans. This service would provide assistance to women who served in the U.S. Armed Forces and forces incorporated as part of the U.S. Armed Forces, such as mobilized National Guard and Reserves and those discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

The second issue is funding for the Veterans' Affairs Department to do outreach work with county veterans service officers. Commissioner Hanson will address this further in his testimony.

Additionally, let me also urge you to support equity funding for state employees. Low salaries seriously impact our agencies. Your support for this would be appreciated.

The Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs approved both of these budgets. Today, the agencies will make the actual budget presentations to your committee. Veterans' Affairs Commissioner, Bob Hanson, and his administrative assistant, Cathy Halgunseth, will present the budget for the Department of Veterans' Affairs. Veterans' Home Administrator, Mark Johnson, and the Home's accounting manager, Kristin Lunneborg, will present the Veterans' Home budget.

Chairman Holmberg and committee members, good afternoon. I am Rudy Jenson, Chairman of the Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs, (ACOVA).

Let me begin by thanking you for your positive actions supporting equity funding for state employees. Low salaries seriously impact our agencies. Your support for this is appreciated.

The Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs is a 15 member committee appointed by the Governor from names submitted by each of the state's 5 major veterans organizations. We are responsible for the North Dakota Veterans' Home and overseeing the operations of the North Dakota Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Our committee is responsible for assuring compliance with federal and state laws in the administration of both the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the Veterans' Home. For example, we oversee the emergency hardship grants program, veterans aid loan program, and van transportation program run by the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

These programs, as will be reported in later testimony, have helped many of the state's veterans and their dependents. Most of these programs are funded from the interest earned on the Veterans' Postwar Trust Fund.

As Chairman of the Administrative Committee, I am pleased to inform you that during the current biennium we have been able to increase the amounts allowed for the dental, optical and hearing aid grants for our state's veterans and their spouses. Yet, some amounts still do not adequately meet the needs of our most needy veterans. In addition, with the VA's opening 3 new Outreach Clinics in our state we will be adding at least 1 additional van to help transport veterans to a VA facility to receive the specialty care they need.

We are here to help our state's 60,000 veterans, their spouses and dependents. Working together with county veterans' service officers, numerous federal, state, tribal and local agencies, as well as community and professional groups our two departments, the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the State Veterans' Home, are able to assist our veterans in their obtaining the benefits and services to which they are entitled.

I want to respectfully ask for your consideration to support the Department of Veterans' Affairs requests for the funding of two extremely vital issues impacting our state's veterans. Both are of equal importance.

One is the Women Veterans Coordinator. This is a desperately needed program. Our military forces are utilizing more and more women in combat zones. We must be able to address their needs. We have an obligation to provide them with the best possible means to access the benefits and services which they have earned and to which they are entitled. This program will help address this problem.

The other issue is funding for the Veterans' Affairs Department to do outreach work with county veterans service officers. This too is critically needed so veterans will receive the benefits they have earned.

Commissioner Hanson will address both of these in his testimony.

Today, the agencies will make the actual budget presentations to your committee. Veterans' Home Administrator, Mark Johnson, and the Home's accounting manager, Kristin Lunneborg, will present the Veterans' Home budget. Veterans' Affairs Commissioner, Bob Hanson, and his administrative assistant, Cathy Halgunseth, will present the budget for the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

The Administrative Committee on Veterans' Affairs supports both budgets.

NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS COORDINATING COUNCIL

My name is John L. Jacobsen. I am the Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the North Dakota Veterans Coordinating Council. I am also a member of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

I served in the North Dakota National Guard and the US Army Reserve for a total of 30 years. I retired in 1995 as a Colonel. I served on Active Duty in 1991 during Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm in the Persian Gulf, stationed in the United Arab Emirates.

The Coordinating Council is made up of 15 members, 3 from each of the five Veterans Organizations in North Dakota:

- American Legion
- AMVETS
- Disabled American Veterans
- Veterans of Foreign Wars
- Vietnam Veterans of America

It is the policy of the Coordinating Council to support legislation that will benefit the welfare of the members of the Armed Forces. The committee MUST concur totally, that is all 15 members must agree on the legislation to be supported or else it does not get the support.

In this case, I have been instructed to recommend to this legislative committee that a "DO PASS" is supported by the Legislative Committee of the Coordinating Council.

ND VETERANS COORDINATING COUNCIL

The Coordinating Council is composed of veterans appointed from the veterans organizations and represents all of the North Dakota veterans. The purpose of the Coordinating Council is to determine the needs of North Dakota's veterans and to propose the means to alleviate those needs so that the veteran and his family may enjoy a satisfying quality of life. It is of the utmost importance that the members of this council be willing to work hard and spend the time needed to help their fellow veterans.

The Coordinating Council, through their Legislative Committee, is responsible for introducing legislation intended to meet and/or alleviate the needs of veterans and their family. The Legislative Committee may be made up of members of the Coordinating Council or may be other veterans appointed by the members of the Council from each of the veterans organizations represented. Only the Legislative Committee will develop proposed legislative bills. If the bill is approved by the Council the members of the Legislative Committee are responsible to actively promote that legislation by lobbying members of the state legislature.

Only the members of the Coordinating Council Legislative Committee are to testify before legislative committees and meet with and lobby members of the legislature. Other members of the Coordinating Council and other veterans will not testify nor lobby members of the legislature unless specifically asked to do so by the Legislative Committee and will limit their discussions to the particular piece of legislation they have been asked to help with. The reason for this is so the legislators will not be given differing points of view about a piece of legislation but only that agreed upon by the Council and the Legislative Committee.

The Coordinating Council is responsible for providing help and support to the Administrative Committee and their two sub-committees, the Veterans Home and the Department of Veterans Affairs. The Legislative Committee in particular is charged with providing support in the hearings in legislative committees for the budgets of the Administrative Committee and it's sub-committees and any other bills they have before the legislature.

If the Administrative Committee becomes aware of an unmet need of veterans, or feels there is a need for a legislative bill, either through their sub-committees or other means, this information is to be brought to the Coordinating Council as well as any suggestions the Administrative Committee may have for meeting the need or the proposed bill. The Coordinating Council will review the information. If the suggestions of the Administrative Committee will require legislation the Coordinating Council will assign the Legislative Committee the responsibility to develop appropriate legislation. The Legislative Committee will report back to the Council and Administrative Committee with the proposed legislation for their discussion and approval.

Testimony Department of Veterans' Affairs Budget (HB 1007) House Appropriations Committee Human Resources Division January 12, 2007

Good morning Chairman Pollert, members of the committee. I am Bob Hanson, Commissioner of Veterans' Affairs.

On behalf of our department I want to thank you for allowing us to share information with you concerning our 2007 - 2009 budget request.

I will give a brief overview of our department and our proposed budget. Cathy Halgunseth from our office will go into the details of the budget with you.

First, let me say thank you for positively addressing our major concerns last session. It is appreciated.

We also want to thank Governor Hoeven and OMB for listening to and positively addressing most of our concerns to ensure our state's veterans receive the care and benefits to which they are entitled.

During FY 2005 approximately \$154 million in state and federal funds was disbursed in North Dakota to, and for, our state's veterans. Just under \$94 million of that amount was hard dollars which went to the veteran or their dependents. Our hardship assistance grant program for 2005 -2006 provided \$172,000 in grants to 360 individuals while our veterans' aid loan program loaned over \$200,000 to 73 individuals. The attached green sheets have these amounts broken out by county. Veterans can and do have a substantial economic impact on North Dakota's economy. When one considers the multiplier effect of these dollars, the impact is even more substantial.

We partner with the DAV in providing 7 vans for our veterans to travel to VA facilities for medical appointments. For the 2 year period ending December 31, 2006, van drivers volunteered over 20,000 hours, drove 487,000 miles and transported over 5000 veterans to their appointments at a VA facility.

The theft of 26.5 million veterans records from the federal VA was a wake up call for us to review the security of our records. Our veterans' records contain substantial sensitive information about our veterans. In addition, the Army is in the preliminary stages of transmitting the discharge documents (DD 214s) electronically. We currently have paper DD 214s from WWII to the present. This is an essential document for a veteran in securing benefits, either at the federal, state or local level. We need to do more to protect them. Therefore, we thank the Governor for supporting our request addressing the need to provide a safe and secure system for storing and retrieving veterans' discharge documents (DD 214s), benefit claims filed on behalf of veterans with the VA, veterans aid loan files, hardship assistance grant files, and employee records, as well as allowing us to implement a program of storing DD 214's in a secure computer environment at ITD. We ask you to follow his lead. The majority of this funding, just under \$60,000, is one time funding.

Equity funding for salaries is a critical, high priority issue for me and our office. For example, the turnover in one of our 5 positions is basically because the salary is not competitive. We hire them, train them and then they take a job at the VA or another state's veterans department. Nearly all our staff have been in their positions from roughly 10 to over 25 years, but are not yet at their mid-point. We thank the Governor for submitting an equity pay package. We respectfully encourage you to adopt, at a minimum, his total salary funding package.

Two major areas of concern impacting our office and our state's veterans which were requested but are not included in the Governor's budget are: 1) A women veterans coordinator and 2) An outreach training program for the state's county veterans' service officers.

Recent articles report women now make up 15% of the active duty force. Over 130,000 women have been deployed since 2001 into two combat theaters where the conflicts are still being waged. I have



further been told that women make up, on average, 10% of a state's veterans population. Using that statistic, North Dakota has approximately 6000 women veterans from all eras.

Women veterans are confronted with different issues than their male counterparts. Several women veterans have told me they feel more comfortable discussing their concerns with another female. There are 4 county veterans service officers and 1 tribal service officer who are female. All the other veterans' service officers are male, most of who are of Korean or Vietnam era age. Approximately 2/3 of the county veteran service officers are part-time. A women veterans coordinator program is a first step in addressing this critical issue. Female veterans are entitled to have their concerns addressed by someone who can gain their trust, understands what they have experienced and are facing, who can truly empathize with them and then assist in taking the necessary actions to help them. We believe women veterans have an absolute right to have their concerns addressed in just as knowledgeable manner as does any male veteran.

State law requires us to assist counties in providing training to county veterans' service officers. We are addressing that by proposing an outreach program to work with county service officers to make sure they are properly trained. This is critical. As I pointed out earlier, 2/3 of our county service officers are part-time, who receive a small salary and in lots of cases little or nothing for travel. I consider providing ongoing training in their local areas an investment in our veterans. It will not only positively impact the veteran, but also their communities, counties as well as the state. The above mentioned \$154 million of annual benefits can and will grow if training is done.

Our proposal would provide active outreach to those counties who need assistance in keeping up with changes evolving from both the VA and our state programs which can make life better for our state's veterans. As stated previously, roughly \$154 million of federal VA dollars was brought in to our state and its communities by veterans in FY 2005. Veterans receive these benefits for the sacrifices they have made for us, and for which they will be living with for the rest of their lives. But there are many who are not being reached, or don't know what they might be eligible for. This program is an extension of the performance audit.

Thank you for allowing us to share our thoughts with you. We are pleased with the Governor's recommendation for our department, but also feel the women veterans coordinator and the outreach program are critical for our state's veterans now.

Testimony Bob Hanson, Commissioner Department of Veterans' Affairs Budget (HB 1007) Senate Appropriations Committee February 21, 2007



Good afternoon Chairman Holmberg, members of the committee. I am Bob Hanson, Commissioner of Veterans' Affairs.

On behalf of our department I want to thank you for allowing us to share information with you concerning our 2007 - 2009 budget request.

I will give a brief overview of our department and our proposed budget. Cathy Halgunseth, administrative assistant, from our office will go into the details of the budget with you.

First, let me say thank you for positively addressing our major concerns last session. I also want to thank you for your approving the salary increases and equity funding for the upcoming biennium. You have made it clear the concern you have to treat state employees with respect and appreciation for the work they do. We thank you.

We also want to thank Governor Hoeven and OMB for listening to and positively addressing our concerns to ensure our state's veterans receive the care and benefits to which they are entitled.

During FY 2005 approximately \$154 million in state and federal funds were disbursed in North Dakota to, and for, our state's veterans and dependents. Over \$114 million of these dollars went to veterans in counties represented on this committee. Over \$102 million of that amount was hard dollars which went to the veteran or their dependents. Statewide our hardship assistance grant program for the 2005 -2006 calendar years provided \$172,000 in grants to 360 individuals while our veterans' aid loan program loaned over \$200,000 to 73 individuals during this same period. This program provides grants to less fortunate veterans for optical, dental and hearing needs. Veterans can and do have a substantial economic impact on North Dakota's economy. When one considers a multiplier effect of these dollars, the impact is even more substantial.

We partner with the DAV in providing 7 vans for our veterans to travel to VA facilities for medical appointments. For the 2 year period ending December 31, 2006, van drivers volunteered over 20,000 hours, drove over 487,000 miles and transported over 5000 veterans to their appointments at a VA facility. With the addition of 3 new VA Outreach Clinics in Williston, Dickinson and Jamestown it appears we will be adding more vans to assist in providing transportation for our veterans to get to their medical appointments at a VA. facility.

The theft of 26.5 million veterans records from the federal VA was a wake up call for us to review the security of our records. Those records contain substantial sensitive and confidential information about our veterans. In addition, the Army is in the preliminary stages of transmitting their discharge documents (DD 214s) electronically. We currently have paper DD 214s from WWII to the present. This is an essential document for a veteran in securing benefits, either at the federal, state or local level. We need to do more to protect these documents and the veteran. Therefore, we thank the Governor for supporting our request addressing the need to provide a safe and secure system for storing and retrieving veterans' discharge documents (DD 214s), benefit claims filed on behalf of veterans with the VA, veterans aid loan files, hardship assistance grant files, and employee records, as well as allowing us to implement a program of storing DD 214's in a secure computer environment at ITD. We respectfully ask that you follow his lead. The majority of this funding, just under \$60,000, is one time funding.

We hire them, train them and then they take a job at the VA or another state's veterans department. Nearly all our staff have been with the department from roughly 10 to over 25 years, but are not yet at their mid-point. We thank the Governor and you for addressing this issue early in the session.

Two major areas of concern impacting our office and our state's veterans which were requested but are not included in the Governor's budget are: 1) An outreach training program for the state's county veterans' service officers and 2) A women veterans coordinator. Both of which are of equal importance.

State law requires us to assist counties in providing training to county veterans' service officers (CVSOs). We are addressing that by proposing an outreach program to work with county service officers to make sure they are properly trained. This is critical. 2/3 of our county service officers are part-time, who receive a small salary and in lots of cases little or nothing for travel. North Dakota's veterans range in age from teenagers to those in their 90s. Each war era has its own unique situations and problems which must be understood and addressed. We consider providing on-going training with cvso's in their local areas an investment in our veterans and our state. It will not only positively impact the veteran, but also their communities and counties as well as our state. Each veteran who receives a service connected disability rating of 10% or more receives a monthly compensation amount depending on percentage of disability.

The above mentioned \$154 million of annual benefits our veterans received in FY 2005 can and will increase if training is done. The CVSOs do care about and are committed to veterans. This program will help them help the veterans in their respective county. This program can help make the lives of the veterans in their county a little better.

Our proposal would provide active outreach to those counties who need assistance in keeping up with changes evolving from both the VA and our state programs. These programs can make life better for our state's veterans. As stated previously, roughly \$154 million of federal VA dollars was brought into our state and its communities by veterans in FY 2005. Veterans receive these benefits for the sacrifices they have made for us, and for which they will be living with for the rest of their lives. But there are many who are not being reached, or don't know what they might be eligible for. This program is in response to the performance audit. This proposal totals \$23,206 for the biennium. By contrast, according to the February 16, 2007 Forum, Minnesota is considering \$4 million to do outreach and communications to help their veterans (copy attached.)

Recent articles report women now make up 15% of the active duty force. Over 130,000 women have been deployed since 2001 into two combat theaters where the conflicts are still being waged. I have further been told that women make up, on average, 10% of a state's veterans population. Using that statistic, North Dakota has approximately 6000 women veterans from all eras.

Women veterans are confronted with different issues than their male counterparts. Several women veterans have told me they feel more comfortable discussing their concerns with another female. There are 4 county veterans service officers and 1 tribal service officer who are female. All the other veterans' service officers are male, most of who are of Korean or Vietnam era age. Approximately 2/3 of who are part-time.

A women veterans coordinator program is a first step in addressing this critical issue. Operation Desert Storm veteran, Teresa Wickens, Commander of the Nebraska United Female Veterans of America recently said, "Women handle conflict different than men. Veterans groups and the Veterans Administration are not prepared to handle that." Ms. Wickens went on to say, "I don't want any woman veteran to ever come back from deployment and say, 'we don't have anybody to talk to.' It is important there is someone on the other end of the phone who absolutely understands who can provide resources and support." We believe female veterans are entitled to have their concerns addressed by someone who can gain their trust, understands what they have experienced and are facing, who can truly empathize with them and then assist in taking the necessary actions to help them. We believe women veterans have an absolute right to have their concerns addressed in just as knowledgeable manner as does any male veteran.

Thank you for allowing us to share our thoughts with you. While we are pleased with the Governor's recommendation for our department, we also feel the outreach program and the women veterans coordinator are critical for our state's veterans now.

All our IT needs – data processing, telephone, website – are provided by the State. Central Supply and Central Duplicating are used as much as possible. I consider our agency to be fiscally responsible. Any additional dollars available will be used to complete an audit recommendation from our performance audit, sending our two Veterans Benefit Specialists to national training, and travelling to counties to provide training to new and part-time service officers.

IN SUPPORT OF HOUSE BILL 1007

House Appropriations - Human Services Committee

January 12, 2007

The Veterans Postwar Trust Fund is a permanent trust fund of the state of North Dakota. This very important fund is utilized only for programs of benefit and service to veterans or their dependents, and all income is appropriated to the administrative committee on veterans' affairs for the expenditure on these programs as authorized by law.

I have been attending regular meetings of the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs for the last two years. I can attest these funds are not supporting "fluff" but quality of life expenditures.....eyeglasses, hearing aids, dentures to those in need and who have served this great nation so well.

As State Treasurer, I am charged with the responsibility of investing the assets of the Veterans Postwar Trust. As a granddaughter, daughter, sister, wife and mother of those who have served and are now serving, I take this task quite to heart.

The market has seen improvements, interest rates have risen and we have made adjustments in the asset allocation to maximize on it all. I am pleased to report The Veterans Postwar Trust Fund has enjoyed a time of growth.

Nearly \$1,000,000 is invested in CD's through Bid-ND. Established in June of 2005, BidND places trust fund dollars in local communities through a bidding process. I seek rates from financial institutions across the state; and award the funds the facility with the highest rate. Currently we have dollars placed

in communities like Buxton, Edgeley, Fingal, Fargo and Langdon...to name a few. The average rate of return collected on these CD's is 5.52%.

The remainder of the fund is invested in money market, bonds and marketable securities. The asset allocation of the trust fund is established by the State Treasurer and is based upon the appraisal of current liquidity and income needs as well as estimates of the investment returns likely to be achieved by the various asset classes over the next 5 years.

The Veterans Postwar Trust Fund has experienced a rate of return for the current biennium to date of 6.3%. I have set the benchmark for rate of return for the 07-09 biennium to be in the area of 5.5%.

The committee anticipates setting aside \$100,000 in both the 2005-07 and 2007-09 bienniums for the reserve account. \$843,362 as of June 30, 2009. The Administrative Committee on Veterans Attairs has a policy of reserving a portion of the investment income balance to NOTE: The principal balance of the fund is \$4,101,849, leaving an estimated available investment income balance of \$673,712 as of June 30, 2007, and

The estimated June 30, 2007, balance made at the end of the 2005 legislative session was \$4,582,146. The increase of \$193,415 is primarily due to investment income being greater than originally estimated.

FUND HISTORY Established

The fund was created by Section 6 of 1981 Senate Bill No. 2271:

SECTION 6. TRANSFER OF VIETNAM BONUS FUNDS TO VETERANS' POSTWAR TRUST FUND. All unobligated moneys in the Vietnam veterans' adjusted compensation funds in the state treasury after July 1, 1981, shall be transferred by the state treasurer to the veterans' postwar trust fund. Any obligations of such funds as a result of any amendment of section 37-25-10 by the forty-seventh legislative assembly shall be paid out of the veterans' postwar trust fund and the moneys necessary to meet those obligations are hereby appropriated.



1988 Initiated Measure No. 4

Initiated measure No. 4, approved by the voters in the November 1988 general election, provided the following:

- Established the veterans' postwar trust fund as a permanent fund.
- Required the State Treasurer to transfer \$740,000 per year for five years commencing July 1, 1989, from the state general fund or other sources as appropriated by the Legislative Assembly to the veterans' postwar trust fund to total \$3.7 million
 - Appropriated the income from the veterans' postwar trust fund on a continuing basis to the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs to be spent for veterans' programs as authorized by law.
 - Required the State Treasurer to invest the fund in legal investments as provided by North Dakota Century Code Section 21-10-07.

The principal balance in the fund on December 8, 1988, was \$401,849.

postwar trust fund. The bill also appropriated up to \$274,000 of investment income earned on the veterans' postwar trust fund balance to the Veterans Home Senate Bill No. 2009 (1989) transferred \$1,480,000, \$740,000 on July 1, 1989, and \$740,000 on July 1, 1990, from the state general fund to the veterans' for its operating costs. Because of net budget reductions during the 1989-91 biennium, the transfer from the general fund to the veterans' postwar trust fund for the second year of the 1989-91 biennium was reduced by \$95,005, from \$740,000 to \$644,995.

restored the \$95,005 which was not transferred during the 1989-91 biennium because of net budget reductions. Because of budget allotments ordered by the Governor during the 1991-93 biennium, the transfer from the general fund to the veterans' postwar trust fund for the second year of the 1991-93 biennium was Senate Bill No. 2001 (1991) transferred \$1,575,005 from the general fund to the veterans' postwar trust fund during the 1991-93 biennium. This amount reduced by \$5,670, from \$740,000 to \$734,330.

House Bill No. 1001 (1993) transferred \$745,670 from the general fund to the veterans' postwar trust fund during the 1993-95 biennium. This was the final transfer required by the initiated measure and includes \$5,670 to restore the reduction made during the 1991-93 biennium because of budget reductions.

1996 Initiated Constitutional Measure No. 4

Initiated constitutional measure No. 4, approved by the voters in the November 1996 general election, created the following new section to Article X of the North Dakota Constitution:


The veterans' postwar trust fund shall be a permanent trust fund of the state of North Dakota and shall consist of moneys transferred or credited to the fund as authorized by legislative enactment. Investment of the fund shall be the responsibility of the state treasurer who shall have full authority to invest the fund only in the same manner as the state investment board is authorized to make investments. All income received from investments is to be utilized for programs which must be of benefit and service to veterans, who are defined by legislative enactment, or their dependents, and such income is hereby appropriated to the administrative committee on veterans' affairs on a continuing basis for expenditure upon those programs selected at the discretion of the administrative committee on veterans' affairs.

Chairman Pollert and Committee members:

My name is Lorraine Jenson.



I joined the ND Air National Guard in 1969 as a nurse with the medics as a 1st Lt. I was the only woman in the guard at that time. I served until 1974 achieving the rank of Captain when I left the guard. I am very proud of the fact I completed and received my wings as a Flight Nurse and served in that capacity with the Minnesota Air Guard until I transferred back to the NDANG.

Today the ratio of women soldiers to men is one out of every 10 soldiers is a woman. They are no longer relegated to clerical or medical jobs but are serving in active combat roles. During WWII we had women air force pilots, (WASPS). It was the first organized group of women pilots to serve in the war. In 1977, almost 35 years after the Army Air force deactivated the WASPS the government awarded the women honorable discharges and veterans benefits. It is estimated that 750 women disguised themselves as men and fought in the American Civil War. The first woman to receive the Medal of Honor was Dr. Mary E. Walker, a contract surgeon during the Civil War. Today 20% of the Air Force's strength are women. So you see women in the military are an integral part of serving with the armed forces and numbers are increasing and as they increase we are seeing more women veterans today from all branches of the service. They are serving on patrols and working side by side with the male soldier.

I would like to list for you the top 5 disease categories being treated at Veterans hospitals today:

42% are disease & problems of Musco-Skeletal System - Amputations, bone injuries.

38% seen are symptoms of ill-defined, no diagnosis yet.

35% seen are mental health problems.

29% seen are Genital-urinary problems.

Women continue to have a larger role in the military and combat, they will be seeking more assistance from the VA in greater numbers.

In addition to Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), a great number of women veterans also experience sexual trauma during their service. I believe it would be easier for women to discuss this concern with another woman than a man.

We need visionary work to plan and address the needs of this new generation of women veterans. To do this we need a women coordinator who can communicate with the female veteran and assist them in their needs. Some of these issues for women would be easier to discuss with a woman coordinator rather than with a male. An example would be the sexual trauma experienced by women in the military.

North Dakota in my estimation has always been a leader in helping veterans. I am respectfully asking you to consider approval of this position. To do so would continue North Dakota's tradition of being visionary and progressive by allowing for a **Women's Veterans Coordinator** to assist North Dakota's female veterans population.





HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE HEARING FRIDAY, JANUARY 12, 2006

Chairman Pollert and members of the House Appropriations committee, I am Kristin Lunneborg, Accounting Manager at the North Dakota Veterans Home. I am here today to give you some insight into our 2007-2009 budget request.

The majority of the changes to our 2007-2009 budget revolve around changes brought on by the VA Medical Center in Fargo, N.D. The first of those changes being the cost shift of expenses relating to pharmaceuticals. In January 2005, the VA Medical Center in Fargo ceased providing medications to the residents of the Veterans Home stating that this expense should be borne by the Veterans Home as the per diem we receive from the VA is to cover these expenses. After much research, it was determined that the most cost effective means of providing these medications would be to build our own pharmacy and purchase the medications from the VA drug supplier for 40% of retail value. The 2005-2007 budget for pharmaceuticals was created using estimates from the VA Medical Center in Fargo. Unfortunately, these estimates fell short of actual expenditures and we had to appear before the emergency commission to ask for \$116,000 in increased appropriation authority to finish out the 2005-2007 biennium. The 2007-2009 biennium request for pharmaceuticals is for \$800,000, an increase of \$212,000 over 2005-2007 original request.

The second major change to our 2007-2009 budget involves primary care services for the veteran residents. Along with ceasing to provide medications, the VA Medical Center stopped providing primary care services which includes doctor appointments, labs, x-rays and various other tests ordered from these visits. Our 2005-2007 budget included the funding for the doctor appointments but did not include the funding for the labs, x-rays and other tests as we did not realize when we prepared the budget that we would be required to pay for these costs. We have tried to absorb these costs into our current budget but were unable to as increased fuel prices have pushed up costs in other areas of our budget. In November we were forced to go to the emergency commission to request an additional \$150,000 in appropriation authority to cover the costs of the labs, x-rays and other tests. Since these expenses were not included in our original 2005-2007 budget, there is an increase of \$97,000 to the


professional services line item for 2007-2009. The increase to this line item is offset due to a substantial decrease in medical service expenses. Last summer we issued a Request for Proposal for our medical services and we were not only able to save the facility a lot of money but we were also able to tap into a vast wealth of knowledgeable specialists.


One change that has a positive impact on our 2007-2009 budget relates to Public Law 108-422 or the Veterans Health Programs Improvement Act of 2004. This law prevents us from offsetting the resident's daily rate by the per diem amount that we receive for each veteran resident. In the past, the per diem amount we received from the VA for each skilled veteran was treated as a third party payment and was therefore deducted from the resident's bill. For example, if a resident's daily rate was \$163.41 per day, we used to subtract the per diem of \$63.41 and bill Medicaid or the resident the remaining \$100.00. Since this law prohibits us from subtracting the per diem, we collect the \$163.41 per day from the resident or Medicaid and we also collect the per diem amount of \$63.41, resulting in an increase in revenue. The net effect of the increase in our revenue is not the full per diem amount of \$63.41 because the Veterans Home Governing Board and the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs has elected to reduce our daily rates by \$20.00, resulting in a net increase of \$43.41 per day. The board decided to reduce the rates so that the Veterans Home could remain competitive in the market and because we did not want all of our private pay residents to leave the facility. Although this bill has a positive impact upon our budget, it had a very negative impact upon our private pay residents as many of them saw their monthly rent bill go up substantially. We have forecasted a net increase in special fund revenue of \$1,228,883 for the 2007-2009 biennium.

We ask for your support for our 2007-2009 biennium budget. Although we are asking for an increase of \$1,404,139 in appropriation authority \$621,027 can be attributed to the Governor's salary recommendations and the increase in benefit expenses, \$349,350 can be attributed to one-time expenditures and \$309,000 is attributed to the VA Medical Center shifting primary care and pharmaceuticals onto the Veterans Home.

We are working very hard at being good stewards of our money and we will continue to look for ways that we can reduce our costs while maintaining good, quality care for our residents.

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INTRODUCTION

The following Technical Condition Assessment is a description and evaluation of the building systems at the North Dakota Veterans Home. The purpose of the survey is to evaluate the technical conditions of the buildings, to aid in prioritizing maintenance needs, determining appropriate allocation of resources for building improvements, and understanding issues which could be addressed concurrent with any expansion or remodeling campaign.

The building evaluation is documented in the following categories:

SITE: Parking Areas, Walks, Lawns, Plantings, Misc. Structures, Utilities/Lighting, Signage, Drainage, Fire Department Access.

STRUCTURE: Foundations, Bearing Walls, Skeleton, Floor Structures, Roof Structures.

ENVELOPE: Roofs, Walls (Skin), Windows, Exterior Doors, Soffits.

The number evaluation rating for each entry is based on the rating scales following this summary. The Physical Ratings Scale is used in all categories except for Codes where the Code Compliance Scale is utilized. By glancing through the ratings, chronic deficiencies can be quickly noted. The illustrations and brief descriptions provide further insight into each deficiency.

The conditions were evaluated by visual inspection and consultation with Bob Nelson, Maintenance/Security Officer. Evaluation was conducted by James Simpson, AIA, CSI, CCS of this firm, Dave Obermiller, mechanical engineer of Obermiller Nelson Engineering, and Brian Poykko, electrical engineer of Obermiller Nelson Engineering.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The North Dakota Veterans Home is located at 1400 Rose Street in Lisbon, North Dakota. The 92-acre site is on the south side of Lisbon, just east of the Sheyenne River, and it has numerous large trees and is surrounded by gently rolling hills.

Established in 1891 and originally called the North Dakota Soldiers Home, the first barracks facility was constructed in 1893. In 1899 a hospital was built. The hospital was closed in the late 1940's and it became the Civilian Employee Quarters. The original barracks building was demolished in 1952. The main portion of the present structure was built in 1949-1950. It is a four-story building, with brick veneer. A four-story addition was built onto the east end of the building in 1980. In 1981 a new central heating plant was constructed on the site, along with an addition to the existing boiler room. The name of the facility was changed to the North Dakota Veterans Home in 1983. In 1990 another addition was constructed. It consisted of a two-story infill between the Resident Dining Room and the 1980 addition, and a two-story addition to the east end of the 1980 episode. A single-story Gazebo with a wrap-around deck was added to the east end of the 1990 episode. The original portion and the 1980 addition were re-roofed in the mid-1990's, and the Gazebo was re-roofed in 2006. In addition there have been numerous smaller re-modeling, repair and maintenance projects.

The site has a small park to the SW of the building, along with several picnic areas and pieces of war memorabilia. There is visitor parking immediately in front of the main entrance, with staff parking to the south, and on the north side of the building, and resident parking to the east.

For the purposes of this report, the main entrance of the building faces west.

CODES SUMMARY

While the actual serviceability of various elements of the buildings is important in assessing overall condition, the arrangement of the parts of the building and their relationship to various codes which can affect the use of the building is also important. Three types of regulations apply to building construction, layout and use. They are the International Building Code, the Life-Safety Code (NFPA 101), and the Americans with Disabilities Act. In addition, requirements of the North Dakota Health Dept. and the Dept. of Veterans Affairs also apply.

The International Building Code (IBC) is applicable when a building is initially constructed and again whenever the building is substantially remodeled or modified. The International Building Code has as its purpose the protection of occupants and it prescribes certain building materials and methods based upon the numbers of occupants, size of building, location on the property, use of building and number of stories. Sizes, locations, and numbers of exits are established by the IBC. The International Building Code has as companion codes, the International Mechanical Code and the National Electrical Code. These codes set standards for sanitary facilities, heating, ventilation, and lighting, among others. All of these conditions must be satisfied to obtain building and occupancy permits.

The International Building Code is a dynamic set of regulations updated every three years, and in many case has become more stringent with each new code. As a result, often what was acceptable construction practice at the time the structure was built may not be acceptable today. In addition, many states and cities have modified the IBC adding their own requirements. Owners are not required to keep their buildings current with the International Building Code except when substantial remodeling or additions to existing facilities are undertaken. The definition of 'substantial' is at the discretion of the local code official.

The second regulation is the Life-Safety Code (NFPA 101) which is generally enforced by local fire departments. The Life Safety Code can be enforced on any existing facility to ensure the ongoing safety of the occupants. Periodic review of facilities by State Fire Marshals administers these requirements. The compliance requirements placed on owners varies considerably from jurisdiction.

The intent of both the International Building Code and Life-Safety Code is the protection of life and property.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is federal legislation that provides for equal access to buildings and accommodations for those with disabilities. While ADA compliance is dictated as a matter of law, and exempts some facilities, the ADA requirements are now incorporated into the International Building Code without exemptions.

PRIORITY CORRECTIVE ACTIONS SUMMARY

The following chart is a compilation of top priority deficiencies as described in the Condition Assessment Report. The deficiencies have been ranked according to physical serviceability and code compliance scales which are outlined on the previous pages. These rankings are based on our professional judgment with maintaining the integrity of the buildings and protection of life being the primary criteria. They are subject to interpretation and change based on other criteria, but establish a point of departure for developing a strategy for implementing corrective actions.





SITE

Parking Areas

Rating: 5

There are four main parking areas around the building: Visitor parking at the main entrance; employee parking areas on the east and southwest sides; and resident parking to the south. The resident parking lot is paved with concrete while the others have asphalt. The resident lot and the employee lot to the SW have concrete curb and gutter. Asphalt-paved areas were resealed in 2003.

The asphalt is ravelling in some areas (losing pavement from the top down), as well as showing slight signs of frost heave and both slight longitudinal and transverse cracking probably caused by substrate settlement and movement.

The resident parking lot is paved with concrete. The surface has many pop-outs, and is both scaling and spalling in numerous places. There are also numerous cracks, ranging from hairline to significant.

Concrete curbs exhibit some minor damage, most likely caused by snow removal equipment.

In all the parking areas the striping is either worn off or fading away.

Roads around the site are paved with asphalt. There are numerous cracks and places where the surface is ravelling.

Walks, Etc.

Rating: 8

Walks are paved with concrete, and except for minor cracking and pop-outs are in satisfactory condition.

The finish on the plywood ramp from the Gazebo deck is deteriorating. Staff indicated that the Health Dept. required the area beneath the ramp to be completely filled so that sprinklers would not have to be installed. Because of this there is little ventilation, allowing moisture to build up.

Lawns

Rating: 7

Lawn areas were dormant at the time of the assessment. They appear to be generally healthy, however there are some bare spots. A portion of the site has an automatic sprinkler system

Plantings

Rating: 7

Trees and shrubs were dormant at the time of the assessment, however they appear to be generally healthy.

Misc. Structures

Rating: 6

There are several accessory buildings on the site, including the boiler plant, the original boiler plant, a 3-stall garage and a metal storage building. These buildings are discussed at the end of this report. The Commandant's Residence is in a separate report.

There is a granite monument just south of the visitor parking area. Except for minor rust stains on the base it is in satisfactory condition. The rust is most likely due to minerals in the local water supply being deposited on the granite by the irrigation system, then rusting when rained on.

There is a chain link fence on the north side of the building. A hole has been cut for drainage adjacent to the staff parking lot. In addition there are other minor defects in the fabric and the posts.

There is a metal railing at the main entrance. The paint is deteriorating and the metal is rusting in many places.

There is a deck with a wooden railing around the Gazebo, with a ramp down to grade on the south side. A small piece of wood trim is missing from the cap at the bottom of the ramp. The painted finish on the ramp has virtually worn away exposing the plywood.


No problems were observed or reported with any site utilities.




There is a lighted monument/planter sign at the entrance to the site. The sign itself is in satisfactory condition, however the joints in the brick base are deteriorating due to water in the planter, and lichens are growing on the brick on the north side.

There is another monument/planter sign just east of the main entrance. The metal letters are in satisfactory condition, but the mortar joints in the brick base are deteriorating due to water in the planter.

There is a wooden address sign adjacent to the entrance to the residents parking lot. Other than slightly deteriorating finish, the sign appears to be in satisfactory condition.





Drainage

Rating: 5

Site drainage on the surface, and runs generally to the north and east. There are numerous swales and other surface drainage elements. Holes have been provided in curbs and planter borders to allow for drainage. Exposed PVC pipe is used to drain storm water adjacent to the Gazebo. On the north end of the original portion, and on the west side of the 1980 addition, the soil adjacent to the building has settled, creating areas where water will pond adjacent to the structure. Staff reported that storm water used to infiltrate the Laundry. Additional fill has been added, and more is necessary. On the north side of the staff parking lot on the east side of the building, there is some minor erosion where the drainage passes under a chain link fence. There is also some minor erosion at the east end of the 1990 episode adjacent to where the rain water leader discharges, and also under the sidewalk at the north end of the original portion.

Additional asphalt had to be added adjacent to the north wall of the 1990 addition to provide positive drainage away from the building after the original paving had settled. See also "Structures: Floor Structures".

Emergency Vehicle Access

Rating: 7

There is emergency vehicle access to three sides of the facility. The roadways are somewhat narrow for fire trucks, but for the most part they are looped or ample turn-around space is provided.

There is one fire hydrant near the building. It is just south of the main entrance. Another hydrant is near the Commandant's Residence.

The siamese connection for the fire department is adjacent to the main entrance, but access is limited due to adjacent steps and ramps.

STRUCTURES


Foundations

Rating: 7

The building has reinforced concrete footings and foundations throughout. Several minor cracks in both interior and exterior walls were observed which could indicate slight settling of the structure. Nothing was observed that would indicate any serious problems with the footings or foundations.

Bearing Walls

Rating: 7

The original portion of the building has cast-in-place concrete bearing walls around the perimeter, and structural clay tile bearing waits on each side of the center corridor. No problems were observed. At the north and south ends of the original portion there are cast-in-place concrete beams with painted, cantilevered concrete sun shades above the windows. The paint on the sun shades is deteriorating and the concrete is spalling.

Drawings of the 1980 episode were not available for review. However, based on site observations it appears that interior and perimeter bearing walls are concrete masonry. There is a small crack adjacent to the door to the Laundry. No other problems were observed.

The first floor of the 1990 episode has cast-in-place concrete bearing walls at new perimeter walls. On the second floor the new perimeter walls are concrete masonry units. This episode also utilizes the bearing walls of the original portion. One small crack was observed at the SE corner of the south wing, 1990 episode. There are a couple of small cracks in the concrete masonry bearing walls in the corridor on the first floor.

Skeleton

Rating: N/A

The building has no skeleton.

Floor Structures


Rating: 7

The ground floor (lowest level) in the original portion of the building is a concrete slab on metal deck supported by steel joists. There are cracks in the vinyl tile behind the serving line in the Resident Dining Room that could indicate some minor deflection. No significant problems were observed. The ground floor in the remainder of the facility is a concrete slab-ongrade. There are significant floor tile cracks and gaps in joints adjacent to the exterior doors at the Receiving Room. Staff reported that a portion of the floor slab was cut out and replaced because it had settled. The existing cracks and gaps have occurred since that replacement. Minor cracks in the vinyl tile adjacent to the elevator in the 1980 episode could be indicative of slab settlement.

The upper floors in the original portion of the building, and the in the 1990 episode are concrete slab on metal deck, supported by steel joists. In the 1990 addition, steel beams and columns support the joists at interior walls, and where the existing walls could not be used to support the structure. Nothing was observed that would indicate any problems with the floor structure in these areas.



No drawings of the 1980 episode were available for review, but nothing was observed that would indicate any problems with the upper floor structures.

Roof Structures

Rating: 8

The roof on the original portion of the building, and the on the 1990 episode is a concrete slab on metal deck, supported by steel joists. Nothing was observed that would indicate any problems with the roof structure in these areas.

No drawings of the 1980 episode were available for review, but nothing was observed that would indicate any problems with the roof structure.

ENVELOPE

Roofs

Rating: 3


The original portion of the building along with the 1980 addition, have built-up asphalt roofs. These areas were reroofed in 1996. Both roof drains and through-wall scuppers are provided. Metal perimeter flashing was bent up to accommodate the re-roofing. In most cases it was not bent back down sufficiently to prevent water from getting under the flashing. In addition the presence of the flashing prevents visual inspection of the roof-to-wall intersection. When this portion was re-roofed, the roofing was installed so as to drain away from rather than towards the scuppers. The aggregate surfacing has shifted in some places exposing the asphalt flood coat and membrane. Staff reported several recent roof leaks that appear to have been repaired. There is a large crack in one of the repaired areas.

The concrete sun-shades on the west side of the building also have a built-up asphalt roof system. The edge of the concrete shows signs of spalling in several places, indicating water infiltration beneath the roof membrane. Also, the aggregate is missing from significant areas, exposing the roof system to UV rays. In addition, the mineral-surfaced cap flashing is cracking in many places.

The 1990 episode has a ballasted EPDM roof system, which was replaced in 2006. No problems were observed or reported. The nature of EPDM is that it will shrink over time. With a ballasted roof system, this shrinkage will be noticeable at the roof-to-wall transition where the membrane will form a "tent" between the roof and wall. Because this "tent" is in tension, any small puncture or other hole will rapidly increase in size.






The parapet around the entire building is capped with a precast concrete coping. The coping on the original portion of the building is spalling and pitting. In addition head joints have deteriorated or are deteriorating and should be replaced. Directly above the main entrance, one section of coping has shifted such that it sticks out past the wall 1" - 2".

Walls (Skin)

Rating: 6

The walls are mostly face brick veneer, with some areas of painted concrete.

The brick is in satisfactory condition, however mortar joints are deteriorating at some window sills, and behind downspouts on the north side of the original portion and the 1990 infill portion. In addition there are several small holes in the mortar on the north side of the east wing, 1990 episode. The lintel supporting the brick above the window on the west end of the 1990 Activity Room does not extend the full width of the opening.

The paint is spalling off of the concrete in several places. In addition the paint is being scraped off the walls at the bottom by lawn care equipment. One small area adjacent to the main entrance was not re-painted when a sign was removed. On the west side of the east wing, 1990 addition, the painted wall is badly soiled from an exhaust vent.


The Gazebo has split-log type wood siding. Some boards are shrinking creating gaps between boards. Some boards are also splitting at the fasteners.

The painted finish on window-well covers is deteriorating, and the screens are bent.


Windows

Rating: 3

The original portion of the facility has painted, single-hung, single-glazed wood windows with storm windows in most areas, with aluminum fixed and casement windows with insulating glass at the SE and SW ends of the building and

adjacent to the main entrance. These aluminum windows are not original to the building as the plans indicate steel sash windows. The caulking around the perimeter of the aluminum windows adjacent to the entry has failed. Only the windows in the 1980 episode provide satisfactory thermal insulation.

The interior finish of the wood windows is in satisfactory condition for the most part, however the painted finish on the exterior has deteriorated, especially at sills, allowing the wood to check and split. Duct tape was used to make repairs to a window on the west side of the Resident Dining Room. One pane of glass in the Resident Dining Room is broken. Windows on the Ground Floor (lowest level) are difficult to open for some residents and staff due to the height of the sash above the floor. No problems were observed with the aluminum windows at the north and south ends of the original portion.

The 1980 and 1990 episodes have metal-clad wood fixed and casement windows. The windows in the 1980 addition have insulating glass, while those in the 1990 episode have double panes of single glazing. One pane of insulating glass on the east end of the third floor of the 1980 episode was fogged, indicating that the insulating seal has been broken. Several windows have been modified to accommodate air conditioning units.

Several windows have been filled in with painted wood. The paint is deteriorating in most of these cases.

The caulking around the perimeter of the windows in the original portion of the building has deteriorated. Caulking around windows in the later episodes is beginning to deteriorate, especially on the east and south sides.


Exterior Doors

Rating: 4


The main entrance doors are aluminum with single glazing. The weatherstripping around and between the door leafs does not provide an adequate seal. Light is visible between the door leafs. The sidelites have single glazing in wood frames. The finish on the wood, both interior and exterior, is deteriorating. Other exterior doors in the original portion of the building are painted hollow metal in painted steel frames, with wired glass and old hardware and weatherstripping.

There are no exterior doors in the 1980 addition.

Exterior doors at the 1990 episode are painted hollow metal in painted steel frames. The paint on the door from the SE corner of the Activity Room is scratched and deteriorating. At the pair of doors on the north side of the Mechanical Room, north of

the 1980 addition, there is no weatherstripping between the doors, and the bottom of the doors is rusted.

The doors in the Gazebo are metal-clad wood French Doors. No locking hardware is provided on these doors, only a door position alarm. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Means of Egress".

Soffits and Fascias

Rating: 8

The only soffits are at the porch at the main entrance and the underside of the concrete sun shades. These soffits are painted and no significant problems were observed.

There are no fascias on the building.

<u>INTERIORS</u>

Ceilings

Rating: 4

Most of the building has a suspended acoustical ceiling system. Ceilings in mechanical spaces and other secondary rooms are painted concrete. The ceiling in the Gazebo is wood.

There are many places throughout the facility where the ceiling tiles have or are beginning to warp, as evidenced by corners raising up from the grid, or sag. The ceiling, including the suspension system, above the serving line in the Resident Dining Room and in the Smoking Lounges is badly stained. Tiles adjacent to a couple of supply air registers are dirty. Tiles and suspension systems in shower areas in the original portion of the building do not appear to be moisture-resistant type. There are water stains on only a few tiles. And tiles in several areas are scratched and otherwise slightly damaged. Tiles in several places have been cut or otherwise modified to accommodate new wiring etc.

Painted ceilings are showing typical signs of normal wear and tear.

The ceiling in the Gazebo appears to be in satisfactory condition. See also "Codes: Life Safety/Building Codes - Construction Type".

Flooring

Rating: 6

Floors in corridors, resident rooms in the original portion and the 1980 addition, dining rooms, activity rooms, smoking lounges, TV rooms, stairs etc. are vinyl composition tile. Several tile behind the serving line in the Resident Dining Room are cracked. In addition, several tile adjacent to the elevator in the 1980 addition are cracked. Floor tile in the





Smoking Lounge in the 1980 addition are badly stained from cigarette smoke. Tiles in the Activity/Dining Room in the 1990 episode are slightly scuffed. In the Employee Dining Room in the original portion chairs have small rags attached to their feet apparently to prevent damage to the floor. A couple of tile towards the north end of the east wing, 1990 episode, are damaged, and there is a water stain on the floor beneath the electric water cooler at the east end of the corridor on the second floor of the original portion. The joints between floor tile in the corridor outside the Resident Dining Room are larger than normal. Some asbestos floor tile, which also have asbestos-containing mastic, still remain.

Resident rooms and first floor corridors in the 1990 addition, the first floor corridor in the 1980 episode, the Lobby, most offices, the Mail Room, the two small Chapels, the Multi-Purpose Room, the Lounge at the east end of the third floor in the original portion, the Library and Lounge on the second floor in the original portion, and the Gazebo all have carpet. Some areas have apparently been re-carpeted recently as they show no signs of wear and tear. The carpet in several offices is showing signs of aging including wear marks and seams becoming evident. There are stains on the carpet in a couple of the lounges, and the carpet in some resident rooms in the 1990 addition is slightly soiled. Seams between the resident room carpet and the corridor carpet in the 1990 episode are coming apart in a few places.


Floors in the resident laundry rooms, toilet rooms, employee locker rooms, Hydrotherapy Room, in the original portion, and in resident shower rooms and toilet rooms in the 1980 episode are ceramic tile. Other than soiled grout joints, no problems were observed.

Floors in resident toilet rooms and soiled linen rooms in the 1990 episode are vinyl sheet flooring. No problems were observed.

The floor in the Kitchen and Dishwashing area is quarry tile. Other than soiled grout joints, no problems were observed, although staff did report one hairline crack that could not be found at the time of the observation.

Where vinyl tile and carpet exists there is rubber wall base. The base is damaged in several places in the original portion of the building, and scuffed and scratched from carts, walkers etc. in other parts of the building.

Wall Finishes

Rating: 7

The majority of walls are painted, with concrete, concrete masonry, plaster or a gypsum board substrate. Some areas have vinyl wall coverings and/or borders. The walls in the Gazebo have stained wood paneling (see also "Codes: Life Safety/Building Codes - Construction Type"). Walls are cracked in several locations, there is slight damage at some corners where carts, wheelchairs or walkers have chipped the substrate, and the paint finish shows signs of normal wear and tear such as pin holes, chips and small areas where tape has peeled away the paint. A small area beneath a resident room lavatory has water damage. It appears that the damage was caused by a leak as the escutcheon for the hot water pipe does not cover the hole in the wall (hole made to repair the pipe). There is also water damage to the wall below an electric water cooler at the south end of the second floor in the original portion. In the resident room at the NE corner of the second floor of the original portion, and at the south side of the Library on the same floor, the paint is peeling off of the walls due to water infiltration. At the resident room the paint is peeling directly behind a downspout, behind which the mortar joints appear to be deteriorating due to water infiltration. Inside the Mail Room, the wall below the mail boxes appears to have been re-finished or repaired. Some areas have not been completely re-painted.


Walls in toilet rooms, showers and the Kitchen are ceramic tile. In the Men's Toilet Room on the north end of the second floor in the original portion, the tile has fallen off the window jamb.

Window sills in the original portion of the building are stone. A few have small cracks. Sills in the 1990 addition are plastic laminate. Gaps have formed between adjoining sections.

Interior Openings

Rating: 7

Doors to resident rooms and public spaces are wood doors with a clear finish in painted hollow metal frames. Doors to mechanical rooms, stairs, cross-corridor doors etc. are painted hollow metal in painted hollow metal frames. All doors and frames are showing signs of normal wear and tear including scratches, dents and other minor surface problems. The closer on the door to the stairway on the ground floor (lowest level) of the 1980 episode leaked hydraulic fluid staining the door. Some hardware in the original portion and the 1980 addition has been replaced during remodeling or as required, however there are still numerous closers that are not commercial grade. In addition, panic devices are old, standard tubular bar type

which give an "institutional" appearance. Some closers shut doors too hard and should be adjusted or replaced.

There is a customer service window at the reception desk in the Lobby that consists of a pane of glass with a transaction slot and voice hole.

There is a Cookson manual rolling counter door at the dish return in the Resident Dining Room that is in satisfactory condition.

There is a wood folding door in the Multi-Purpose Room in the 1990 addition. There is minor damage to some of the wood panels.

The borrowed lites at the Waiting Area adjacent to the Activity Room have a single glass pane in wood frames. No problems were observed.

Stairs/Ramps

Rating: 8

There are four public stairways in the original portion of the building, one in the 1980 addition, and one in the 1990 episode. All have vinyl tile treads (vinyl asbestos tile in 1980 addition according to drawings) with vinyl risers and steel nosings. Handrails are painted steel, aluminum or stainless steel. The paint on handrails is deteriorating.

The stairway in the mechanical room on the ground floor of the original portion is a painted steel stair. The paint finish has deteriorated.

The stairway from the second floor of the 1980 addition to the roof also has vinyl asbestos tile and painted steel handrails. No problems were observed.


Elevators/Lifts

Rating: 4


There are three elevators in the facility. The elevator in the original portion is an Otis, electric traction type, with a capacity of 4,000 pounds. It has vinyl composition tile flooring, baked enamel on steel wall panels, and a stainless steel handrail. The floor tile is scuffed. The elevator in the 1980 addition is also an electric traction type with a 4,000 pound capacity. It has carpeting, wood-grain plastic laminate wall

panels, and a stainless steel handrail. The finishes appeared to be in satisfactory condition. The elevator in the 1990 episode is a Dover hydraulic elevator with a 2,500 pound capacity. It has carpeting, wood-grain plastic laminate wall panels, and a stainless steel handrail. Controls and signals at all elevators appeared to be in satisfactory operating condition, although they are dated and showing signs of age.

Staff reported that the motors and generators for the electric traction elevators should be replaced as they are obsolete and repairs are problematic because replacement parts are difficult to find.

Specialties

Rating: 7

The lockers in the staff locker rooms in the original portion of the building are very narrow making storage of winter coats difficult, and there is minor damage to the doors and painted finish.

Mailboxes in the original portion of the building are in satisfactory condition, however they no longer conform to USPS requirements.

Shelving in the libraries, TV rooms etc. is showing signs of aging.

There is an operable partition in the Multi-Purpose Room of the 1990 addition. No problems were observed.

Food Service / Laundry

Rating: 8

Staff reported that the dishwasher breaks down frequently. Other kitchen equipment was reported to be in satisfactory operating condition. One panel on the front of the serving counter in the Resident Dining Room has come loose.

No problems were reported with the laundry equipment.

Toilet & Bath Accessories

Rating: 5

Toilet partitions are steel with a baked enamel finish. Partitions are dented and the finish is deteriorating in many places.

Miscellaneous

Rating: 4

Most cabinets in the original portion of the building are showing signs of aging, although some have recently been refinished. "Codes - Handicapped Accessibility: Rooms/Spaces".

Furniture in lounges, TV rooms etc., especially the smoking rooms, is showing signs of aging. Upholstery is fading and/or stained, wood finishes are deteriorating, and there are scratches and dents.

CODES - LIFE SAFETY

The following analysis is based on the requirements for an existing Health Care and Residential Board and Care occupancies as stipulated in NFPA 101 Life Safety Code (LSC), 2003 edition. Applicable requirements of the International Building Code (IBC), 2003 edition, North Dakota State Building Code, and North Dakota Health Department requirements are noted where they would be necessary as part of any significant remodeling project.

Means of Egress

Rating: 4

The stair in the center of the original portion of the building cannot be used as a means of egress since it discharges into the Lobby which has a lesser fire-resistive construction rating than the stair, and the landings are not long enough. (It does not need to be a means of egress.) In addition, just outside the main entrance there is a gate at the top of the stairs that does not swing in the direction of egress travel.

The corridor on the ground floor between the original portion and the 1980 addition forms a dead-end traveling in both directions. The dead end is created by doors not swinging in the direction of egress travel. The corridor on the ground floor of the 1990 addition, adjacent to the elevator, forms a dead-end. These would be classified as dead-ends only under IBC provisions that would take effect if significant remodeling is undertaken in these areas.

One means of egress from the upper floor of the 1990 episode passes through the Activity Room. This is not permitted since the Activity Room is not constructed as a corridor and does note qualify as an intervening room.

The door at the north exit from the Gazebo swings in the wrong direction. And the south exit leads to a deck which wraps around the Gazebo to the south and west, directly adjacent to the building.

A gate at the first floor landing for the stairs on the east side of the Activity Room in the original portion of the building swings in the wrong direction and is equipped with noncompliant latching hardware. The gate should be removed. Several stairway doors were taped off with "Do Not Enter" signs to prevent some residents from leaving the facility. These signs would confuse guests etc. It is recommended that another solution be found for this problem.

Motorized wheelchairs are parked at the north end of the ground floor corridor in the 1990 episode somewhat restricting access to the exit door.

Handrails at stairs in the original portion and the 1980 episode lack the required extensions at landings.

Smoke/Fire Detection & Alarm Systems Rating: 6

In the original portion of the building, there are no smoke detectors in the Activity Room, the toilet rooms, Lobby or offices. Staff reported that the fire alarm system was installed throughout the building in 1990 and updated in 2000. It is a Pyrotechnics brand, with a MXL Series Control panel, analog detection loops, discrete output circuits, and separate output circuits for chimes, horns and visual appliances. The wiring in the original portion and the 1980 addition was re-used when the system was upgraded. This wiring should be replaced. See also "Codes: Handicapped Accessibility - Signage/Signals".

Fire Suppression

Rating: 5

The entire facility is equipped with an automatic fire sprinkler system which was updated in 2000, however there is some question as to the type(s) of sprinkler heads installed. The Health Dept. has cited the facility for failure to maintain and test sprinklers in accordance with its requirements.

Area/Occupancy Separations


Rating: 2

Many corridor doors and stairway doors in the original portion of the building have no fire rating label, no closer, no intumescent gasketing and no smoke seal. In addition some doors have no latch, and others have louvers.


The service window at the reception desk is not a protected opening. Windows on west side of the 1980 addition are not protected (wall is 3-hour rated).

The exhaust air shaft between resident storage units and the corridor walls in the original portion of the building is not a fire-rated enclosure, and there are no dampers at each floor level.

Cross-corridor doors on the ground floor between the 1980 and 1990 episodes have a non-compliant smoke seal, as does a door between the 1980 episode and the original portion on that floor.

There is no door between the corridor and the resident Dining Room, 1990 episode.

Doors to the Receiving Room in the 1990 episode have non-compliant smoke seals.

Storage areas below stairways do not have fire-resistive rated doors.

There is no smoke/fire damper in the exhaust duct from the hood behind the serving line in the Resident Dining Room. Staff also believes that there are un-sealed penetrations in the fire wall between the Kitchen and the Dining Room, and between the Activity Room (original portion) and adjacent rooms in the 1990 addition.

There are un-sealed floor penetrations in the stairways of the original portion of the facility. There are also items in the stairwells such as piping which are not allowed in the stairs.

Any modifications made to the Activity Room in the 1990 addition, or adjacent corridor, will require replacement of the borrowed lites adjacent to the door to the Activity Room since it is not a protected opening.

According to the latest Health Department survey, stairway enclosures and return air shafts in the original portion of the facility do not meet the required fire-resistive or smoke containment standards. These findings were corroborated by this investigation; see comments in this section.

Lighting Systems

Rating: 9

Exit lights appear to be located in accordance with Code requirements.

Emergency lighting is provided by fluorescent fixtures connected to the generator.

Safety Features

2.5

Rating: 7

Guardrails at stairs in the 1980 episode do not conform to current IBC height requirements.

Construction Type

Rating: 7

The wood paneling on the walls and ceilings in the Gazebo is permitted by Code in an existing facility, but would not be allowed in a new facility because it does not meet flame spread or smoke development limits.



CODES - HANDICAPPED ACCESS

Parking/Drop Off

Rating: 5

There is no compliant van-accessible parking space. In addition the location of the accessible parking spaces forces persons to cross the driveway to get to the building.

There is no passenger loading zone.

The access aisle adjacent to accessible parking spaces is not striped to discourage people from parking in it. In addition, the striping is beginning to fade.

Site Routes

Rating: 5

The upper run of the ramp adjacent to the main entrance exceeds the maximum allowable slope, and it exceeds the maximum allowable rise of 30 inches. In addition, the handrails do not extend as required at the bottom of the ramp runs.

There is no sign identifying the accessible entrance.

Entrances and Exits

Rating: 6

There are an insufficient number of accessible exits.

Building Routes

Rating: 4

Areas of refuge at stairs are not required because the building is fully sprinklered.

Maneuvering clearances are not provided at many doors.

Electric water coolers, wall-mounted oscillating fans and brica-brac shelves (1990) form obstacles to visually-impaired persons by protruding into the accessible route.

The reception counter at the Lobby is not accessible.


At the elevator in the 1980 addition, the floor designation is provided on only one side of the hoistway entrance, and it is a non-compliant sign (no Braille). In addition there are no tactile symbols or characters at the access to the emergency phone in the elevator in both the original portion and the 1980 episode.

Rooms/Spaces


Rating: 3

Many doors still have knobs and a few, including doors at stairs in the original portion of the facility, have thumbpiece latchsets.

Storage facilities within resident rooms are not accessible. Clothes rods in the 1980 episode are 70 inches above the floor.



Non-compliant hoistway sign.




Thumbpiece latch on door.

Doors to resident storage units in the 1990 episode have recessed pulls.

Resident laundry equipment is not accessible (too high).

Toilet Rooms

Rating: 1

There are no fully wheelchair accessible public or multipleuser toilet rooms in the facility. Some toilet compartments at multiple-user toilet rooms comply only with the requirements for ambulatory toilet stalls. Lavatories in the original portion of the building have grab bars installed in front and along the sides, presumably to help people stand at the lavatory, but they restrict the reach to faucets somewhat. Shower spray units are and lavatory faucets are non-compliant.

Resident toilet rooms in the original portion of the building are totally inaccessible, as are the resident toilet rooms in the NE corner of the 1980 addition. Other resident toilet rooms in the 1980 episode do not provide the required clearance at the water closet and there is no grab bar behind the water closet. The resident toilet rooms in the 1990 addition appear to conform to ADA requirements.

Drainage and water supply piping at lavatories is not insulated and protected as required.

Signage/ Signals

Rating: 3

In the original portion of the building and the 1980 addition, room signs are non-compliant. Directional signs throughout the facility are non-compliant.

There are no strobe-type fire alarm horns in many group spaces in the original portion of the building including toilet rooms, TV rooms, the libraries, the Museum, the Activity Room, and the smoking room. There are no strobe-type horns in the smoking room of the 1978 addition, or in the Physical Therapy Room in the 1990 episode.

CODES - HEALTH DEPT.

There is no accessible toilet or dressing room adjacent to the Hydrotherapy Room.

There are an insufficient number of water closets on the third floor of the original portion.

Some single rooms have a dimension of less than 10 feet.

MECHANICAL

Plumbing System Rating: 3 (including gases and compressed gases)

Except where it has been replaced, domestic water piping in the original portion of the facility is galvanized steel. Because of its age it is in poor condition and should be replaced. The remainder of the domestic water piping is copper and is in satisfactory condition.

There are very few piping isolation valves in the facility. When repairs need to be made to the domestic water piping, a good deal of the facility must go without water.

Recirculating pumps for the domestic hot water system were replaced in 1990, however one pump in the Laundry is in poor condition and should be replaced. And one pump in the ground floor mechanical room in the original portion of the facility has significant efflorescence from apparent water leaks.

Sanitary sewer piping in the original portion is cast iron and is in need of replacement. When waste piping from the Kitchen clogs, sewage backs up into the chiller mechanical room. A sewage ejector pump was installed in the basement of the original portion as part of the 1980 addition.

There is a Chemtron medical gas (oxygen) and vacuum system in the 1990 addition. The oxygen supply system has been deactivated because it required extensive maintenance and was expensive to operate. Portable oxygen generating equipment is used as required. The vacuum pumps and connections appear to be in satisfactory condition.


Plumbing Fixtures

Rating: 4

Plumbing fixtures, faucets and trim in the original portion of the facility have exceeded their useful life and should be replaced. Those fixtures, as well as those in the 1980 addition do not conform to current, recommended water-usage limits. Fixtures in the 1990 episode are in satisfactory condition. See also "Codes - Handicapped Accessibility: Toilet Rooms".

Central Sources

Rating: 2

The campus has five (5) boilers, three in the Power House and two in the Laundry.

Two of the Fower House boilers (#1 and #2) are 1956 Cleaver Brooks fuel oil boilers used for additional heating capacity during cold weather and as standby units, while the third (#3) is a CAM'S Industry electric boiler, installed in 1981. This boiler operates continually and is taken off-line only for maintenance and repair. The fuel oil boilers require a good deal of maintenance to remove by-products of combustion. In addition, while all three boilers appear to be in relatively good operating condition, the fuel oil boilers have exceeded their expected useful life-span, and the electric boiler is approaching its expected useful life-span.


One boiler (#4) in the Laundry is a 1980 Cleaver Brooks, fuel oil boiler, while the other (#5) is a CAM'S Industry electric boiler. Both were installed in the 1981 episode. The electric boiler operates continually and presently only serves the laundry equipment. The fuel oil boiler is used as a standby for the electric boiler. These boilers have also reached their expected useful life-span.

While these boilers are in fairly good condition for their age, and repairs to all the boilers can continue to be made to keep them operational, the repairs will become more difficult and more expensive as time goes by. Metal parts begin to exhibit fatigue due to frequent heating and cooling. This fatigue is evidenced by cracks. In addition, replacement parts will become more difficult to obtain.

No. 2 fuel oil is stored in three above-ground, painted steel tanks adjacent to the old power house. One tank has copper tubing wound around it through which steam is piped to heat the fuel oil and prevent it from gelling. The piping is insulated and covered with black polyethylene. Because of the limited amount of fuel oil used annually (16,000 gallons on average), it would be cost efficient to use No. I fuel oil, or a winter blend, and remove the steam heating system. Also, the paint is deteriorating at the top of all three tanks. Spill protection is provided by an earthen dike.

A water-cooled Trane Series R chiller was installed in the late 1990's. It is in satisfactory operating condition, and operates at approximately 70 percent of capacity at peak load.

There are two steam to hot water converters. One is used to provide hot water for the fan coil units in the original portion and the 1980 episode. The other is used to provide hot water/glycol mixture to the heating coils in the air handling

units. Heating efficiency is reduced slightly by converting steam to hot water. The unit that provides hot water to fan coil units etc. is located in the penthouse on the 1980 episode. The controls on this unit are in poor condition, the outside anticipator does not work for either the hot water pumps or the hot water reset schedule. The steam trap for the drip leg on the converter was blowing by steam. The converter controls should be upgraded to DDC and connected to the BMS.

Two Aerco water heaters produce hot water for the facility by converting steam. One is used for domestic hot water and the other is dedicated for the Laundry. They are 26 years old and in satisfactory condition and can be expected to last up to 35 years. If the steam pressure reducing station on the Laundry boiler were upgraded and connected to the two water heaters, the laundry boilers could then provide steam for all domestic hot water. This would allow the Power House boilers and steam distribution system to be taken off-line when heating is not required. This would reduce fuel costs, and heat loss in steam distribution lines and equipment rooms (heat gain in adjacent rooms), as well as boiler heat losses during the summer.

There are hot water unit heaters in several ancillary spaces. The units are thermostatically controlled. No problems were observed or reported.

Distribution System

Rating: 2

Steam distribution is provided by black iron piping. There is a 6 PSI steam header originating in the Power House that is used continually for the production of hot water, and in the winter months for heating the facility. Much of this piping is underinsulated or has no insulation resulting in significant heat losses and additional energy costs. There is an 8-inch steam line connecting the old power house to the campus distribution system that is approx. 180 feet long and operates at a nominal 6 PSI. This line is used to heat the old boiler room in the winter, and because of heat losses and other inefficiencies, it should be decommissioned, and a new fuel-oil furnace installed to heat the old boiler room.

There are very few isolation valves on the piping runs, making repairs difficult. In addition many of the valves are in poor condition due to their age. Steam valves are in need of new gaskets and seals.

There are two circulating pumps for the both the hot water and chilled water systems. The pumps are operated alternately, which has helped keep them in good operating condition.

Because of the age of the piping, problems will most likely become more frequent and more difficult to repair (concealed within construction).

Condensate piping, except that to the 1980 addition, was installed in 1990. Condensate and steam piping from the Power House to the building is nearly 60 years old and should be replaced. Condensate pumps for boiler #4 are in poor condition.

Air Handlers

Ratings are provided for each air handler individually at the end of the comments.

AHU #1 serves the 1990 addition. It uses 100 percent outside air and works in parallel with exhaust fan #9. The AHU provides a constant volume of air at a constant discharge temperature. The unit has a heating coil which is fed with the hot water/glycol mixture. A chilled water coil was added to this unit. There is a 3-way valve which controls the discharge air temperature. The unit has no control valve. An inline booster pump was added. There are no known sequences of operation for this unit. In addition the filter access doors were propped open causing the unit to draw the majority of its air from inside the equipment room. The unit has direct digital controls (DDC) and is connected to the existing building monitoring system (BMS). Exhaust fan #9 runs continuously, resulting in a negative air pressure in the facility. Review of the existing system indicates that 100 percent exhaust and 100 percent make-up air are not required for the areas this unit serves. Exhaust fan #9 should be decommissioned and its ductwork removed. Return air ductwork should be installed, along with a mixing box to reduce the amount of outside air intake. In addition AHU #1 should be added to a time schedule on the BMS to reduce its operation from 168 hours/week to 80 hours/week. And the DDC controls for mixed air system and cooling coil should be updated. Rating: 5

AHU #2 provides make-up air to the Kitchen and Dining Room. It has a hot-water heating coil and a chilled water cooling coil. It has DDC controls and is connected to the existing building automation system (BAS). This unit operates 24/7. The associated range hood (Exhaust fan #15), Serving Line exhaust (EF #16), and Dishwash exhaust (EF #10) are manually turned on in the morning and turned off when staff leaves each day. However AHU #2 is not turned off because of freeze-up problems in the range hood exhaust automatic water wash-down and fire suppression system. By leaving AHU #2 running, this creates positive pressure in the room, pushing


warm air up through the exhaust fans keeping them warm enough to prevent freeze-up. A variable frequency drive should be installed on the range hood exhaust fan and to the serving line exhaust fan so the fan speeds could be reduced to 20 percent when the Kitchen is unoccupied or the range hood is not being used. Back-draft dampers should be installed on the dishwash exhaust allowing the unit to be turned off during unoccupied times or when the dishwashing machine is not in use. A variable frequency drive should be installed on AHU #2 so that the unit could track the exhaust fans and adjust the CFM based on the amount of make-up air required. Finally, kitchen staff should be trained to turn off exhaust fans when they are not required. Rating: 5

AHU #3 serves the Multi-Purpose Room, Chapel, Barber/Beauty Salon, general offices and two patient rooms on the first floor of the 1980 episode. It is a mixed air unit, providing a constant volume of air at a constant discharge temperature. There are heating and cooling coils (hot water/glycol and chiller sources respectively). There is a 3-way valve that controls the discharge. The unit has DDC controls and is connected to the BMS. This unit operates 24/7 even though most spaces are occupied from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM daily. The two resident rooms should be disconnected from this unit and connected to AHU #7. AHU #3 should be on a time schedule to operate for 14 hours per day, 7 days a week.


Rating: 7

AHU #4 provides ventilation and air conditioning to the first floor of the 1990 episode, including the Activity/Dining Room and resident rooms. The unit utilizes some return air, however it supplies air at a uniform temperature (no individual thermostats) which results in uneven cooling in the summer. **Rating: 6.**

AHU #5 provides make-up air to the north half of the original building. It has a hot water heating coil and a chilled water cooling coil, an automatic humidifier, and it utilizes 100 percent outside air. It provides make-up air to a combination of resident rooms, general occupancy areas and offices. It has DDC controls and is connected to the existing BMS. The unit operates 24/7. Exhaust fan #1 works in conjunction with this unit and provides exhaust for the same area. The fan runs 24/7 and is not connected to the BMS. The exhaust air is drawn through shafts behind the storage units in these rooms. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Area/Occupancy Separations". The entire air supply and exhaust system in this area of the facility should be replaced. Rating: 2

AHU #6 provides make-up air to the south half of the original building. It ahs a hot water heating coil and a chilled water cooling coil, an automatic humidifier, and it utilizes 100 percent outside air. It provides make-up air to a combination of resident rooms, general occupancy areas and offices. It has DDC controls and is connected to the existing BMS. The unit operates 24/7. Exhaust fan #2 works in conjunction with this unit and provides exhaust for the same area. The fan runs 24/7 and is not connected to the BMS. The humidifier leaks onto the AHU cover and the unit is noisy. The exhaust air is drawn through shafts behind the storage units in these rooms. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Area/Occupancy Separations". The entire air supply and exhaust system in this area of the facility should be replaced. Rating: 2

AHU #7 provides make-up air to a combination of resident rooms, general occupancy areas and offices on the ground floor. It has a steam heating coil with a face and bypass, and an independent DX cooling system. The unit uses 100 percent outside air, has no DDC controls and is not connected to the BMS. This unit is in very poor condition as a result of apparently having been fabricated from a jumble of components. The unit operates 24/7. There is an exhaust fan that works in conjunction with this unit. It runs 24/7 and is not connected to the BMS. The air conditioning unit has problems keeping up during cooling conditions. AHU #7 and the associated exhaust fan and cooling unit should be decommissioned. A plate and frame heat recovery unit with a steam coil should be installed to replace them. Zone control dampers should be installed on the ground floor to eliminate unnecessary make-up air ventilation. Variable frequency drives should be installed to reduce ventilation levels by shutting off the unit during unoccupied periods (ground floor), and reducing ventilation levels to minimum requirements in resident rooms during evening hours. The controls should be upgraded and the unit connected to the BMS, including a time schedule for control of the occupancy dampers and variable frequency drives. Rating: 2

AHU #8 serves the Activity Room in the original portion of the building. It is a mixed air, constant volume, single zone AHU. The unit has steam heat with DX cooling. The controls are in poor condition and the unit is not connected to the BMS. Because the room is used as a smoking room at all hours of the day, the unit runs continuously to ventilate the space. The unit generates more noise than should be expected, and staff indicated that the unit is in less than satisfactory operating condition. The controls should be upgraded and the unit should be connected to the BMS. **Rating:** 5

The Laundry has a stand-alone cooling unit that utilizes 100 percent return air. The unit has two DX cooling units rated at 5 ton each. It is controlled by a wall-mounted thermostat that only has a single setting (no set-back for unoccupied times). The thermostat should be removed and DDC controls installed. The unit should be connected to the BAS and a time schedule developed to disable the unit when the Laundry is unoccupied. Rating: 7

There are two exhaust fans in the Boiler Room in the 1980 addition. Their function is to cool the room when the boilers are on-line. They are controlled by a wall thermostat. The fans run continuously when the boilers are operating, but they do not have make-up air dampers or make-up air fans that operate when the fans are running. This prevents the room from being cooled with 74-degree air, and it creates negative pressure in the building resulting in increased drafts through doors and windows. There is also a set of combustion air dampers that are controlled by a second thermostat. The thermostatic controls for the exhaust fans should be replaced. A new make-up air unit should be installed, and the existing boiler combustion air dampers should be repaired. Rating: 5

The facility has multiple building exhaust fans. All of these fans operate 24/7. Some of these fans could be shut off during unoccupied times. None of the fans are controlled or monitored by the BAS. All fans should be connected to the BAS for monitoring of proper operation and scheduling off during unoccupied periods. **Rating: 5**

The Paint Shop has an exhaust hood vented directly to the exterior. There is no sawdust collection or evacuation system in the Wood Shop. Rating: 2

Air Distribution and Returns

Rating: 3

The original portion of the facility has very little actual ductwork. Exhaust air is drawn in through spaces in storage cabinets and routed through shafts in the building construction. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Area/Occupancy Separations". There is no ventilation in the gang showers/toilets. Ventilation should be added to reduce potential moisture-related problems.

There is no ventilation in the lower level Mechanical Room, resulting in dangerously hot air temperatures caused by heat from the steam operated equipment, and under-insulated steam and condensate piping. Ventilation should be added to reduce the air temperature to safer levels for personnel.

Ductwork in the 1980 and 1990 additions is galvanized metal and is in satisfactory condition, although there is no return air ductwork only supply and exhaust. See also "Mechanical - Air Handlers".

Radiation/Convectors

Rating: 6

The original portion of the building has through-wall fan coil units to provide heating, cooling and ventilation. They have hot water coils for heating and chilled water coils for cooling. The units do not control the temperature well because the control valves operate poorly. In addition, occupants have a difficult time setting the controls to the desired temperature. In addition many of the control valves leak and repairs are difficult due to the design of the units.

The 1980 addition has cabinet unit heaters in corridors and the stairway, and finned-tube radiation in resident rooms and other rooms with individual room controls (thermostat). There is paint on the covers of the finned-tube radiation from when walls were re-painted.

The 1990 episode has cabinet unit heaters in resident rooms and other areas. No problems were observed or reported.

Temperature Control

Rating: 4

The facility has an older, text-based automatic temperature controls BAS system by Johnson Controls. As noted previously, not all mechanical equipment is connected to the BAS. This equipment should be connected to the BAS to improve energy efficiency. The system should be upgraded to a newer, graphical system to improve operator interface and to allow interface with newer operating software and communication systems.

Resident rooms in the 1980 episode, have wall thermostats to control the radiation units in these rooms. Cabinet unit heaters in corridors and common areas also have thermostats. The fan coil units in the resident rooms in the original portion and cabinet unit heaters in the resident rooms in the 1990 addition are operated by controls within the units, not thermostats. Thermostats are either Honeywell or Johnson Controls. No problems with the thermostats were reported or observed.

ELECTRICAL

Main Service

Rating: 8

The building has two electrical services. One is located in the 1981 boiler room addition and is rated at 900 amps, 480-volt, 3-phase, 4 wire. This service is dedicated to boiler #5. The other service is in the 1990 episode. It is rated at 2,000 amps, 480-volt, 3-phase, 4 wire, and is a Siemens brand unit operating at 35% capacity. Both services are in satisfactory condition. Based on existing loads this service has spare capacity.

Distribution/Panelboards

Rating: 8

There are 480-volt distribution feeders from the main service to motor control centers, distribution panelboards, step-down transformers, lighting and power panels.

There is a 300 KVA step-down transformer and a 1,600 amp, 208/120 volt switchboard next to the 1990 main service. The switchboard serves all 120 and 208/240 volt loads. Some new panelboards were added in the original portion of the building in the 1980 episode, and some were replaced in the 1990 episode In addition feeders for the original portion were replaced in the 1990 episode. The distribution system for the 1980 addition was connected to the new service in 1990.

Panelboards are either GE or Siemens brand.

Existing conduits have no space for additional feeders.

All equipment appeared to be in satisfactory condition.

Power Distribution System/Outlets

Rating: 5

All branch circuit wiring in the original portion of the facility was replaced during the 1990 episode. Wiring devices are the grounding type.

There are a minimal number of receptacles in the original portion, and parts of the 1980 addition.


In addition, existing conduits have no more space for additional wiring.

Illumination

Rating: 5

For the most part, light fixtures are fluorescent fixtures with T-12 lamps and magnetic ballasts. Many of the fixtures in the original portion of the building, and over-bed fixtures are surface-mounted. There is an on-going maintenance program to replace these fixtures with types that use high-efficiency T-8 lamps and have high-efficiency electronic ballasts.

In addition there are recessed and surface-mounted incandescent fixtures in some areas, heat lamps in the resident showers in the 1980 episode, and pole-mounted fixtures in the parking lots. These fixtures are exhibiting minor problems associated with normal wear and tear.

Communication/Data Systems

Rating: 5

Surface-mounted speakers in the original portion of the building are deteriorating.

The telephone system is used as intra-building communication between offices etc. No problems were observed or reported.

No problems were reported with the computer network cabling.

Electric Heating

. Rating: N/A

The only electric heating that was observed are recessed wall units in the resident toilet rooms in the 1990 episode. Staff indicated that these units have been disconnected.

Mechanical Equipment Connections

Rating: 7

Most motor controllers were replaced as part of the 1990 episode. Motor controllers are Siemens brand MCC (motor control center) type or stand-alone type. Disconnects for boiler #4 appear to be out-dated.


New labeling should be provided to identify the equipment served and the location of the feed point.

Other Systems (Security systems, etc.) Rating: 4

The 1990 episode has door alarms at most exit doors. Many of these doors were closed off with warning tape to prevent residents from activating the alarms. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Means of Egress".


The building has a fire alarm system, as well as smoke and fire detection equipment. See also "Codes - Life Safety/Building Codes: Smoke/Fire Detection & Alarm Systems" and "Codes - Handicapped Accessibility: Signage/Signals".

The nurse call system in the original portion of the building and the 1980 episode has Rauland pull stations. Pull stations and the control panel in the 1990 episode are by Dukane. Staff reported that the room numbering system needs to be revised to allow for quicker response. In addition, the system is not equipped with an "emergency" indicator capability. In multiple-user toilets in the original portion, only one toilet stall has a pull. Pulls in showers in the original portion are not within reach of the shower stall.




Older disconnects at boiler #4.



Generators Rating: 6

The generator is a Kohler, 250 KW, 480-volt, 3-phase generator in the ground floor mechanical room on the east side of the 1990 episode. It has one output circuit for 480-volt emergency equipment loads, and one output for 120/208-volt emergency equipment loads and operates at 30% capacity. It provides power for emergency lighting, resident room and kitchen fan coil units, sewage pumps, some food service equipment, air compressors, vacuum pumps, condensate pumps, generator support loads, temperature controls, fire alarm panels, elevators, some corridor convenience receptacles, medical gas monitoring, and convenience receptacles at nurses stations. There are two transfer switches, one for the 480-volt critical branch loads, and the other for 208/120-volt life safety and critical branch loads. There is no distinction between 208-120-volt life safety circuits and 208/120-volt critical branch circuits. Staff reported that the automatic transfer switch testing circuit has burned out, requiring the generator to be tested manually. There is a double-wall, underground fuel storage tank on the east side of the building.

There is an Onan, 155 KW standby rated generator in Power House. Fuel is stored in the main fuel oil storage tanks. It has three separate distribution circuits. One serves the Power House (except electric boiler) through a 400 amp automatic transfer switch. The other two are for backup of normal power in the original portion of the building. One of these circuits is 120/240 volt single phase, the other is 240/120 volt, 3-phase. Only the 3-phase circuit is in use. It requires a manual transfer switch operation in the main building. Staff reported that the transfer switch is obsolete and replacement parts are no longer available.

BOILER PLANT

Rating: 3


The boiler plant has brick veneer walls with concrete block back-up and a built-up bituminous roof. The concrete slab-ongrade floor is painted, as is the interior of the concrete block up to approximately 8 feet. The roof structure is steel joists with metal decking.

Staff had to install steel angles on the east and west sides of the building with steel tie rods through the building to keep the walls from bowing outwards.

The sealant at control joints is deteriorating, as is the painted finish on the louvers. The paint on the door on the south side has deteriorated, allowing the door to rust.

One window on the east side appears to have been replaced. There are many dead bugs between the panes of glass.

The building has two separate electrical services. One is rated at 2,300 amps, 480-volt, 3-phase and is dedicated to the 1500 boiler #3. The other service is rated at 400 amps, 240/120 volt, 3-phase, and it serves boilers 1, 2 and 4, the generator power plant and other building loads. Each service is not clearly labeled as service equipment, nor do they identify the location of the other service. The branch circuit panelboards are original to the building and should be replaced. In addition, the directories at each Panelboard are out-of-date and need updating. Wiring devices are the grounding type, but are in need of replacement. Wiring is original to the building and should be upgraded. Light fixtures are fluorescent with T-12 lamps and magnetic ballasts. The fixtures should be replaced. Motor controllers have exceeded their expected useful life and should be replaced.

ORIGINAL BOILER PLANT

Rating: 2

The original boiler plant has brick veneer walls with loadbearing clay tile back-up, and a built-up bituminous roof. The roof structure is steel joists with a concrete deck.

The building has painted steel windows with non-insulating glass. The steel is rusting in most places as the finish is virtually gone, and the glass is cracked or broken in some places.


There are significant cracks in the brick veneer, and the north wall is severely bowed outwards. The mortar joints are also deteriorating.

The building has an overhead electrical service drop to a 100 amp, 120/240 volt, 3-phase, 3 wire loadcenter. Branch circuits are minimal. Light fixtures are fluorescent with T-12 lamps and magnetic ballasts. The fixtures should be replaced. New labeling should be provided for motor controllers.



Rating: 8

The 3-stall garage is a wood-framed structure SE of the main building. It has a concrete slab-on-grade, vinyl siding and asphalt shingles. It has gypsum board on the interior and is heated. No problems were reported.

METAL STORAGE BUILDING

Rating: 1

There is a pre-engineered metal storage building SE of the 3-stall garage. It has a concrete slab-on-grade floor and painted steel windows.

The metal panels are dented, torn and otherwise damaged, with numerous repair patches. The galvanized finish is deteriorating allowing the base metal to rust.

The sliding door on the west side was removed and replaced with a coiling garage door, an adjacent walk-door and painted plywood. The paint is deteriorating. The sliding door on the east side is difficult to operate.



INTERIM LIFE SAFETY MEASURES - Revised

The following safety measures would provide an additional level of fire safety for the current building which has numerous life safety code deficiencies. These measures DO NOT bring the building into compliance with current life safety codes. They would provide fire system as allowed by the Fire Safety Evaluation System (FSES). These measures would provide an additional level of warning and safety in order to enhance safe egress from the building in case of an emergency. They would provide additional separation to the corridor for safe egress from the building. The smoke-fire dampers would separate the supply and return air from each floor.

The required 2 hour shafts would not be accomplished.

These measures would provide additional safe guards during planning, design and construction of a new facility for the North Dakota Veterans Home.

SUMMARY OF EXISTING MECHANICAL SYSTEM


Supply Air:

There are two Air Handling Units (AHU) located on the ground floor at the North and south ends. These units have ducts that rise vertically through a shaft in the corner of this room and the rooms above. At each floor there are ducts that branch off and run down the corridor and supply into the rooms on either side of the corridor with a grill located in the corridor wall. There are fire dampers at each floor with fusible links. The dampers are not tied into the fire alarm system. There are no supply grills into the corridor except on first floor, at the ends located in the entrance lobby.

Return Air (Exhaust):

The exhaust for the 1949 portion of the building is accomplished via power ventilators located on the roof. From these ventilators there are 5 vertical shafts that drop down into the building on each end in the janitor's closet. Two of these shafts on each end continue down to the ground floor and have grills from the linen closet and the janitor's closet on each floor. The other shafts terminate above the ceiling, one per floor with a fire damper. These dampers have a fusible link and are not tied into the fire alarm system. The exhaust or return air from each floor is drawn above the ceilings and through the louvers at the backs of the wardrobes to these vertical shafts at each floor. The east side crosses the corridor in 6 ducted (not verifiable but noted on original drawings) to the west side where the janitor closets are located.

SUPPORT THE ND VETERANS HOME

Position Paper of the North Dakota Veterans Home Governing Board, Feb 2007

The ND Veterans Home has a proud history as one of the state's oldest institutions.

- > Built in 1891 with a land grant.
- Last major reconstruction in 1949 (58 years ago).
- Basic care was increased in 1980.
- > Skilled care was added in 1991.
- Currently licensed for 112 basic & 38 skilled beds, however, many complex issues keep us from operating at capacity.

The ND Veterans Home is routinely inspected by local, state, and federal authorities. We have an obligation to respond to every finding. Very recently, significant structural design problems were identified.

- Safety, code, and compliance issues that were not the responsibility of any one specific group or agency have accumulated, and, when taken in their entirety, have become very significant and must be addressed now.
- > There is no concern over quality of care.
- > In the short term: Immediate measures have been and are being taken to mitigate problems & minimize any and all risks.
- > In the long term: the structural problems must be eliminated rather than minimized.

An analysis of the cost effectiveness of repairing or replacing the current home shows that it would be more cost effective to build a new Veterans Home.

A comprehensive survey of future needs shows that ND will need a Veterans home at least the size of the current one for the foreseeable future, and it will need to be more capable due to the complicated injuries our veterans are coming home with. The total cost to repair or replace will be in the vicinity of \$20-\$25 million, and will be higher every year that goes by without taking action.

There is a great opportunity before us, as the federal government will currently match 65% of our costs and ND could receive the VA's highest priority for these funds. That would make the state's cost about \$6-\$8 million. Timing is critical. In even a couple of years, the situation could change and ND's priority at the federal funding level could fall sharply.

Many worthy programs compete for state money – this should be one of the highest. Veterans should neither be bashful about nor apologize for their requirements.

We need your help!

Whether we get funding to proceed through the legislature, private & public donations, or issue a bond or borrow money that the veterans themselves pay back -- some how, someway, we need to do this, & we should do it now. In even a couple of years, there is no guarantee that we will have the opportunity that we have right now. If this project does not succeed, it will be a shame, but do not let it be our shame. Let's do what's necessary to make this happen!

State Home Construction Grant Program Fact Sheet

ISSUE: This fact sheet provides current information regarding the program.

DISCUSSION: The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) provides financial assistance to the States to construct or acquire nursing home, domiciliary and/or adult day health care facilities. VA may participate in up to 65 percent of the cost of construction or acquisition of State nursing homes or domiciliary or for renovations to existing State homes. A State home is owned and operated by the State. VA assures Congress that State homes provide quality care through inspections, audits, and reconciliation of records conducted by the State home program managers and the VA medical center of jurisdiction. Under a separate State Home Grant program, VA also provides per diem payments to States for the care of eligible veterans in State homes.

The program was authorized by Congress in 1964 and is authorized in Title 38 United States Code (USC) Section 8131-8137 and regulated in Title 38 Code of Federal Regulation (CFR) Part 59.

VA may participate in up to 65 percent of the cost of construction or acquisition of state nursing homes or domiciliaries or for renovations to existing state homes.

A state home is owned and operated by the state.

The ranking of all pending projects results in an annual fiscal year priority list. On 9/27/05, Secretary Nicholson approved the Priority List of Pending State Home Construction Grant Applications for FY 2006. The Priority List is used as the basis for awarding grants during that fiscal year. There are a total of 129 projects on the FY 2006 Priority List and are currently valued at \$656,111,000. The first 80 projects had certified 35 percent state matching funds and are ranked in priority group 1. The current value of the 80 priority group 1 projects is \$419,597,000. The remaining 49 projects will be considered for priority group 1 status once the state can provide certification of 35 percent state matching funds. According to Title 38 CFR 59.50, the final tiebreaker between ranked projects is the date the initial application is submitted.

Since 1999, VA has awarded over \$607 million in grants to the states for construction of or renovations to state veteran's homes. During the remainder of FY 06, VA will potentially award an additional \$105 million in state home construction grants. During this time, the number of VA grants represents more than \$1 billion dollars in new construction and improvements to existing state home facilities.

The FY 2005 operating budget was \$126,244,942. This amount includes the FY 2005 appropriation of \$104,341,696 and no-year carryover funds in the amount of \$21,923,246. The FY 2006 appropriations are yet to be determined. When and if funds are appropriated for this program, they are authorized until expended.

Annually, VA commits to as many projects as funds are authorized and available.

During FY 2005, 40 new initial applications were submitted to VA for consideration. The total value of the initial applications is \$103, 203,713 and if determined to be feasible projects for VA participation, they were ranked on the FY 2006 Priority List. If these projects are awarded future grants, they would add 430 additional beds to the state home system. Annually, initial applications are received prior to the August 15th deadline.



- (i) Priority group 1 sub priority 1. An application for a project to remedy a condition or conditions at an existing facility that have been cited as threatening to the lives or safety of the residents in the facility by a VA_ Life Safety Engineer, a State or local government agency (including a Fire Marshal) or an accrediting institution (including the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations). This priority group does not include applications for the addition or replacement of building utility systems, such as heating and air-conditioning systems or building features, such as roof replacements. Projects in this sub priority will be further prioritized in the following order: seismic, building construction, egress, building compartmentalization (e.g., smoke barrier, fire walls), fire alarm/detection, asbestos/hazardous materials, and all other projects. Projects in this sub priority will be further prioritized based on the date the application for the project was received in VA (the earlier the application was received, the higher the priority given).
- (ii) Priority group 1 sub priority 2. An application from a State that has not previously applied for a grant under 38 U.S.C. 8131-8137 for construction or acquisition of a State nursing home. Projects in this sub priority will be further prioritized based on the date the application for the project was received in VA (the earlier the application was received, the higher the priority given).
- (iii) Priority group 1 sub priority 3. An application for construction or acquisition of a nursing home or domiciliary from a State that has a

Subject: August 15th Reminder - Last Notice

Good Morning,

There are 6 working days until the August 15th deadline and I am working on development of the FY 2007 Priority List. Most of you are aware, on August 15, 2006, the year closes for projects to be further considered for that List. Please make sure that you review your most recent certification to see if it has expired. An expired certification will not qualify for Priority Group 1 status on the FY 07 Priority List.

If you have received a FY 2006 letter indicating that VA could not commit to your project due to fact that your project did not rank high enough, that letter requested that you provide an updated status of the project by April 15, 2006. Several states failed to timely provide the status of their projects. In those responses, the state should have provided that the project should be considered for the FY 2007 Priority List or that the project should be formally withdrawn.

If you received a FY 2006 letter indicating that your initial application was feasible for further VA consideration, no further response is necessary for placement on the FY 2007 Priority List.

However, if the State wants the project to be in Priority Group 1 on the FY 2007 Priority List, I will need by the August 15, 2006 deadline (1) a copy of the legislation authorizing the project (by specific legislation or by line item legislation within a larger bill) and (2) the certification of the 35% State Matching Funds (VA Form 10-0388-6) which must be signed by the State Budget Official.

Unless these requirements are received in this office by the deadline, the project will not be in a position to receive a VA commitment letter in FY 2007. If you meet these requirements, the project will remain on subsequent Priority Lists until the project is eventually awarded a grant or it is withdrawn by the State.
