Rep. Aarsvold, district 20, testified in favor of the bill.

Rep. Aarsvold- I have followed the Northern Crop institute and their progress for many years and from my point of view it is probably one of the most exciting innovations in ND agriculture that we have ever experienced. I would ask you to support this bill.

Rep. Kingsbury, district 16, testified in favor of the bill.
