CHAIRMAN JOHNSON: Committee Members, we will open on HB 1121. The Clerk will read the subject of the bill.

CLERK: HB 1121 is a bill relating to the retail sale of alternative fuels; and to amend And reenact Sections 19-10-01 and 19-10-10 of the NORTH DAKOTA CENTURY CODE, relating to petroleum product definitions and specifications.

CHAIRMAN JOHNSON: Those who would like to testify in favor of HB 1121.

SCOTT RADIG: Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the House Agriculture

Committee. My name is Scott Radig; I am director of the Division of Waste Management for
the North Dakota Department of Health. I am here today to testify in support of House Bill
1121, which regards the definition of alternative fuels.

Scott did say, "To correct an oversight in the original bill proposal, we also are offering four very short amendments, which will ensure that neither adulterated nor misbranded alternative fuels may be offered for sale. I would be happy to answer any questions.

REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Mr. Radig, I think I understand what we are trying to do here. My question has to do with; we have heard some discussions about E- 85 being actually E-63 and variations on that.

What we are doing here in terms of defining actual content of a product be influenced by what this bill is doing?

SCOTT RADIG: Chairman Johnson and Representative Muetler. This bill will define alternative fuel excluding biodiesel. It will give the authority to the Department of Health to define technical steps, percentages, and standards which must be met.

Those may be found in Administrative Rules. When we go through that ruling, we will take information and technical guidance from industry or the National Standards towards B 4 and these types of fuels and technical figures that have definitions. We will probably be going along with National Industry Standards or those types of definitions.

REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER: You are saying, these will be things done within the Health Department that is not necessarily going to show up at the pump unless it is really in E 85 or B 100. The rules also defines label requirements are at the pump and also what the allowable percentages will be based on time of year.

CHAIRMAN JOHNSON: Any other questions? Thank you Scott! Is there any other testimony?

MIKE RUD: I represent the North Dakota Petroleum Marketers. We stand in support of this HB 1121 and would ask your support as well and we feel very confident that we can work with the Health Department. We have in the past and continue to get all the definitions that are needed to get specific about the different gasoline and Diesel as we go forward with this process.

Sen. Flakoll opened the hearing on HB 1121, a bill relating to the retail sale of alternative fuels and to petroleum product definitions and specifications. All members (7) were present.

Dave Glatt, Chief of the Environmental Health Section for the ND Department of Health, testified in favor of the bill. See attached testimony.

Sen. Klein- so in section 2 we are asking now to put a particular kind of label on the pump? What does that section really do?

Dave Glatt- what it does is that it requires that a label is put on the pump so that the purchaser knows what they are buying.

Sen. Klein- is that going to be a burden to the retailer or is that pump going to generally have the same thing in it all the time?

Dave Glatt- currently we do require labeling and so that wouldn't be an additional burden and that pumped would be used with that.

Mike Rudd, NDPMA, testified in favor of the bill.

Mike Rudd- We stand in support of getting the definitions in place and encourage you to give this a do pass.

Sen. Klein- how would you envision a pump that had the ability to have different blends?

Mike Rudd- I have never seen one of these pumps but it is my understanding I that it has 5 buttons on the pump one is regular unleaded, one is E10, one is E85, and the 2 blends would be between E20 and E30 is my understanding. Those would all have to be clearly labeled.

Sen. Klein- and you would have 5 tanks that it would have to come out of or would it blend at that point?

Mike Rudd- the pump would be a blender pump.

Tom Balzer, NDMCA, testified in favor of the bill.

Tom Balzer- We support this bill, this is a option that we have been looking for where the department of health has the option to find quality standards and gives them this option to change as technology changes as well as to wait for technology to catch up for the uses of biodiesel. This also gives us the option to test it.

Sen. Flakoll closed the hearing.

Sen. Klein motioned for a Do Pass and was seconded by Sen. Wanzek, roll call vote 1: 7 yea, 0 nay, 0 absent. Sen. Behm was designated to carry the bill to the floor.
