## SENATE BILL NO. 2059

- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 20.1-03-12 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to fees for game and fish licenses and permits to propagate, domesticate, or possess
- 3 protected wildlife.

## 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 20.1-03-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is
6 amended and reenacted as follows:

20.1-03-12. Schedule of fees for licenses and permits. The various license and
permit fees are as follows:

- 9 1. For a resident, age sixteen and over, small game hunting license, six dollars.
- 10 2. For a nonresident small game hunting license, eighty-five dollars.
- For a resident big game hunting license, twenty dollars, except the fee for a
   licensee under age sixteen is ten dollars, except as provided in a gubernatorial
   proclamation issued pursuant to section 20.1-08-04.1.
- 14 4. Except for a nonresident who participates on the same basis as a resident in a
- 15lottery for deer licenses remaining after the second lottery for residents under16subsection 4 of section 20.1-03-11, for a nonresident big game hunting license, two17hundred dollars, and for a nonresident bow license, two hundred dollars, and a18nonrefundable five dollar application fee must accompany any lottery license fee19under this subsection, except as provided in a gubernatorial proclamation issued20pursuant to section 20.1-08-04.1. For a nonresident who participates on the same21basis as a resident in a lottery for deer licenses remaining after the second lottery
- 22 for residents, fifty dollars.
- 23 5. For a resident fur-bearer license, seven dollars.

2			or over or a resident totally or permanently disabled, the license fee is three

16			place of business maintained by that person within this state.

19	<del>17.</del>	<u>16.</u>	For an annual license to practice taxidermy, twenty-five dollars.

21			respective open seasons, not to exceed in any one season twenty-five game birds,
22			to points within this state other than that person's home or to points outside this
23			state, three dollars.

25			purposes, ten dollars.
26	<del>20.</del>	<u>19.</u>	For a motorboat certificate of number and license: Each motorboat under sixteen
27			feet [4.88 meters] in length, and all canoes, regardless of length, powered by a
28			motor, twelve dollars. Each motorboat sixteen feet [4.88 meters] in length and over
29			but shorter than twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length, excluding canoes, twenty-four
30			dollars. Each motorboat twenty feet [6.1 meters] in length or over excluding
31			canoes, thirty-three dollars.

21	<del>23.</del>	<u>22.</u>	For a resident paddlefish tag annual license, three dollars per tag.
22	<del>24.</del>	<u>23.</u>	For a nonresident paddlefish tag annual license, seven dollars and fifty cents per
23			tag.
24	<del>25.</del>	<u>24.</u>	For an annual resident license to sell minnows or other live bait at wholesale, fifty
25			dollars.
26	<del>26.</del>	<u>25.</u>	For an annual license to sell minnows or other live bait at retail, fifteen dollars,
27			except the fee is seventy-five dollars if white suckers are sold.

- 3 The fees for these licenses and permits must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited
- 4 to the game and fish fund. Forty-five dollars of each nonresident big game hunting license fee
- 5 must be used for the private land initiative.
