- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact three new sections to chapter 54-06 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to state employee service awards, employer-paid tuition, and
- 3 employer-paid professional organization membership and service club dues.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 54-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

State employee service awards.

- 1. Each state agency, department, or institution shall recognize certain service anniversaries of employees by implementing and administering a service award program. Service awards may be postponed or withheld if there are documented problems with an employee's performance.
- 2. An employee must have completed three, five, ten, fifteen, twenty-five, thirty, thirty-five, forty, forty-five, fifty, fifty-five, sixty, sixty-five, or seventy years of employment with the state to receive a service award. An employee who leaves employment with the state and subsequently returns to employment with the state again begins to accumulate time that must be added to the employee;s previous service and applied to any future service award.
- 3. The types of service awards that an employee is entitled to receive are:
 - a. Following the completion of three years of service, a certificate or plaque, and
 an item not to exceed a value of twenty-five dollars.
 - <u>b.</u> Following the completion of five years of service, a certificate or plaque, and
 <u>an item not to exceed a value of fifty dollars.</u>
 - c. Following the completion of ten years of service, a certificate or plaque, and an item not to exceed a value of one hundred dollars.

1		<u>d.</u>	Following the completion of fifteen years of service, a certificate or plaque,
2			and an item not to exceed a value of one hundred fifty dollars.
3		<u>e.</u>	Following the completion of twenty years of service, a certificate or plaque,
4			and an item not to exceed a value of two hundred dollars.
5		<u>f.</u>	Following the completion of twenty-five years of service, a certificate or
6			plaque, and an item not to exceed a value of two hundred fifty dollars.
7		<u>g.</u>	Following the completion of thirty years of service, a certificate or plaque, and
8			an item not to exceed a value of three hundred dollars dollars dollars.
9		<u>h.</u>	Following the completion of thirty-five years of service, a certificate or plaque,
10			and an item not to exceed a value of three hundred fifty dollars.
11		<u>i.</u>	Following the completion of forty years of service, a certificate or plaque, and
12			an item not to exceed a value of four hundred dollars.
13		<u>j.</u>	Following the completion of forty-five years of service, a certificate or plaque,
14			and an item not to exceed a value of four hundred fifty dollars.
15		<u>k.</u>	Following the completion of fifty years of service and every five-year
16			increment thereafter, a certificate or plaque, and an item not to exceed a
17			value of five hundred dollars.
18	<u>4.</u>	A re	etirement award shall be provided to an employee who has a minimum of fifteen
19		<u>yea</u>	rs of state service and who has not been previously recognized for a retirement
20		by t	he state as follows:
21		<u>a.</u>	A retirement certificate signed by the governor, chief justice, or chairman of
22			the legislative council and a plaque.
23		<u>b.</u>	An item with a value not to exceed two hundred dollars.
24		<u>C.</u>	A farewell party may be provided upon agreement of the employee and the
25			agency, department, or institution.
26		<u>d.</u>	Retirement awards may be withheld if there are documented problems with an
27			employees performance.
28	<u>5.</u>	A st	ate agency, department, or institution may not provide cash to an employee as
29		part	of a service or retirement award program. However, a state agency,
30		<u>dep</u>	artment, or institution may provide a gift certificate.

A expenditure made under this section is deemed to be compensation for services provided to the state and is made for a public purpose and may not be construed as a gift for purposes of section 18 of article X of the Constitution of North Dakota.

SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 54-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Employer-paid tuition. Each state agency, department, or institution may adopt rules or policies to provide training and educational opportunities to its employees to learn new required skills or to enhance their current skills, to increase the opportunity for advancement within the agency or state service, to increase proficiency and productivity, or to improve work performance. The cost of training or education courses, including tuition and fees, may be paid for, within budgetary constraints, by the state agency, department, or institution or reimbursed to the employee in accordance with rule or policy. Each state agency, department, or institution providing employer-paid training or tuition under this section, shall file annually with the office of management and budget a report indicating the individual receiving the employer-paid training or tuition, the amount paid, and a statement of the public purpose or public benefit of the employer-paid training or tuition. The office of management and budget shall submit to the legislative council a report that contains a summary of expenditures made pursuant to this section during the biennium and describes the statements of the public purpose or public benefit of the expenditures. An expenditure for employer-paid training or tuition under this section is deemed to be made for a public purpose and may not be construed as a gift for purposes of section 8 of article X of the Constitution of North Dakota.

SECTION 3. A new section to chapter 54-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Employer-paid membership dues for professional organizations or service clubs.

Each state agency, department, or institution may adopt rules or policies to provide for the payment of membership dues for professional organizations or service clubs, and organizations with a direct job relation to the employees work duties. The cost of membership dues may be paid for, within budgetary constraints, by the state agency, department, or institution or reimbursed to the employee in accordance with rule or policy. Within sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, each state agency, department, or institution making an expenditure under this section, shall file with the office of management and budget a report detailing the

- 1 expenditure, the amount paid, and a statement of the public purpose or public benefit of the
- 2 expenditure. Within ninety days after the close of each biennial period, the office of
- 3 management and budget shall submit to the legislative council the a report that contains a
- 4 summary of expenditures made pursuant to this section during the biennium and describes the
- 5 statements of the public purpose or public benefit of the expenditures. An expenditure made
- 6 under this section is deemed to be compensation for services provided to the state and is made
- 7 for a public purpose and may not be construed as a gift under section 18 of article X of the
- 8 Constitution of North Dakota.
