- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota
- 2 university system; to provide for transfer of funds; to authorize the state board of higher
- 3 education to issue and sell bonds for capital projects; to limit student tuition rates; to provide for
- 4 a transfer; to provide for a legislative council study; to amend and reenact section 15-10-43 of
- 5 the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the contract with the Kansas state university
- 6 veterinary medical education program; to repeal sections 1 and 2 of House Bill No. 1031, as
- 7 approved by the sixtieth legislative assembly, relating to the budgeting process; to provide for
- 8 retroactive application; and to declare an emergency.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. BASE LEVEL FUNDING INFORMATION. The amounts identified in this
section represent the base level funding component appropriated to the North Dakota university
system office and to the various entities and institutions under the supervision of the state
board of higher education listed in section 3 of this Act as follows:

27	SECTION 5. CAPITAL ASSETS. The sum of \$15,754,112	, or so much of the sum as	
28	may be necessary, included in the capital assets line item in subdiv	ision 1 of section 3 of this	
29	Act, must be used by the state board of higher education to satisfy outstanding bond		
30	obligations.

1 **SECTION 6. OPERATIONS POOL.** The sum of \$144,559, or so much of the sum as 2 may be necessary, included in the operations pool line item in subdivision 1 of section 3 of this 3 Act, is to be allocated for system priorities as determined by the state board of higher 4 education. 5 **SECTION 7. COMMON INFORMATION SERVICES.** The sum of \$28,652,267, or so 6 much of the sum as may be necessary, included in the common information services line item 7 in subdivision 1 of section 3 of this Act, must be used for the benefit of the institutions and 8 entities under the control of the state board of higher education, as determined by the board. 9 Funding allocations are to be made based on the North Dakota university system information 10 technology plan and technology priorities. Funds allocated pursuant to this section must be 11 used to support the higher education computer network, the interactive video network, the 12 on-line Dakota information network, ConnectND, northern tier network, and other related 13 technology initiatives as determined by the board. 14 SECTION 8. CONTINGENCY AND CAPITAL EMERGENCY. The sum of \$296,482, 15 or so much of the sum as may be necessary, included in the contingency and capital 16 emergency line item in subdivision 1 of section 3 of this Act, must be used to meet unforeseen 17 operations or capital asset needs and opportunities, as determined by the state board of higher 18 education. 19 SECTION 9. CAPITAL ASSETS - MAYVILLE STATE UNIVERSITY. The sum of 20 \$1,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, included in the capital assets line 21 item in subdivision 1 of section 3 of this Act, may be used for the development of a master 22 capital plan and for deferred maintenance projects at Mayville state university as approved by 23 the board. 24 SECTION 10. STUDENT LOAN TRUST FUND. Section 3 of this Act includes the sum 25 of \$317,460, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the student loan trust fund for 26 the professional student exchange program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and 27 ending June 30, 2009. 28 SECTION 11. PERMANENT OIL TAX TRUST FUND. Section 3 of this Act includes the sum of \$900,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the permanent oil tax 29

trust fund for the service rig program at Williston state college, for the biennium beginning

1	SECTION 12. FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS - APPROPRIATION. All
2	funds, in addition to those appropriated in section 3 of this Act, from federal, private, and other
3	sources, received by the institutions and entities under the control of the state board of higher
4	education are appropriated to those institutions and entities, for the biennium beginning July 1,
5	2007, and ending June 30, 2009. All additional funds received under the North
6	Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and
7	ending June 30, 2009, are appropriated to the state board of higher education for
8	reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board.
9	SECTION 13. TRANSFER AUTHORITY. If, during the biennium beginning July 1,
10	2007, and ending June 30, 2009, the state board of higher education determines that funds
11	allocated to campus operations in section 3 of this Act are needed for capital projects or
12	extraordinary repairs, the board may transfer funds from operations to capital assets. The
13	board shall report any transfer of funds under this section to the office of management and
14	budget.
15	SECTION 14. FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITION ADJUSTMENTS. The state
16	board of higher education is authorized to adjust full-time equivalent positions as needed,
17	subject to the availability of funds, for institutions and entities under its control. The university
18	system shall report any adjustments to the office of management and budget before the
19	submission of the 2009-11 biennium budget request.
20	SECTION 15. EDUCATION INCENTIVE PROGRAMS. The funding appropriated for
21	education incentive programs in subdivision 1 of section 3 of this Act may be allocated to
22	education incentive programs as determined by the state board of higher education, including
23	the reduction or elimination of specific programs, and the state board of higher education may
24	determine the appropriate number of years of program eligibility for each education incentive
25	program.
26	SECTION 16. BISMARCK STATE COLLEGE NATIONAL ENERGY CENTER OF
27	EXCELLENCE BUILDING. The state board of higher education may enter into an agreement
28	or agreements with the Bismarck state college foundation or other private entity and do all
29	things necessary and proper to authorize construction by the foundation or other private entity
30	of a national energy center of excellence building on the Bismarck state college campus using
31	state funds, federal funds, donations, gifts, or other private funds.

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- The admissions committee shall determine the criteria to be used in the selection of eligible students, with eligible students interested in large animal veterinary medicine receiving a priority.
 As a condition of selection under this program, an eligible student shall agree to practice veterinary medicine in this state for a period of three years upon
 - practice veterinary medicine in this state for a period of three years upon graduation. If a student fails to fulfill the commitment for practice in this state, the student shall repay to the state board of higher education all moneys forwarded to or for the student under this Act, on a proportionate basis.
 - **SECTION 26. REPEAL.** Sections 1 and 2 of House Bill No. 1031, as approved by the sixtieth legislative assembly, are repealed.
 - **SECTION 27. RETROACTIVE APPLICATION.** Section 25 of this Act applies retroactively to students participating in the Kansas state university veterinary medicine program.
 - **SECTION 28. EMERGENCY.** The capital assets, professional student exchange program, and contingency and capital emergency line items contained in section 3 of this Act and sections 9 and 15 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.
