- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 12.1-31 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the disorderly conduct at a funeral; and to provide a penalty.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 12.1-31 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Disorderly conduct at a funeral - Penalty.

- 1. For purposes of this section:
 - a. "Funeral" means the ceremonies, rituals, processions, and memorial services
 held at a funeral site in connection with the burial, cremation, or memorial of a deceased person.
 - <u>b.</u> "Funeral site" means a church, synagogue, mosque, funeral home, mortuary,
 <u>cemetery, gravesite, mausoleum, or other place at which a funeral may be</u>
 conducted.
- 2. An individual is guilty of disorderly conduct at a funeral if the individual:
 - a. With intent to disrupt a funeral, protests or pickets within five hundred feet
 [152.4 meters] of the funeral or funeral site within one hour before, during, or one hour following the funeral;
 - <u>b.</u> With intent to disrupt a funeral procession, impedes, or attempts to impede a
 vehicle that is part of the procession;
 - c. Intentionally blocks or attempts to block access to a funeral or funeral site; or
- d. Knowingly engages in protests or picketing at the residence of any surviving member of the deceased individual's family or household on the date of the funeral.

- 3. Disorderly conduct at a funeral is a class B misdemeanor. Disorderly conduct at a funeral is a class A misdemeanor if the offender has a prior conviction for disorderly conduct at a funeral under this section or under an equivalent offense of another state or the federal government.
- 4. Any person who violates subsection 2 is liable to a surviving member of the deceased individual's family or household for damages caused by the violation. A surviving member of the deceased individual's family or household may bring an action for injunctive relief and other appropriate relief or remedial compensation. In an action brought under this subsection, a prevailing plaintiff may recover attorney's fees. Any civil action brought under this subsection must be commenced within two years from the date of the death of the deceased individual.
